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For Chief Justice Job LBJ Left With Three Choices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The withdrawal of Abe Fortas' nomination to be chief justice has left President Johnson with three choices.
Chief Justice Earl Warren said earlier he'd stay on if Fortas weren't confirmed by the Senate, removing any need for quick action.
He will be on the bench when the Supreme Court opens Monday.
Warren said last July his open-ended retirement—which was seized as a major issue by Fortas opponents—would be a danger of 4-to-4 decision in the Supreme Court term beginning Monday.
Johnson could submit a new nomination before Congress adjourns, or make a recess appointment that would be subject to confirmation in the Senate's next session. And he could simply do nothing.
The men who spearheaded the opposition to the Fortas nomination and cheered its withdrawal Wednesday are for this last alternative. They promised to fight any attempt by Johnson to name a new chief justice.
"It would be the better part of wisdom for him not to send up a

new nomination," said Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., who started the drive against Fortas.
"We are on the eve of a decision by the people concerning new government," he said.
Asked if he thought Johnson would offer another chief justice nomination, Sen. Howard H. Baker, R-Tenn., said: "I very much hope he doesn't."
In 1969, Johnson as majority leader supported a resolution that Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., guided through the Senate opposing any recess Supreme Court appointments by outgoing President Eisenhower.
Warren told a news conference last July: "I am obliged to stay on. I suppose that under the oath I am obliged to perform the duties of my office. I neither expect nor hope that I will be a fact." He said that

he expected Fortas' confirmation.
He faced seven men Wednesday at a ceremony marking the signing of a Redwoods National Park Bill but refused to comment on the nomination's withdrawal.

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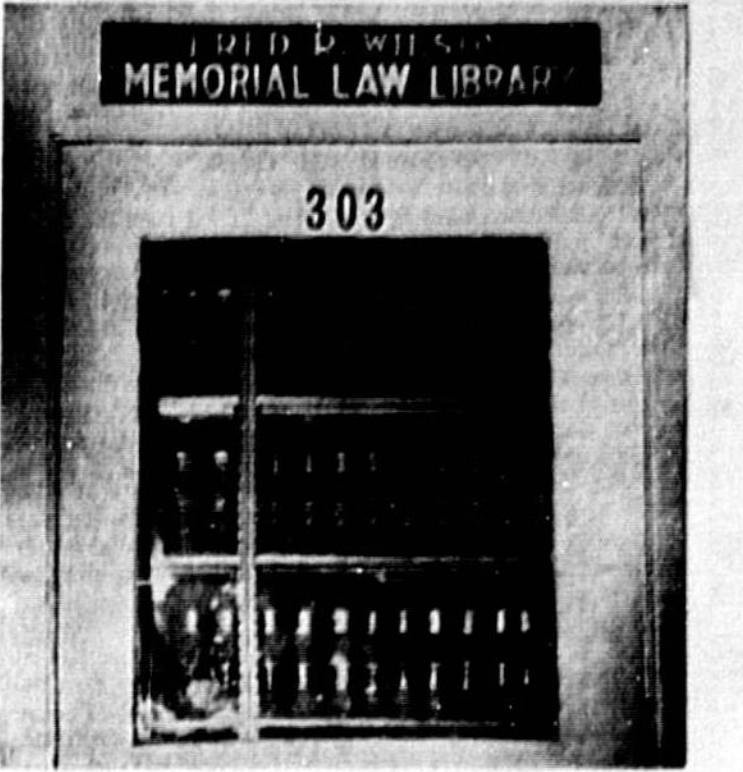
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Courthouse Restricted For Safety

Sighs of relief that the ancient building has lasted another week can be heard from employees at the Seminole County Courthouse each Friday after noon as offices close for another weekend.
The old facility, which has survived long after its sons and adequate life has ended, is now and perhaps will continue for some time to be the housing place of all the county's official documents and records.
"Is the courthouse a safe

structure for people to be in," one time, but we can't even be sure that number is safe," Ferguson said pointing out that only two beams hold up the second floor.
Fire hazard in the facility is another problem Ferguson went into. "It is an old wooden structure. It's been rewired but a fire hazard always exists where you have papers."
The building purchased by the county after its creation in 1913 was originally owned by the Elks Club. The present courtroom was a dance floor at

