2 Dig In Hill For Gold, Only It's Kitty Litter

WICKENBURG, Ariz. (AP) — Not far from here, in the luscious days of frontier adventure, a pioneer named Henry Wickenburg hauled \$2 million in gold from his Vulture mine in three swabbing years. Well, this desert still holds rewards for men of boldness and vision and daring. Not far from here today, about five miles beyond where the road runs out of Maricopa County and also out of blacktop, out in a barren land of saguaro cactus and diamondback rattlers, two such red-blooded men are laboring a small mountain for its mineral treasure.

Kitty litter. "Laugh, I don't mind, everybody does at first," Phil Reinhardt said. "But I'm serious about this, and I'm committed."

Reinhardt himself, a 31-year-old six-footer with broad shoulders and a rich red beard, the picture of the rugged Western prospector, adds to the incongruity of his commitment to

the genteel problems of apartment dwellers and their passcats. So does his partner, Larry Johnson. Johnson, 34, has sun-bleached hair, faded jeans, scuffed shoes, all the badges of the outdoorsman, and lives alone in a cabin at the mine. "When Phil first mentioned to me what he was up to," Johnson said, "I laughed too."

To avoid that inevitable reaction when approaching potential investors, the two entrepreneurs have given their venture a most imposing name: Gulf American Mining Enterprises, Inc.

"Sounds impressive doesn't it?" Reinhardt said. "Besides, I like the acronym, GAME. But the real reason is that we believe this stuff has other applications and we intend to branch out — after we make it big in cat litter."

The "stuff" Reinhardt mines, and discusses with uncommon emotion, is rhyolite. There is rhyolite and rhyolite, Reinhardt explains. It is a form

of lava. But the variety beneath his 1,000-acre lease, a chalky rhyolite, pale gray in color, has two remarkable qualities which he discovered by accident. It eliminates odor like a sea breeze and soaks up moisture like a blotter.

Phil Reinhardt got onto his unlikely product while he was knocking around the southwest prospecting for silver. He had a degree in structural engineering, but nine-to-five jobs bored him.

A geologist told him about the rhyolite mine. A Texas firm, unable to find a use for the rock, wanted to get rid of the lease. "I went to Houston and they showed me a sample of it, crumbled. I thought to myself, that looks like kitty litter. It was just a hunch. So I studied kitty litter. Do you know it's a \$300 million a year market? I found out what properties kitty litter required and had some tests run. That was in 1973. You see the result."

**Hopes Revived For 8 Trapped Men
From Mine, A Message Of Life**

TOWER CITY, Pa. (AP) — A man alone in the depths of a mine since midday Tuesday has tapped a message of life through a 60-foot wall of coal, rekindling hope that seven comrades may also be alive. Rescuers made voice contact with 37-year-old Ronald Adley on Wednesday, nearly 32 hours after he and eight others were entombed a mile inside a 600-foot high mountain. The body of a tenth miner was found on Tuesday after the accident at the Porter Tunnel section of Kocher Coal Co.'s mine in the center of Pennsylvania's anthracite coal region. Adley's taps were the first sign that anyone had survived the crush of water that broke through a wall from an unused tunnel and flooded the mine, splintering timber and triggering an avalanche of mud and debris. Walter Vincinelly, the state's

top mining official, said Adley was alone in the 17th finger or work tunnel, of the mine. The other miners could be about 250 feet away in the adjacent finger, the last one in that section of the mine, he said. Rescuers found nothing in the other sections. Vincinelly said a series of six-inch holes would be drilled where Adley was located. He said rescuers with picks would increase the holes little by little,

making an escape hatch for the trapped miner. The mining official said, however, it would be early morning before they could expect to reach Adley. By late Wednesday, a second body had been removed from the mine. Hopes of finding the other miners still alive dimmed. Then rescuers heard the tapping sound and realized someone was alive, said Vincinelly. "They immediately started drilling and every time they stopped, they heard the tapping again," Vincinelly said. At 7:45 p.m., rescuers drilled a lifeline through the 60 feet of solid anthracite separating them and the trapped man.

Adley removed a cap on the pipe and told his rescuers he was unhurt and asked them to tell his wife.

