proper NEA committees before resorting to boycott.

Recently a case in point has come to our attention. Rumor has charged a certain grocery store with working its deliverymen more than 48 hours a week. It was recalled by some that the President's Agreement provides that the num hours for all except mechanical workers, factory sers and artisans, are forty per week. Here was evisently a case of flagrant violation. The rumor spread, Aptrently no one knew where it started; but enough people. selfeved it to hurt the firm's business.

The Compliance Board heard of it and made an investi ration. It discovered that the grocer was not working his deliveryman more than 48 hours a week, and that he was paying the employee \$15 a week instead of \$13 as was pertly permissable. The Compliance Board knew further that an exception to the President's Agreement had been made by General Johnson so that the maximum hours for all grocers had been increased from 40 hours a week to 48 hours a week. And it knew further that deliverymen did not come under the code at all, and could be worked more public. than 48 hours if necessary,

So here we have a case of an employer who was doing more than his part by the NRA. He was paying better than the minimum, wages and he was working his employee less than the maximum hours. And yet because some person, perhaps on account of a grudge against him or possibly through sheer ignorance of the NRA provisions and a sense of misguided patriotism, the grocer's business was being hurt by an incipient boycott. 


