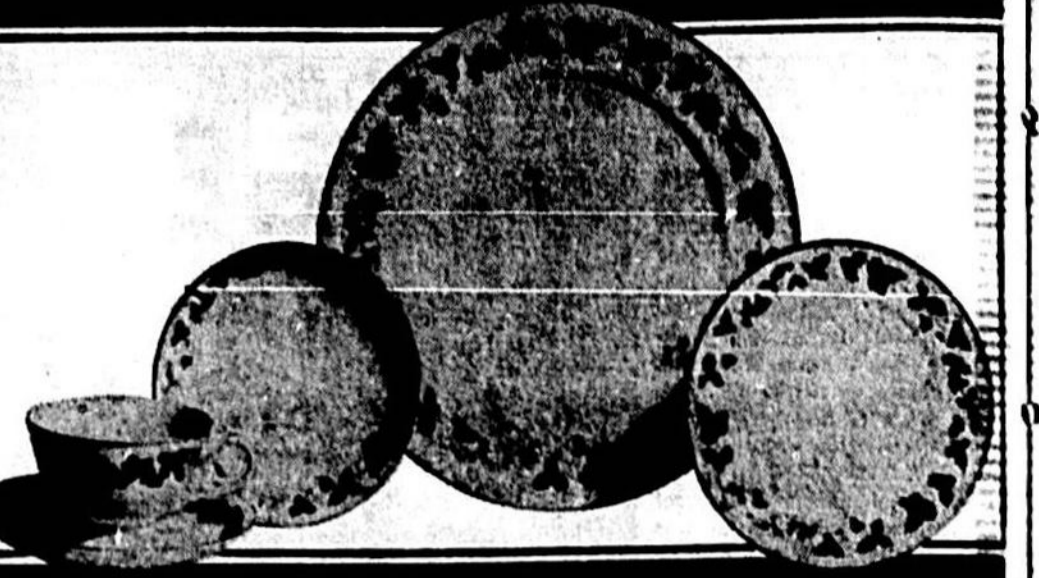

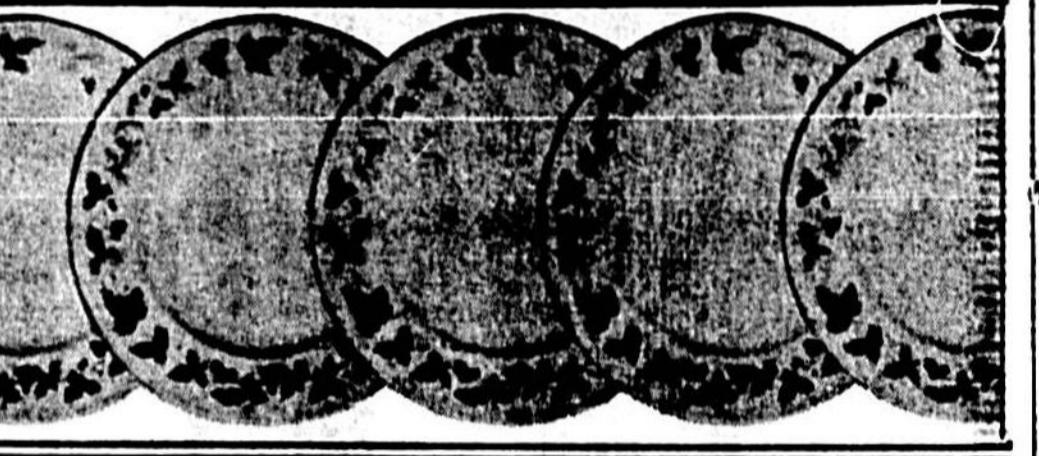

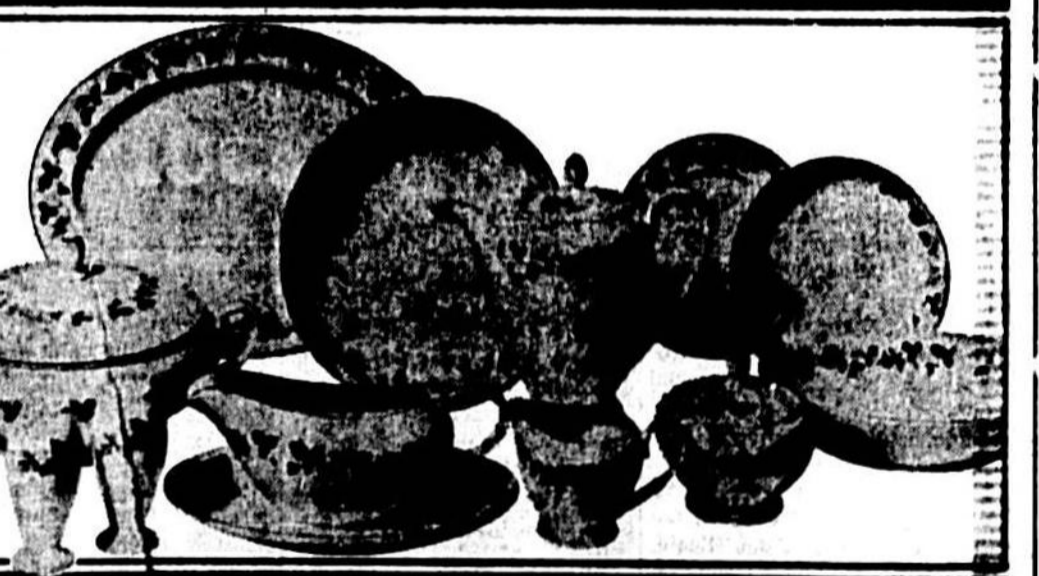

**Seminole Raiders Continue Winning Streak; Grab 20th**

Seminole Junior College's Raider basketball squad proved that it is "the team to beat" in junior college action as they won their 20th straight game Wednesday evening downing the Daytona Beach Junior College Scots 92-55.

It was the Raiders' 22nd win in 23 starts as they kept their No. 1 state rating out of the reach of Harvard Junior College

who has two losses on the year. The powerful Titans are only one game behind the Raiders in hoop standings and also the only squad which has beaten the highly rated SIC squad. The Seminole team now has a two-year record of 37 wins and five losses.

In last night's action swiftly guard Darryl Wynn was the man with the hot hand as he hit on eight of 11 floor shots for a

61 per cent average and racked up 21 points to lead the on-rushing Raiders. Wynn also played one of his best defensive games of the season by taking the ball away from the Scots three times during the contest, two of which resulted in four points for the mini-37 guard from Anoka.

Right behind Wynn in the scoring was exciting Vernell Elzy who dropped in 18 points, picked off 21 rebounds and led

the assists column with a phenomenal six pickups.

Jim Shinnholder of the Scots did a fine job for his outclassing team flipping in 27 points and picking off 12 rebounds. Right behind the fine center was teammate Jim Richmond with 18 points.

Fred Milton, 6'7" forward of the Raiders did a remarkable floor shooting job hitting on 85 per cent of his attempts for 12