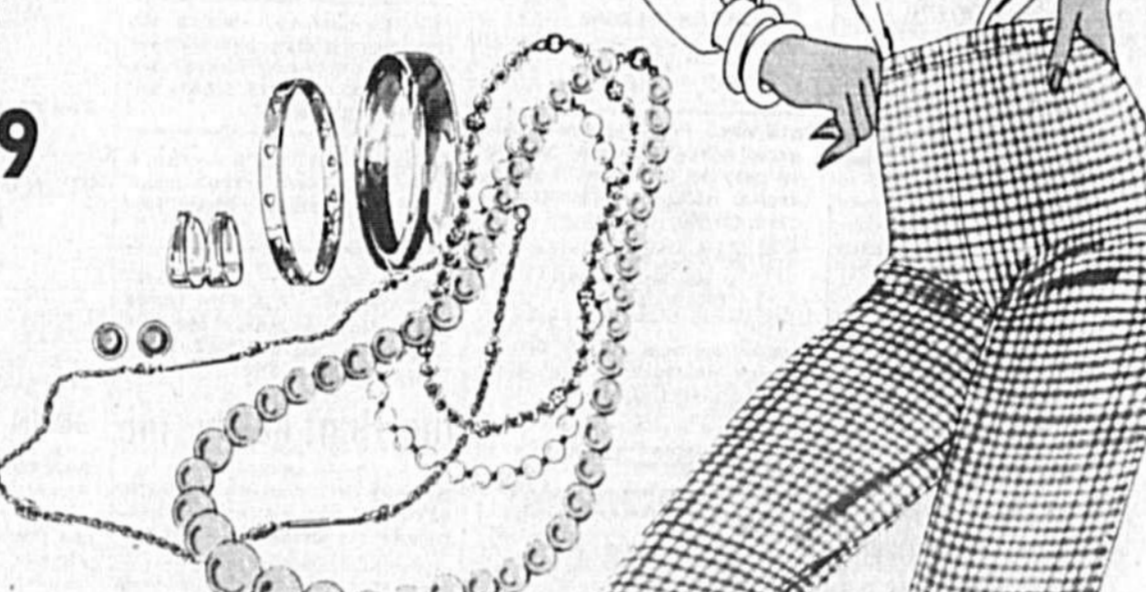

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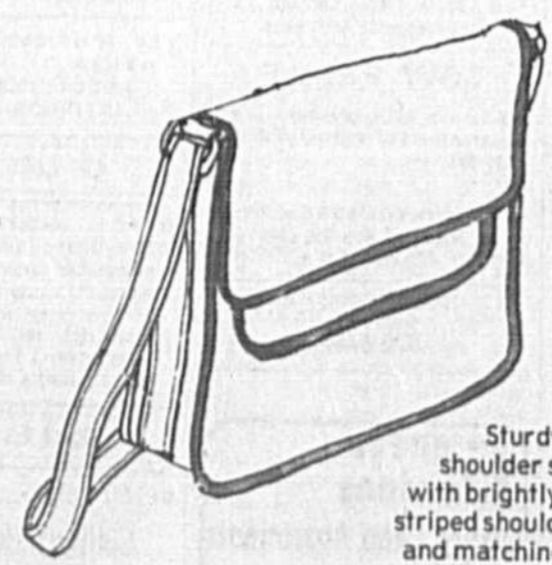

'Hello, Jimmy?... I Want To Say...'

WASHINGTON (AP) — There is a room in the White House complex now that looks like a bookie joint. Or maybe one of those potboiler operations where telephone pitchmen sell stock in the Brooklyn Bridge.

It is the heart of Dial-a-President, or "Ask President Carter" as it's called, the two-hour period Saturday afternoon when you can get on the telephone and talk with Jimmy Carter about whatever bugs you. Banks of telephones are at one end of the room, complicated electronics equipment at the other. And in the center, like Zeus, sits Emerson Stone, his finger on the wipe-out button.

President Carter and Walter Cronkite, the two voices on the White House end of the radio talk show, will not be in the mission control center in the Old Executive Office Building. They will be in the Oval Office, seated before microphones and a television set that flashes the caller's name and its pronunciation.

Cronkite's major role will be to say "The toll-free number to call is 800-423-8111." (Yes, it's a 900 area code — the first.) He will also act as the talk show host, gently casting off the verbose and redundant and keeping things moving. He can ask follow-up questions.

Emerson Stone's role will be different. When the show goes on the air at 2 p.m. EST, his finger will be poised over a silver button, ready to strike if the language gets saltier than hell and damn.

"The President and I will be the only people with The Button that day," he jokes.

Stone is a CBS Radio News vice president cast in a role performed by call-in talk show hosts on late-night radio all over the country.

