

Five Seek 3 Posts In Oviedo Election

The City of Oviedo will hold a general election Tuesday from 8 a. m. until sundown for the purpose of electing three city councilmen. Five candidates are qualified, Mrs. J. R. Battle, Kirby Bucklew, C. D. Thompson and incumbents, Rex Clonts and W. H. Martin. Thompson, along with Mrs. Battle and Bucklew, are newcomers to the political scene. His decision to run for council, he says, came because he is "vitaly interested in the growth and development of the community which will inevitably come as the proposed university materializes."

He also is much interested in the proposed zoning board for the city and has done extensive work in this department believing that Oviedo has a "great potential for development in the next few years and that the town must meet this challenge with adequate facilities."

He came to Oviedo five years ago from Jacksonville where he attended Jones Business School for two years. The Thompsons have four boys, all enrolled at Oviedo School. He is an active member of the First Baptist Church and is assistant superintendent of the Junior department.

Solons May Eye 'Party Girl' Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate rules committee hopes to wind up its second Bobby Baker investigation this week—but the tantalizing "party girl" issue may keep the case alive right into the new Congress.

Earth Population Is 3.2 Billion

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The population of the world, increasing by 65 million annually, is expected to reach 4.3 billion by 1980, according to the Population Reference Bureau, Inc.

"Most important is that about a third of the world's people have gained, or are gaining, control of the birth rate," the bureau said. "And the high birth rate areas are the developing countries with low levels of living."

At present the world's population is 3,203 billion. Communist China is the most populous nation in the world at 600 million. India is second with 468.5 million, followed by Russia at 229 million, the United States at 192 million and Indonesia with 102 million.

Only three witnesses remain on the list to be called when public hearings resume Tuesday.

The committee has not yet reached a decision on whether to go into the accusation that "party girls" played a big

part in the award of government contracts and influence legislation.

In another phase of the case, it was expected that the committee would turn over to the Justice Department the major investigation into the field of illegal corporate gifts to political campaign.

The department already is looking into some testimony about political contributions. A federal grand jury, em-

paneled in early October to investigate Baker's affairs, also is expected to investigate the same field.

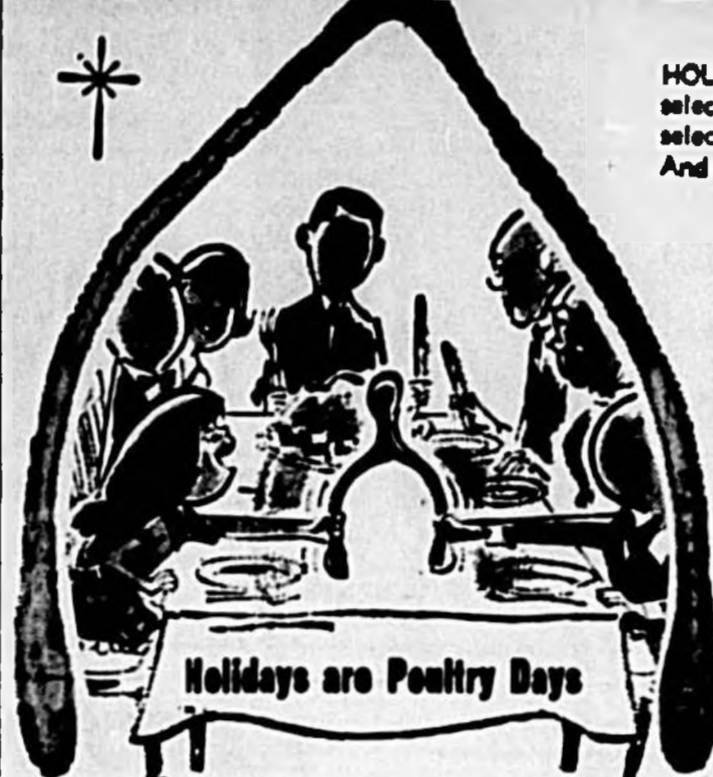
The Senate committee has received statements—not yet brought out publicly during its Baker hearings—about alleged forced contributions to political causes by officials of major companies.

The committee has not yet decided whether to broaden its inquiry into this field.