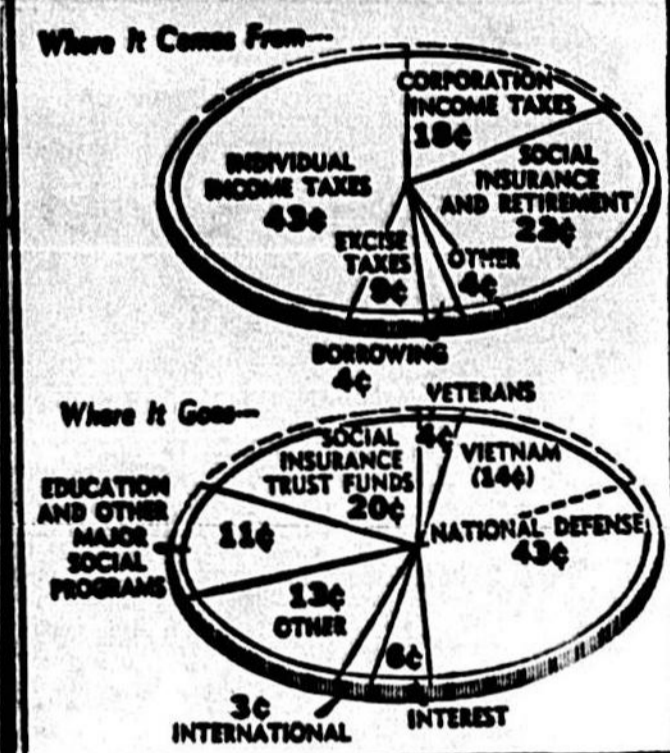

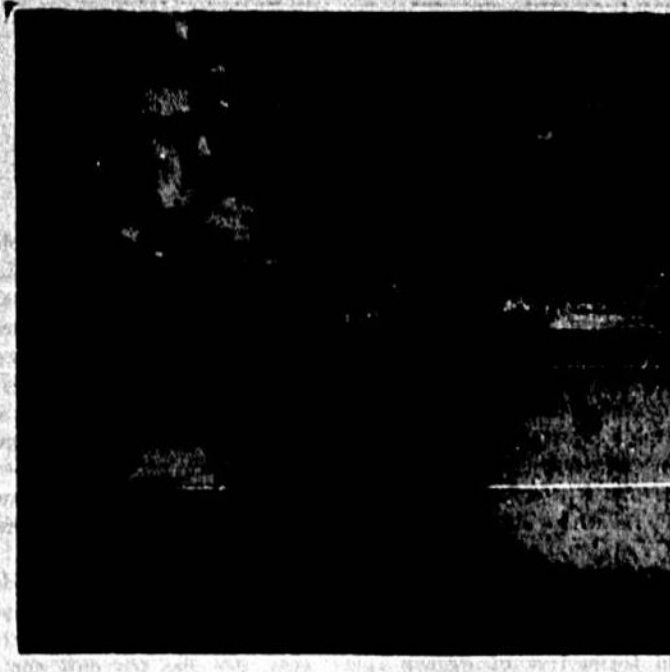

# Tax Hike Means Healthy Gains, Johnson Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson called Thursday for a temporary no-strike treaty between industry and labor, a tax increase "in the next few weeks" and a study of possible new wage-price guidelines.

In his annual Economic Report, Johnson warned Congress the business advance is running "too fast for safety." The nation must choose quickly, he said, whether it wants to avoid a "feverish boom" leading to a possible financial crisis, and perhaps ultimately a recession.

The expansion can be moderated by prompt enactment of his proposed 10 per cent tax surcharge—a high but healthy production gain of \$1 billion he said. That would bring 1968 output to a record \$400 billion.

"Damage already has been done to interest rates, to our trade surplus, and to the level of prices by the failure of Congress to act last fall," Johnson said.

"But it is still not too late to avoid far more serious problems if action is taken in the next few weeks."

He endorsed a voluntary moratorium on strikes in major industries to keep American goods available and competition in world markets and prevent further balance-of-payments trouble.

"We must," Johnson said,

"exert every effort to avoid the possible destructive effects on our trade surplus of strikes or the threat of strikes in key industries."

"I urge business and labor to cooperate with the Secretaries of Labor and Commerce in dealing with this danger to our export surplus."

The President also announced establishment of a Cabinet Committee on Price Stability directed to develop means of fostering price and wage stability. Among other devices the committee will try to draft a formula for every restraint in wage and price decisions.

"The panel will not intervene in any specific current wage or price matters," Johnson said. But he indicated it will seek some guidelines device to replace the virtually defunct wage-price guidelines promulgated under President John F. Kennedy.

The President's Council of Economic Advisers—whose new chairman, Arthur M. Okin, will head the Cabinet committee—said in its own report, transmitted to Congress along with Johnson's, that a series of conferences will be started shortly with representatives of labor, business and the public.

The aim, said the council, will be "to attempt to reach some

agreement on appropriate general standards to guide private price and wage decisions."

Johnson's report was the last of three major presidential messages sent annually to a new session of Congress. His demand for approval of the proposed \$10.5 billion surtax, to become effective April 1 for individuals and retroactive to Jan. 1 for corporations, was delivered in even stronger terms than in the State of the Union and budget messages.

But Johnson never mentioned a threat of price or wage ceilings. And his council used such terms as "folly," "repugnant," "arbitrary" and "chummy" in rejecting direct controls.

In his own 11,000-word portion of the message, the President: —Vowed not to devalue the dollar. The U.S. commitment to maintain gold at \$35 an ounce is firm and clear, he said, Kennedy.

"We will not be a party to raising its price. The dollar will continue to be kept as good as or better than gold."

—Asked speedy action by Congress to erase the requirement that the bulk of the gold stock remain frozen as a currency reserve. Freeing it for sale to maintain the \$35 price, Johnson said, will demonstrate U.S. readiness to meet its commitments.

—Reiterated his Jan. 1 directives to close the balance-of-payments deficit, urging Americans to postpone travel outside the Western Hemisphere for two years.

—Denounced the movement in Congress to impose import quotas on steel and a score of other products. This would be "retreating into short-sighted protectionism," Johnson said, and would bring swift retaliation against U.S. goods, thus penalizing all Americans.

