

170 Elderly Patients Dead As Fire Hits Jamaica Home

KINGSTON, Jamaica (UPI) - A fire that officials said looked like the work of arsonists swept through a home for poor and elderly women early today, killing at least 170 patients who were trapped in their beds as flames quickly engulfed the two-story wooden

Officials said the confirmed death toll stood at 170 but could rise. Of the 204 patients asleep in their beds when the predawn blaze broke out, only 24 were safe

"This could be the most serious loss of life (from a fire) in Jamaica," said one official at the scene. "It seems to be the work of arsonists," said Anthony Spaulding, construction minister in Prime Minister Michael Manley's cabinet.

Iran Rules Out Talks

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) - Iran sent a message today to U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim saying a U.N. envoy slated to visit Tehran soon, would not be allowed to discuss the 199-day American hostage crisis. the official Pars news agency reported.

Fearing growing anti-government feelings in the military, Iran also warned the members of its armed forces they would be tried by tough revolutionary courts for acts against the Islamic regime.

The Foreign Ministry, which Monday denied reports of a three-phased plan aimed at freeing the 53 American hostages, today called the reports "lies" spread by "some news agencies which are subservient of American imperialism."

Bahamas Looks To U.N.

NASSAU, Bahamas (UPI) - Bahamian Prime Minister Lynden Pindling will ask the United Nations to intervene if Cuba doesn't apologize for a MiG attack that sank the Bahamian patrol boat Flamingo and killed four persons.

And Pindling said Monday he would expect "support and retaliation" from neighboring countries if his country's relations with Cuba further deteriorate and there is a sustained attack or invasion. "We place ourselves firmly in the Free World." he

The Bahamas will ask the UN's security council to apologize for the May 10 attack, guarantee that Bahamian sovereignty will not be violated and provide compensation for the loss of life and property. The attack came after the Bahamas arrested 10

Cuban fisherman for illegally working its waters.

Zaire Accused Of Torture

LONDON (UPI) - Hundreds of political prisoners have perished in remote jungle concentration camps in Zaire from starvation, torture or in summary executions, Amnesty International charged today. The independent human rights organization said in a 23-page pamphlet, "Human Rights Violations in Zaire," large numbers of prisoners have also died in prison "as a result of starvation, malnutrition and

But "mortality rates are reported to be highest in isolated detention camps" in the African nation, the former Belgian Congo, visited by Pope John Paul II two weeks ago, Amnesty said. In one equatorial rain forest camp, "which holds

about 500 prisoners, between 50 and 100 have died each year between 1977 and 1979," it said.

Poles Conquer Everest

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) - Two Polish engineers reached the peak of Mount Everest by going up the previously unconquered "South Pillar" route, the Ministry of Tourism announced.

The climbers were identified as Andrezej Czok, 32, a electrical engineer from Gliwice, and Jerzy Kukuczka, 32, a mechanical engineer from Katowice.

Cleared Deputy Returns To Active Duty | FLORIDA

Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Richard Odell went back on the job Monday, after preliminary reports cleared him of any wrongdoing in last Wednesday's shooting of an elderly

Chief Assistant State Attorney Chris Ray said this morning he has found no evidence to contradict his finding last week that the shooting of Henry Alexander, in his home on Tangerine Avenue, just off Southwest Road was justifiable Alexander, reported by his family to be 91, was shot and

killed after he aimed a 12-gauge shotgun at Odell, who had followed Alexander into the frame house. Odell and Deputy Steve Walthers had been called to the scene by Alexander's companion Ida Mae Brown, who had been thrown out of the house earlier, at pistol point, by

While the Sanford State Crime Lab has not finished its report on the shotgun Alexander held when he died, Ray says the weapon may not even have been operable because there was a 16-gauge shell in its chamber. Although Ray says the operability of the weapon will not

change his findings, the state crime lab is expected to test fire the gun, to determine whether it would have discharged the smaller sized shell. Sheriff John Polk said today he "probably would have made the same decision (as Odell made)," to pursue Alexander into the house, rather than waiting outside for more officers. "He had to make a split-second decision. You can never

second guess that," he added. Polk said Odell, like all deputies, was not specifically assigned to the patrol zone including Goldsboro on a regular basis. Deputies are assigned a zone for a shift, not on a weekly

Cuban Boat Asks For Help, **But Vessel Fate Unknown**

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) - The Coast Guard says it could not help a Cuban refugee boat that radioed it was sinking with 21 people aboard because the distress signal came from within Cuban waters. The fate of the boat was unknown today.

