Robert J. Holly Appointed  
Acting Secretary Of Local  
Chamber Of Commerce

Announcement of the appoint-  
ment of R. J. Holly as acting sec-  
retary of the Sanford Chamber of  
Commerce, by the board of gov-  
ernors at a meeting this morning,  
was the feature of the meeting of  
the chamber today in the Semino-  
le cafe. Mr. Holly will take over  
the duties of the local chamber for  
the past six years, who tendered  
his resignation last Wednesday.

trict, and a committee was appoint-  
ed to see the City Commission and  
suggest that an ordinance be  
adopted regulating the height and  
the location of swinging signs.

Three Are Slain  
By Dry Officers  
In Pistol Battle

Alleged Bootleggers Pursue  
Seven Dry Agents After A  
Series Of Raids And All 3  
Die In Fight That Follows

HOMESTEAD, Fla., Aug. 6. (AP)—  
Three men rode out of Flori-  
da's Everglades yesterday in pur-  
suit of seven federal prohibition  
agents who were returning to Miam-  
i after a series of liquor raids, and  
in a battle that followed, all three  
lost their lives.

Long known as a retreat for li-  
quor runners, bootleggers and out-  
law gangs, the low-lying swamps  
and wide plains of saw grass which  
make up the lower peninsula have  
presented an impenetrable barrier  
to entrance of the law.

In the past few years the liquor  
traffic has gained a firm hold in  
the Everglades. "Hammocks," or  
small high and dry tracts within  
the swamps have proven ideal  
spots for stills.

Agents Find Three Stills  
Yesterday, seven federal agents  
came upon three stills near the  
Cape Sable Road, which runs from  
Homestead through Royal Palm  
Park and south to the tip of the  
peninsula.

The stills were destroyed and  
the officers started for Homestead  
and Miami in two automobiles  
when a third automobile carrying  
three men, supposedly bootleggers,  
turned into the main road from one  
of the numerous uncharted trails  
leading into the swamps.

The three men, who were after-  
ward identified as M. P. Merritt,  
Clayde Parrish and J. A. Brinson,  
all of Homestead, opened fire on  
the officers and in the battle that  
followed, all three were killed.

Merritt Was Former Constable  
Merritt was formerly constable  
of the Sixth district and was re-  
cently removed from office by Gov-  
ernor John W. Martin. Parrish was  
the son of a former Homestead  
police officer.

The officers, who had the story  
of the shooting to Homestead of-  
ficials, refused to give their names.  
It was in this section of the  
Everglades South of Lake Oke-  
chobee that the notorious Ash-  
ley gang, which for years preyed  
on small banks along the lower  
east coast, made its retreat, and  
attracted to its ranks outlaws from  
all sections of the state. All at-

Mr. Ryan died suddenly of heart

Moore Haven. He is survived by  
his widow, Mrs. Florence Ryan, a  
son, Charles Jr., and a daughter,  
Dorothy.

He was city manager of Sanford  
for two years, leaving here in  
March, 1923 to become city man-  
ager of Fort Pierce. Two years  
later, he entered private business  
at Stuart and then in Moore  
Haven.

COMMITTEE FOR  
SENATE FINISHES  
CAMPAIGN PROBE

Solons Adjourned Subject To  
Call Of Chairman Reed Of  
Missouri; Probe Centered  
On Contributions Of Insull

CHICAGO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Having  
turned up during two months  
investigation, expenditures of \$3-  
000,000 in Pennsylvania's May  
primary and \$1,000,000 in the Illi-  
nois April primary, the Senate  
Campaign Funds Committee stood  
in adjournment today, subject to  
the call of its chairman, Senator  
Reed, Democrat, Missouri.

Inquiries into other primar-  
ies are not now in prospect and  
Senator Reed announced that it  
would probably be some time be-  
fore the committee was called to-  
gether again. The call will go  
out, however, upon receipt of any  
serious charge of irregularities in  
elections involving the seats in the  
senate.

Returns to Kansas City  
The chairman has returned to  
his home in Kansas City, while  
Senator La Follette, Republican,  
Wisconsin, the only other member  
to sit in the Illinois investigation,  
again has thrown himself into the  
senatorial fight in his home state.

Senatorial disclosures, which  
have come in the two inquiries  
here and in Washington are cer-  
tain to have their echoes in the  
senate during the next session,  
even if contests are not brought  
involving the seat to which Wil-  
liam S. Vane has been elected in  
Pennsylvania, and Frank L. Smith,  
Republican, has been named in  
Illinois.

Aside from the huge sum spent,  
the outstanding development in  
the Pennsylvania inquiry was the  
influence of thousands of workers at  
the polls and the handing around  
of huge bundles of cash.

Probe Centers On Insull  
In the Illinois inquiry, atten-  
tion was centered largely upon the  
contribution of Samuel Insull of  
Chicago, public utilities executive,  
to the campaign committee of  
Smith, who is chairman of the  
Illinois Commerce Commission,  
which exercises vast power over  
traction, gas and electric corpora-  
tions.

