

# Rapaports Return From Europe Tour

Dr. and Mrs. Stanley J. Rapaport of Casselberry have returned home and reopened the office after a fabulous tour of Europe and the United States with their children, "Herky," 5, and Kathleen, 3.

They picked up their Volkswagen "camper," which they christened "Brunhilde," on arrival in Rotterdam, Holland. It was fully equipped for sleeping, cooking and eating and enabled the Rapaports to travel economically and simplified the matter of finding accommodations.

This resulted in such unusual overnight stopping places as the Eiffel Tower in Paris, the Coliseum in Rome and the Leaning Tower of Pisa. They dined in style in their VW beneath the balcony of Princess Grace and Prince Ranier in Monaco.

In the absence of landermats, Mrs. Rapaport solved the universal problem in the manner of the local housewives by washing their clothes by hand in the village fountains.

Dr. Rapaport's knowledge of German and his wife's French were very useful during the trip and enabled them to get to know the people better in the countries which they visited.

Arriving in Holland at tulip time, they saw the flower auctions. Mrs. Rapaport finds the wooden shoes which she

purchased as a souvenir are very comfortable to wear. The Dutch people find them very practical where the streets are muddy and there are no sidewalks.

While in Spain, they saw the colorful annual festivals and spectacular fireworks displays at Valencia and Castle Leon. The open air meat markets with the many flies drove them to a diet of sardine sandwiches, however.

They visited Portugal,

where they found the women wear six petticoats and go barefooted, and then on to Gibraltar.

They found Italy to be the most interesting country in Europe and were fortunate to be in Rome before the death of Pope John and attended a public audience in St. Peter's.

Like every tourist they enjoyed the gondolas in Venice and the flower market of San Remo. They also found the natives very adept at squeezing the "last lira" from tourists.

Driving into Switzerland, our stalwart travelers found many of the alpine passes blocked with snow, which meant turning around and detouring 200 miles. They drove through Austria and into Germany, where they had their only peek behind the Iron Curtain when they visited East Berlin.

It took about an hour of going through the complicated procedure to get into East Berlin, where guns were much in evidence and it appeared to be only one-fifth as prosperous as the Western zone, Dr. Rapaport noted.

They toured the Scandinavian countries of Sweden, Norway and Denmark and found Norway to be the prettiest country which they saw in Europe with its spectacular scenery.

Dr. Rapaport carried on advance studies at a hospital outside of London and found British Socialized Medicine to be a failure.

After sightseeing in England and Scotland, they went to Ireland by way of an overnight ferry from Liverpool. This was a "must" since Mrs. Rapaport is of Irish descent and they all kissed the Blarney Stone before boarding ship for home.

On arrival in New York they headed their faithful "camper" westward for a visit with Dr. Rapaport's family in California. They stopped off at such spots as Yellowstone, Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, and are convinced the scenery in this country far surpasses that of any of the other lands which they visited.

On the return trip they stopped off in Texas to visit Mrs. Rapaport's folks.

They are very glad to be back home in Casselberry and say the most important thing they learned from their travels is what a privilege it is to be an American and what a wonderful country in which we live.

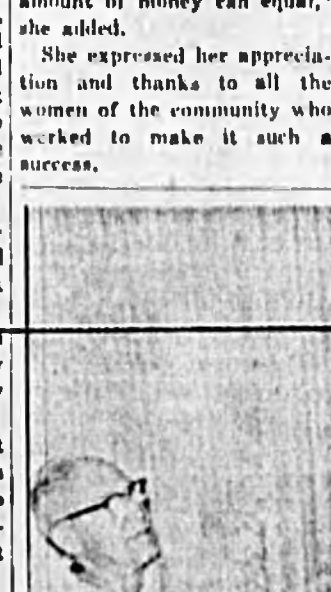

## Casselberry Youth Does U. S. Research

Dale Birkenmeyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Birkenmeyer Jr., of 281 Lake Griffin Circle, Casselberry, has returned to San Salvador Island in the Bahamas, where he is engaged in research for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Entomological Research Division.

Young Birkenmeyer came home, Friday, June 28, for a week's visit and surprised his family with a two months growth of beard.

His work on San Salvador involves a test program for trying out a method of eradicating insects by sterilization, which is proving very successful.

Between 40 and 60 thousand flies are sent to the island each week in the pupa stage. They are kept in cages when they hatch out and are fed chemi-sterilants mixed with sugar.

After being sterilized the flies are released on the island. The normal female fly, whose life expectancy is five weeks, mates only once during her lifetime and lays an average of 99 eggs. The male fly lives 4 weeks and under ideal conditions may mate with as many as 54 different females. Thus for each male fly sterilized the world is spared a possible 5,346 additional insect pests.

Birkenmeyer claims that he can distinguish between the male and female of the species by looking into their eyes.

The island, which serves as a site for a missile tracking station operated by PanAmerican, is an ideal spot for the test program because of its remote location and small area.

