Motels Boost Security In Wake Of Armed Attacks

By Susan Loden Herald Staff Writer

A rash of armed robberles at Seminole County motels have caused motel managers to examine and tighten security, while gunplay in two of three weekend bandit raids has increased the concern of sheriff's investigators.

Seminole County sheriff's Lt. George Hagood, head of the investigation into the seven holdups or attempted holdups, which have occurred at motels along the Interstate 4 corridor during the

'anything involving guns is a concern. This is a heck of a priority with us."

So far none of the victims, all either guests or working in rooms at the Day's Inn and the Hollday Inn on State Road 46, west of Sanford, or the Quality Inn, on State Road 434, in Longwood, have been injured by the robbers, Hagood said.

The bandits have gotten away with cash and jewelry, with an elderly South Carolina couple

past seven weeks starting Aug. 21, said, loosing the most, about \$800 in cash and personal goods.

But, he said, a Tennessee man was taking a big risk in fighting back when three bandits, one armed, entered the open Day's Inn room he shared with two other men and and demanded

James Edward Cook, 29, of Grimsley, Tenn., folled the robbery at about 9:25 p.m. Saturday when he refused an order from the bandits to enter the bathroom of his room, he struggled

with one of the intruders and they fled. But the gunman returned to fire a single shot into the room, a sheriff's report said.

A Hialeah man, a guest at the Day's Inn on Friday, told sheriff's deputies when he ran from an armed robber who approached him at a soft drink machine at about 7 p.m. outside the motel, the suspect pulled the trigger of his gun, but the weapon didn't fire. Sanford To Make Offer On Acreage For Landspreading

Sanford City Commissioners they did not have to disclose. voted 4-0 Monday to authorize city staff to make an offer to purchase nearly 3,000 acres of land between Yankee Lake and the St. John's River to use for effluent spraying. The amount of the offer was undisclosed.

In September the city made a pact with the state Department of Environmental Regulation which for four years had been insisting Sanford stop dumping treated effluent into Lake Monroe and go to a landspreading system of disposal. The city agreed to stop untreated sewage and storm water runoff from flowing into the lake in exchange for an extended deadline on changing the city's manner of effluent disposal.

The DER issued a permit allowing that plant to operate until March 30, 1989; the previous permit was to run out in January 1987. The agreement also states the city must separate its combined storm and sanitary sewers in a project starting not later than 1992 and finishing not later than 1995.

Execution Claimed

420 Held Hostage At Sea

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - negotiate their demand for re-Palestinian gunmen holding 420 hostages aboard a hijacked luxury liner said today they "executed" one hostage and will kill more unless Western diplomats agree to negotiate with them. Christian Voice of Lebanon radio reported.

Nicknames Help Nab Bad Guys

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UPI) -Police Chief Joseph McNamara will recommend to his colleagues that they adopt his department's practice of giving criminals colorful nicknames.

"It's a very positive practice. This kind of thing captures a cop's imagination and the public's," McNamara sald Monday.

Sgi. Larry Darr is the department dispenser of nicknames and has given out such allases as "The Herder," "Hollywood," "Wigs" and "The Thriller" - the latter for a robber who wore one glove and sported Michael Jacksonlike curls.

"Our biggest problem in solving a robbery is in finding out who did it," Darr said. "By giving identitles to the robbers that reflect some characteristic or method of operation, we give the detectives something to remember."

Seminole Eyes Rebate Plan For Pet Neutering Cost

A rebate program that would pay pet owners \$25 for having a pet neutered is slated for discussion by county commissioners today.

Under the program, any Seminole County resident who has a pet sterilized, whether or not they bought the pet from a county shelter, has 30 days to apply for the \$25 rebate. The pet owner must also provide written verification of the operation from the veterinarian performing the operation, according to a proposal designed by Bob McIntosh, animal control director. If the pet ewner does not apply within the 30-day period he waives his right

to any rebate, the proposal says.

"From the date of the inception of the program then people who had their animals done within that 30-day period can apply for the rebate," McIntosh said. In other words, the proposal is not retroactive.

"We're trying to cut down on these pupples and kittens that I'm having to put to sleep out here every day," said McIntosh. It doesn't cost the taxpayer anything on top of that, he said. "You've contributed already before your animal is sterilized when you buy your pet license every year."