Besides this contribution, the  
committee learned that Insull gave  
\$15,000 to George Brennan, Dem-  
ocratic national committee man,  
from Illinois, for use in his cam-  
paign for the Democratic senatorial  
nomination, and \$10,000 each  
to the two rival Republican fac-  
tions, contending for supremacy in  
Chicago and Cook county.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6. (AP)—

come to all lovers of the park.

"Spoonings should be done in  
a wholesome atmosphere where  
romance comes naturally," said  
Supt. Emil Johnson.

spooning in the parks under  
their jurisdiction.

"Give the young people good  
exercise and sports and they  
will forget the spooning," said  
Captain William Stocker of the  
West Side police.

Postal Receipts  
Show Huge Gain  
Over Last Year

Increase Of \$21,647 Or 90 Per  
Cent Shown In The Gross  
Receipts Of Office; Parcel  
Post Business Also Boosted

A gain of \$21,647.90 in the gross  
receipts for the Sanford postoffice  
for the month of July of this year  
over the same month in 1925 was  
shown in the monthly report of  
Postmaster J. P. Hall. This is  
an increase of approximately 90  
per cent over the figures for July  
1925, when the gross receipts were  
\$24,373.37. The total for this  
month was \$46,021.27.

The greatest gain was shown in  
the money order department, the  
figures for the two months being  
\$41,182.77 for July 1926, and \$20-  
325.78 for July 1925, this gives an  
increase of \$20,856.99 or over 100  
per cent.

The postal receipts were \$4,858-  
50 for July 1926, and \$1,017.59 for  
July 1925. This is an increase of  
\$3,840.91.

According to Postmaster Hall the  
parcel business during the sum-  
mer months is practically nothing  
compared to the rush months of  
the winter but an average of 300  
parcels are received each day,  
which is an increase of about 50  
per cent over July of last year,  
however, and necessitates the use  
of trucks to deliver them to avoid  
congestion in the office. About  
200 of these parcels are mail order  
parcels. The local office handles  
about 100 U. S. D. parcels a day.

"This is the first time that it  
has been necessary to deliver the  
parcels in receive in trucks. In  
previous summers we used the reg-  
ular mail service for this work,  
but it has been found necessary to  
add the extra service with the in-  
crease of business," stated Mr.  
Hall.

Little Headway Has  
Been Made Against  
Big Forest Blazes

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 6. (AP)—  
Little headway is being made in  
fighting the forest fires in the  
northwest, and the flames con-  
tinue to spread.

High winds which spread the  
flames widely the early part of  
the week are continuing, it was re-  
ported today. Flames on the  
Black Feet, the Fathead and the  
Pendorelle forests were scattered  
over wide areas by the gale.

Forest headquarters here report  
that already this year the flames  
have burned over 200,000 acres in  
the district comprising western  
Montana and North Idaho. This is  
nearly four times as much as the  
total area burned in 1924 and 1925.

Two additional deaths have re-  
sulted from the fight against the  
flames. Jefferson Segena of  
Yuma, Ariz., was killed near Bon-  
ners Ferry, Idaho, when struck by  
a falling tree, while an aged wood-  
man named Lurdstrum died while  
fighting a fire near Donald, B. C.

Machado Orders Pena  
To Die By Garrote

HAVANA, Cuba, Aug. 6. (AP)—  
The garrote, ancient instrument  
of death, is shortly to be called into  
use in Cuba for the second time in  
20 years, President Machado hav-  
ing signed the death warrant in the  
case of Hernan Pena.

Convicted of murdering Accon-  
son Villalon, of Santiago de Cuba  
several years ago, Pena will be  
sent to the garrote within 24 hours  
after his official notification, which  
is expected to be made at midnight  
tonight.

Support Of Izaak Walton League Is  
Pledged For Better Sewerage System

of sewerage should be allowed to

stand in the way of needed legisla-  
tion of this nature.

ed are highly distasteful to the peo-  
ple in the vicinity of the sewerage  
"canals."

The membership drive of the  
league will be started in the near  
future, and it is the hope of the  
club that the city  
will be around 400 instead  
of the end of the drive.

Various plans for the city

proposed, but the Izaak Walton  
League is the only one that has  
been adopted.

tion of the Florida job.

