Coast Line Adds Train Personnel

Special uniformed passenger representatives have been assigned to two of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad's crack year-round streamliners between New York and Florida, T. K. Lynch, the line's passenger traffic manager, announced today.

"Passenger travel on Atlantic Coast Line between New York and Florida has increased to the extent that these well-trained young men are needed on the East Coast Champion and West Coast Champion to maintain the high level of service for which Coast Line is so well noted," said Lynch.

In an interview today, he said that reservations for January and February indicate a 12 to 15 per cent increase over last year in passenger travel on Coast Line. In sounding this progressive note in contrast to the less optimistic picture painted by other railroad officials, Lynch expressed faith in the future of rail travel. He noted an increase of more than 18 per cent on Coast Line's through Florida trains for December, 1935, compared with same period in 1934. Lynch further stated that a certain amount of this increase was due to the winter grilles, but a large portion is due to Coast Line's emphasis on promoting rail travel. Lynch specifically attributed some of the increase to Coast Line's recently completed "Free the Round-Up," a selling campaign participated in by all of the railroad's 14,000 employees.

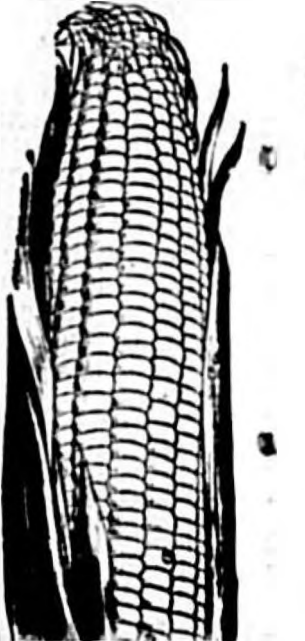

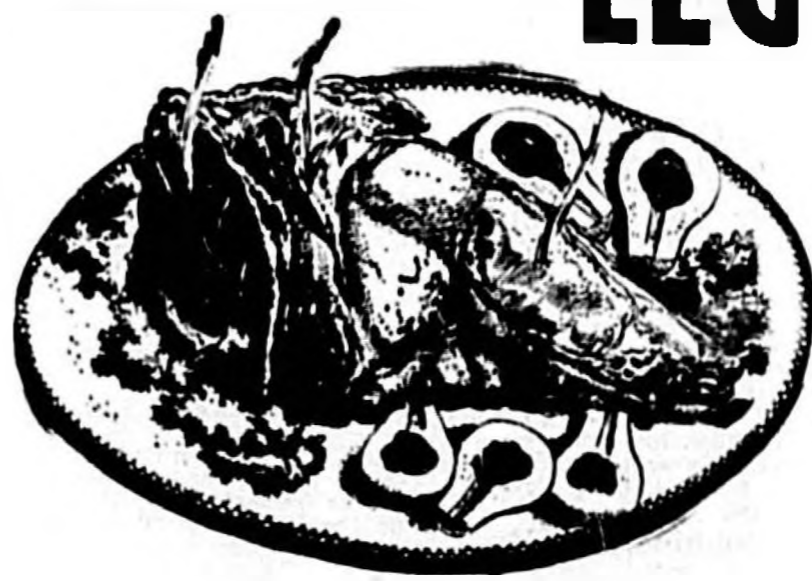

Temperatures Up; Seas Subside As Cold Front Fades

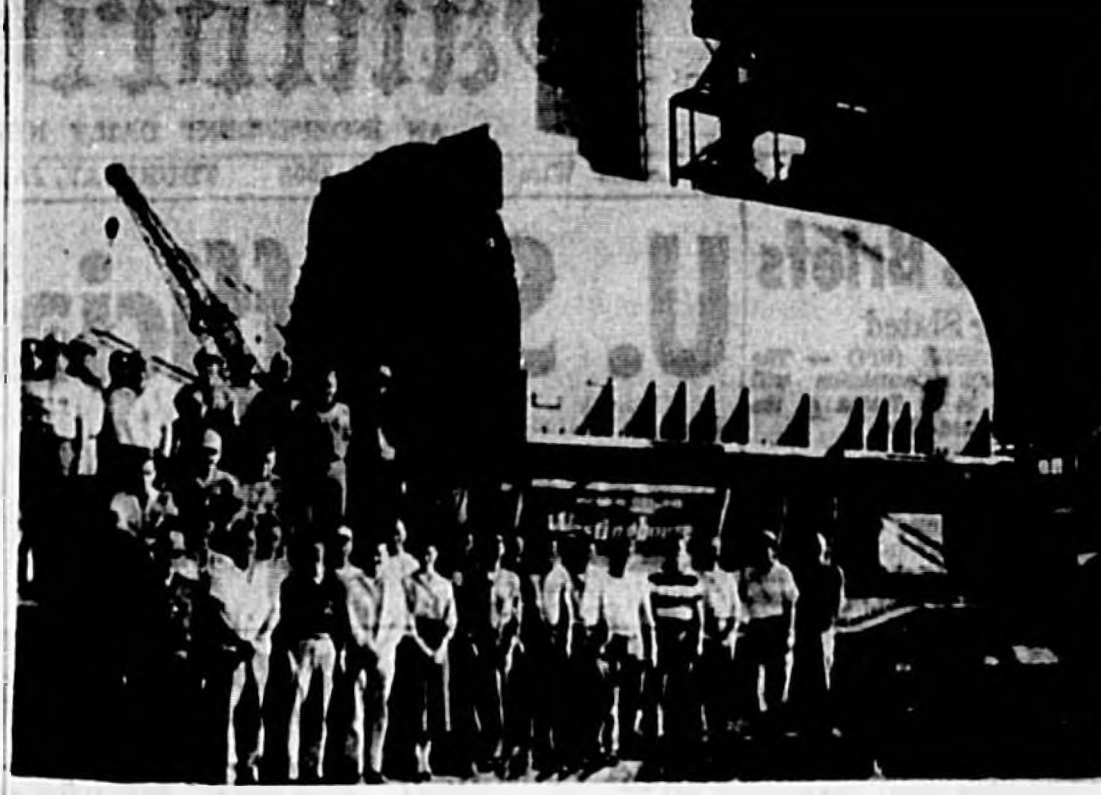
United Press International has slowly subsided along the Atlantic seaboard today, marking the expiring gasp of a week-long weather onslaught that flailed the nation from coast to coast.

Editorials Commissioners Face Challenge This Year

The Seminole Board of County Commissioners faces a real challenge in 1959. Board members must prove to the public that they are working for the benefit of the county as a whole, and that each knows what the other is doing.