one time. Purchase price for the structure was \$33,000. Seminole holds the only county of the 67 in Florida which has never built a courthouse.
Latest remodeling of the facility was done in 1959 at cost of \$66,000.
Two years ago, John A. Burton IV, architect, in the courthouse facilities report prepared for the County Commission, cited the fact the "existing court house does not comply with the building code or fire laws and should be abandoned and demolished as soon as practicable. If necessary to conserve current funds, the old building can be used temporarily for county offices in which the functions are such that loss by fire or otherwise would be less than a catastrophe."
At the same time, inspectors of the county zoning office have requested and committee of the Fred R. Wilson Memorial Law Library have heeded the request that no additional law books be purchased for the li-

Lake Mary Ponders Annexation

Advisability of incorporation for Lake Mary or of annexation to Sanford will be taken up by the board of directors of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Tuesday. President Don Jackson told The Herald today.
Tentative discussion on the matter was put before the general membership at Thursday night's meeting of the chamber and it was decided that directors would name a committee to plan a future "town meeting" to put the issue before area residents, Jackson said.
Guest speaker Thursday night was Senator Ken Plante, whose address centered around the area's need for industry and the problems of water pollution.
Stressing the fact that people should not only live in Seminole County but also should work and shop where they pay taxes, he cited the need for industry to help support the increasing population.
"Being the bedroom county for Orange County is bad for the economy of this area," he pointed out.
"Moving of the Navy base will be a boon to industry and economy in the county since it has made the county 'bed'." (Continued on Page 5A, Col. 3)

Persons were lined up today at both the courthouse and South Seminole offices of Mrs. Camilla Bruce, supervisor of elections, to have their names placed on the voter registration rolls before the books close at 5 p.m. tomorrow. Some 25,781 persons had registered and total of voters is hoped to reach the 30,000 mark by the deadline.
Mrs. Bruce and her staff have worked far into the night for the past several weeks to handle the last minute rush.
Offices will open at 9 a.m. tomorrow and remain open until 5 p.m., except for the 12:30 to 1:30 lunch hour at the south end office.
Seminole County has had a consistently light registration over the years and some estimates place the number of voters which should be registered at close to 30,000. Neighboring counties of similar size to Seminole carry larger numbers of voters on the rolls than this county.
Tomorrow is also the deadline for persons not having fulfilled the residency requirements for Florida voters to file applications to be able to vote in the presidential portion of the Nov. 5 elections.
To qualify to file the applications, the citizen must be registered in his home state. Applications may only be filed at Mrs. Bruce's courthouse office.

During his year in Saigon, Mrs. Weiss and their two daughters have made their home at 2629 Laurel Avenue, Lynn, 21 as a student at the University of Southern Illinois at Carbonale, and Susan, 19, is a student at Seminole Junior College.
The family will leave before Nov. 1 to take up residence in Honolulu. Mrs. Weiss is a sister of Walter A. Gilow, publisher - editor of The Sanford Herald.

Pastor's Corner

Humanae Vitae

Within the last few weeks the encyclical letter "Humanae Vitae" (Of Human Life) by Pope Paul VI has been the source of well publicized controversy and dissent among some Catholic theologians by its condemnation of contraceptives.

Such a reaction among Catholics would be perhaps intelligible. Prophets of doom predict over-population and worldwide famine by the end of the century due to the population explosion. They do not trust Christ's promise that divine providence will take care of our problems if we seek first the kingdom of God and His justice, in other words, if we seek to govern our whole lives and even our most intimate actions according to His will. Christians however are expected to do this even if it involves personal difficulty and self-sacrifice.

Catholics, too, have always recognized tradition as a legitimate source for our knowledge of divine revelation and have accepted the Church as a divinely established interpreter of this revelation.

The Church's traditional teaching on this matter has always been quite clear and the Pope's letter merely reaffirms the establishment of the Church, it goes back beyond the Christian Era, it was introduced in the law of Moses. Josephus wrote in the first century that "the law recognizes no union of male or female save for the procreation of children". Before Moses, divine detestation of the act of contraception is expressed in Genesis 38:28.

The Christian teaching on this matter is equally clear as a matter of history. Tertullian in the second century wrote "To prevent birth is but accelerated murder, nor does it matter whether one takes away life already born or frustrates it as it comes to birth". Two hundred years later Jerome condemns some who "even produce sterility in themselves, murdering a human being before he has been planned in the womb".

