## Philippine Victory By U. S. Air Force Disrupts Jap Plans

New All-Out Offense  
By Foe Is Nipped;  
Situation In Bur-  
ma Is Unchanged

BERLIN claimed today  
German submarines had  
sunk 12 more ships in north  
and central Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—The United States is sending a mission to India to explore the possibilities of American help in creating a huge Allied supply base there, the State Department announced today.

In the Philippines, the triumph by the small United States Air Force in destroying five ships in Subic Bay was reported to have disrupted Japanese plans for a new all-out offensive on Luzon. Bataan action has been negligible for 24 hours.

The Burma situation has been materially unchanged in the past three days and Rangoon and Pegu are still in British hands. British military quarters announced today.

Britain's army battled knee-deep in the paddyfields west of the Irrawaddy River against a Japanese spearhead which has reached the head of the Gulf of Martaban and turned southwest for a direct attack on Rangoon, less than 70 miles away.

Work in Rangoon, presumably in preparing the city for a siege, was "being carried on quietly," a spokesman said, indicating that looting and terrorism reported to have occurred during civilian evacuation of the city had stopped.

Meanwhile, a secret conference between Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and General Wavell, presumably over the defense of Burma, was disclosed last night as the Japanese invaders pointed their next blow down the west shore of the Gulf of Martaban toward the deserted capital city of Rangoon.

The Rome radio was heard announcing tonight that the Japanese already had captured Rangoon, but the Japanese had made no such claim and it was noted that the Italian radio in the past has circulated false reports of such successes.

**United States Navy Wants Many Knitted Garments**

Reds Tighten Trap On Enemy On Two Fronts

Germans Are Pushed In Vyazma Pocket By Stalin's Men

(UPI—Associated Press)  
Axis Field Marshal Rommel has left his stalled African army to confer with Hitler. It was reported today. A Nazi military attack at Turkey also is rumored to be at the conference.

(UPI—Associated Press)  
The Russians claimed further advances against the German forces entrapped in the Vyazma pocket as well as a tightening of the trap around the Nazi 16th Army in the Stalingrad area.

The Germans had converted Yekhnyov and the surrounding area into a network of strongly fortified points and had rushed reinforcements to it by plane from Germany, France, Czechoslovakia and other occupied countries.

The Russians were able to storm these fortifications despite a heavy artillery barrage. The Germans suffered "very heavy losses," including over 600 killed in a single sector of about a mile.

The German retreat was said to be so precipitate that they left behind a hospital of the village of Blododa and failed in a desperate last-minute effort to set fire to Yekhnyov and destroy an ammunition dump there. As a result the Russians captured a large quantity of material.

On the same front a supply train, stalled at Blododa in the Soviet and the Military Commissar, was signed today by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. It increased to \$142,000,000 the total appropriations for war and defense in 1941-42.

Meanwhile, legislation to increase the Federal debt limit from \$125,000,000,000 in a record-breaking \$125,000,000,000 was approved unanimously by the House Ways and Means Committee today.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau testified the treasury expects to run out of its available cash by the end of April and his opponents are forced to agree plan now to obtain revenue.

Compulsion May

Be Used To Get Money for War

CORALIANO, Mar. 6, (AP)—The United States government may have to use compulsion to get money for the gigantic war effort, unless the nation comes forward voluntarily to buy all the defense stamps and bonds possible, Maj. Benjamin H. Namm, representative of the U. S. treasury department, told the Florida defense saving committee yesterday.

At the same time, officials pointed out that Florida leads the nation in stamp and bonds purchases per capita and leads the northern states in total amounts bought.

Mr. Namm, speaking on the same program with Governor Holland and Senator Andrews, made it plain that Americans had given large amounts of money to the cause, but he declared even more is needed.

The government "would much rather have the effort on a voluntary basis than be required to use compulsory measures," he said.