Facts which came to light Tuesday make it mandatory that Commissioners lose no time in putting the county's house in order. Seminole residents were shocked Tuesday night when they learned that an ex-commissioner had left his successor without funds, that the district's appropriation had been transferred to another district.

If the action was meant to be humorous, it fell on unappreciative ears. Seminole County's tax money isn't a joke. At least it isn't to the people who pay the taxes. The money used in such "sporting" fashion does not belong to the County Commission. It is the property of all Seminole County. So is the entire county budget.

If F. A. Dyan's transfer of funds to the district of Homer Little was meant as a parting shot, an effort to embarrass his successor, David Gatchel, it was a success. It also embarrassed Seminole County.

Apparently, some board members were unaware of the transfer until the meeting. This, too, is far from humorous. Unfortunately, our county will be judged by many on the basis of this incident. And how will we appear to the outside world?

Board members this year have a chance to erase this action, and prior incidents, from the memory of their employers, the taxpayers. At the start of the year, commissioners pledged themselves to harmony, hard work and progress for the county as a whole.

They now have a chance to fulfill that pledge. We believe they will do it. We know that it is needed in Seminole County.

A step in the right direction was the resolution prohibiting future transfers of this nature. The Herald believes the survey of roads, scheduled to start today, is needed. It is the beginning of a business-like approach to the county's operation.

The pledges made several weeks ago are important to the county. Future progress depends on fulfillment. Seminole County needs one board, not five. Only the members of the commission can make this a reality.

Next Governor Here?

Members of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce will hear an interesting speaker at the annual banquet on Feb. 13.