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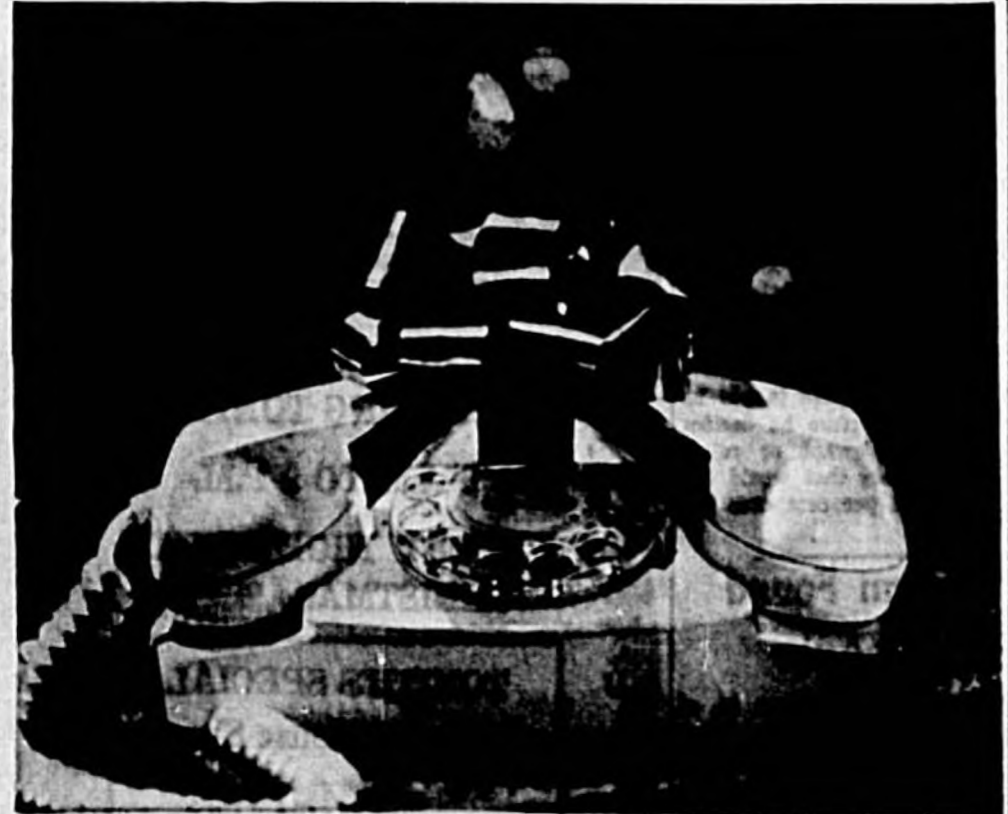

Public Defense Fund Seen In Rights Case

PHILADELPHIA, Miss. — (UPI)— An attorney said today that a public fund may be set up to defend 21 men, including a sheriff and his deputy, against federal charges in connection with the killing of three civil rights workers. At present, 19 of the men face only federal charges of violating the civil rights of the workers, shot to death and buried near a dam last summer. But Mississippi authorities were reported to have decided to press murder charges against several of the men. Laurel G. Weil, attorney for Neshoba County Sheriff Lawrence A. Rainey and his deputy, Cecil Price, said there has been "talk of organizing" a fund raising drive for the men. "People want to help," he said. "People have offered help and more would if they knew how to go about it."

He said none of the men had asked for help. The Memphis Commercial Appeal Sunday quoted sources as saying the state would charge about nine of the 21 men arrested with murder, and several others with being accessories to murder.

Defense Budget At \$50 Billion

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara is "almost certain" his department's budget for the coming fiscal year can be held to \$50 billion or less. McNamara delivered his estimate to President Johnson Saturday during a two-hour conference in which they reviewed preliminary defense figures for the budget that will go to Congress in January. Discussing the session later with newsmen, the secretary said he believes the obligation authority for his department will be slightly less than \$10 billion—a figure he said was "substantially below anything in recent years."

New England dug out of an avalanche of snow today and New York took emergency measures for 150,000 persons left without light, heat or water.

The latest December blast came after a week of wintry storms that pummeled every one of the continental 48 states at one time or another.

The weather bureau said the nation's weather "had settled down to a more quiet routine."

But vestiges of the onslaught of snow and cold remained. An ice storm in New York state turned highways, ponds and fallen power lines into death traps and made widespread hardship. The death toll in New York alone stood at 12.

A state of emergency was in effect at Troy, Saratoga Springs, Schenectady, Gloversville and many small neighboring communities.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller took a first-hand look. It was estimated that more than 100,000 persons were forced to leave their homes and seek shelter elsewhere. The hard-hitting storm turned highways, ponds and fallen power lines into potential death traps. At least 12 deaths were attributed to the storm. Ten persons died in highway crashes, one seven-year-old girl drowned when she fell through ice on a creek and

one 17-year-old youth was electrocuted when he stepped on a downed power line. Police warned mothers to keep their children inside while crews worked on hundreds of snarled and sparking power lines.

Extra work crews from other parts of the state arrived during the night and began relieving weary workmen who had labored through the night in sub-freezing temperatures. Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller in a hastily arranged tour of

the Albany-Troy-Schenectady area, said this was "the worst ice storm I know of in the history of New York."

Rockefeller said he was satisfied the civil defense organization and the Red Cross were doing "all that could be done."