Last year in Hillsborough County over \$169,660 in rebates

were neutered, said McIntosh. rarily" when the funds dwindle dog or cat from the county's Seminole's proposed program is based on that program. Funding for the program

would come from a \$2 appropriation from each license fee collected in the county, the proposal states. "We're charging \$6 now for pet licenses and the proposal is to drop the charge to \$5. We're proposing to raise the liscense fee for neutered animals to \$3 with \$2 of that to be given to this program," McIntosh said.

Rebates would be given after \$3,000 from the license fees has been collected for the program, or six months after approval of the program, whichever comes first. The program "will were paid out and 8.483 animals automatically suspend tempo-

to \$500 and automatically reinstate when funds regenerate to \$3,000 again, the proposal says.

However, the proposal does not provide for rebates that are requested during the time the fund is being built up to \$3,000. It also does not address whether rebates will be given if the fund does not reach \$3,000.

"The uncontrolled breeding of one female cat in a two year period can increase the population by 88 cates," Melntosh said.

The program is part of an on-going effort by the county to control problem populations of unwanted pets. In August commissioners approved a measure that requires those adopting a

animal control facility to pay a \$35 fee, \$25 of which is refunded when the pet is sterilized.

McIntosh said that measure in part assures that pets adopted from the county are being sterilized — as required by state law concerning adopted pets. The procedure also relieves veterinarians of some paperwork that had been part of their

responsibility. In the past, people paid \$44 for adopting unspayed females and \$34 for unneutered males and the county would pay the veterinarian's fee for spaying or neutering. The Animal Control Office received no funds from

Another Day Older And Deeper In Debt ...

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate, in failing to extend the U.S. credit line to \$2 trillion because of squabbling over balancing the budget, could disrupt government finances today and leave recipients of federal checks in limbo.

The chamber was stalled for a fifth day over a proposal to tack balanced budget legislation onto the bill needed to raise the federal debt ceiling from \$1.8 trillion to \$2 trillion.

The Treasury warned Monday that without the increased borrowing authority by midnight, government checks might not be honored by later today or Wednesday.

Despite prodding by President Reagan, who favors the balanced budget measure, the Senate was stalemated over the attempt to take the federal deficit down to zero in six

Backers said the amendment - sponsored by Sens. Warren Rudman, R-N.H., Phil Gramm, R-Texas, and Ernest Hollings, D-S.C. — would mean equal budget cuts in all programs except Social Security. Opponents charged many areas, including 80 percent of the military budget. would also be exempt.

Democratic leader Robert Byrd proposed taking the pressure off by waiting to vote on the balanced budget measure for a few days and passing a temporary extension of the debt ceiling. He suggested a vote Thursday on the balanced budget issue and several other amendments.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan welcomes to the White House today Singapore's Prime Minister Lee Kwan Yew, who supports the president's views on free international trade as protectionist fever rises on Capitol

Lee arrived in Washington Monday for a round of talks with Reagan and other key administration officials.

The Asian leader was described by a senior U.S. official as a "good friend" of the United States and "a remarkable statesman" who has remained in power 25 years.

The official said Lee heads a country that "shares our commitment to a free and open trading system and has one of the freest trading regimes in the world.

The United States is Singapore's largest trading partner and 400 American firms are represented there.

Defendant Charged With Carrying Concealed Weapon, 'Explosives' At Seminole Courthouse

A Sanford man scheduled for trial Monday was charged with carrying a concealed weapon after he pulled a 14-inch bayonet from his boot when detained by bailiffs upon entering the Seminole County Courthouse.

He was also charged with possession of explosives in a courthouse after live shotgun shells and a bullet were found by sheriff's lieutenant Robert Kunkler in one of two boxes he was carrying.

The incident was the first test of increased security at the courthouse. Four unarmed bailiffs were stationed at the entrances of the courhouse starting Oct. 1 to detain people and search articles they consider suspicious. The move was to prevent a similar situation as occurred in the Orange County Courthouse in January 1984 where a man carrying a handgun killed a bailiff and wounded two others in a courtroom

The man was scheduled to appear for trial before County Judge Wallace Hall on

charges of possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana and two traffic charges, failure to carry a driver license and improper equipment.