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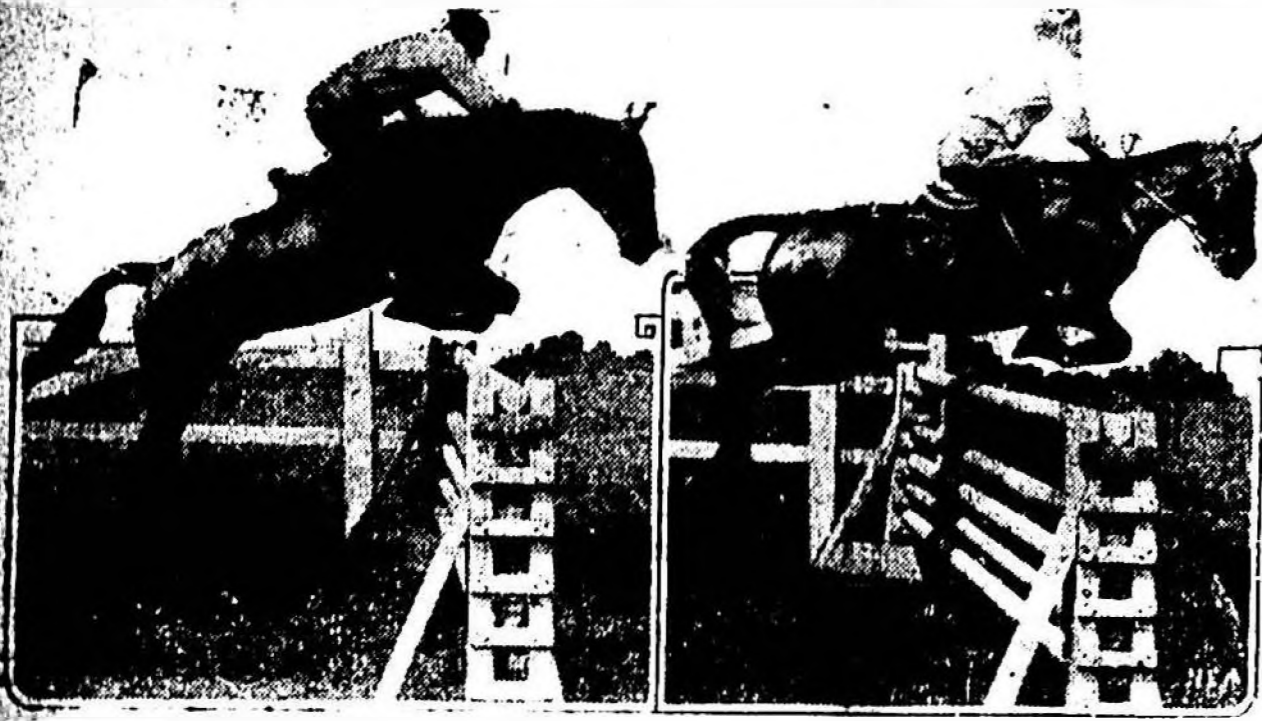
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How a Thoroughbred Takes the Hurdles

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—What chance would a wet presidential candidate—that is, a candidate who favored a national prohibition referendum, which would be wet enough for all practical purposes—stand in 1928?

It's a question under pretty serious consideration at both Republican and Democratic party headquarters here.

Not that either national committee wants it to become a presidential issue. On the contrary, it's an issue that both are deadly afraid of. They simply are forced to analyze the situation, because of reports they're receiving from various and numerous parts of the country.

THERE'S no denying, as the party managers see it, that a bloc of wet states has sprung up in the last year or two—states which would subordinate every other issue to that of prohibition, if given an out and out wet presidential candidate to vote for.

In this group the managers include, as certainties, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Connecticut, Delaware, Rhode Island, Missouri and Wisconsin, with 113 electoral votes among them.

Counting other states which are suspected of having wet leanings, the political dopsters reckon that a most candidate might start off with as many as 167 electoral votes sewed up from the very beginning of the campaign, on that single issue.

Burning Ships Run From Rescue Boat

SARASOTA, Fla., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Mystery surrounds the ship which, on fire seven miles off the coast of Venice yesterday turned and sped from a rescue craft and vanished from sight into the open sea.

The burning ship, from meager descriptions, was a fair-sized vessel, built for passenger service. The Venice flagship Raven, put out to the rescue and had reached within a mile of the vessel when the latter reversed its course and headed for the open Gulf. Although the Raven made full 20 knots at the time, the fugitive ship vanished from sight within a short space of time. The belief was that it was a run-runner and preferred to take chances on being able to control the blaze within its hold, than to run risk of capture.

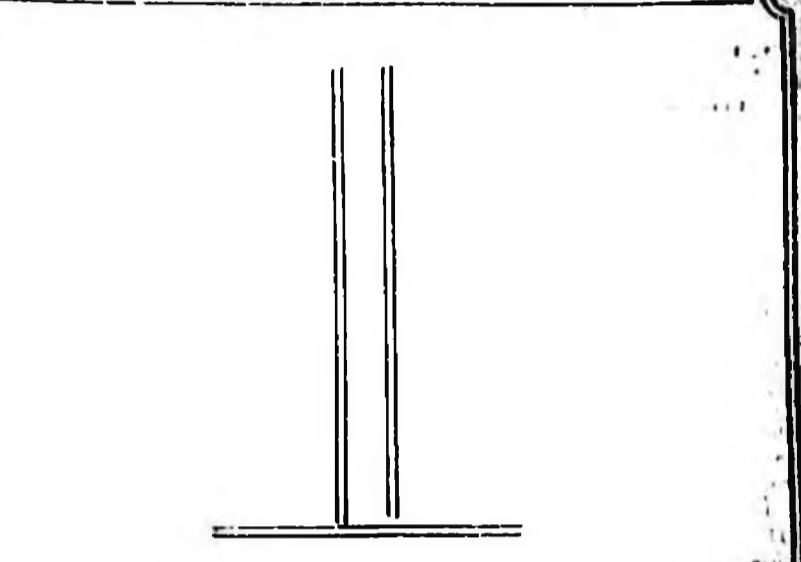
