COURT DENIES SINCLAIR PLEA FOR ACQUITTAL

Justice Hitz Rules That
Questions Which Magnate
Refused To Answer Were
Pertinent To The Inquiry

DEFENSE CHALLENGES
COMMITTEE RIGHTS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(INS)—The defense motion for an instructed acquittal on the Harry F. Sinclair contempt trial was denied today by Justice William Hitz in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia.

The wealthy oil man is on trial for contempt of the United States Senate for refusal to answer certain questions before the Senate Teapot Dome investigation committee on March 22, 1934.

Defense attorneys, in their appeal for a directed verdict, challenged the right of the committee to summon and swear witnesses on the date involved, basing their plea entirely upon technical grounds.

The government's case was attacked on the ground that Sinclair had not been legally sworn, as required by law, and, secondly, that the Senate committee was without power to summon witnesses in the oil inquiry after the expiration of the committee's powers.

When Sinclair appeared before the committee on March 22, 1934 he was not sworn, the senators still bound him. Having never been sworn under the new authority, the witness was not amenable to the law requiring testimony, the defense argued.

No confirmation could be obtained today of a published story that "Daddy" Browning had won his suit and that "Peaches" had lost her counter suit.

The decision will be rendered tomorrow, reports heard that Browning wins suit against his young wife.

Izzak Walton Meet Expected To Draw Big Crowd Tonight

Members of the Izzak Walton League and their representative groups are to meet tonight at 8 o'clock in the Court house, where they will hear the provisions of the recently drafted measure preventing the selling and sale of game fish and other aquatic life.

The bill, said to be one of the most stringent ever, is an offense carrying a heavy penalty for possession of use of seal and for the sale of game fish taken from the lake of Seminole county. This is expected to preserve for all time the abundant supply of fish now found in practically every lake of aquatic life in the county.

Members of the Audubon Society are also expected to be present tonight and read a will, for which they will ask for support, establishing a bird sanctuary throughout the actual confines of the county.

First Business Session Of Radio Commission Held In Washington

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(INS)—The first official operating session of the Federal Radio Commission today was held in Washington, D. C., for the purpose of considering the problem of checking interference.

Members of the commission declared, however, that with the installation of good reception in the autumn, they will find a marked improvement and again will begin to get real value out of their receiving sets.

LARGEST RIGID DIRIGIBLE NOW PLANNED BY U.S.

Plans And Specifications
Call For New Monarch Of
Skies To Be 780 Feet In
Length, Engineers Report

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(INS)—The United States Navy is receiving designs and specifications for the largest rigid dirigible ever conceived by aeronautical engineers.

The new monarch of the skies, initial appropriations for which were approved in the session of Congress just closed, will be 780 feet long with a maximum "sausage" diameter of 120 feet.

The dirigible will be 600 feet from tip to tip and 91 feet through its greatest breadth.

General details of the dirigible were revealed today, two days after the British Air Ministry had announced plans in the House of Commons for two new rigid dirigibles of 600-foot length.

Both countries, it is believed, had been under consideration for more than a year, but revelation of the exact limits of the building specifications came as a surprise to the aeronautical engineers.

Vice President Leaves Key West Today For Havana And Panama

KEY WEST, Fla., Mar. 15.—(INS)—Standing on the dock this morning waiting for the vessel to leave for Havana, Charles G. Dawes, vice-president of the United States, announced himself by using silver pieces into the Gulf stream to be captured by diving pearlmen who enter the water in a boat at this port by their water suits.

Dawes stated his visit to Havana and Panama was purely one of recreation. With him were Mrs. Dawes, their daughter, Virginia, Benjamin G. Dawes, brother of the vice-president, and E. L. Ames of Ohio.

Mrs. Ames and Mrs. B. G. Dawes met the party on their arrival here this morning.

Three Liquor Cases Tried This Morning

Court Again Rules In Favor Of Ford In Million Dollar Suit

Judge Overrules Plea
Of Defense Asking
For Elimination Of
Justification Plea

DETROIT, March 15.—(INS)—With justice smiling upon him for the second time in as many days, Henry Ford won another round today in the \$1,000,000 libel suit brought against him by Aaron Sapiro, Chicago attorney.

