a month later, photographing the hidden side of the moon with Lunik III. you don't "deliberately" miss the moon by 5,000 miles with Lunik IV.

So they're only men after all. We have suspected it all along. More importantly, maybe the Russians themselves will begin suspecting it. Perhaps they will even go so far one day as to admit a mistake.

This they have never done, When - and if - they do, they'll find out it's not so had. No one will laugh at them. We know they goofed this time. But we're not laughing at them.

# Intolerable Incompetence

The lives of many individual servicemen - not to mention the security of the country - may depend on the soundness with which missiles, planes, submarines and other defense devices are put together.

Wouldn't you imagine, therefore, that workmen and firms who turn these things out would apply themselves to their tasks with extreme care and high dedication?

Large numbers plainly do just that. But, as we are learning from the inquiry into the tragic case of the aubmarine Thresher, some do not.

If ever a matter called for full congressional investigation, this would seem to.

Indeed, enough evidence of poor performance exists to suggest that we ought to have a revival of the militant spirit which characterized the Senate Preparedness subcommittee in wartime.

And any probe should concern itself not simply with what happened to the Thresher in the Portsmouth Naval shipyard, but with what happens to other submarines and many types of naval craft when they are

being overhauled or repaired. Some reports filtering out of these places are pretty frightening. From one yard, a submarine commander examining repairs to his ship's hull said:

"That weld will never hold under

You might as well send a plane up with a gaping hole in the wing as take a submarine down with a weak spot in its hull.

Testimony already taken with respect to the Thresher offers a considerable catalogue of deficiencies, on the part of both naval yard workmen and outside, private suppliers of components.

Of the vessel's extensive system of hydraulic valves, one in every five was originally installed backwards. The same thing happened to the periscope mechanism. The rudder complex, the air system and other elements were defective at the outset.

Some of the proud working folk at Portsmouth yard do not like to hear such criticisms. One called them "lumps in the mashed potatoes."

But when lives - and the nation's safety - are involved, this is no time to invoke the great alibi of the mid-20th century: "Only a min-ority were responsible." A minority of one can send a submarine to the

What goes on in naval construction is only part of what may be a very large and unhappy commentary on certain elements in American labor and management. The Thresher disaster suggests, however, that this is the place to begin digging.