Two other islands in the chain Mayaguana and Grand Turk also have testing programs with the methods varying slightly on each. The program is scheduled to continue to next June.

Birkenmeyer attended Orlando Junior College for two years and plans to enroll in the University of Florida at Gainesville in September. The Department of Agriculture now has a new million dollar laboratory located in Gainesville and Dale would like to work there following his graduation.

The North Orlando Garden Club, organized in 1960 with a membership of 15 women, has lived up to its objective and proved an asset to the community.

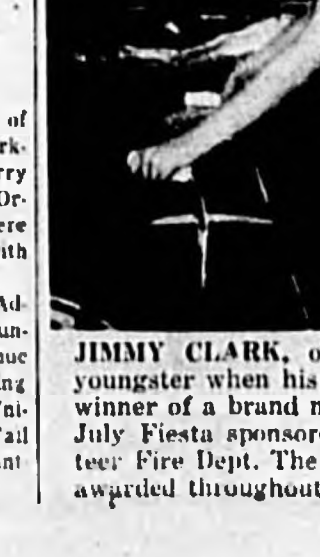

The department also plans to receive the training program offered by the State Fire College.

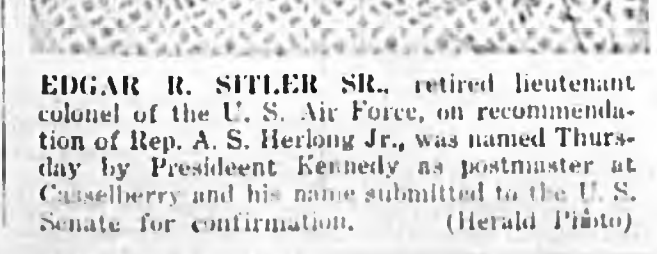
Starting next week, volunteer firemen will conduct a house-to-house solicitation to explain the objects of the department, ask for support and seek new members.

## Liberals Gone 'Too Far To Left' - Goldwater Kennedy's 'Co-Existence' Stance Blasted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said today that President Kennedy appears "determined to coexist with international communism wherever it thrives—even in the Western Hemisphere."

However, Goldwater added that he was not suggesting that Democrats or New Frontiersmen were Communists or that the Communists had captured control of the Democratic party.

In a speech prepared for delivery before the Human Events Conference, Goldwater said today's conservative

was "standing where history once placed the true liberal." He said the conservative stands for freedom, individual rights, justice, order and honor.

"I believe today's liberal is so frightened of the future that he is incapable of acting in the present," Goldwater said. "Why else are we confronted today with a virtual paralysis of policy? Why else does Cuba remain a festering, Soviet power base on our very doorstep? Why else are we trying to pretend that international communism is melting and not out to enslave the entire world?"

Goldwater said that the "cause, for our indecision and inaction is a deep-rooted fear on the part of the liberal establishment which forecloses the possibility of any action at all that may contain a slight element of risk."

"Such craven fear is completely out of character with the American spirit," he declared.

Goldwater said "liberals have taken us too far to the left for the good of the nation, particularly when we find ourselves in a worldwide struggle with the forces of the extreme left."

His criticism of Kennedy was based on the President's recent speech at American University in which he referred to a Soviet interest in a "just and genuine peace" and urged an effort to "make the world safe for diversity."

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Goldwater said that U. S. Communist party leader Gus Hall was using defeat of GOP candidates next year and support of "people's political movements" that Hall said operated within the orbit of the Democratic party.

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However, Goldwater added that he was not suggesting that Democrats or New Frontiersmen were Communists or that the Communists had captured control of the Democratic party.

## Sheriff Hunts Two Escapees

## Russians Sank Sno' Boy, Says Exile Leader

MIAMI (UPI)—A Cuban exile leader says the fishing boat Sno' Boy was "intentionally sunk" by Russian trawlers when it surprised the Soviet vessels engaging in "espionage" activities in the Caribbean.

The Sno' Boy has been missing since July 1 on a voyage from Kingston, Jamaica, to Northeast Cay with 40 persons aboard.

The exile leader, Dr. Luis Conte Aguero, said Thursday he believed the 63-foot vessel "surprised" Russian trawlers engaged in clandestine espionage activities in the area and was intentionally sunk.

A labor spokesman said that AFL-CIO president George Meany, a member of the presidential panel, would try to see if there was any chance he could settle the dispute and avoid emergency congressional action.

Today when we look into our churches during the worship hours we find many people with eager, radiant and joyous faces who would say most emphatically that they, too, were glad when they went into the house of the Lord. The heart breaking thing is that there are so many more people who never experience the joy of worshipping God and therefore find themselves unfulfilled, spiritually hungry, unhappy, and without a chart or compass on the turbulent sea of life.

Several years ago Dr. Henry C. Link wrote a book entitled, "The Return to Religion" and in this book he makes clear his feeling about attending worship services.