Delivering the address will be Millard Caldwell, former Florida governor. Caldwell hasn't announced his subject, which the Chamber left to the ex-governor's discretion. Based on his recent speeches, Caldwell probably will choose a subject very close to the state's spending program.

Whether Chamber members agree with Caldwell, they are certain to hear a speech which will hold their attention. Since Caldwell's address to the annual meeting of the State Chamber of Commerce, there has been increasing speculation that he plans to seek the governor's chair once more.

If these predictions come true, it is very possible that Caldwell will meet one of his toughest campaign opponents at the banquet here.

Sanford's J. Bratley Odham is considered a prime candidate for the race. Odham has declined to say whether he will run. In a recent television interview, Odham did not say he would run. But, he didn't rule out the possibility.

Odham's answers to a couple of "loaded" questions from TV interviewers demonstrated again that the Sanford real estate developer can meet the issues of the day head-on without the benefit of rehearsals.

As Chamber members dine and chat in the Mayfair Inn ballroom, they might keep this thought tucked away for future reference: Sanford well could be facing the two leading contenders for the state's highest elective office in the next campaign.

Washington Calling

WASHINGTON — What can come out of the "Private" visit of Anastas I. Mikoyan conducted in the full glare of bursting flash bulbs and grinding newsreel cameras it is hard at this stage to see.

But, at the very least, a shrewd observer with the full confidence of Nikita Khrushchev will have had an opportunity to know at firsthand the American position not only on Berlin but on the whole range of issues separating the two sides in the cold war. He will have a look, too, at American industry and that will be a gain. Mikoyan has never let his ideological commitments get in the way of the facts and he can gauge for himself the strength of America's great industrial machine.

He also will be promoting trade and he may ask again for credits from this country to finance an expanded volume of trade. If he is turned down he will turn his failure into propaganda, as he did when this country rebuffed the overtures he made last fall.

Congressional leaders were told at the White House and State Department briefings that the Russians have not made known the real reason for the visit. But the visitor will surely not keep this a secret for very long.

Interest in Europe in the mission of Mikoyan to the United States is intense. The speculation ranges from the possibility of a "deal" to be worked out between the two powers, which is absurd on the face of it, to the idea that Mikoyan hopes to get approval for a four-power meeting so that he can return and hold out to the 21st party Congress the promise of a peaceful settlement.

Mikoyan is irrefragable. This reporter talked with him last summer in Moscow. At that time he was negotiating with an important West German trade delegation headed by Krupp's No. 1 man, Berthold Beitz.

"If your country doesn't want to trade with us the Germans do," Mikoyan told me. "They are here now. They are prepared to do business."

The report current in Moscow was that the deal negotiated with Krupp involved far more than was publicly announced. European trade rivals were convinced that the West Germans had stolen a march by signing up a secret, far-reaching agreement for extensive trade in the future between the two countries. This is typical of Mikoyan's bargaining technique.

One of his important stops on his American tour will be in Cleveland where he will be the guest of Cleveland industrialist

Cyrus Eaton. Eaton says he intends to get together a group of leading industrialists to hear Mikoyan's proposals for expanded trade. He said, too, that he will explore ways to find the dollars by which the Russians can expand their purchases in this country. This is in accord with his conviction that expanded trade with Russia and China is one of the principal ways to peace.

In his sixty-fourth year Mikoyan has a wiry, tough look. In 1922-23 he helped Stalin liquidate Leon Trotsky's challenge. He was advanced to full membership on the party's Central Committee. From thence forward his rise has been steady.

When the presidium was torn by the struggle between Georgi Malenkov and Nikita Khrushchev after Stalin's death, Mikoyan was on Khrushchev's side. It was the winning side. He has had to be tough and fast and resourceful to win in the league in which he has played. And there is no sign that he has lost his cunning as Khrushchev's chief of staff in the race to surpass the United States.

Mikoyan is the most important Soviet official to visit this country since Vyacheslav Molotov made a secret visit to Washington toward the end of World War II. That is in itself a fact of the first importance and it could mean a turning point in the relationship between East and West.