Prior to this decade, no reputable Catholic theologian questioned the teaching of Pope Pius XI that "those, who in performing the conjugal act, deliberately deprive it of its natural power and efficacy . . . do something intrinsically immoral".

In the last few years, and particularly in the last few weeks, many Catholic "novelists", writers whose theological reputation seems based on novelty rather than scholarship, have challenged the traditional teaching of the Church on this and other subjects. Only the Catholic Church forbids remarriage after divorce. Because of the serious individual and social problems involved, challenges to the Church's stand on these matters are popular and much publicized.

Christ's teaching however was not an election platform formulated on the basis of public opinion surveys. Let us realize, too, that the great majority of Catholic theologians, clerics and lay people who hold firm to the orthodox teaching of the Church do not make news for precisely that reason that they are the rule rather than the exception.

The Pope in his letter recognizes the difficulties and spiritual anguish involved for some in these teachings of the traditional doctrine but, as all faithful Catholics, also recognizes the force of St. Paul's admonition to the Galatians "I wish you were as an angel from heaven should preach a gospel to you other than that which we have preached to you, let him be anathema".

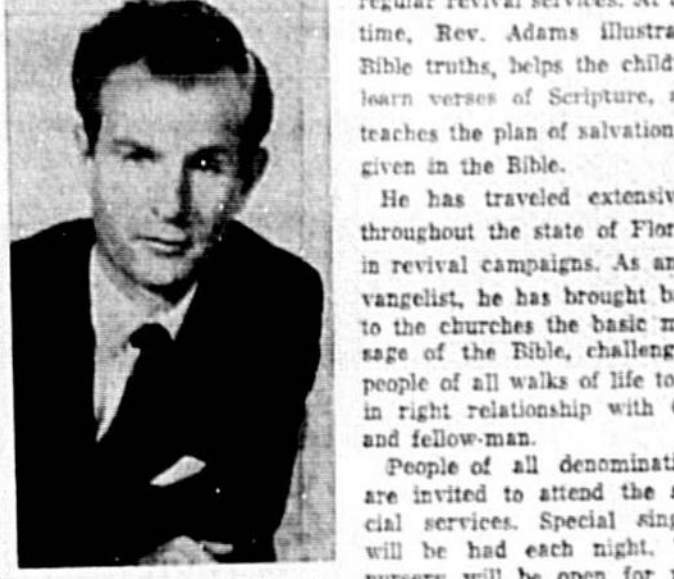
Revival Service Slated

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LeMay Name Not On Ballot

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A state official says it will be practically impossible to put Gen. Curtis LeMay's name on the Florida ballot, but the law isn't clear about whether a former George Wallace party elector could vote for him.

Mrs. Dorothy Gilson, head of the Secretary of State's Elections Division, said Thursday that the name of former Georgia Gov. Marvin Griffin has already been placed on Florida's ballot as Wallace's vice president and some of the ballots have already been mailed to servicemen overseas.

"I would say it was physically impossible to change," she said. She noted that the state had not received any official word that Griffin has withdrawn and

However, only Florida has a law which might present a problem of who would get the electoral votes if Wallace should win the state. So far as the Constitution is concerned the electors picked by plurality of popular vote in their states are free agents to vote for whomever they choose.

However, 17 of the states do split out how the electors shall vote. But generally the electors aren't very precise or detailed. Florida's law, on its face, looks the tightest. It provides for long punishment for any elector who does not vote for the presidential ticket named on the ballot. Griffin is on in Florida.

Meanwhile, the chairman of the George Wallace party in Florida said he felt selection of LeMay would improve Wallace's chances of winning in this state. "I think this is the general reaction around the state," said Dr. Jake Purvis of Fort Walton Beach. "This is what all the people were waiting and I think they're all mighty happy with it."

He said he had received several calls from people who said that they were changing their plans to vote for other candidates and would now cast their ballots for the Wallace-LeMay ticket.

WASHINGTON (AP)—In spite of his selection as George C. Wallace's running mate, Gen. Curtis LeMay's name won't be on the ballot as a vice presidential candidate in most states.

Wallace's announcement that LeMay is his No. 2 man came too late to replace the name of former Georgia Gov. Marvin Griffin on the ballot except for a handful of states.