Coast Guard spokesman Bruce Pimental in Miami said the distress call was picked up Sunday morning from the 21-foot pleasure craft El Bravo. "We don't know whether Cuban authorities acted upon the distress call," said Pimental. "We don't

know what became of the vessel." Thousands of refugees kept coming on the shuttle Monday with 4,491 refugees arriving on 65 boats by evening. The total in the 29th day of the exodus reached 61,958, eclipsing the total forecast by federal officials for the entire month of May. Coast Guard Comdr. Samuel Dennis said the number

still could increase greatly. "They have a potential for bringing another 30,000 to 50,000 people here," he said. "We're basing that on 30 to 50 passengers per boat, but some boats are coming with 200 and 300 on them."

Vessels Leave Tampa Port

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — Deep-draft vessels have begun moving out of the Port of Tampa on a limited schedule for the first time since May 9 when the freighter Summit Venture rammed into and collapsed a portion of the Sunshine Skyway Bridge.

The Coast Guard said a 200-foot-wide section on the northern side of the main shipping channel had been cleared of steel girders and concrete sent pluging 150 feet into Tampa Bay in the collision. A Marine Board of Investigation looking into the

cause of the nation's third worst bridge accident in which 35 persons died was to question an official of the Tampa Pilots' Association today about piloting requirements and policies.

The Coast Guard opened up the section of main channel Monday afternoon and three loaded phosphate vessels that had been blocked in port left. In addition, one vessel which had been at anchor outside the bay was brought in.

Shippers were expected to try to get the loaded vessels stuck in port out as quickly as possible. The movement has been limited to one-way traffic during daytime hours and with tugs standing by.

A 'War Zone'

MIAMI (UPI) - After long hours of violence, the sound of black rage was the crunch of tires on streets paved with broken

The smell was the acrid odor of burning factories, warehouses and stores. The look was gaping holes in windowless buildings, husks of burnt-out cars, collapsed roofs, twisted girders and piles of rubble.

That was the "war zone" Monday, during the first hours of calm since four former Dade County policemen - whites were quickly acquitted Saturday of participating in the beating death of a black man. The war zone is the police name for Liberty City, 20 square

miles of squalor and industry in the northwest part of Dade County. In a sunny, smoky, uneasy calm Monday afternoon, it had more the look of the aftermath of war-a bombed-out city. Streets glistened with broken windshield and bottle glass. Dozens of burned cars sat in the middle of thoroughfares,

minus tires and windows. Thick black smoke poured from half Only ragged parts of the walls remained of dozens of buildings, most of them large stores. At major intersections and along the perimeter, National Guardsmen stood beside jeeps, M-16 rifles on their hips.

People had died during the two preceding nights of violence

that began in Liberty City and spread to other parts of the city.

More were to die. In the quiet, life went on — but not as before. Three black women and a man washed clothes in a launderette. Next door, the contents of a small grocery store spilled

through broken glass doors. A teen-age bike rider peddled curiously among firemen battling flames flickering from Miami Cordege Co., a factory. It had collapsed in a pile of rubble and twisted steel girders. At Earl's Supermarket, three portly women picked through the litter in the parking lot, loading things into shopping carts. Cars, parked helter-skelter, filled the parking lot of a shopping center. All had flat tires and on the side of each was spray-painted "Looter." Few stores were open. Small groups of black men clustered at street corners. They watched as a procession of cars filled with whites carrying TV cameras

Some mugged. Some raised their fists in black power salutes. Others hoisted a finger in earthier displays, Many shouted obscenities.



Legacy Of A Princess

All but a handful of this country's public broadcasting stations aired the controversial "Death of a Princess" recently. In so doing, they ROBERT WALTERS resisted pressure from the government of Saudi Arabia, the Carter administration, and at least one giant oil company to suppress this Britishproduced "docudrama" depicting the chain of events that led to the public execution of a Saudi princess and her lover in 1977.

Against such pressures, the broadcast represented a forthright, and heartening, assertion of First Amendment rights. This was all the more significant in that it was mounted by a public broadcasting service and affiliated stations that are partly dependent on subsidies proposed by the administration and approved by Congress.