"If it wasn't for the bailiffs, he would have walked around the courthouse," with the weapons, Kunkler said.

But even if the bailiffs, Terese Vincent and Charles Mort II, had not stopped the man. he probably wouldn't have gotten far because Kunkler was tipped the man was on his way to the courthouse just about the same time he was on the courthouse steps.

Kunkler, in charge of the sheriff's judicial division, gave the following account of the

At 10:07 a.m. he received a phone tip that a man was heading for the courthouse and may cause trouble. Kunkler left the deputies' mezzanine-level office heading towards the first-floor east-west entrances one and a half floors below, the only two entrances open to the public at the court house.

When Kunkler arrived at the west entrance two bailiffs, unaware of the tip-off, had detained a man because he fit the profile of persons they were trained to be suspicious of. On the approach of Kunkler. the man reached into his boot and pulled out a sheathed bayonet which he dropped down on a table. The 14-inch weapon had a

Kunkler said the man was carrying two boxes. The man placed the smaller one, a leather-covered box, about 6 Inches by 15 inches by 2 inches, on the table but refused to put down the larger box even after the licutenant told him at least twice that he was a deputy. Kunkler then took the man aside and told him he was under arrest for carrying a concealed weapon.

The larger box contained just papers but inside the smaller box was a shirt, five 12-gauge shotgun shells, two 410-gauge shotgun shells and a .38-caliber cartridge. Kunkler said.

The man became emotional before he was arrested, according to the arrest report.

Arrested and being held today in lieu of \$500 bond was Tommy Capps, 31, of 721 Michigan St., Sanford.

South Africa Announces Reforms

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) -Police battled blacks and people or mixed race in more than 20 townships, killing one person and injuring 11, as the government announced a \$150 million program to aid all Jobless South Africans.

The government also announced a reform in its apartheid laws that will open some 'whites only" movie theaters to all races.

Police in Lynville, about 80 miles northwest of Johannesburg, opened fire Monday on a mob that attacked a post office truck and attempted to burn down a shopping center, authorities said. One black man was killed and 11 others were injured.

The white driver of the post office truck was also slightly injured, police said.

Authorities reported that police clashed with rioting black and mixed-race, or 'colored." students in more than 20 townships nationwide

Rioters also burned down two schools, one in a "colored" township near Cape Town and another in a black township near Port

Syrian Envoy Visits Gemayel

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Shitte Amal militiamen backed by tanks surrounded Beirut's three Palestinian refugee camps today after clashes in which at least five people were killed and 30 wounded, police said.

At the Baabda presidential palace, President Amin Gemayel received a personal envoy of Syrian President Hafez Assad for talks on the Lebanese crisis, government

"The envoy, Gen. Mohammed al Kholi, is carrying a letter from President Assad to President Gemayel. The discussions will be covering everything from the Soviet hostages, the Syrian peace-keeping role in Tripoli to the occasional bouts of fighting in Beirut," said a government source who declined to be named.

Kholi's arrival coincided with tension around Beirut's three Palestinian refugee camps after a day of heavy fighting between Shiite Amal militiamen and Palestinian forces, followed by a night of minor skirmishes.

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



The Fall (And Rise?) Of OPEC

Another nail has been driven into the coffin of OPEC, this time by that organization's most stalwart supporter. Saudi Arabia over the last decade has cut its own oil sales from 10 million barrels a day to less than 2 million in an effort to keep OPEC prices up and hold the organization together. But now it has agreed to sell to three American oil refineries at the market price, rather than the higher official OPEC price, and it has announced it will no longer try to counter the price-depressing glut in the world market by holding back its own production.

To some extent, the American oil companies have driven Saudi Arabia, and thus OPEC, to this pass. They've been buying less lately and particularly avoiding purchases from Saudi Arabia. To a larger extent. however, it's OPEC that has caused its own problems. As it drove the price of oil to such extravagant heights in the 1970s, it produced a great leap in conservation among its customers and a boom in new oil drilling in non-OPEC nations. Its high prices also contributed significantly to a worldwide recession that itself lowered demand for oil. Falling demand and rising supplies undermined the cartel, whose members started competing against each other. For the last few years, only Saudi Arabia has stuck to the prices and production levels to which all the cartel members regularly promised to adhere.