Federal Judge Fred S. Raymond overruled a motion by attorneys for Sapiro to eliminate Ford's plea of justification on the ground it violated an earlier court order.

The decision gave Ford wide latitude in presenting his defense to the libel suit, which was based upon a series of articles, published in the Dearborn Independent, attacking Sapiro's activities in organizing farmers cooperative associations.

The court postponed a decision on a motion by Sapiro's counsel to eliminate the whole Ford plea. He held that the plea was defective in many instances but that the trial could proceed without a final ruling on the plea.

Ford's plea of justification was important to the auto king's case because his defense to the libel suit will be limited to facts known to the jury at the time the trial began.

Aaron Sapiro, the plaintiff, was in court and was given the opportunity to make his case before the court.

Big Acreage Available For Rubber Culture

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(INS)—Six million acres of land in central and northern South America are available for rubber culture, today in an exhaustive report on the possibilities of rubber production in the western hemisphere.

The report was made by experts who have been studying ways and means of liberating American customers from the British rubber monopolies with the hope of their incidental attention.

Plan To Aid Farmer Given To President

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(INS)—A plan to make seed and fertilizer loans to farmers, by making the counties guarantors where the borrower does not possess collateral, was presented to President Coolidge today by Albert C. Williams, member of the Federal Farm Loan Board.

SHANGHAI, Mar. 15.—(INS)—The city of Wuhu today was reported to have fallen into the hands of some kind of Kuomintang (Nationalist) committee. All the civil authorities evacuated the city after mobs had entered the offices.

Taxable Wealth For Each Child Enrolled In Public Schools Totals \$2,295.81

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 14. (INS)—The taxable wealth per child enrolled in the public schools of Florida amounts to \$2,295.81 according to figures compiled by state superintendent of public instruction W. S. Cawthorn.

Florida's enrollment in public schools at the present time is 3,127,617 pupils. The total county tax valuations of the state in 1926 amounted to \$786,645,325, the basis for Dr. Cawthorn's present calculation.

Dade county has the highest taxable wealth per child of any in the state, this being \$3,758.92 in this county here in a total enrollment of 31,770 pupils and the tax valuation is \$119,421,171.

Palm Beach county has a taxable wealth per child of \$2,832.70. Palm Beach county's enrollment in public schools is 11,164 and the tax valuation is \$31,624,592, according to Cawthorn's records.

Duval county has a taxable wealth per child of \$2,985.72, the county's enrollment being 3,870 and tax valuation \$11,551,770.

Duval county's taxable wealth per child is \$2,985.72, having an enrollment in Duval county schools of 28,658 and a tax valuation of \$77,359,920.

Seminole county has a taxable wealth per child of \$2,578.24. Enrollment is 4,753 and tax valuation of the county \$10,828,485.

Pinellas county has a taxable wealth per child of \$2,405.54. Enrollment in public schools totals 17,721 and the tax valuation of the county is \$40,859,540.

Hillsborough county has a taxable wealth per child of \$2,244.33. Public school enrollment is 32,121 and county tax valuation, \$72,116,254.

Polk county has a taxable wealth per child of \$1,633.01, the enrollment in schools being 19,991 and the county tax valuation only \$32,645,634.

Washington High School Student Play With Big Sticks Of Dynamite

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14. (INS)—Teachers at Central High School were wondering today, somewhat apprehensively, just how far this younger generation's desire for a "kick in life" is going to express itself.

It was long enough when cigarettes appeared dropping from the mouths of juveniles; it was worse when flasks began to bulge a youthful hips—but that was before the era of dynamite.

The dynamite isn't any new thing for the contents of a flask, after all, it is real.

Parents, teachers and police are flabbergasted today over the discovery that five freshmen students at Central have for several days been carrying around sticks of dynamite in their pockets as usually as they might carry lead pencils.

One of the boys is said to have playfully wielded the stick as a lute in conducting his class as an imaginary orchestra, leading to an expose.

The resultant investigation developed that the explosive had been found in the woods near Adams Mill road and been casually appropriated by the boys. They knew what it was, too, according to the police, who are withholding their names.

They will not be punished, according to school authorities, but they will be given a lecture concerning the kickable properties of dynamite.

There are 32,000 students at Central High School. The dynamite was sufficient to have given many of them their last "kick" in life.