What the largest viewing audience in PBS the presidency, he offered the hope of a history saw was a demonstration of public television's independence, proclaimed in statute but ever vulnerable to erosion. But there was far more to "Death of a Prin-

cess" and the controversy that surrounded it than a simple tug-of-war between a free press and its would-be censors.

The very fact that the United States government would permit itself to be enlisted by a tactics. foreign power in an effort to control the content of American television programming is a chilling reminder of the dangers inherent in our dependence on imported oil.

And then there is the matter of the film itself, and the Saudi objections to it. The Saudis recognize, as we should also, that the way in which their society is perceived here can have profound political, economic and even military consequences for both countries.

'Death of a Princess' offered a less than lattering look at important aspects of Saudi life, including the behavior of members of the ruling royal family. Whatever the accuracy of the film's depiction of a society undergoing unprecedented change, Americans would be foolish indeed to ignore or depreciate the cultural, religious and political sensitivities of a nation as vital to the Inited States as Saudi Arabia.

Nuclear Tightrope

In an effort to shore up U.S. relations with India, President Carter has dealt a serious and, perhaps, a fatal blow to his own campaign against the proliferation of nuclear weapons.


Mr. Carter is going to permit, a shipment of nuclear fuel to India in spite of that country's long-standing refusal to allow international inspection of its nuclear power facilities. Under our Nuclear Non-Proliferation Act of 1978, the United States is supposed to cut off supplies of enriched uranium to countries that refuse to accept safeguards against the diversion of the material into the development of atomic weapons.

The irony is that the impetus for the 1978 act came mainly from India's unauthorized use of nuclear materials from the United States and Canada to develop an "explosive device" set off near the Pakistan border in 1974. That event spurred Pakistan into the pursuit of a nuclear capability, and gave other Third World countries reason to question whether they should forego

Having forgiven both India and Pakistan for a breach of non-proliferation safeguards, the Carter administration can hardly expect support for its international initiatives to tighten control of nuclear fuel reprocessing and otherwise prevent the possible diversion of plutonium into weapons

Mr. Carter obviously wants to avoid a showdown with India on this issue at a time when the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan demands that we keep our fences mended in South Asia. India's flirtation with the Soviet Union has resumed since Prime Minister Indira Gandhi returned to power. By wooing her with uranium, Mr. Carter is bound to aggravate Pakistan and China, the two countries most threatened by a nuclear-armed India.

Mr. Carter may wind up the loser all around — losing the confidence of Pakistan and China and losing credibility for his non-proliferation policy - while Gandhi, true to form, goes on playing

WASHINGTON - When Sen. Edward M Kennedy, D-Mass., embarked on his quest for spiritually uplifting and intellectually stimulating campaign "in the best tradition of

With a few notable exceptions, however, Kennedy has failed to deliver on that promise. He has instead pursued a course that places excessive emphasis on pandering to local economic interests and engaging in petty bickering about President Carter's campaign

Both the nation and the Democratic Party have suffered as a result of Kennedy's unfortunate choice of strategy, because he is uniquely endowed with the ideological ommitment, political instinct and rhetorical ability necessary to effectively challenge a president who lacks any form of broad, coherent vision of where he wants to lead the

For the best of Kennedy, it's necessary to SCIENCE WORLD go back more than a year, to a widely acclaimed speech he delivered in the spring of 1979 at the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. It began with a

"What goals shall we set for the nation in the next 10 years? What trails shall we try to blaze? Whose compass shall we use to find directions? How shall we — and how shall our children and our grandchildren — remember

the decade of the '80s? "Will it be a rising sun or a setting sun, a forward step in the journey toward fulfillment of the American dream, or a backward step in the nostalgic search for a simpler past that

"Will it be a time of new action and inspiration, as when Americans moved from the decade of the '50s to the '60s? Or will it be a time of continuing reaction, of drift among the surging tides of events beyond our ability

Kennedy didn't have solutions to all of the world's problems, but he concluded that address with an inspirational call "to reclaim the opportunity that slipped away, to stake out the higher ground again."

Similar soaring rhetoric has surfaced occasionally during the senator's campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination. 