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State Judiciary Is 'Patchwork,' Conferees Say

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The state judicial system is "a bewildering and disorganized patchwork of courts," according to a citizens conference which discussed it during a three-day meeting here.

The conference, which brought together some 80 prominent Floridians, ended by recommending sweeping changes in the state judiciary.

The group pointed out in a summary statement that there are 15 different types of trial courts in the state, which is more than any other state but New York.

It said the "multiplicity of trial courts with overlapping jurisdiction is inefficient and costly."

The conference cited the need for removing judges from politics and of creating a board of lay citizens and legal figures to investigate complaints against judges.

It endorsed the "Missouri" plan of selecting judges as a means of removing them from politics.

Under the plan, a judge runs unopposed and the voter only decides whether he wants the incumbent to remain in office.

If not, the judge is replaced by a name from a list made up by an independent nominating commission of lay citizens.

Preacher Pleads Poverty Fight

LONDON (UPI) — Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. said Sunday Western nations should spend more money in the fight against poverty and less for defense.

The American civil rights leaders made the statement in an unprecedented sermon from the pulpit of London's famed St. Paul's Cathedral. He was the first free church minister ever to preach in the Anglican cathedral. King is a Baptist.

"Can we in the West stand idly by and not be concerned about conditions in the world," King asked. "In the West we are spending far too much of our budget making military bases throughout the world while people are starving.

"We must not end up substituting one tyranny for another."

Beautification Plan Launched

Seminole County beautification got off to a vigorous start at a luncheon meeting at Spencer's Restaurant.

Members of the initial committee which had been selected by John Alexander, temporary chairman, elected him permanent chairman during the meeting.

Alexander outlined the scope of the program explaining that the aim is to enhance the natural beauty of Seminole County with carefully planned landscaping and planting, particularly at the entrances to the county and, most particularly, those exits from Interstate 4.

He noted that this comprehensive program would take the cooperation of the municipal and civic leaders of the communities throughout the county, as well as the help of all citizens to create an orderly long-range, well-planned and integrated program of beautification.

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GOP Body, Governors Split

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A move by "moderate" Republican governors to oust GOP National Chairman Dean Burch may not receive the support of the party officials who will have the final say, a UPI survey indicates.

Some GOP national committeemen and committeewomen were openly scornful of the governors' plans. A total of 66 votes are needed to remove Burch when the National Committee meets Jan. 21.

The committee members represent the same grassroots organization which was instrumental in gaining Sen. Barry M. Goldwater the GOP presidential nomination. Burch was Goldwater's choice for the top party post.

Committeewoman Mrs. William Addington, of Kansas, summed up the feeling of a number of her colleagues who are apparently remaining loyal to the Goldwater camp. "They couldn't agree on a

candidate to stop Goldwater, and I don't think they can agree on a successor for Burch," she said.

The governors contend that a declaration of principles they adopted at their meeting in Denver last week means the end for Burch. Among other things the statement calls for a broad-based party that includes diverse viewpoints.

Tennessee Chairman Harry Carbaugh answered this by

saying, "I think these gentlemen will find in the end that the heart of the Republican party is far more conservative than liberal."

He said he would support a change in party leadership only if a conservative could be elected chairman.

Wisconsin GOP Chairman Talbot Peterson said he thought Burch would have more than enough committee votes to win in a showdown.

Wisconsin committeewoman

Mrs. Byron Ising added that she would support Burch and that the governors' meeting took place too soon after the election to allow for "clear thought."

Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie, chairman of the Republican Governors Association, and Michigan Gov. George Romney both said in television interviews Sunday that Burch was not the man to lead the party back to power.

"There has been no evidence

in the last several months that there was any desire on the part of Mr. Burch to approach the future of the Republican party on the basis of including rather than excluding," Romney said. He termed Burch's ouster "essential."

Smylie said the GOP governors built a shoe at their meeting in Denver, "and I have grave doubt that Mr. Burch can wear the shoe with comfort."

Wintery Blasts Boom Florida's Tourist Trade

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A wintry onslaught in the East that dumped up to 20 inches of snow on New England apparently will help to give sunny Florida a record tourist year, officials said today.

With less than a month to go in 1964, the Florida Development Commission said the prediction that 14.5 million tourists would flock to the Sunshine State is looking better with every Northern snow flurry.

Winter is the best season for heavy-paying tourists who seek the balmy breezes of lower Florida.

Development Director Roger Staba said that as of mid-November, all indications pointed to hitting the 14.5 million figure. Current cold waves in the North tend to guarantee the estimate.

If the forecast comes true, it would be a 300,000 increase over the 14.2 million tourists who visited Florida last year and spent \$2,522,995,771.

There is no spending estimate yet for 1964, but Staba said it will probably show little change from last year. He said, however, the average length of stay has been shortened and the dollar volume in crease has been relatively low.