PROSPERITY OF NATION SEEN IN TAX PAYMENTS

Revenue For Income Tax Is Estimated At Six Hundred Millions For 1st Quarter

WASHINGTON, March 14.—The high-tide of the American prosperity, reached last year, was reflected today as the advance word of dollars began flowing in the Treasury on income tax returns for 1926.

With initial payments due by March 15, Treasury experts predicted the income tax revenues would total at least \$600,000,000 in the first quarter of the year. This will mark an increase of \$100,000,000 over the revenues on March 15 last year when \$499,000,000 was paid into the Treasury.

Government officials view the prospects of the golden flood with approval. They anticipated it would provide a surplus of \$100,000,000 in the Treasury by the end of the present fiscal year, June 30.

With a surplus of this bulk in the Treasury, it was pointed out, possible tax reductions will be effected when Congress convenes in December.

The principal reason for the sharp increase in revenues, officials said, was the widespread industrial and commercial prosperity throughout the country last year. The scattered spot of agricultural depression, it was added, had little effect upon the tax revenues since the agriculture of the nation had turned into a decided virtue, since by controlling the "skip" messages may be sent to one particular desired point, and not to other points for which they are not intended.

Curtains Asked For Railroad Locomotives

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14. (INS)—The Wisconsin Railroad Commission today asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to order approximately five hundred railroads throughout the country to equip locomotive cabs with curtains and other devices to protect employees from inclement weather.

This action was taken following the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court holding that the Wisconsin Law and the regulations of the Wisconsin Commission requiring the installation of such devices were void. The Court held that the Interstate Commerce Commission has full authority in the matter under the Boiler Inspection Act.

Soft Coal Operators Planning Shutdown

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 14. (INS)—Plans for cessation of activity in the Ohio soft coal fields upon the expiration of the Jacksonville wage agreement March 31, were being made today by members of the Ohio mine operators' association.

The operators assert that they see no way of avoiding a general shut down, unless a last minute resumption of negotiations with the United Mine Workers union, should result in a temporary plan for keeping the mines in operation while a permanent wage agreement is worked out.

Billy Sunday Raps Sinclair Lewis For His New Book "Elmer Gantry"

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Mar. 14. Billy Sunday let loose one of his characteristic tirades today, this time not against the "devil" but aimed at Sinclair Lewis' new book, "Elmer Gantry," depicting the career of a hypocrite traveling to fame and fortune via the pulpit with base aims as the only goal.

While his blast was largely at the author, it also included the American reading public.

"That there is any market for all such unconvincing things as this 'Elmer Gantry' appears to be due to the deplorable religious conditions in the country today," the famous evangelist declared in a personally-wired statement from Tampa to International News Service here today.

"If I am not mistaken, this same Sinclair Lewis is the kind who stood in the pulpit in Kansas City some time ago, ridiculed Christianity and defied God to strike him dead. And I been the Lord I would have soaked him so hard there would have been nothing left for the devil to levy on."

Only burning belief can awaken belief in others, but owing to the teachings of the so-called "new theologians," an appalling number of pastors, ministers, priests and religious teachers have virtually ceased to believe themselves, Sunday said.

"And the result is," he continued, "that their timid and insecure converts are really only heretics and liars. It is a terrible accusation, but it is true. Reinhold Wright Kauffman has written a book recently, 'A Man of Little Faith,' which was a fine expose of conditions and will not leave a dark brown taste in the reader's mouth."

"Master Of Hounds" At White House Worried By Addition Of Two Lions

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14. (INS)—Clarence Jackson, the diminutive bowlegged colored youth who beams under the title of "master of hounds" at the White House, wore a distinctly worried look today.

For the first time since Clarence took up the job of looking after the presidential menagerie of dogs, cats, zebras, squirrels, et cetera, a fear has crept into his mind that perhaps the job isn't all that a colored boy could desire.

The reason for Clarence's worry is a cablegram received by President Coolidge from the mayor of Johannesburg, South Africa, to the general effect that two lions are being dispatched as a gift from the city of Johannesburg. They will be along in a few weeks.

The master of the hounds shuffled uneasily today when he was gravely informed by Mr. Coolidge of the impending arrivals, and just what would be necessary in the way of their care and comfort.