Griffin was picked by Wallace at the outset of his third party campaign as a stand-in running mate because many states required any party seeking a place on the ballot list former presidential and vice presidential candidates.

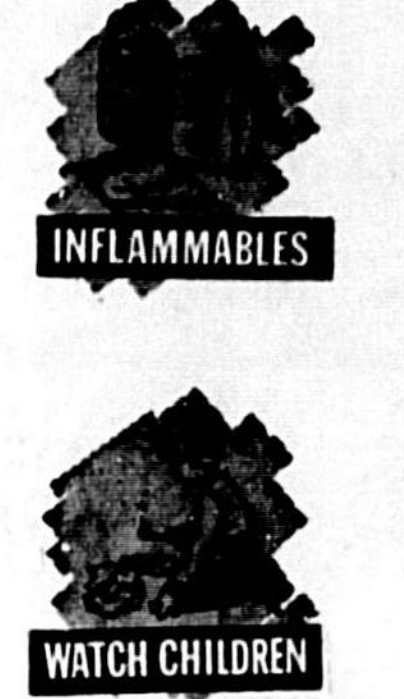

Helpful Hints For Mailing Cookies

If you are going to send cookies overseas, you may want to use this advice.

Use empty metal coffee or shortening tins that come with plastic lids, or metal boxes that are available in variety or housewares stores. Sturdy plastic containers are a satisfactory choice if the cookies are being sent only a short distance. For a bright holiday look, it's fun to cover the container with gaily colored wallpaper or self-adhesive plastic.

To pack, wrap cookies in pairs, flat sides together, in pieces of foil long enough to allow a generous overlap; seal each with a cellophane tape. Cushion the bottom of the container with a layer of crumpled foil and arrange the cookies on top, packing them in as tightly as possible. Stuff any holes between with more foil to keep cookies from bouncing about. Affix the lid and seal with tape.

To wrap, cover the container with a layer of corrugated cardboard, then wrap in a double layer of brown paper.

Autumn Time To Transplant

Autumn is one of the best times to transplant woody plants for the home landscape. The growth of trees and shrubs slows down toward the end of summer, and plants become dormant with the onset of cooler weather. Therefore, woody plants can be transplanted with less shock to the plant.

Plants moved when in an actively growing stage lose an excessive amount of water, unless special precautions are taken. With the exception of a few plants, transplanting may be done in either fall or spring. Some of the exceptions include azaleas, holly, dogwood, and magnolia. Difficult-to-move plants usually have better chance of surviving if they are transplanted in the spring.

Most types of evergreen and large shade trees should be moved carrying a ball of soil covered tightly with material such as burlap. Plants which have been grown in containers have the advantage of transplanting well anytime, provided their roots are well established in those containers.

If trees and shrubs are properly planted, chances for survival and growth are improved. Unfortunately many soils consist of only a thin layer of top soil and a heavy subsoil. When transplanting into a poor soil, a hole should be dug larger than the root system or ball to be placed in it. Part of the soil from the hole should be mixed with some type of organic matter — sphagnum peat moss, compost or leaf mold, at the rate of two parts of soil to one part of organic matter.

Before placing the plant in the hole, fill the hole partly with soil mixture, then position the plant so that it will be the same depth as it was before transplanting. Finish filling the hole with the soil mixture and form a ridge over the perimeter of the hole with excess soil. The extra soil will form a reservoir for water applied to the soil surface. The ridge eventually will disappear as the soil around the roots settles.

Fear Not Fashion Cycles

Don't let fashion cycles throw you! You need not fear fashion cycles if you know your figure well enough to choose becoming and well-fitting styles. Make the most of your good points and disguise the imperfections. A full-length mirror might be your best fashion friend if you believe what it tells you. Figures differ in proportions, so study the effect of different lines on your figure. The resulting knowledge can help you choose not only ready-made clothes, but also patterns, more satisfactorily.

Know your measurements and proportions — shoulder width to hip width; neck to waist, waist to knee, and all of these to total height. Compare these proportions to a standard such as "misses" ready-to-wear dresses. How do they fit?

If the waistline seems in the right place but skirts always need shortening, your body proportions from waist to knee or perhaps from the knee to the ground are shorter than average. To remedy this situation, try high-waisted styles to give you that long-legged look.

If however, you're short-waisted, the lowered belt line may be your cup of tea.

