State Judiciary Is 'Patchwork,' **Conferees Say**

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) The state judicial system is "a bewildering and disorganized patchwork of courts," according to a citizens conference which discussed it during a three-day meeting here.

The conference, which brought together some 80 prominent Floridans, ended by recommending sweeping changes in the state judiciary.

The group pointed out in a summary statement that there are 15 different types of trial courts in the state, which is more than any other state but New York.

It said the "inultiplicity of trial courts with overlapping jurisdiction is inefficient and costly.'

The coaference cited the need for removing judges from polities and of creating a board of lay citizens and legal figures to investigate complaints against judges.

It endorsed the "Missouri" plan of selecting judges as a means of removing them from politics.

Under the plan, a judge runs enopposed and the voter only decides whether he wants the incumbent to remain in office. If not, the judge is replaced by a name from a list made up by an independent nominat-

Wintry Blasts Boom Florida's **Tourist Trade**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) wintry costaught in the East that dumped up to 20 inches of snow on New England apparently will help to give sunny Florida a record tourist year, officials said today.

With less than a month to go in 1964, the Florida Development Commission said the prediction that 14.5 million tourlats would flock to the Sunshine State is looking better with every Northern snow flur-

Winter is the best season for heavy-paying tourists who seek the balmy breezes of lower Florida.

Development Director Roger Stake said that as of mid-Novrmber, all indications pointed to hitting the 14.5 million figure. Current cold waves in the North tend to guarantee the estimate.

If the forecast comes true, it would be a 200,000 increase over the 14.2 million tourists who visited Florida last year and spent \$2,522,395,771.

There is no spending estimate yet ror 1964, but Stake said it will probably show little change from last year. He said, however, the average length of stay has been short ened and the dollar volume in crease has been relatively low

The average expenditure per day for each visitor increased to \$14.80 in 1963 from \$3.56 in 1959. At the same time the average length of stay dropped from 17.6 days to 11.3 days.

But the tourist count itself has been picking up steadily.





is testing the use of sonar, echosounding equipment similar to that employed in the tracking of submarines, to tell how much of an animal is fat and how much lean. The device sends painless sound waves through the animal's body; the echo pattern reveals whether they traveled through fatty tissue or lean meat.

Bible Simplified

"And he called unto him the twelve, and began to send them forth by two and two; and gave them power over unclean spirits; and commanded them that they should take nothing for their journey, save a staff only; no scrip, no bread, no money in their purse; but he shod with sandals and not put on two coats."

This passage from the Gospel according to St. Mark (King James Version), with its strange syntax and punctuation, is heavy going for many people. Much more readable is the following:

"He called his twelve disciples together and sent them out by two. He gave them power over the evil spirits and ordered them: 'Don't take anything with you except a stick; no bread, no bag, no money in your pockets. Wear sandais, but don't wear an extra shirt."

The latter is from "The Right Time," a newly published translation of Mark into everyday American English.

The translation is the first in English ever undertaken by the American Bible Society, which for years has been producing simple translations in foreign languages. Like them, "The Right Time" was originally intended for use overseas by the growing numbers of people who use English as a second language.

But it was judged so readable that it will be widely distributed in pamphiet form in this country as a first step in Bible reading for young people, migrant workers, new citizens and many other who find the traditional versions too difficult. Other translations of the New Testament books are in preparation.

Some purists, of course, may raise objections, as they have done with every new Bible translation, including the King James. But as Dr. Eugene A. Nida, the society's secretary for translations, explains;

"Our goal is to give every man a copy of the Bible in his own tongue and in the form he best under-
