Trees can offer many advantages in the landscape plan — among them framing for your house as well as protection from wind and costly problem and nuisance. costly problem and nuisance.

Seminole County has a local farm forester, Charles Chellman, who can give you valuable in-formation as to what trees are best adapted to your area and soil conditions.

In addition to our County Farm Forester, information on this subject is also available from your County Agricultural Agent as well as the Extension Service Specia-lists at Gainesville. Reputable nurserymen and commercial tree services also are often willing to give general advice about trees. One common mistake in choos-

best to buy trees from nearby nurseries. If you bring them or have them shipped from a distant place, consult local authorities first to make sure they will grow

in your area.

Another thing to consider is maintenance cost - some trees are more susceptible than others to attacks by diseases and insects and to storm and wind damage. Some trees are better able than others to withstand "city" conditions such as fumes and sidewalks or impacted soil. If you want to plant a tree near sewer or water lines, it is best to avoid willows and other species with roots that tend to clog drains. Oaks are among the least troublesome in this respect. 