To make a long story short I will say that after 20 years of agnosticism Dr. Link returned to religion and became faithful in attendance at worship.

Let us realize that in a world so torn and tired that the church does have an important part to play. May we support it in every way and thereby please God who loved it so much that His own Son died for it.

### No 'Conflict' Seen In Science, Religion

Dr. Hugh L. Dryden is a noted scientist who serves as deputy chief of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

He is also a licensed lay preacher in the Methodist Church.

As a man who is deeply involved in both worlds, he sees no "conflict" between science and religion.

"Even a scientist needs religious faith," he said in an interview.

"Science has made tremendous contributions to mankind. It has penetrated the mysteries of the material universe and freed the minds of men from ignorance and superstition.

"But science is a partial view of life . . . in many respects, a narrow view."

Dr. Dryden does not accept the cliché that religious people live by "faith" whereas scientific people live by "objective" knowledge.

"The areas of knowledge which one person can explore in detail and experience for himself, even in a lifetime, are very few," he said.

"No man could possibly live in the modern world on the knowledge he himself has mastered. He lives by faith in the results of the experience of other men, both those now living and those of past generations."

"His interpretation of the universe . . . of meaning and value . . . of moral purpose . . . and his whole philosophy of life are great adventures of faith. In scientific language, they are extrapolations from the information and insights available to him as one particular individual with a sharply limited knowledge of our universe."

Dr. Dryden said that some people "are led to a purely materialistic view" of the universe.

"Others, including myself, are persuaded that in the universe there are both the material and the spiritual."

Either view, he emphasized, is necessarily held of faith, because neither can be demonstrated conclusively by the objective methods of science. Occasionally, some scientist will venture beyond the proper boundaries of his discipline and attempt to "prove" the materialistic view of the universe.

Dr. Dryden said he had read an article recently by a scientist who felt that the apparent spiritual dimensions of human existence could all be adequately explained in materialistic terms.

"He was convinced," said Dr. Dryden, "that the inner life of man—his consciousness of self, his power of thought, his conscience, his ideals—were the direct result of the physical and chemical activity of the brain." He found "proof" in the fact that damage to the brain destroyed some or all of the manifestations, and that drugs could excite or pacify an individual."

Dr. Dryden said he found himself thinking about this argument one Sunday morning in church "when I should have been listening to the sermon."

"It occurred to me that scientific progress has made us familiar with many sci-

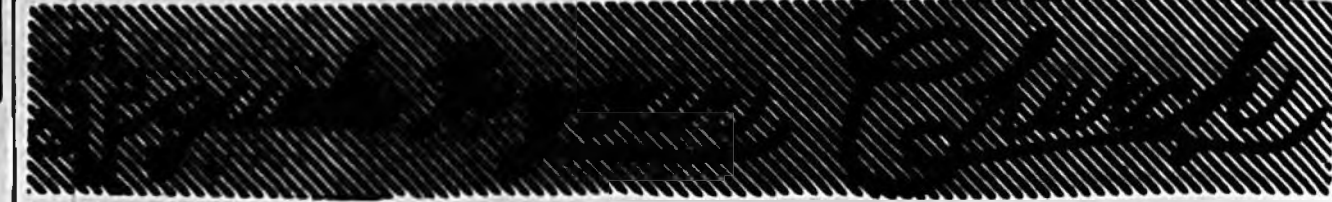

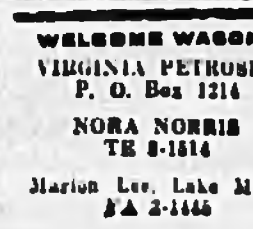

# Major Red Spy Defects \$1.7 Million In New Contracts To West; Under Guard Announced By Dynatronics, Inc.

LONDON (UPI) — A Russian spy of major importance has defected to the West and is now hiding in Britain under heavy guard, the government said today.

The identity and whereabouts of the defector are being kept secret to protect him from Communist agents who may want to kill him.

He is understood to have revealed a mass of information about other Soviet spies and the workings of the Kremlin's vast espionage network.

The government, which has been plagued itself by its own security leaks, confirmed re-

ports Thursday that the Russian first defected to the Americans and then was brought to Britain at his request after being questioned in the United States.

A government spokesman said the spy was interrogated for weeks by the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) until it was convinced he was not "planted" by Moscow and told all he knew.

British military intelligence questioned the Russian after he was moved to this country, and are continuing to question him in hiding.

The government was reluctant to disclose details about the defector, and confirmed his presence in Britain only after British newspapers reported the defection Thursday.

The press said the spy was being hunted by fellow Communist agents who want to silence him and demonstrate the power of the Soviet spy system.

The Daily Telegraph quoted American officials as saying the man was "a major defector" whose cross-over to the West was "a major Western victory in the unremitting war of espionage."

Dynatronics, Inc., Central Florida space electronics firm, Thursday announced new contracts totaling \$1,730,000 for the first quarter of the current fiscal year.