"Are they mean and ornery lions, Mr. President?" asked Clarence dubiously.

"Not particularly I believe said the president. "One of them is said to have a benevolent disposition. The other is sometimes addicted to biting."

Clarence wasn't sure about the meaning of abduction, but he did understand what biting meant.

"Yes," continued the President, "one is said to have bitten a boy down there. But, then, his foot was off the ground."

Clarence scratched his head. If a boy's foot was off the ground, he finally figured, that boy was moving.

"Yessah," he said, and retired to think.

State Survey Reveals Very Little Damage Done To Truck and Fruit

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Mar. 14. (INS)—Considerably less damage than at first supposed was suffered by truck and fruit crops in Florida as a result of the unusual frigid spell during the past week, according to the weekly weather and crop bulletin issued by the government weather bureau here today.

The complete bulletin follows: "The week was fraught with much danger to the truck and fruit grower. Moderate rains during the first day were followed by bright skies and falling temperature, terminating in killing frost and freezing temperatures southward to the everglades on Friday. A review of conditions shows that the damage to truck, such as beans, potatoes, and tomatoes, suffered severely or were killed in the interior, except where protected or favorably located; practically no damage was done to the truck on the southeast coast. The damage to potatoes in the Hawthorne district was much less than apprehended; some tops were partially cut back, but recovery is expected. A large acreage to cucumbers and melons was protected; only exposed vines suffered in such instances as some potato fields were saved by flooding with Artesian water. Where truck and melons were killed, the work of replanting began at once. There was no damage to orange groves; strawberry bloom suffered to some extent. A large acreage to melons is being planted in some western counties, replacing cotton, to some extent, in Jacksonville. Truck in the west, as was the case in the peninsula, suffered considerably. Rain is needed in some localities of the peninsula, but there is ample soil moisture over much of the section, too much so some low lands of the western division.

— Northern Division —

Much sunshine with the temperature about 8 below the normal freezing temperatures in the interior. All truck, melons, and other tender plants suffered—much was killed in some districts. Citrus bloom was not damaged.

— Central Division —

The week was unusually cold with killing frosts on several days. Tender plants suffered severely in some localities; citrus bloom was not damaged; berries suffered to some extent.

— Western Division —

Truck and some tobacco plants. Large acreage is being planted to melons—much already planted; the planting of corn continued locally.

— Southern Division —

There was no frost damage on the coast, but truck was damaged in the interior; some potato fields were saved by flooding them. The shipping of beans and other truck continued from several districts."

Appropriations For State Colleges To Have Big Boost If Solons Pass On Budget

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 14. The board of control received only \$36,764,475.50 in other words, their appropriations during the years from 1924 to 1926 will amount to \$5,994,484.50 more than they were from 1920 to 1924.

"It is difficult to keep taxes down and at the same time enable the various state departments to be adequately financed. Even with the necessity for keeping taxes down, the budget commission new buildings and equipment for the University of Florida at Gainesville and the Florida State College for women at Tallahassee.

"To make further increase over appropriations for the past two years would only mean larger increases in state taxes, and evidence from every part of the state have convinced me that the coming year will be such that higher taxes will work an absolute hardship on the people of Florida."

Business Manager J. G. Kellom of the Florida State College for Women, today told the International News Service that the \$200,000 granted the State Women's College at Tallahassee for the construction of a dormitory and equipment by the state budget committee was far from adequate for the work it was impossible for the College to grow under the present conditions.

"The Florida State College for Women, which has 1,400 students, has had for the past five years a first-class first-class program and thousands have been turned away from the school because of inadequate facilities," Kellom said.

"The Florida State College for Women could have and should have an enrollment of over 2,500 students if adequate dormitories were furnished," he said.

The College for Women asked for \$200,000 for new housing facilities for Florida girls, but the budget commission trimmed this sum to \$250,000, practically one-third.

"The trouble with most people," Kellom said, "is that they don't realize that the future state is the young women and men of today. They could build roads and houses and look with pride upon the construction because it is a material thing and can be seen. It is a spiritual thing and can not be seen physically and therefore is neglected merely because it can not be seen every day."

Kellom pointed out that there were almost 25,000 students being graduated from Florida high schools annually and only about five per cent were given the opportunity of a higher education because of the lack of facilities in the state.