"Protectionism is no answer to our balance-of-payments problem," the President added. "Its solution depends on export promotion."

—To the latter end, Johnson announced he shortly will send Congress legislation to extend steel industry's tariff-making authority and take other steps toward free trade.

Although the message referred only briefly to the proposed labor-management no-strike pledge, the advisers' companion report noted the steel industry presents a current threat to the payments balance.

Steel users are buying heavily on a hedge against a possible strike when the wage contract expires July 31, and some are placing orders overseas to insure delivery. The forthcoming pledge in steel imports, said the report, is a continuing threat to the payments balance.

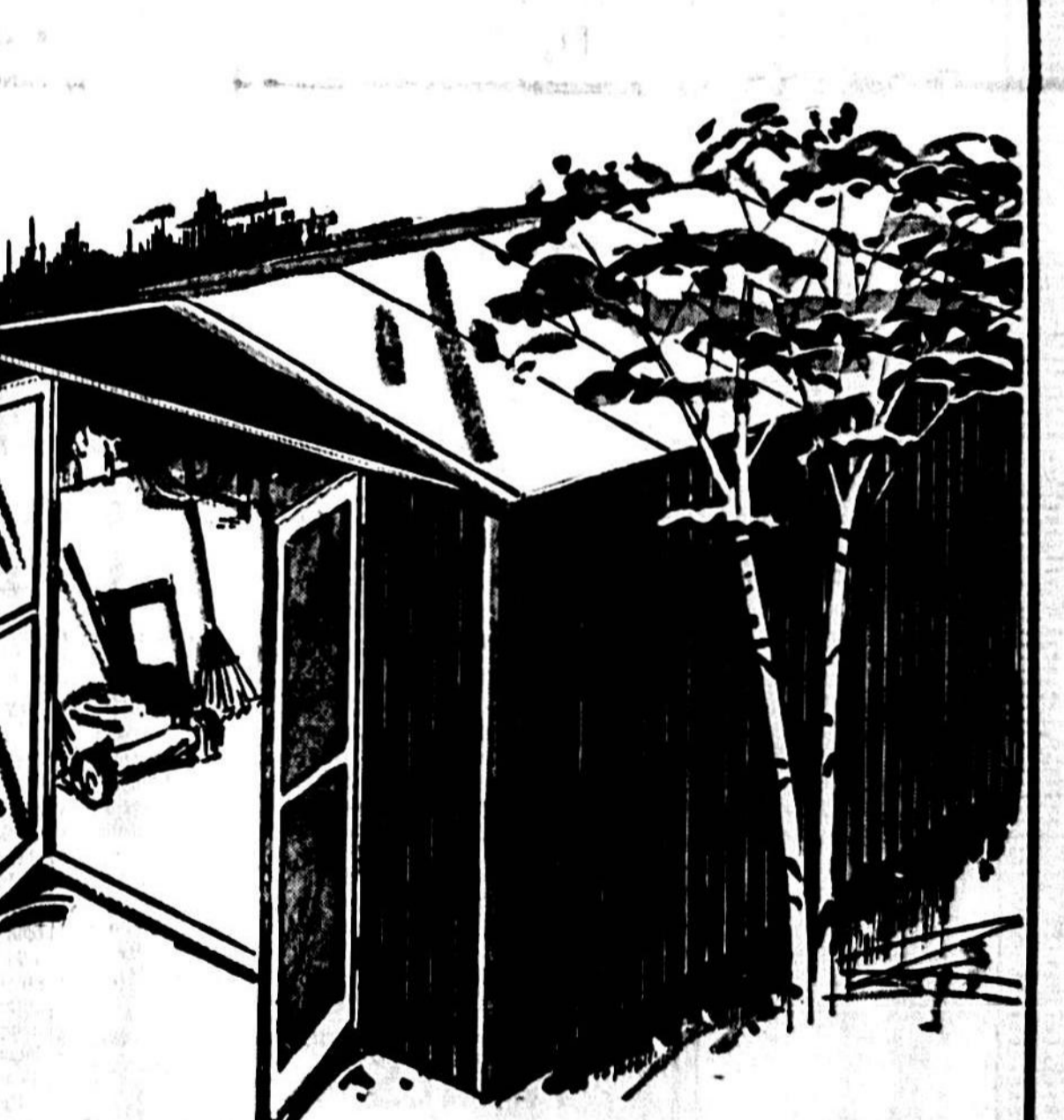

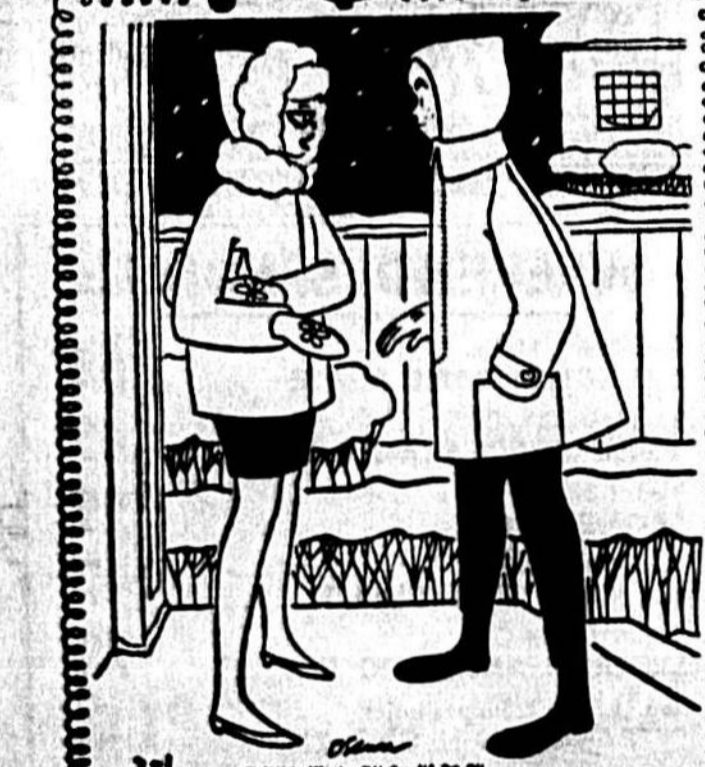

Mrs. Doris Rouse, of 107 Anderson Circle, Country Club Manor, lost her life this morning in a fire apparently caused from a dropped lighted cigarette.

Peace Justice Alfred Davis, acting as coroner, is holding the body pending investigation to determine the cause of death.

The burning house was discovered by the dead woman's husband, Chief James O. Rouse, U. S. Navy, when he returned home at 5:30 a.m. before his planned departure for Camp Lejeune, N. C., where he had been assigned.

Sanford Fire Department was called to the scene. Rouse said he had been out most of the night visiting friends before his planned departure. When he arrived at his home along with a Marine, who was going to accompany him to North Carolina, he discovered the fire and broke in windows and the front door.

He said he discovered his wife's body seated in a chair near the door.

Rouse said his wife had been dependent on late and in severe pain as a result of burns she received last October in a fire in their home, which was started by a cigarette.