In the third annual stockholders meeting at the Robert Meyer Motor Inn, Orlando, Dynatronics president Parker Painter said the figure represents 35 contracts of varying sizes. Largest is for \$453,000 to develop classified data processing equipment for space exploration.

The new contracts come on top of a \$1,045,000 backlog

from the year ending March 31.

"Dynatronics' standard product sales rose to over \$1 million during the last year, the direct result of an investment of more than \$300,000 in company-sponsored research and product development during the past two years," Painter said.

He stated that an unusually high number of bids are still outstanding, "and projections indicate a high level of bookings during July and August."

Painter stated that net sales for the year ending March 31 rose to an all time high for

the seven year old company of \$3,486,764, almost \$1.8 million more than the previous year though profits for the year declined.

"The immediate aim," he said, "is to maintain business volume at about the same level as last year restoring normal profit margins."

### Junta Clamps Tight Control On Ecuador

QUITO, Ecuador (UPI) — The military junta which ousted hard-drinking President Carlos Julio Arosemena clamped tight control on Ecuador today and promised heavy penalties for anyone opposing it.

The nation's military chiefs deposed Arosemena in a bloodless coup d'etat Thursday and put him aboard a military plane to Panama, where he arrived late Thursday night and was taken to a hotel.

Four persons were reported injured in anti-military rioting in Quito and the port city of Guayaquil following the coup.

The junta announced a strict 9 p. m. curfew in Guayaquil and put the entire nation under military law. Censorship was established, all constitutional guarantees were suspended, and summary punishment was promised for anyone attempting to disturb the peace.

Arosemena, 43, who became president after a military coup only 20 months ago, was said to have been drunk Wednesday night at a reception attended by officials including U. S. Ambassador Maurice Bernbaum.

Quito radio stations said the president insulted several foreign ambassadors at the reception, and this culminated a series of incidents which led the military to depose him.

Newspapers in Chile charged early this year that Arosemena insulted Chilean President Jorge Alessandri at a formal banquet during Alessandri's state visit to Ecuador.

### Miamian Named To Dade Bench

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Jack Turner, of Miami, was appointed by Gov. Farris Bryant to fill the judgeship of the Dade County Criminal Court of Record, succeeding the late Judge Ben C. Willard.

Turner, who had been a city judge at Homestead, has been serving as a judge in the Metropolitan Court in Dade County for the past five years.

### City Integrates Public Facilities

ST. PETERSBURG (UPI) — The St. Petersburg city council approved a resolution backing integration of all publicly owned facilities.

The resolution, which passed by a vote of five to one, also stated that city employment would be open to all persons, regardless of race, creed or color.

Evans said the formal program for the convention would be announced shortly, commenting "we are trying to fit a lot of highly important discussions and talks into a workable schedule that will allow all attending to take full advantage of the program."

Invitations for the convention will be in the mail within a few days, coming from the office of Joffre C. David, secretary-treasurer and general manager of FFVA at Orlando.

### U. S. Pressures Four Nations To Restrict Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department said Thursday it wants Britain, Spain, Canada and Mexico to help further "isolate" Cuba with respect to air travel.

These are the four principal free world countries through whose territory commercial airline routes still operate to and from Cuba.

In making the statement at a news conference, state department spokesman Richard A. Phillips stopped just short of a flat request for the four countries to deny landing rights to planes flying to or from Cuba.

But in reply to questions about these air routes, Phillips said the United States had long "made known" to the four countries involved "our interest in the isolation of Cuba." He said these representations went back even before the Cuban missile crisis last October.

Though some of these countries have quietly taken steps to check planes for movement of arms or subversive agents, they have continued to permit landing rights, Phillips said this was a matter to be decided by each country, and the United States could not dictate.

Cuban and Czech airliners have used Canada as a stop-over point on the way to Europe. Cubana Airlines operates flights to Mexico City. Spanish flights operate to and from Havana.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant announced appointments to the newly created governing board of the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind at St. Augustine.

The new governing board was created under a law passed by the last Legislature taking the school from under the control of the State Board of Control.

Appointed to the governing board were State Rep. Charles Usina, St. Augustine; Mrs. Nelson R. Park, Winter Park; Mrs. Bernard Castro, Fort Lauderdale; Henry Kramer, Jacksonville; Dexter Douglas, Tallahassee; Leslie Huffstetler, Eustis; and Frank Robshaw, Palatka.

In making the announcement, Bryant said the school has "done wonder in equipping these youth to better meet the challenges and opportunities which lie ahead."

### Trulock Heads Peace Officers

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — C. Roma Trulock was named president of the Florida Peace Officers' Association here, succeeding John L. Alze.

Trulock is a special agent with the Florida Sheriff's Bureau.

No one wants to spoil the good eating that is so much a part of summer's fun. But it is necessary to add one vital ingredient to picnic plans:

Mix with common sense.