## Allies Abandon Batavia; Japanese Troops Over-run All of West Part of Java

Farm Placement  
Program Is In Effect In State

Movement Is Ordered  
To Fight Shortage  
Of Farm Laborers

JACKSONVILLE, Mar. 6 (UPI)—Anticipating increased farm labor demands as a result of the Florida Work Projects Administration, today ordered a "provisional farm placement program" in an effort to provide farmers in every county with efficient labor with which to meet the stepped-up demands placed upon them by the war effort.

Local offices were directed to draw up lists of workers and to maintain active contact with representatives of the WPA's training and employment division which is being charged with the responsibility of placing farm laborers where the demand exists.

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District WPA offices, serving agricultural areas, will have special re-employment representatives assist in carrying on the farm placement program.

Education Commission and all

other agencies interested in agriculture and employment.

Farmers may register job opportunities through any of these agencies and the WPA will refer available workers in their area to these agencies.

employment.

## Fresh Scottish Troops Halt Jap Forces In Burma

War Department Reports Landing Of Additional Enemy On Philippine Isle

(By Associated Press) Fresh Scottish troops and tanks are credited with stopping the Japs, thrusts in Burma. A Rangoon communiqué says the situation is unchanged.

The Japanese have extended further their occupation of the Philippines, the War Department said today in reported landing of a small force of invaders accompanied by tanks at Cebu, 100 miles west of Manila, about 70 miles south of the Batan fighting front.

Bataan hostilities had ceased except for slight artillery fire and an ineffective enemy air raid.

A British communiqué indicated that the counter-attacks by British Burma forces were continued yesterday during the third day of a battle which began when the Japanese drove a wedge across the Sittang River into open country along the road to Rangoon, 55 miles southwest of Pegu.

The Imperialists appeared to be holding firm.

"There, around Pegu Friday, was the scene of several fierce engagements, in which our troops gave a very good account of themselves," the communiqué said. "Our attacks were carried out by our armed forces with intense and artillery support and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy."

"Our forces captured four anti-tank guns and other material. Over 60 of the enemy dead were counted on the battlefield. Our losses were approximately 25."

Earlier Far Eastern advice had mentioned Allied use of planes and tanks coming across the back of the Sittang River, where open country provided the full employment of armored weapons for the first time in the Burma campaign.

The communiqué added that the situation around Rangoon itself remained unchanged except for a light bombing of the airfield north of the city, which caused neither damage nor casualties.

19 Land In Key West After Ship Was Torpedoed

(By Associated Press) The loss of three more merchant vessels and probably 15 seafarers has been disclosed by the Navy. The disclosure, to 36 the number of merchantmen officially reported sunk off the U.S. Canadian coast.

KEY WEST, Mar. 7. (AP)—Ten remain, their voices husky and their faces lined with fatigue, told yesterday of a 48-hour battle in the rugged waters of the Atlantic. Mr. Peteroff left was torpedoed "somewhere in the Atlantic" with the probable loss of 15 men.

The men were so exhausted they could hardly stand up. We had to go to the deck to get some air.

## U.S. Men And Equipment Are Said Streaming To Australia

(By Associated Press) A London Daily Mail reporter, Walter Farr, says the United Nations' striking power in the southwest Pacific has been greatly bolstered by a steady stream of American troops and equipment flowing to Australia. The disposition at the development of naval and air battles without parallel in history is developing. These battles are taking place at widely separated points over 70,000,000 square miles of ocean.

"These massive forces will not only help to defend Australia," Mr. Farr wrote. "They are taking with them large quantities of materials to be used to build the foundations for a great offensive against the Japanese."

"As the convoys move westward along the mostly guarded lifeline to Australia, the Japanese are shooting out great numbers of naval and air power five, six or seven thousand miles into the Pacific toward Australia.

The latest indication of these operations is a Tokyo broadcast relayed through Stockholm, said the Germans fled northwestward from the town.

The focal point of Russian action was shifting day by day, according to the Soviet news service.
