Groups that will sing include the Famous Florida Jubilee Singers of Orlando, the Celery City Quartet of Sanford, the Sanford Jubilee Singers, the Sanford Spiritual Singers, James Hall, Jr., and his Metropolitan Chorus, and Eddie Glavin, tenor soloist.

Favorite numbers will be sung and reserved seats are available for white people.

R. E. Kipp, principal of the Sanford Grammar School will be

guest speaker on the program. The Hopper Academy is one of only three negro elementary schools in Florida that are fully accredited by the State Department of Education for 1941-1942, but has received notice from this department that if it is to remain on the fully accredited list it must ask at least 900 approved books to its library.

**3 Sanford Students Work As Assistants**

DELAND, Mar. 5. —(Special) —Investigation into one of the least publicized phases of campus activities at Stetson University recently revealed that three Sanford students are among the 17 student assistants now employed in the Stetson library. According to a report from Miss Charlotte Smith, head librarian, Miss Nancy Rossetter has charge of government documents and Forest May and Robert May receive a number of hours each week in the circulation department of the library storehouse, for which they are granted credit by the school in payment of tuition expenses.

Financial assistance, however, is not the sole benefit which these students gain from their work, Miss Smith emphasized in

her report. Employment in the Stetson library has become equivalent to an honor due to high standards of efficiency and industry required from the personnel. Perhaps the most important benefit, the librarian said, is the apprenticeship training which the student workers undergo, giving them a solid footing in the event they desire to go into actual training for a librarian's post.

Youthful Commanders

In a particularly interesting article advocating the appointment of younger men to commanding positions in the armed forces of the United States, Walter Lippmann shows that although there have been a few old Field Marshals in their late seventies who still had sufficient dash and imagination to win battles, by far the majority of the world's great military leaders were in their-thirties or forties.

"Let us list some of the great commanders of history," Mr. Lippmann writes. "Alexander was thirty-three when he died. Hannibal was winning his most important victories before he was thirty years old. Caesar was in his early forties when he undertook the Gallic wars."

"Wallenstein was forty-two at the beginning of his famous campaigns. Marlborough was fifty-two when he became captain general of the English troops. Wellington was forty-six when he won the battle of Waterloo. Napoleon was twenty-seven when he won the campaign of Italy, was forty-one at the zenith of his greatness as a general, and only forty-six when his military career was ended. Nelson was forty-seven when he was killed at Trafalgar. Weyand was forty-seven at the battle of the Marne and Ludendorff was forty-nine at the battle of Tannenberg. Chiang Kai-Shek was the leader of the Chinese before he was fifty."

"Consider our own military men. Washington was forty-four when he took command of the Continental Army. John Paul Jones was twenty-seven at the beginning of the War of Independence. Decatur was twenty-five when he made his name in the Tripolitan war. Perry was thirty-seven in 1812. Andrew Jackson was forty-eight at the battle of New Orleans. Robert E. Lee was fifty-four at the beginning of the War Between the States, but his greatest field commander, Stonewall Jackson, was less than forty when he was killed. Sherman was forty-five at the end of his campaign. Grant was forty-three at Appomattox.

"It may be significant, too, to remember that in 1934, when General Charles De Gaulle published the book on mechanized war which the French general staff ignored and the German general staff studied so profitably, he was forty-four years old. It is also interesting that Colonel William Mitchell was about forty when he began to agitate for the recognition of air power, and that he was forty-seven when he was convicted by a court-martial in 1926."

With this as his background Mr. Lippmann concludes that there should be a complete reorganization of the Army, Navy and Air Forces of the country to place in positions of supreme command those who have risen from the lowest grades since the last World War. "Go down to the younger men—men in their thirties and forties—" he says, "and you are in a generation born and bred to mechanized movement and already at home in the air. They alone can use the new weapons as they should be used."

Flood Control

Calling for the early construction of a canal connecting the St. Johns and Indian Rivers and controlling the waters of the Upper St. Johns and Kissimmee valleys, the Orlando Sentinel points to the grave plight which the cattlemen of this area are now facing as a result of the high waters last Spring which flooded their pastures leaving the cattle with little or nothing on which to graze this winter.

The Sentinel insists that the present emergency provides new proof that this "comparatively inexpensive canal" ought to be dug at once and declares, "This ought to be a good time for our delegation in Congress to impress on their colleagues the wisdom of making this connection between the two rivers, which would also serve as a valuable route for small water carriers."