Waistline getting thick? Look for dress lines that come in diagonally from wide shoulders to a narrow line at the waist and set again at the hips — princess styles, for example. Better yet — take off those inches!

Skirt always hang over the hips? You know the answer to that one. Styles that create an illusion of width at the shoulder may balance the hip width. But, if lines of shoulder yokes or other widening details make you look too short, choose styles with eye-catching interest at the neckline. Then avoid details that call attention to your hips — large hip pockets, full sleeves, low waist lines, and the like.

There are many choices in styles in every new fashion cycle. Don't go overboard for the one that is unkind to your figure.

Do You Know How Old You Are?

It's hard to believe, but one out of seven in the United States doesn't really know how old he is. That adds up to about 30 million people who aren't sure of their exact age. If you're one of these, now's the time to do something about it, especially if you are approaching retirement. Many factors of retirement depend on your proving proof of your birth date.

A lot of people past the age of 60 often rely on what their parents told them once, or what an uncle wrote down in a Bible. This isn't good enough, and it's often difficult for persons in Florida over the age of 60 to obtain exact proof of age because the state didn't start registering birth certificates until 1917. Similar situations exist in other states.

Proof of age is necessary before you can collect Social Security and it might even be needed before you can collect any early life insurance benefits. SO — if you are one of

the 30 million in the U. S. who are in doubt about your exact age, become one of the 40,000 people who are getting this proof every month from the U. S. Bureau of the Census. Write to the Census Service Branch, Pittsburgh, Penn. 15202, and ask for an Age Search Application form. State who you were living with, and when one of the censuses were taken in 1910, 1920, 1930, or so on. You're taken every ten years. Your name and age at the time of the census should be listed in the Census records under the name of your parents or who ever was the head of your household when the Census was taken.

Of course, there's a small fee of four dollars for the service. For five dollars, they'll give you extra fast service. A dollar buys an extra copy.