There is a Christmas conspiracy abroad to ruin my peace of mind. It is a conspiracy of full 20 years' duration, with the result that I am developing a pitiful persecution complex. Don't be surprised if, in another year or two, you see soothing, reassuring editorials in the newspapers reading: "Yes, Inez, there is a Santa Claus, Crazy, Mixed-Up but Still S. Claus."

It isn't that I lack faith — oh, I have loved Christmas and everything "connected" with it beyond reason all my life — but that my faith has been sorely tested over two decades.

Not one year in these 20 or more has there failed to arrive at Chez Robb a Christmas package addressed to me but completely and wholly without any clue to the giver. "The gift without the giver is bare," said the poet, in one of literature's ten strikes.

It's more than here; it's maddening. From the moment you open the package and scramble through the tissue, the excelsior and the festive wrappings to find the card and from the bleak second you realize that said card is nonexistent, the shine begins to nose out of Christmas and unquestioning faith out of Santa.

If you do not acknowledge the gift — and how can you when even Sherlock Holmes would wash his hands of the job? — you are haunted by the fear that you are

mortally offending one of your dearest friends who is too proud to ask if you received this particular piece of lignum vitae. And how in the world can you thank the lord if he doesn't have sufficient buttons to include his or her card with the fruit cake or the animacassar or the planter hand-crafted from an abandoned dovecote?

Every year I pray that this burden will be lifted from me, but every year that unidentified package slips by the household guard. This season it arrived in the form of a Lalique glass cigarette container, obviously the perfect gift for the woman who has everything, including a husband who is a human chimney.

If such a gift is sent from a store or gift shoppe, it is sometimes possible to take the offending item back and ask the emporium, reluctant though it be, to trace the identity of the missing giver.

But this is not always sure-fire. Once, 10 years ago, I carried a beautiful handkerchief to a famous Fifth Avenue store and asked if it could trace the giver who failed to include his card.

The salesgirl at the handkerchief counter said casually, "It won't be easy. That handkerchief is in the \$20 range."

Holy smoke, I thought, 20 dollars for a handkerchief? I never knew they could cost so much. Surely, something so expensive and rare in handkerchiefs would

be easily traced to the profligate buyer, I said.

"Not in this stor-ah," the languid salesgirl said haughtily, and that was that.

This year's gift of Lalique apparently arrived via carrier pigeon while my back was turned, and I haven't the foggiest notion where to start the bloodhounds and the private eye.

And somewhere out yonder, someone is getting madder by the minute because he has had no acknowledgment of the gift. But his head of steam isn't a patch on mine. My stack is going, going, GONE.

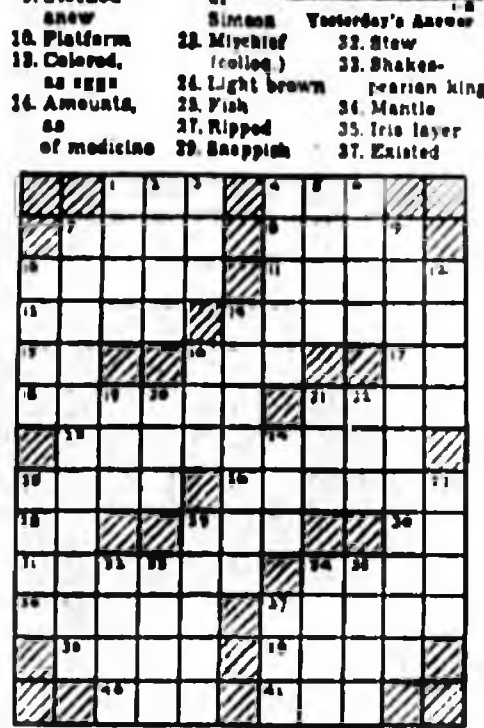

Farm Families Get \$391,010 In Aid In County In '58

During 1958, farm families served by the Sanford Farmers Home Administration office, received farm loans totaling \$391,010. It was reported this week by Curtis J. Green, county supervisor.

Green stated that funds were loaned for various purposes, but most were for housing and farm operation. The recently expanded farm housing program is helping many farmers plan and develop better housing and farm building facilities, Green said. Most loans are repaid ahead of schedule and many farmers have repaid loans and are now obtaining their credit needs through local banks and other lenders, Green added. Many part time farmers are now being helped with FIA loans. The Sanford office serves farm families located in Seminole, Orange, Volusia, Flagler and Brevard Counties.