## For The Children

"Sir, you have knocked down many things we believed in, but have not put anything in their place."

This was an earnest student's lament to a teacher who was busy trying to instill in all his pupils a healthy skepticism as they plunged into the varied fields of knowledge.

In the view of Bergen Evans, a Northwestern University professor, the job that teacher was doing is vital. Writing in Cosmopolitan magazine, he says of the American youngster in school:

"The boy must be encouraged to doubt, to question, to demand the credentials of every blustering assertion that claims to be incontrovertible."

"It seems almost cruel. The innocent trust of youth is so attractive that it seems wrong to undermine it. But the questioning spirit . . . will be the boy's first line of defense as he passes into manhood."

"The predators of the modern world work through thought control—through slogans, clichés, dogmas and lies, all clamoring for the boy's allegiance and blind acceptance."

What is at stake in the proper schooling of our young should be obvious to us all. In two years there will be more than 20 million pre-teen and teen-age boys in U. S. schools. How their minds are shaped will clearly affect the course of national and world history.

Professor Evans calls for careful balance to assure fair treatment for students through the whole spectrum of talent.

Like many others, he urges patience and eternal vigilance to the end that creative individuals be identified and encouraged rather than suppressed by the routine rigidities of the large class.

At the same time he would not have the great mass of average students downgraded by teachers or any others:

"No good is accomplished if, by disparaging contrast with the fortunate few, the many are led to feel inferior."

Evans is equally solicitous that reasonable attitudes be shown toward those who learn slowly or exhibit limited powers. Says he:

"They, too, are human beings. They, too, will be men with a place in society . . . They are helpless in the face of eternal blame and open or implied contempt."

A good school he adds, must protect the individual boy—against those in or out of the school who would stigmatize him for failure, corrode his creativity, embarrass him in his averageness.

"The purpose of the protection is often the highest educational aim of all—to preserve that boyish engerness . . . that innocence permits."

"For much human greatness is simply a retention of the boy in the man."

If that spirit were instantly applied in all U. S. education, then the waste of human recourse among America's 20 million schoolboys would be far less than it is in sad fact likely to be in 1965 and thereafter.

If you wives find that your husbands are reciting an excessive number of lewd stories in your boudoir, then beware!