Now Saudi Arabia won't, either. And by next spring, oil experts are predicting, the full effects will have trickled down to American consumers, who could see as much as a 10-cent-per-gallon drop in the price of gasoline.

This is good news, but it could also be the making of the next oil crisis. If lower prices produce a drop in conservation or in non-OPEC production or in the number of competitors in the oil-producing and refining industries, they can only send prices spiraling upward again. And if American companies step up oil imports while prices are low, there is the risk of the U.S. economy becoming dependent on imports again and of OPEC rising from the ashes.


It is, in fact, when things are looking good that the nation most needs an energy policy. Unfortunately, that's just when the public and the politicians are likely to be least interested in it. Only when prices are rising will the do-nothing strategy of letting the market take its course produce the results the country needs. It takes government programs like the imposition of tough fuel-efficiency standards for ears - to produce conservation. It takes government trade and finance initiatives to keep non-OPEC oil-producing countries like Mexico from losing their shirts and therefore their ability to keep producing oil. When prices are falling, it takes active government anti-trust intervention to prevent the domestic industry from recouping its losses by concentrating itself further into an even smaller and less competitive form.

Very little of that is happening now. Maybe that's what Saudi Arabia is counting on.

We Should Heed Soviet Bid For Compromise

Looking at the recent statements of Soviet and American leaders one could easily conclude that the forthcoming summit meeting of President Reagan and Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev is headed for a hopeless stalemate.

The Soviets contend that there can be no meaningful arms negotiations unless Reagan abandons his "Star Wars" proposal. Reagan counters that this is something he is unwilling to bargain away. The Soviets add that if the United States would give up "Star Wars," they would be willing to sign a verifiable agreement calling for deep cuts in offensive missiles.

I personally think it would be in the interests of the United States to seize the Soviet offer. But I write as one who regards the "Star Wars" project as an enormously costly boundoggle that would escalate the federal defleit, heat up the arms race and reduce national security.

Reagan apparently believes that his proposal

is worth the added tax and debt burden. The Soviets regard it as a military threat. So if the concept is taken seriously by both Reagan and Gorbachev, the rest of us must take it seriously, no matter how foolish it appears.

On that assumption, I believe there is still a possible basis for compromise at Geneva: a willingness on the part of the Soviets to enter into a deep mutual reduction of offensive

missiles in return for an absolute commitment by Reagan that the United States will not go beyond the research stage on "Star Wars." Each side would agree not to develop, test or deploy anti-satellite weapons of any kind. The militarization of space would be halted except for research.

The Soviets believe, rightly or wrongly, that if the United States proceeds with the defensive shield which "Star Wars" promises, this would place them in grave danger. They fear that it would destroy the mutual deterrence that now rests on the assumption that neither side could attack the other without inviting its own destruction. If "Star Wars" were in place, say the Soviets, the United States could hit them with a first strike, knowing that we were safe against a Soviet reprisal. Thus the prospect of "Star Wars" offers the Soviets only two acceptable alternatives: build a similar system or increase their offensive missile power. In either case, the economic cost would be enormous

Since research cannot be reliably verified, it is impractical to propose to the cold warriors in the Reagan administration that they abandon "Star Wars" research. But if the Reagan people can be persuaded that the last thing the United States needs is a bigger arms race and a bigger deficit explosions."

with all its dire consequences, perhaps the proposed compromise will have some appeal.

In his recent address at the United Nations. Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze emphasized that the Soviets have made a number of substantive proposals relative to the Geneva negotiations. There was doubtless a heavy political motive behind the Soviet initiatives, but some of them are well worth testing by the American negotiators.

Reagan has said: "At Geneva, we're in the best position in more than a generation to achieve real reductions of nuclear weapons. All we need is a serious approach by the Soviets."

Consider, then, these recent steps highlighted by Shevardnadze: "The decision not to place anti-satellite weapons in outer space so long as the United States does not take such a step; te suspension of further implementation of our countermeasures in Europe caused by the deployment of U.S. medium-range nuclear systems; our moratorium on any nuclear explosions."

These and other Soviet initiatives indicate that the Soviets are trying to set forth a "serious approach" to the Geneva talks. I believe that they have opened the door to reasonable compromise.