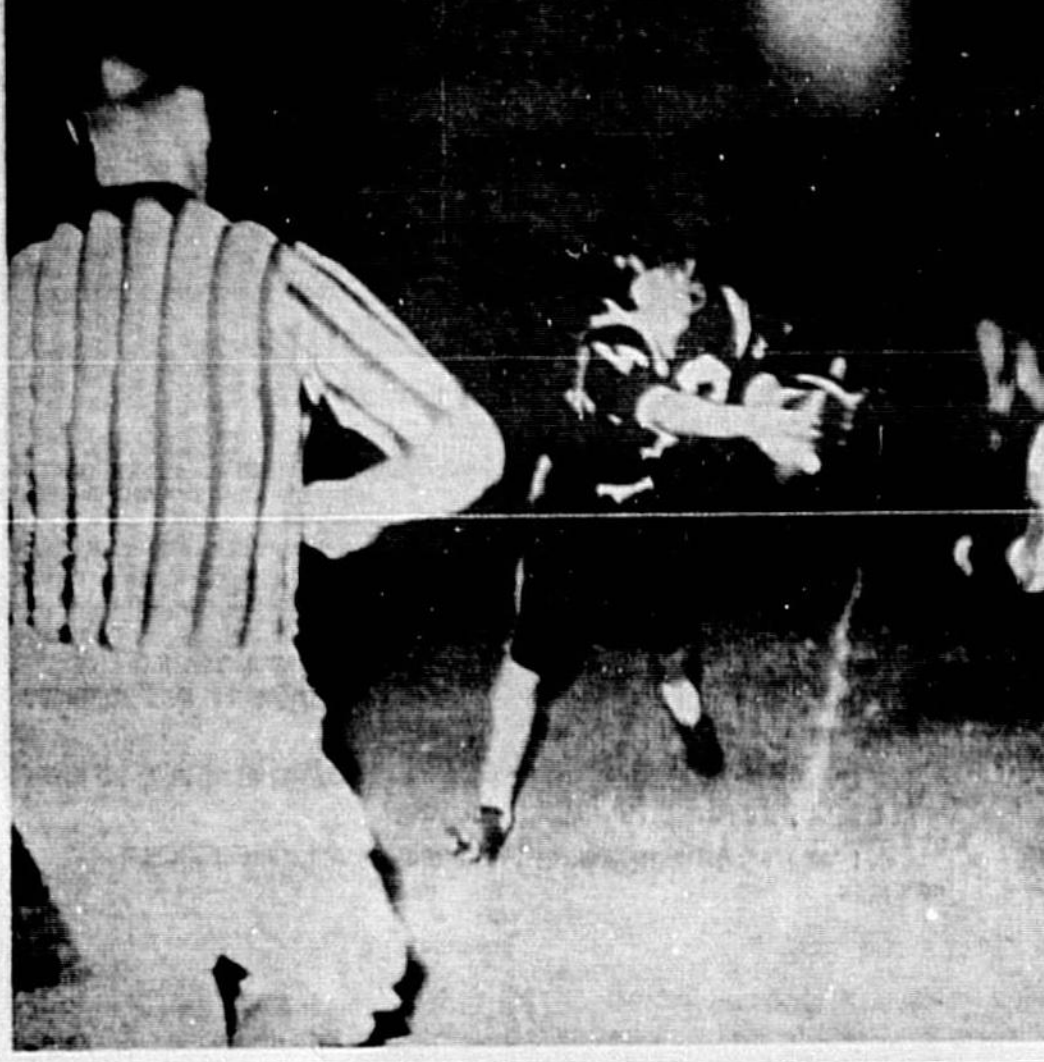

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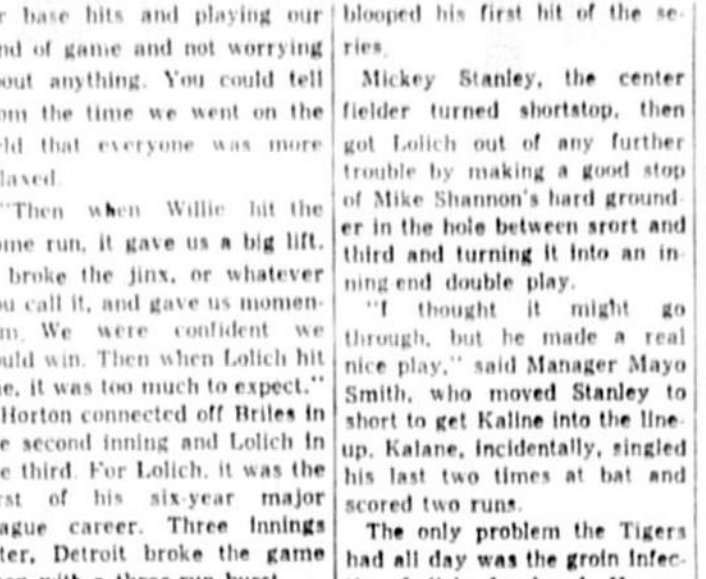

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—The Florida Public Service Commission has suspended a clause that would have allowed Florida Power and Light Co. to raise rates by at least \$750,000 next month.

The commodity adjustment clause will be inoperative until the current investigation of the utility's rates is completed, Commission Chairman William Mayo said Thursday.

He said the clause granted to Florida Power and Light earlier would have allowed the utility to raise rates \$750,000 a year for each increase of one point in the cost-of-operation index.

Costs had gradually risen so that the company would have been able to automatically pass the rate hike into effect next month, Mayo said.

Heart Attack Risks Outlined

A film entitled "Better Odds For A Longer Life," furnished by Seminoles-DeBary Division of the Canaveral Area Heart Association, was shown, after which a question and answer period was conducted.

Dr. Perez pointed out to the some 40 members present that studies show that those who had heart attacks had one or more of the following conditions or living habits: (1) high levels of cholesterol or other fatty substances in the blood, (2) overweight, (3) high blood pressure, (4) lack of exercise, (5) cigarette smoking, (6) diabetes, and (7) a family history of heart attacks in middle age.

"It appears, continued Dr. Perez, that any one of these habits or conditions, called risk factors, increases the chances of a heart attack."

"To reduce your risk of heart attack, you should have regular medical check-ups, regulate fat and cholesterol in the diet, reduce if overweight, control high blood pressure, don't smoke cigarettes, and exercise daily," he concluded.

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AROUND THE CLOCK

Since this is National Newspaper Week we'd like to recall the story of a newspaper that lived for three months in Italy during World War II. It was read only by the fighting GIs in the frontlines.