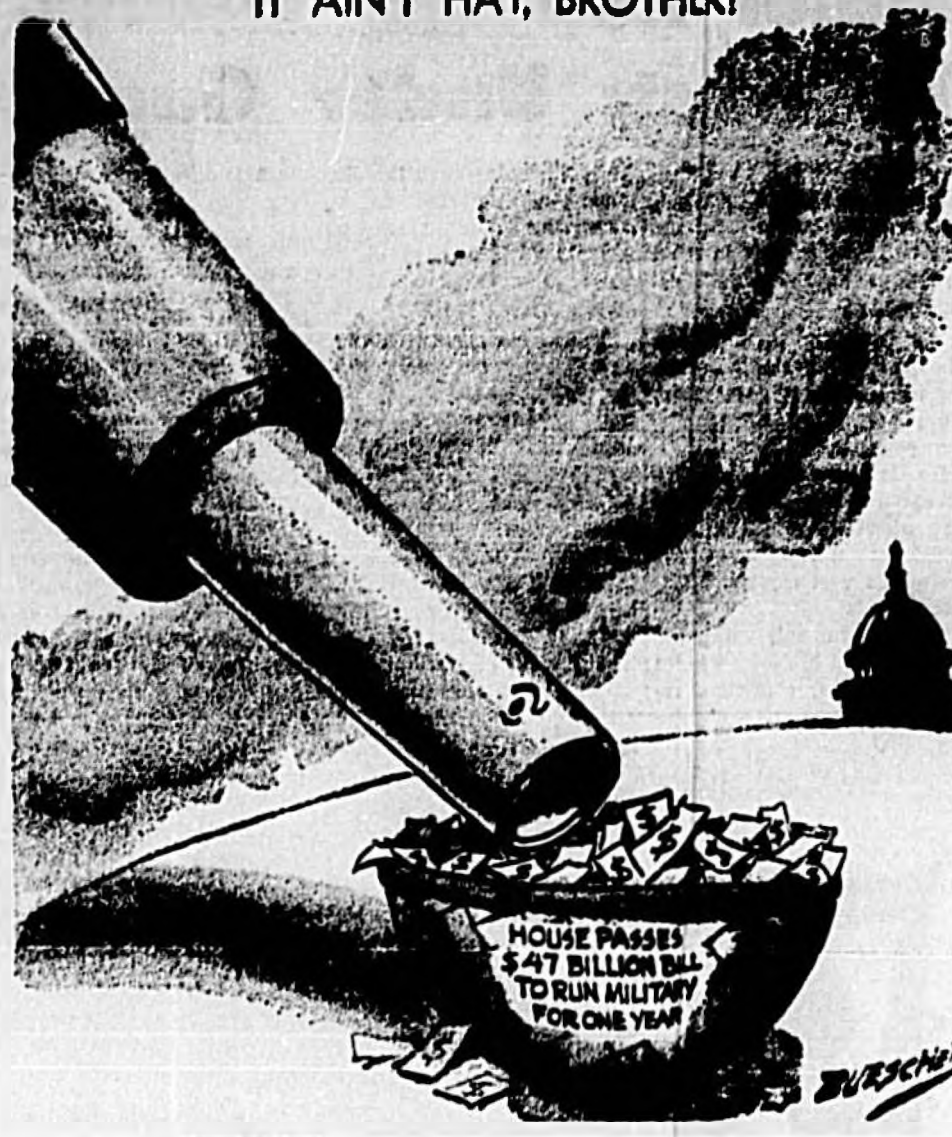

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The next six months may be as fateful as any half-year since the end of World War II. Developments now coming to a head are important to the United States internationally and on the domestic front as well.

Moscow talks between Russian and Red Chinese leaders may set the course for the future of communism. A widening split between the two camps, which now seems likely, greatly alters the international balance of power in Asia.

The most immediate result might be a decision on the resumption of Red China's attack on India later this year. Finally aroused to the Communist menace, India is now said to see that the real threat from Red China is its advance through Burma and Indochina into the Malay peninsula.

The threat of further Communist penetration into Southeast Asia has been increased by British failure to persuade the Russians to help stop the fighting in Laos. Pakistan's foolish flirtations with Red

China as an ally that might help against India further heighten the prospect for trouble in South Asia.

After the Russia-led China talks in Moscow came American-British-Russian negotiations on a nuclear test ban. The outcome will indicate whether the threat of nuclear warfare becomes more acute or is eased. If the latter, there may be some hope for eventual progress towards disarmament.

President Kennedy's trip to Europe was hailed as a great personal triumph, making clear America's continued support for Europe. But the extent to which the mission advanced American objectives for a strengthened North Atlantic Treaty Organization is still uncertain.

The proposed NATO multilateral nuclear force, armed with Polaris missiles, has been temporarily shelved. It may never come into being as long as the opposition of French President Charles de Gaulle continues.

British and Italian governments are weak and may fall. The German government will change this autumn with the retirement of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. The Netherlands faces election. Stability in Europe is questionable.

The failure of Europe to unite in a common market or for meaningful trade and tariff negotiations with the United States weakens the whole Atlantic alliance at a time when it needs to show strength against the Communist front. The possibility that the Russians may revive the Berlin crisis at any time is a constant threat.

The Near East, Africa and Latin American are in a ferment of development, still unsure they can govern themselves as democracies. Argentina is battling against a revival of Peronism. Brazil, Venezuela and British Guiana are prime targets for Communist infiltration, some of it exported from Cuba.

## Queen Frederika

Just as fictional detectives are advised to seek out the woman in the case, some political sleuths thought they had found her this week in the background of the downfall of Greek Premier Constantine Caramanlis.

Although King Paul had served as front man, they decided, the woman in the case, and the cause of it all, was hounding Queen Frederika.

The reason seemed petty, certainly not enough to bring down a government which in eight years had brought both stability and a measure of prosperity to Greece.

Obviously it was King Paul's determination to carry out a scheduled July state visit to Great Britain against the advice of his 64-year-old premier.

But the word was the King merely was acting in support of his pretty queen who remained undaunted by the fact that on her last visit to Britain in April left-wing demonstrators had put her into unidentified flight down a Mayfair Street.

Queen Frederika, born a German but determinedly Greek since her marriage, long has been a figure of both praise and blame.

She won the affection of Greeks with her work among Greek children during the Greek civil war, once disobeying military orders against entering a contested village where she had heard guerrillas were holding a group of children. She entered the village alone despite enemy gunfire.

But she also won the enmity of Greek ministers who resented her intrusions into politics and her clearly held opinion that frequently she knew better than they.

In fact there was reason to believe that Caramanlis himself had invited the dispute as a reason to resign and force the country into elections.

In his own country Caramanlis long has been under fire from liberals and leftists

on charges that he rigged the 1961 elections.

Outside Greece, Communist propaganda has maintained a drumbeat of charges that Greece is one of three remaining Fascist countries in Europe.

Out of the present shakiness seemingly can come two results. Queen Frederika will get permission to make the state visit to Britain. And Caramanlis will be able to stifle his critics through a new mandate.

### Business Briefs

The Chrysler-Plymouth division reports that its dealers delivered 44,236 new cars in June to bring the total for the first half of 1968 to 222,996, an increase of 32 per cent over the same period last year.

Combined sales of Plymouth, Valiant, Chrysler and Imperial cars for the six-month period were the greatest since 1960, according to C. E. Briggs, vice president of Chrysler Motors Corporation and general manager, Chrysler-Plymouth division.