"Grave indeed is the plight of cattle along the St. Johns in Seminole County where pasture was ruined last year by heavy floods, obliging stockmen to use up their winter pastures and now cattle are near starving unless fed," says the Orlando paper. "Right at this time when the need for food grows greater the situation is all the more serious, for we cannot raise too much meat for our forces and our own use."

"Stockmen are buying feed, but their animals not used to being fed are in many cases scattered hopelessly along the streams and lakes in search of hyacinths and the first green growth of every kind. It is a nip and tuck game whether the new grass will come on in time to relieve the scarcity, especially with the recent heavy rains again covering some of the low areas."

"This situation has happened before and will happen again unless proper measures of water control are taken to prevent this drowning of pastures every two or three years."

"Mistress of Moscow" by Joseph E. Davies was published less than ten weeks ago. An immediate, country-wide wave of major reviews has made people aware of the book's deep and timely significance.

As our Ambassador to Russia, Joseph E. Davies acquired so much secret information of an official character that he was one of the few Americans to predict the amazing performance of the Red Army. His book is the record of his confidential dispatches to the State Department, released with the Department's extraordinary consent.

Mr. Davies spoke freely with the powers that be in the Kremlin, from Stalin and Litvinov down. The leading generals of the Red Army broke bread with him at the Embassy. There were no formal amenities, but frank, man-to-man discussions now reported in full, colorful detail, from the secret pages of an ambassador's diary.

Mr. Davies saw history in the making at close range and reported it intimately in his private diary and off-the-record letters to President Roosevelt. Secretary Hull and others, now revealed for the first time. As a result, the reader has the sensation of being permitted to look behind the veil into the workings of our secret diplomacy.

"Mission to Moscow" is written by a capitalist who is able to look at communism with an open mind. It answers some of the hitherto baffling questions about the Soviet Union, from the secret of the Red Army's power to the true story of the Moscow trials.

"Mission to Moscow" is required reading for every thinking American.

Clifton Fadiman has written a penetrating, deft introduction to the Readers Club edition of Walter Van Tilburg Clark's "The Ox-Bow Incident." One of the simplest best-fables of our time and place came at last the classic elegance of La Fontaine. Rough-hewn but makes and makes the original of "Boccaccio's Decamerone." 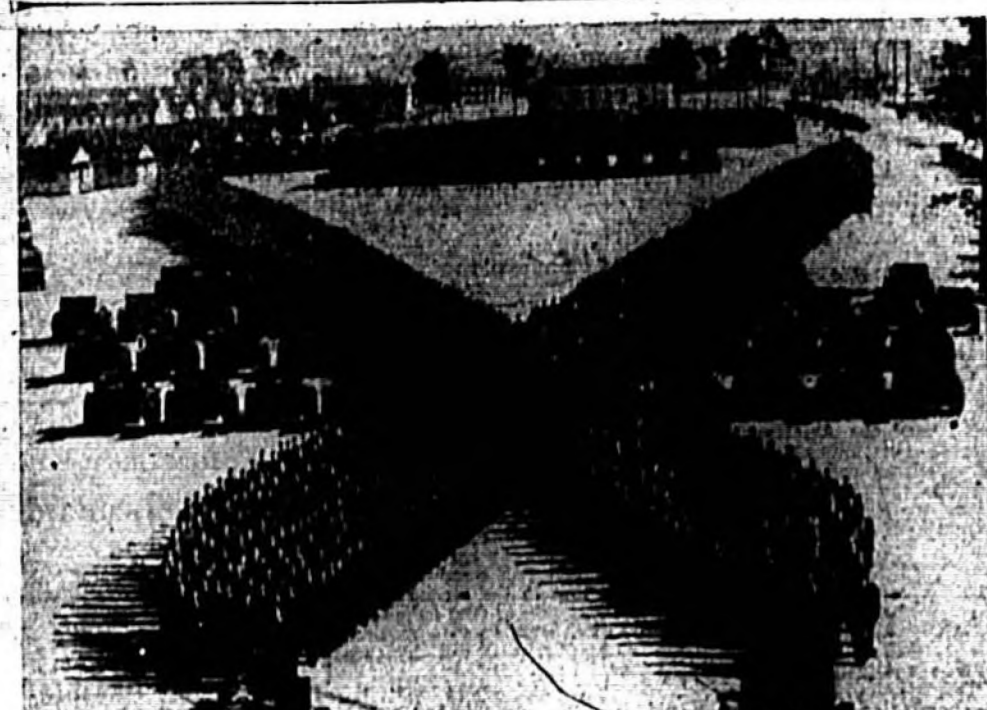