Unbeknownst to most people, the popular military newspaper Stars & Stripes was more than just one newspaper. There were three chains called Stars & Stripes during WW II... S & S - Mediterranean, S & S - European and S & S-Pacific, each with a number of newspapers in its chain.

This is the story of the Combat Edition of Stars & Stripes Mediterranean, S & S and operating in Algeria, Oran and Casablanca while the fighting was in Tunisia and it was impossible to get the newspaper to the GIs in the frontlines.

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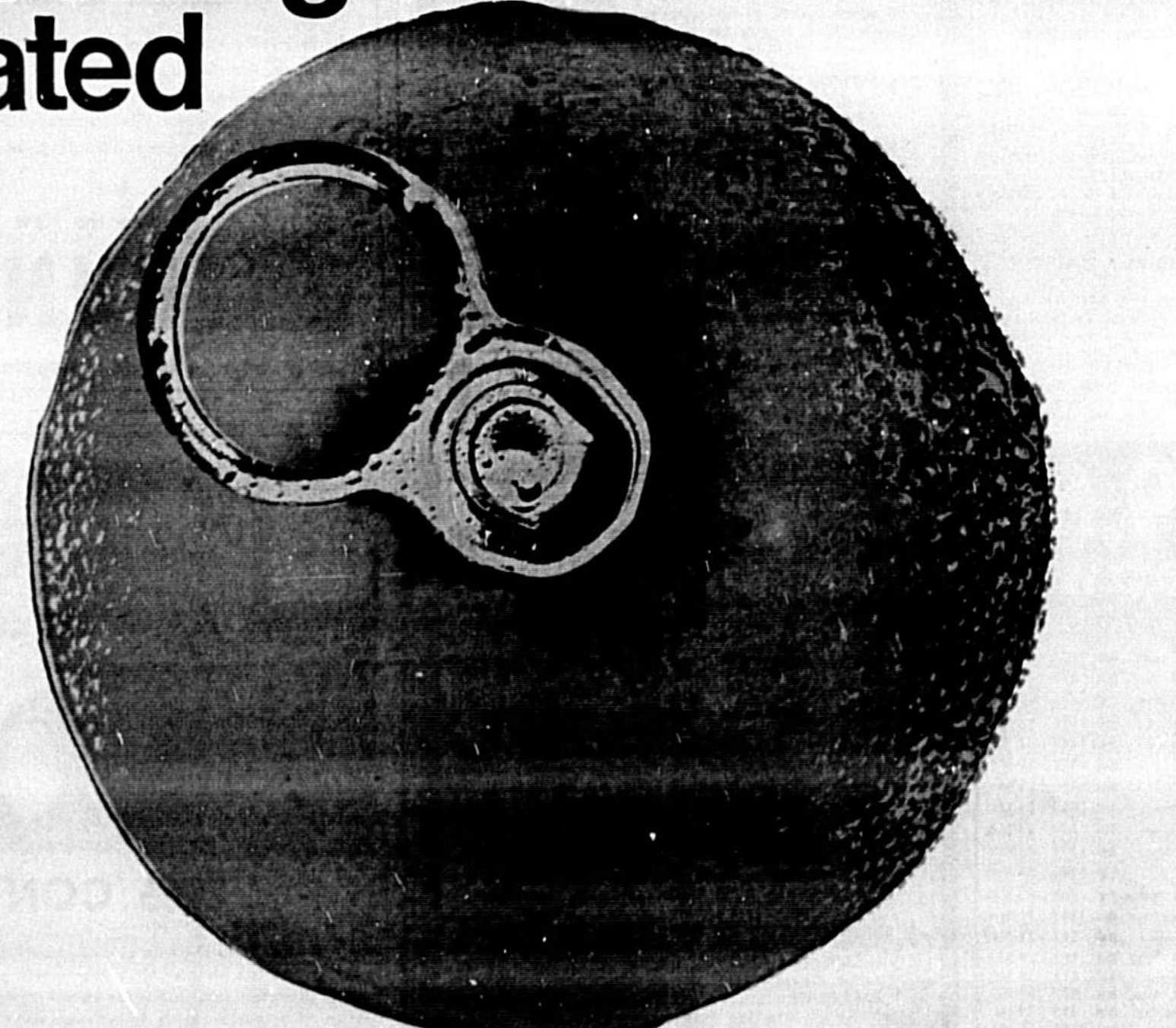