In Sanford, Ben Howland, of Seminole County Motors, said that there was a 75 per cent increase in sales over last year with the Dodge Dart leading in popularity.

Brass Motors reports that the 30 per cent increase in sales of the Plymouth and Valiant was due to the new warranty and style.

# Special Report On The ... U. S. Profit, Loss On Red Split

**WASHINGTON (NEA)** — Secretary of State Dean Rusk has put a group of men to work on the Sino-Soviet quarrel.

His aim: to find ways of exploit that conflict to U. S. advantage.

The State Department experts were caught unprepared. For 10 years they had been expecting a blowup — some day. "But we didn't expect it to develop so fast," says one top diplomat privately.

Rusk's experts don't expect to know for some time exactly what the Mao-Khrushchev argument will do to U. S. aims and U. S. allies world wide.

But as of today they see opportunities in Eastern Europe and Latin America. They see dangers in Laos and South Viet Nam, where the Mao-Khrushchev differences could mean a sharp worsening of our position.

Here is the breakdown on what the Sino-Soviet rift may mean to U. S. interests, as outlined by some of Rusk's first-string aides.

**WESTERN EUROPE**  
There is evidence the Eastern European countries, inspired by the conflict and Albania's ability to defy the Soviet Union, are becoming a little more independent in their attitudes.

Romania, whose politicians have not been noted for willingness to buck the Russians. In the past few months there have been signs the Romanians are not going to stop every time Khrushchev sneezes.

In the Russian-enforced division of labor, the Romanians had been told not to industrialize but to specialize in agriculture, fertilizer and petroleum production. In March, the Romanians announced they would not be bound by that dictate. They would industrialize as they pleased. Furthermore they weren't going to have their trade controlled by the Red bloc; they would buy and sell from the West when they could get better deals.

The Romanians refused to send their premier or Red party chief to Khrushchev's recent conference with East European chieftains in East Berlin.

In Czechoslovakia there have been new signs of continued refusal to buckle down by some non-Czech peoples. There are equally interesting reports from other Eastern European countries.

The experts don't see major revolts in the cards. They do think this growing independence only as a way to get more aid from the Russians, this could cost the Soviet Union heavily in aid as it has in Cuba.

**LATIN AMERICA**  
The Russians and Red Chinese are fighting for control of the Communist parties throughout the continent. This fighting slows down concerted action. If it turns out that some of the parties end up controlled by the Russians, some by the Chinese, co-operation among the Communist parties in Latin America will become more difficult.

State Department men expect more violence in those Latin lands where the pro-Red Chinese take over the Communist parties. But greater Red violence may play into U. S. hands because handling violence and securing co-operation against the Reds in open fights is easier than controlling subtle Red subversion.

There are no signs so far that the Mao-Khrushchev fight will help the U. S. in regard to Cuba.

**INDIA**  
Russia is likely to do more to help the Indians resist the Red Chinese. Count on more Russian arms aid.

**SOUTHEAST ASIA**  
This is the rough spot. The Mao-Khrushchev quarrel has already lessened Russian influence in North Viet Nam and Laos and increased Red Chinese influence.

This could step up the war in South Viet Nam and cause greater Red gambles in Laos and Viet Nam.

**MILITON-TO-ONE SHOT KILLS TWO**  
HURLBURT FIELD, Fla. (UPI) — A low-flying jet fighter fired four non-explosive rockets at a protective bunker here (part of Eglin AFB) Thursday during war games. One of the rockets crashed through an 18-inch observation slit in a million-to-one shot that killed two persons and injured 14 others.

The freak accident happened during war games by the Tactical Air Command and an immediate investigation was launched to learn whether human or mechanical error caused the accident.

### Castro Using British Island To Export Red Agents, U. S. Says

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — The State Department said today that Cuba has been using Grand Cayman Island, a British possession in the Caribbean, as a way station to sneak "potential subversive agents" into Latin American countries.

A spokesman said the United States has asked Britain if it can stop the traffic.

Department Press Officer Richard I. Phillips said three Soviet-built Cuban airplanes have landed at Grand Cayman in the last several weeks. He said they carried 15 to 20 persons who later went on to San Jose, Costa Rica and other countries in the area.

He said the flights originated in Cuba and "the presumption is that they were potential subversive agents."

Grand Cayman is the largest of the Cayman group of islands lying south of Cuba and northwest of Jamaica.

Costa Rican authorities apparently did not know the origin of the passengers from Grand Cayman and admitted them to the country. Costa Rica does not have diplomatic relations with Cuba.

Phillips said it is up to each country to set its own policy on landing rights for Cuban airlines. But he reiterated U. S. policy of attempting to isolate Cuba as much as possible.

A new airborne electronic "brain" system designed to gather data for both military and civilian operations is being installed in the USAF's Air Weather Service B-47 jet aircraft. The data from the planes will be automatically transmitted to ground-station computers and will be available for study within minutes, according to the Bendix Corp.'s developer.

