


By Mona Grinstead The North Orlando Garden Club, organized in 1960 with a membership of 15 women, has lived up to its objective and proved an asset to the community.





County School Tax Remains At 8.25 Mills Budget To Be Increased By \$891,000

The 1963-64 tax levy for Seminole County school operations will be 8.25 mills, continuing the same as the 1962-63 levy, it was tentatively decided by the School Board Thursday afternoon.

The levy will continue the same although the budget will be increased \$891,000 to \$8,248,483 for the July 1-June 30 fiscal year, Supt. R. T. Milwee explained. Public hearing on the budget will be held July 25. After final approval it will be forwarded to the State Board of Public Instruction for its approval. . . .

Milwee explained the levy remains static, although the budget is increased, because of the increased taxable valuation of county real and personal property, up \$2.2 millions this year over last year. School millage is limited by the State Constitution to 20 mills. The School Board may levy up to 10 mills in the county without a referendum and may propose up to 19 mills more in the school district which must be voted on by the qualified electors (freeholders),

The biennial district millage election will be held Nov. 5, at which time three school trustees will be chosen. Last year's \$27 millage was divided 3.35 in the county, 3.75 in the district and 1.5 for bonds. The School Board seeks to continue this breakdown with the Nov. 5 election. However, the board could lump the three parts

"Sir. you have knocked down many things we believed in, but have not put anything in their place."

This was an earnest student's lament to a teacher who was busy trying to instill in all his pupils a healthy skepticism as they plunged into the varied fields of knowledge.

In the view of Bergen Evans, a Northwestern University professor, the job that teacher was doing is vital. Writing in Cosmopolitan magazine, he says of the American youngster in school:

The boy must be encouraged to doubt, to question, to demand the credentials of every blustering assertion that claims to be incontrovertible.

"It seems almost cruel. The innocent trust of youth is so attractive that it seems wrong to undermine it. But the questioning spirit . . . will be the boy's first line of defense as he passes into manhood.

The predators of the modern world work through thought control -through slogans, cliches, dogmas and isms, all clamoring for the boy's' allegiance and blind acceptance."

What is at stake in the proper schooling of our young should be obvious to us all. In two years there will be more than 20 million pre-teen and teen-age boys in U. S. schools. How their minds are shaped will clearly affect the course of national and world history.

Professor Evans calls for careful balance to assure fair treatment for students through the whole spectrum of talent.

Like many others, he urges patience and eternal vigilance to the end that creative individuals be identifled and encouraged rather than suppressed by the routine rigidities of the large class.

At the same time he would not have the great mass of average stu-dents downgraded by teachers or any others:

"No good is accomplished if, by disparaging contrast with the fortunate few, the many are led to feel inferior."

Evans is equally solicitous that reasonable attitudes be shown toward those who learn slowly or exhibit limited powers. Says he:

"They, too, are human beings. They, too, will be men with a place in society . . . They are helpless in the face of eternal blame and open or implied contempt."

A good school he adds, must protect the individual boy --- against those in or out of the school who would stigmatize him for failure, corrode his creativity, embarrass him in his averageness.

"The purpose of the protection is often the highest educational aim of all --- to preserve that boylsh eagerness . . . that innocence permits.

"For much human greatness is simply a retention of the boy in the

If that spirit were instantly ap-plied in all U. S. education, then the waste of human recourse among America's 20 million schoolboys would be far less than it is in sad fact likely to be in 1965 and thereafter.