Decision Time Is At Hand

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Decision time is at hand for those House members who would like to improve their status in life and who might be willing to take a gamble — those who are thinking about running for the Senate.

Some have already announced their decision to give up the security of their House seats and make a bid for the Senate. Others still are mulling over the idea, consulting their political allies, taking polls and generally trying to determine the prospects for success should they make the plunge.

The urge to run for the Senate is strong. The pay may be the same as in the House, but there is vastly more prestige in being a member of that exclusive club, the Senate.


A senator has only to run for election once every six years, whereas a House member runs every two. A senator is one of only 100 people bearing that title, while House members are part of a mob of 435 representatives.

With the exception of House committee chairmen, few House members ever experience the kind of courting and stroking the White House and lobbyists lavish on senators.

And despite the Senate's notable lack of success recently in sending any of its members on to the White House, the Senate continues to be regarded as the launching pad for presidential aspirants. Notwithstanding the obvious shortcomings of some indvidual senators, nearly every one of them manages to make somebody's list of potential presidential or vice presidential candidates.

At the moment, only one House member — Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y. — is considered a serious contender for the presidency in 1988.

Rep. James Broyhill, R-N.C., became the latest House member to bid for the Senate, when he announced he wants to succeed retiring Sen. John East, R-N.C. Earlier in the year, when speculation began that East would not seek re-election because of poor health. Broyhill said he would not be a candidate. He obviously continued to think about it, however, and when East bowed out Sept. 17 Broyhill quickly declared he was in the race.

Paralysis Of The Will

Most readers of this column will not be interested in the demise of the large New York City "Westway" project, but they ought to be intensely interested in the larger meaning of that demise. The meaning: It seems to be no longer possible for this country to conceive and push through a large civic project costing hundreds of millions of dollars, even a project whose long-term benefits are glaringly obvious.

For the last 20 years, to put the matter briefly, the Lower West Side of Manhattan has been dead. Once, the great ocean liners and freighters sailed from piers there. Cunard liners, the Holland America Line, the Leonardo Da Vinei and the France. But all of that is gone, the neighborhood is a dangerous slum, and no one has any access to the shore of the Hudson River. It is potentially one of the most attractive pieces of urban property in the world.

Perhaps the Westway project was too grandiose, though it would not have been under city planner Robert Moses back in the 1930s and 1940s when so many great public beaches, roads and bridges were built in the New York area. More about Moses in a minute, for I am working on him for a chapter in my new book on the year 1940.

Anyway, the planners conceived of Westway as a large revitalization project. It involved a land-fill, extending into the Hudson River, which has plenty of room for it. The elevated Westside Highway, which collapsed down to the ground five

years ago, was to be replaced by an underground highway which would be non-polluting. And there would arise on the present wasteland, apartment houses, condominiums, recreation areas, businesses and shopping malls. The federal government, out of the Highway Trust fund and appropriations, was going to contribute \$1.7 billion.

But time ran out, because of a variety of objections. The project became tied up in endless litigation. The Hudson River striped bass were big winners here: no one could guarantee that Westway would not interfere with their breeding habits. Endless environmental impact studies were undertaken, and the litigation went on. There were cries on every hand that Westway was a gift to private real-estate developers. despite the fact that it would create thousands of construction jobs. It would create tens of thousands of new permanent jobs, and provide sorely needed residency space in Manhattan.

But no, Westway was beaten by a pervading spirit of negativism, by city-haters and extreme environmentalists and jealous people who thought that Donald Trump and other developers might make money, and, in the end, it was beaten by a jungle of environmental and impact laws that few even educated people understand.

Robert Moses, the great city builder of an earlier day, could put a major project through because people wanted things done and he had the ego and the power to threaten and cajole.

How To Walk On Hot Coals

NEW YORK (UPI) — One of the more recent fads to sweep the nation is fire-walking. But just about anyone can walk across a bed of hot coals because coals are a poor conductor of heat, according to a scientific report.

In the last two years, thousands of people have paid up to \$350 apiece to promoters who preach that walking across hot coals can be accomplished by boosting self-confidence through mind control

"It's become a big thing to pay hundreds of dollars to learn how to do this." said Paul Kurtz of the magazine Skeptical Inquirer, which published the report. "The seminar people teach it's all mind over matter, suggesting it's a pyschic thing. Really it's a basic physical principle that applies to anyone, whether they've taken a fancy course or not."