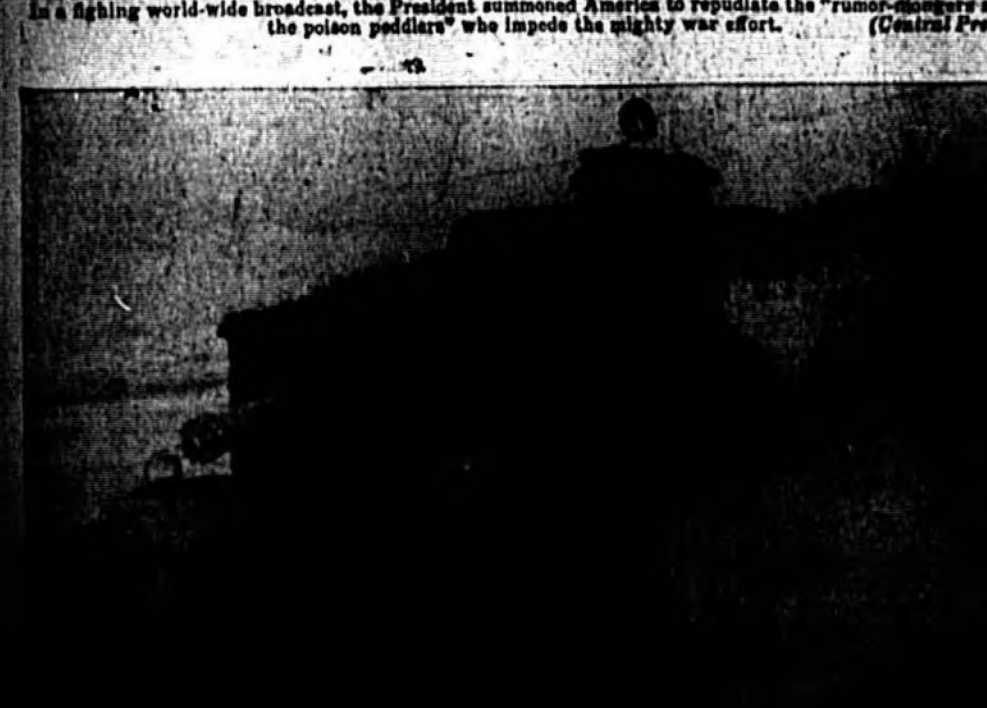

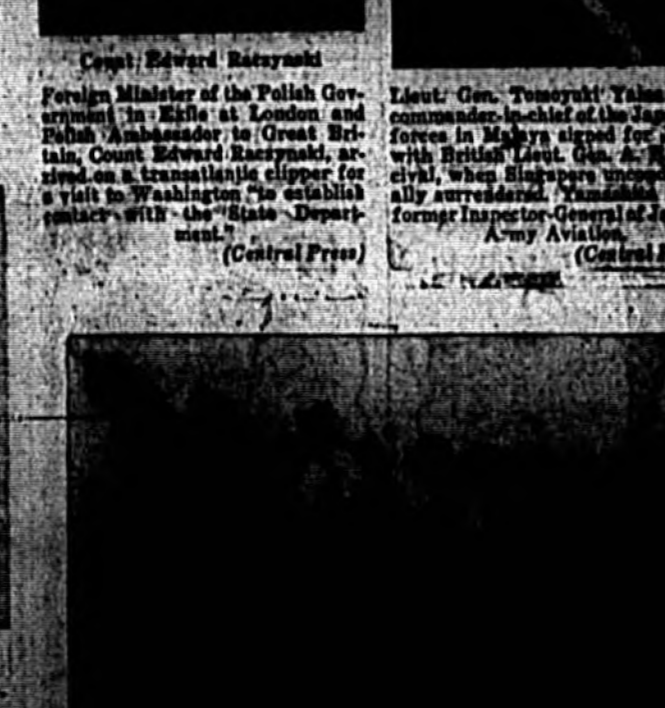