Jockey Guilty In Race Fixing

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ex-jockey Con Errico wears a No. 13 chain around his neck for good luck. Today, he needed it. Errico was found guilty Monday night of conspiring to fix nine horse races at the Aqueduct and Saratoga tracks in 1974 and 1975 in one of the biggest scandals in racing history. A jury of six men and six women deliberated about five hours before returning the verdict in U.S. District Court in

Errico, 58, showed no emotion when the jury foreman an-

Judge Jack Weinstein set sentencing for June 18 and continued Errico's bail at \$25,000. Errico could be sentenced to up to 20 years in jail and a \$25,000 fine. "It's like winning a race and getting disqualified," Errico said as he left the courtroom.

He said he would appeal the decision.

The alleged fix on March 24; 1975 was the key factor in the week-long trial and the basis of Errico's indictment, because it was the only one that occurred within the five-year statute of limitations. Errico, who began his career in 1944 and ran his last race in 1975, was indicted on March 21.

Jose Amy - one of three jockeys who said they were offered bribes by Errico - testified during the trial he took \$1,500 from Errico to "hold back" the horse he was riding.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Neil Firetog had described Errico as the "necessary link that made race-fixing exist in New York in

He said Errico was the middleman between the jockeys who fixed races and a group of bettors who engineered the fixes.

Defense attorney Albert Brackley maintained the jockeys were fixing races themselves, and the government and the FBI

Reagan Could Secure Lock

On Republican Nomination

By United Press International Ronald Reagan could put a mathematical lock on the 1980 Republican presidential nomination today by winning about half of the 111 convention delegates on the line in the Michigan and Oregon primaries.

Reagan, with 939 delegates in the bag, could reach the 998 needed for the GOP nomination by capturing 59 of the 82 delegates at stake in Michigan and 29 in

President Carter, with 1,534 delegates, could not reach the 1,666 needed for the Democratic nomination in today's primaries because Michigan Democrats allocated their 141 delegated in caucuses earlier and Oregon has only 39 at stake.

Republican challenger George Bush, who has 206 pledged delegates, remained upbeat, saying, "I think I'm going to win in Michigan. I have the same feeling I had when we won in Pennsylvania and came so close in

Instinct was about all Bush had going for him. The only Michigan polls available, taken by the Reagan campaign, showed the former California governor about 10 points ahead. In Oregon, a weekend newspaper poll showed Reagan with 54 percent of the vote; Bush with 24 percent.

On the Democratic side in Oregon, the Oregonian poll showed Carter also had 54 percent, with Sen. Edward Kennedy, who now has 810 delegates, at 22 percent. Carter campaign sources said internal figures showed a much closer race.

Ford Sees Deadlocked Vote

ATLANTA (UPI) - Former President Gerald Ford said Monday he believes the U.S. House of Representatives, not the American public, will be picking the next president.

Speaking to a business convention in Atlanta, Ford also said economic issues could make Sen. Edward Kennedy the Democratic nominee even though Carter holds a commanding lead in delegates.

Ford said he believed Illinois Congressman John Anderson, who dropped out of the Republican presidential campaign to run an independent candidacy, will keep both major party candidates from getting an electoral majority.

That would throw the selection of the next president Democrats have held majorities for two decades. Ford said he still isn't certain who the party nominees will be. He hinted he would be at the Republican convention in case of a deadlock and said Carter may lose the nomination because of the

Legislation Boosts Coal

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Accusing the railroads of blocking development of an adequate coal distribution system, Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., has drawn up legislation to expedite construction of coal slurry

Bumpers was to introduce the legislation today and conduct a Senate Energy Committee hearing on the bill, which would allow the Interior secretary to declare certain coal slurry pipelines to be in the

Necessary rights of way could then be acquired by right of eminent domain in state or federal courts. Bumpers said a slurry pipeline designed to carry 25 million tons of coal a year may be built from Gilette, Wyo., to White Bluff, Ark.

Doctors Could Eat Words

.CHICAGO (UPI) — Doctors who for years preached overeating is the prime cause of obesity may have to eat their words. Now research shows that, in some cases, overweight may result from the body's inability to burn excess calories. The new theory, outlined in the current Journal of the

American Medical Association, tends to explain why some people get fat while others eat at will without gaining a pound.

The normal body, it said, compensates for

overeating by burning the excess calories taken in. The calorie-burning process is centered in the body's small store of brown fat - a heat-producing tissue that gets its name from its brownish hue.

But, researchers found, some people lack the physical ability to burn the excess calories. Instead, the extra calories are stored - and the people get fat