While coals used for fire-walking are as hot as 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit, they are poor conductors of heat, according to physicists at the University of California in Los Angeles, who wrote the report.

They likened the phenomenon to a cake in an oven baking at 350 degrees Fahrenheit. The cake, pan and air inside the oven are all the same temperature. But while cooks can easily place their bare hands in the oven air or tap the cake to see il it's done, they cannot touch the cake pan for more than a second without getting burned.

"Different materials at the same temperature contain different amounts of thermal or heat energy and also have different abilities to carry the energy from one place to another," the report states.

Coals have a relatively poor level of conductivity and the researchers estimated few if any people will get burned feet if their walk across coals is confined to less than four seconds.

Their research shows people who pay to walk across coals spend an average of 1.9 seconds on the searing beds, which are usually only 4 or 5 feet long.

The researchers contend people's feet actually have a better ability to conduct coolness to the fire than the coals have the ability to conduct heat to their feet.

Second Thoughts On Mengele

WASHINGTON — In the face of a U.S. pronouncement that Josef Mengele is dead, we had the temerity last June to suggest that the notorious Nazi war criminal might possibly be alive and thumbing his nose at the world. Our suspicions have now been heightened by intriguing new reports.

First, let us concede that the evidence of the death-camp doctor's demise is impressive. Forensic experts have examined some bones from a Brazilian grave and concluded that they are Mengele's remains. Their findings are supported by letters and other documents provided by Mengele's family, plus the testimony of those who purportedly knew him in Brazil.

yet some of our intelligence sources still are not convinced. The medical evidence, they say, is

cumulative but not specific. The documents and testimony don't always jibe with other, more authoritative evidence.

They can't shake off the tantalizing suspicion that the evidence of Mengele's drowning in 1979 could have been manufactured as part of an elaborate hoax to throw off his pursuers.

Just as several governments were closing in on Mengele, with millions of dollars in reward money on his head, the 1979 grave suddenly gave up its bones. The timing was too convenient to satisfy some Mengele hunters. Besides, they say, he was an accomplished swimmer.

Now here are the latest reports:

— The Israelis have refused to close their file on Mengele and have sent an expert back to Brazil to

review the evidence.

— A source close to the Israeli investigation confided to us that the Israelis have obtained a 1982 letter

in Mengele's handwriting. If the letter can be authenticated, he could not have drowned in 1979.

— Both Israeli and American intelligence agencies have picked up reports of Mengele sightings in Paraguay in the 1980s. The latest was an August 1984 CIA dispatch that "unconfirmed sightings of Mengele were reported in Paraguayan border cities."

— The CIA also learned from members of Paraguayan dictator Alfred Stroessner's staff that "Mengele sent correspondence, including Christmas cards, to them from Portugal until late 1980." He reportedly traveled back and forth between Portugal and Brazil.

Some Israeli authorities, according to a source who has talked to them, believe Mengele is alive today, hiding in Paraguay.

— Secret CIA cables, meanwhile, report that Mengele has been traffleking in drugs under the alias "Enrique Waldman" or "Henrique Wollman."

Like the Israelis, we have not yet closed the books on Mengele. We have assigned our associate Lucette Lagnado to spend full time trying to determine whether he's dead or alive.

Supreme Court Widens Affirmative Action Review

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Supreme Court opened its 1985-86 term Monday by announcing it will conduct a sweeping review of affirmative action plans that the Reagan administration charges discriminate against whites.

The Justices, returning to the bench on the traditional first Monday in October, will hear arguments this term in a case brought by the Cleveland chapter of the International Association of Firefighters challenging a promotion agreement worked out between the city and a group of minority

firefighters. The court also agreed to decide a case involving the New York City local of the Sheet Metal Workers' International Association over whether a union can be ordered to increase its non-white membership to a certain level.

The court already has on its docket a case from Jackson, Mich., concerning a unionnegotiated affirmative action

The cases are among a series of affirmation action disputed that have made their way to the high court since 1984, when the justices ruled in a case from Memphis, Tenn., that whites could not be laid off before blacks with less seniority.