The average expenditure per day for each visitor increased to \$14.80 in 1963 from \$8.86 in 1959. At the same time the average length of stay dropped from 17.6 days to 11.3 days.

But the tourist count itself has been picking up steadily.

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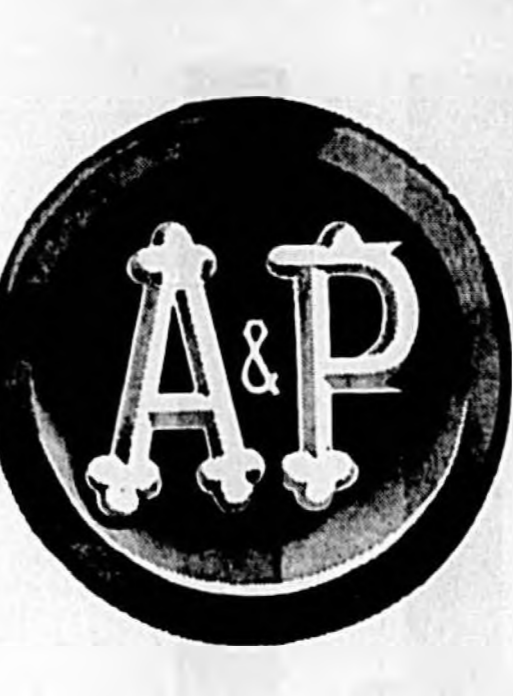

Discrimination End Sought By Jewish Leaders

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — American Jewish leaders urged business and industry in this country to start promoting workers under the "ability principle" and to sweep discrimination out of the office door.

The executive board of the American Jewish Committee wound up a week-long meeting with a special report on discrimination in business compiled by the University of Michigan.

AJC President Morris B. Abram said the study — which offered suggestions for solving the overall problem — showed widespread discrimination was manifested in standards that have little concern for ability and more for race, religion, social background and club affiliations. Basically, the study suggests that management commit itself to the "ability principle" in promotions and the Jewish leaders unanimously backed the proposal.

Jacoby On Bridge

By Oswald Jacoby

The Italians added 13 International Match Points to their lead on the first hand of the second session when Avarall and Belladonna contracted for a grand slam while our North-South pair stopped at six in the World Bridge Olympiad.

The Italian bidding is shown in the box and here is the official analysis of the operation of their "Roman Club" system with these cards.

"In the Roman system the one heart opening is forcing and one spade is the negative response. Normally this negative response denies nine high card points, but possibly North downgraded his hand because of the singleton king of diamonds.

"South's two no-trump rebid every suit guarded. The next two bids were natural. Four no-trump was Roman Black-

wood, five diamonds showed one ace or all four. Six diamonds showed one king.

"Six spades appears to have been a waiting bid. If so, the six no-trump response can show nothing extra, so the final bid of seven hearts appears to have been a complete gamble as to which black king South would hold.

I want to go a trifle further than the official analysis and point out that North's six spade call was a nothing bid. He intended to get to seven when he bid six spades and might better have saved one round of bidding. And, of course, seven was a complete gamble. South had to have the king of clubs in order to have any play for it, but South came through with that key card.

After listening to a tape recording of a wife's nagging, a divorce court judge in London said flatly:

So you'll let them hear how she sounds when she isn't being all sweetness and light to impress outsiders.

The thought of that kind of exposure ought to oil the most rasping, nagging tongue any wife could have... and set it purring.

Most naggers wouldn't nag if they had any idea of how they sound, or if they ever thought any outsider would ever get a chance to hear them at their worst.

For the women who nag their husbands in private usually sweet-talk them in public.

Fossils Found At Gainesville

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — Two amateur archeologists found the fossilized bones of a giant ground sloth and provided scientists a "missing link" in the evolutionary history of the mammal.

The curator of the Florida State Museum, Dr. David Webb, said the ground sloth bones and other valuable finds were made by Paul Kinsey, of Jacksonville, and Dow Roland, of Newberry, in a lime pit at Hale, west of here.

Webb said the ground sloth—related to the present tree sloth—was a giant, slow moving beast that lived in North America during the ice ages. He estimated the sloth bones were from 20,000 to 50,000 years old.

"The sloth is a poorly known group for some reason," Webb said. "We often find indications of them, but rarely is there enough fossil material available to really find out something about them." He said the sloth fossil "is a missing link in the evolutionary history of the mammal." The bones were found in alternating layers of clay and sand about 10 feet below the surface. It was believed these were old pond and stream beds. Also found in the pit were bone fragments from a llama, the skull of a horse, jaw material from a camel and portions of a giant land tortoise. The museum curator said the fossils were from the paleocene era, the most recent geographical era dating back one million years.