Conference Slated In \$9 Million Suit

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A pre-trial conference will be held Jan. 27 in the nine-year-old \$9 million dollar damage suit against the Florida DuPont interests.

Federal Judge G. Harold Carswell said the main purpose of the meeting will be to set a date for retrial of the suit, brought by Roy Crummer of Orlando. Crummer charged that the DuPonts conspired to destroy this multimillion dollar municipal bond business by instigating a number of state and federal investigations. A district judge dismissed the suit on grounds it was barred by the statute of limitations. But the U. S. Court of Appeals reversed the ruling and ordered the suit to be tried by a jury.

Crummer maintains the alleged conspiracy was fraudulently concealed and he did not find out about it in time to bring suit within the three-year limitation.

Dulles To Continue Vigorous Schedule

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Administration sources said today that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles intends to maintain his vigorous working schedule despite expressions of concern about his health.

There had been a feeling in some quarters that the 70-year-old cabinet member should ease up a bit in view of his age and two recent illnesses. But reliable sources said that President Eisenhower had no plans to ask Dulles to slow down. The President wanted to feel that Dulles, because of his temperament, would be miserable if forced to adopt a reduced workload.

Furthermore, the sources added, Eisenhower had been assured by physicians that there was nothing of a serious nature in Dulles' recent ailments to justify putting him into enforced idleness. Concern over the secretary's health dates, of course, from his operation in late 1956 for intestinal cancer. It is no medical secret that such ailments sometimes recur.

The concern, which died down after Dulles recovered, was heightened again in recent weeks by two new ailments. In December, Dulles was hospitalized by diverticulitis—an intestinal inflammation. Earlier this week he was sent home with a virus attack.

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

WASHINGTON (UPI) — One American at least has Deputy Soviet Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan all in a lather.

He's Alfonso Tana, a 70-year-old hotel barber. He stopped by the Soviet Embassy today — for the third straight day — to give the visiting diplomat his morning shave.

Tana, who has waited on so many prominent people in the past 30 years that he can't remember them all, said Mikoyan is "a very nice fellow, a kind and gentle man."

Unlike most barber-customer relations, there's little conversation — almost none, in fact.

"We just say 'good morning' and then when I'm finished 'good day,'" Tana said. "Then Mr. Mikoyan thanks me and bows."

Proving to be something of a diplomat himself, Tana said when asked if Mikoyan got or needed a haircut:

"He didn't ask for one."

Tana refused to say whether Mikoyan paid him for the shaves, or gave him a tip for his services. "Those are money matters that I just won't discuss," he said.

Asked how he happened to be tapped for the job, he replied: "Someone at the State Department asked me to do it. Somebody must have recommended me."

Cliburn Cancels Four Concerts

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI)—Pianist Van Cliburn said today he has cancelled his concerts for the next 12 days because of a toothache.

"I love playing, but I don't think the audience would enjoy it if I'm sitting there wracked with pain," the popular young pianist said. "And my powers of concentration would not be as good."

Cliburn, who said he had been bothered in the past few months by his teeth but has not had time to go to a dentist because of his heavy concert schedule, cancelled concerts set for San Antonio, Tex., Saturday; Atlanta, Jan. 13; Birmingham, Jan. 17, and Syracuse, N. Y., Jan. 20.

Cliburn has been here since Monday and said he would probably have to remain until next week in order to have a wisdom tooth pulled.

Rebels Say Flynn Never Saw Castro

HAVANA (UPI) — The rebel publication Revolution scoffed today at Hollywood star Errol Flynn's report that he was wounded "while operating with Fidel Castro."

"That one (Flynn) never saw Castro," said Violeta Casals, a woman broadcaster for the rebel radio, in an article published by Revolution.

Flynn, who said he had been strafed by a government plane while traveling with a band of rebel raiders, showed newsmen here a leg wound which he said was caused either by a government bullet or by a chip of the masonry it knocked off a pillar behind which he had taken cover.