The Reagan administration has argued the ruling means minority hiring quotas are unconstitutional and such relief can be granted to only those who can prove they have been actual victims of discrimination. The Justice Department has sent letters to 45 communities asking them to review mandatory hiring quotas in light of that court ruling, which is called the Stotts

Affirmative action is one of several hotly contested topics the Reagan administration is pushing before the Supreme Court, which also faces major decisions this term on abortion and the rights of criminal defen-

The Cleveland case began in October 1980 when the Vanguards of Cleveland, an association of black and Hispanie firefighters, filed a class action suit alleging discrimination by the Cleveland Fire Department in the promotion of minorities.

adopted in January 1983 over community. protest from the firefighters union, the city agreed to promote blacks and Hispanics on a one-to-one basis with nonminorities.

The union appealed to the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which upheld the plan, prompting the union to go before the high court.

In supporting the union, the federal government told the justices lower courts are ignoring its 1984 ruling. "The unambiguous meaning of Stotts, in our view, is that a court ... may not award affirmative equitable relief to non-victims at the expense of innocent third parties."

The New York case has been in the courts since 1971 when the Department of Justice charged the union had violated the 1964 Civil Rights Act by discriminating against blacks and other non-whites.

After a trial in 1975, a federal district court order several remedial actions, including setting a goal of 29 percent minority membership in the union's Local 28, and ordering the local to begin a recruitment and publicity campaign in minority neighborhoods and to keep detailed records of minority hiring. An administrator was also appointed to oversee the union's adoption of the plan.

Courts eventually held the union in contempt for not meeting the goals and ordered it to spend \$150,000 to set up a training program to increase minority membership and other remedies.

Concerning the rights of criminal defendants, the court also agreed to decide if it is constitutional to exclude ardent opponents of capital punishment from juries in capital trials, a dispute that could affect death penalty laws nationwide.

The justices will hear arguments in an appeal by the state of Arkansas, which is challenging a lower court ruling that said "death-qualified" juries are unconstitutional.

The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in March that the exclusion of jurors who hold absolute scruples against the death penalty violates a defendant's right to a trial by a jury

In a settlement of the suit, made up of a cross section of the

Numerous studies have shown that people who support the death penalty are more apt to convict suspected criminals. while those who oppose the death penalty are more apt to

acquit them. The decision ordered the state to grant a new trial to Ardia McCree, of Camden, Ark., who was convicted of the Valentine's Day slaying of Evelyn Boughton. 54, during the 1978 robbery of the gift shop she operated.

In its appeal to the high court, Arkansas said the lower court ruling, if allowed to stand, would require some states "to make sweeping changes" in their jury selection process and cause confusion in regions where the exclusion of death penalty opponents from capital juries has been upheld.

"Thus capital murder juries would be selected in Arkansas and in the 8th Circuit in a vastly different manner from the procedures used by other states around the country," the appeal

In Arkansas, citizens who say they could not vote for the death penalty under any circumstance are stricken from Juries in capital trials, because the same jury that determines guilt or innocence also sets the sentence and the jurors must be unanimous before a death sentence can be imposed.

In some states, the judge alone sets the sentence, but many legislatures oppose that system because it vests the decision in the hands of one person, a legal brief filed by the attorney generals of 26 states told the high

The four-page letter was sent to groups in: Buffalo. N.Y.: Columbus, Ohio: Denver: Indianapolis: Miami: New Jersey: New Orleans: Phoenix, Ariz.: St. Petersburg, Fla.; Tampa. Fla.: Vancouver, British Columbia, and Washington,

The criteria stresses "significant community identification" and a preference for individual rather than corporate ownership. An individual owner would need to have a net worth of at least \$100 million.

The letter also indicates that a new franchise must have a stadium primarily intended for baseball with "natural grass and adequate lighting."

Members of the committee will meet with the groups in New York on Nov. 7-8.

Paychecks Continue Below National Average In Southeast

ATLANTA (UPI) - Federal officials says workers in the Southeast continue to earn paychecks well below those in other parts of the country despite a slight increase in

Donald M. Cruse, regional commissioner for the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said the average annual pay of workers covered by state and federal unemployment insurance programs increased from \$15,369 in 1983 to \$16,052 in

"Pay levels in the region remained below the national average of \$18,359," said Cruse. "Within the region. average annual pay varied considerably by state."