**Thunderstorms Break Drought In Midwest**

By United Press International Thunderstorms which broke a searing drought in the Midwest moved across the Appalachians today, drenching dry New England forests and eased crop conditions along the Atlantic seaboard. A steady rain fell in the Northeast and scattered showers sprinkled the South and Great Plains.

Up to a half-inch of rain fell in the Middle and North Atlantic States Sunday. More than 1 1/2 inches fell at Millville, N. J., in six hours Sunday night. More than an inch of rain hit Curtis, Neb., in less than a half hour.

Cooler air pushed in over the upper Midwest, where temperatures dipped into the 50s during the night. Blythe, Calif., which simmered in 116 degree heat Sunday, cooled off during the night to 104.

Several storm-born tornadoes were reported in the West and South Sunday but caused no serious damage. Two funnel clouds were reported north of Yoder in southeastern Wyoming while a severe weather warning was in effect. Imperial, Neb., also in the danger area, was battered by hailstone.

A small tornado ripped off a roof, tore down television antennas and uprooted a garage five miles north of Elizabeth City in eastern North Carolina Sunday. No injuries were reported.

A 16-year-old boy, swept away Saturday when a flash flood struck his car in an arroyo near Fowler, Colo., was still missing today. A five-foot wall of water rushed along the normally dry Kramer Creek bed and pushed the car about a quarter mile downstream. Authorities said the youth may have been swept 1 1/2 miles into the Arkansas River.

The Weather Bureau said mostly fair skies will cover the West today while showers will continue across the South and Plains.

**Rails, Unions Lax In Dispute, Wirtz Charges**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz says that neither the railroads nor rail unions is making any real effort to settle their strike-threatening work rules dispute.

Wirtz said Sunday that both sides in the dispute were assuming that the government or Congress would settle it and "there is no affirmative attempt" to break the deadlock.

President Kennedy has named a special committee, headed by Wirtz, to make recommendations for a settlement. He plans to use its report as a basis for proposals to Congress next Monday to end the dispute.

Both the railroads and unions have agreed to hold off any strike action at least until July 29. The carriers have threatened to put into effect work rules that would eliminate thousands of jobs, and the unions have said they would strike if the new rules are applied.

Wirtz, in a television interview, said there still were "all manners of procedures" that could be used for settling the dispute short of compulsory arbitration.

**Migrant Held** SPARTANBURG, S. C. (UPI)—Augusta Kennedy, a 39-year-old migrant worker from Belle Glade, Fla., was being held today in connection with the slaying of a working companion, Dave Houston, 63, also of Belle Glade.

**Swift Strike III**

FT. BRAGG, N. C. (UPI)—Swift Strike III, a massive movement of men and machines engaged in mock combat, will begin to rumble through 7,500 square miles in North and South Carolina and Georgia July 21 in this nation's largest peacetime maneuver.

**Gov. Wallace Attacks JFK**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace told Congress today that President Kennedy should be "retired from public life" and his civil rights program defeated.

He said the legislation is totally unacceptable to the South and called for a national referendum on the proposals. If a referendum was held, Wallace said the civil rights bill would be overwhelmingly rejected.

**Bullet Fired Into Cab Of FEC Engine** MIAMI (UPI)—Vice President W. L. Thornton, of the strikebound Florida East Coast Railway, said today he will inform Gov. Farris Bryant and the FBI in Washington of a shooting incident near Miami.

A bullet was fired into the engine cab of a FEC freight near Miami Sunday. Engineer Frank Bellamy, 42, said the bullet, fired from a moving car, struck a speed recorder and passed through a cushion.

Bellamy said the shot came from a car containing three men which followed the train on a road running a parallel course to the track.

**One Man Arrested By FBI**

TAMPA (UPI)—State Sen. C. W. Young met today with officials of General Telephone Co. and planned a later meeting with union leaders in an attempt to end the violence and sabotage which has marked a five-day-old strike. Young, a Pinellas County Republican who is vice chairman of the Senate Committee on Labor and Industry, said his primary objective is to try to stop the damage resulting from the strike.

TAMPA (UPI)—The smoldering General Telephone Co. strike moved into its fifth uneasy day today and one badly beaten management employe lay in a hospital and another faced an operation for a crushed nose.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced Sunday it had charged union member Albert Clinton Ash, 35, with "willfully and maliciously interfering with a telephone communication line control by the United States."

Management personnel have been working to repair cut cables and other damage, including broken telephone booths, honey poured into coin slot of pay telephones, burned poles and damaged relay boxes.

The strike began last Thursday when contract negotiations broke down and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers threw up picket lines. The strike has resulted in cut cables and other sabotage. The two workers were attacked Sunday in the first violence of the strike.

The FBI, which entered the case when top-priority defense communications cables were cut, said Ash is charged with tampering with equipment at a telephone repeater station on the 22nd Street causeway here.