The sailor has been in the service for the past 25 years and has served in Korea and Hawaii and other locations overseas. He has been stationed at Sanford Naval Air Station for the past 18 months.

Mrs. Rouse was pronounced dead at 6:45 a.m. by Lt. Gerald Trovay, M. D., from SNAS.

Standing room only was available at the City Hall for the meeting. Crowd of citizens which began arriving for the meeting before 7:30 swelled to more than 125 in numbers. When the Council Chamber was full, the doors were opened to permit the people standing on the porch to hear the proceedings.

**A-Missile Warheads In Need Of Much Work**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States disclosed today much work remains to be done on its newest nuclear missile warheads.

But officials voiced confidence that "real, reliable hardware" would be ready for production when newly expanded plants are opened to handle the work.

Word that further, non-nuclear development work remains to be done on the warheads came out only two days after the Atomic Energy Commission revealed plans for a major new expansion of eight of its weapons production plants.

In the earlier disclosure, the AEC said the expansion was designed to produce nuclear warheads for the Sentinel antiballistic missile system, scheduled for defense against any Red Chinese nuclear threat. Other advanced weapons systems, including the submarine-launched Poseidon and the land-based Minuteman 3, also will be produced in the expanded plants.

"The word" of these missiles are not real "come out after a report asked the AEC for amplification of a letter informing the commission's annual report today to Congress, declared:

"A major effort (in weapons development) is being devoted to the development of new nuclear warheads required by the Poseidon."

One AEC weapons official said prototypes of all the new missiles "have been tested in clarity, and we are sure of the concepts, but details of design remain to produce 'real, reliable hardware' capable of being readily used by the armed forces."