The regional office of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a division of the U.S. Department of Labor, keeps track of employment figures for Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky. Mississippi. North Carolina. South Carolina and

For the region, Georgia had the highest average pay at \$16,951, followed by Kentucky at \$16,627. Mississippi had the lowest average pay at \$14,398.

But Cruse said no state in the region had average pay that matched the national levels. The cities with the lowest average pay were Jacksonville. N.C., at \$11,769, and Naples, Fla., at \$12,951. The largest average increase in pay was in Knoxville. Tenn., up 6.7 percent. The second largest was in Gainesville, Fla., up 6.1 percent.

The milk recalled was in containers bearing sales code dates of 10-8 and 10-10 and that are identified as having been processed and packaged at plant No. 12-044, which is in Jacksonville.

The suspect, sometimes working alone, at other times in pairs or as a trio, usually hit at check-in time, between 3:30 and 7 p.m., Hagood said.

He recommends motel guests keep their room doors closed and locked and that they look out the window and check with the front desk before responding to a knock on the door.

"We don't tell every guest to beware of the armed robbers," Bernte Banner, Holiday inn manager said. "We always suggest they close the door and use the locks."

Banner said he is considering tightening security by hiring guards and has recently ordered tighter control over issuance of

At the Day's Inn. manager Manhar Patel said, guests are routinely cautioned to lock their cars and are advised they can put valuables into the motel's safe. He said the rash of armed robberies have brought his workers outside to patrol the parking lot frequently.

Specifically related to curbing armed robberies, Patel said, "We haven't made any concrete plans yet. If it keeps going we will have to do something. We are cooperating with local law enforcement.

The manager of the Quality Inn refused to comment on the robberies, saying he didn't want to jeopardize the on-going investigation. He said his motel has security.

The suspects who usually strike on Friday or Saturday have been seen in three or four different vehicles. Hagood said.

The suspects apparently try to blend in to the motel atmosphere, he said. They sometimes dress in shorts and are shirtless to appear as a motel guest might.

"I want one more (hit)," Hagood said. " We're going to work our butts off. If they think they're smarter than the cops they'll probably push their luck."

Gimmicky Diets Just Won't Work

compound, from an ad I saw in glowing testimonials about the paper, to help me lose over-the-counter or mail-order weight. A few weeks later 1 decided to order another product: it's supposed to contain growth hormones (Larginine, 500 mg.; L-ornithine, 250 mg.; L-tryptophane, 250 mg.). I didn't lose weight, but I got several bladder infections. Could these weight-loss pills have caused the infections? I want to lose weight. but I don't want to lose my health.

DEAR READER - I hate to say it, but you are the victim of a get-rich-quick scheme. These weight-loss gimmicks are, at best, harmless; at worst, harmful. There is no more "growth hormone" in the product you describe than there is estrogen on my bicycle sprocket. Arginine, ornithine and tryptophane are naturally occurring amino acids, the building blocks of protein. You can't grow without them, but they certainly do not promote growth in the sense that hormones do. Further, they are not really 20 hormones. You will obtain plenty of amino acids from eating a balanced diet.

High doses of any nutrient can irritate tissues. Vitamin C. for 27 Baby shoe example, can trigger kidneystone formation. Your bladder was probably not so much infected as it was inflamed 36 Villain in by the compounds you were excreting into your urine.

There is no easy way to lose weight. The safest and most effective method is simply to reduce the number of calories you consume every day. This means cutting out sweets and sugar, drastically reducing your intake of fats and attempting to obtain more regular exercise. Support groups like Weight Watchers often provide necessary incentive.

Some diet pills may be dangerous, and those that aren't are unnecessary. Also, you cannot use diet pills indefinitely: 62 Of humans you have to stop them sooner or 63 Firearm later, because most manufacturers do not encourage long-term use. Then the weight may begin to be a problem once again, you 66 Long time resort to diet pills, and you are off and running in another lose-weight, gain-weight cycle,

DEAR READER - When your calf went into spasm, some of the fragile capillary blood vessels in the muscle ruptured and bled, causing a bruise. This is a fairly common problem and does not indicate that you are menopausal or vitamin-or mineral-deficient. I don't know why your calf muscle contracted so violently, unless you were exercising or straining. If it happens again, use an icepack over the area;