There'll be a 6½ second delay before the conversation goes on the air. If your radio is on while you talk to Carter you'll hear yourself 6½ seconds late, causing no end of confusion. If Stone strikes his destruct button, a tape will announce a brief interruption.

President Carter and Cronkite won't be spared any obscenity or abusive language. That nicety is for those listening to all 265 stations on the CBS network, some other stations where there is no CBS outlet, some public broadcasting stations and the Voice of America.

CBS is spending \$50,000-plus for the show, Carter's latest effort to stay in touch with the people. The White House says NBC and ABC have ideas for programs, too, but not necessarily in the same format.

**Nationwide Activities Checked
'Sky King' Probed For Financial Fraud**

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The nationwide financial dealings of Kirby and Carolyn Grant and the Sky King Youth Ranches of America Inc., have been under investigation for several weeks, The Evening Herald has learned from a source within the Seminole County office of State Attorney Douglas Chesbire.

The probe by the state attorney's office is directed at the possibility of ranch funds being "funneled" through personal checking accounts, and the possible misappropriation of ranch funds, according to the source, who asked not to be identified. Additional investigative efforts may be directed at fundraising activities throughout the nation by the Grants and the organization.

At least another month of investigation probably will be required before any charges could be considered, he said.

"I can only tell you what I don't know," said Tom Thompson, the new executive director of the ranch. "When we talked to Mo (Maurice) Shams, attorney for the ranch, he said they — the state attorney's office — were embarrassed because they hadn't been able to find anything. I asked what the investigation was about, but we couldn't get any details."

As early as Feb. 4 subpoenas had been issued for the Combank, Longwood, banking records of the ranch itself and of Carolyn (Mrs. Kirby) Grant, the source said. Both Mrs. Grant and the ranch maintained checking accounts at that bank, according to bank officials.

Grant, television star of the former "Sky King" series, has been president of the organization since the mass resignation of six board members in December. Mrs. Grant has been secretary-treasurer since that time.

Grant has been criss-crossing the country seeking donations of funds and property. On Apr. 21, 1975, in a letter to board members, Grant stated, "There are nine states where we have been offered free land. This could only come about through trips I have made, broadcasts and word-of-mouth advertising. It is a natural culmination of events that this project shall become national."

In the same letter, Grant told the board: "For

your information, during the network run of the "Sky King" series there were about 700,000 children in the "Sky King" fan clubs across the country. These children are now young adults with families of their own. Undoubtedly, a number of them have become eminently successful in business or the professions. It is this reservoir along with many other influential friends across the country that I shall count on to help me meet the challenge that I feel I must accept."

The name "Sky King" itself has entered into the controversy surrounding Grant's Seminole County youth care facility in Chuluota for the past three months.

Flying Crown Enterprises Inc., a Winter Haven corporation, claims to have bought the rights to the name, as well as the actual prints of the old black-and-white television series. Although Grant was a founder of Flying Crown, members of the present board of directors told The Evening Herald his connection is now minimal "if any."

An attorney for Flying Crown sent a letter to Grant warning him to "cease using the image created by the television series 'Sky King.'"

An additional investigation is being conducted into the affairs of the ranch by the Florida Department of State. That check-up is a matter of routine, according to investigator William J. (Doc) Forbes, and is part of the organization's application for an updated certificate to permit them to participate in fund-raising activities.

The organization had been soliciting funds without certification since 1975.

"Although Mr. Grant has consistently maintained that the members of the board who resigned were responsible for maintaining that permit," Forbes

**County Commission Must Vote
Williams To Ask Amur Go-Ahead**

County Commission Chairman Dick Williams said today he will ask county commissioners Tuesday for permission to ask a state agency to stock three Seminole County lakes with the controversial weed-eating white amur.

The Florida Cabinet last Tuesday cleared the way for stocking Seminole lakes with the hybrid-eating fish, but the county commission must approve the concept at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Last year, state officials met with the cabinet to try and resolve a squabble between the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the state Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. The DNR wanted to stock Florida's waterways immediately, but the game and fish agency wanted additional research done on the amur before it's placed in the state's waterways.

The final upshot was cabinet members decided each individual project must be submitted by the DNR and approved by the cabinet.

The last vote deadlocked, with Williams and Commissioner Bob French in favor of the amur and Commissioners John Kirkbrough and Bill Kirchhoff in opposition. Commissioner Harry Kwiakowski was absent when the vote was taken.

Kimbrough fears the "weed shark" might make its way into the St. Johns and Wekiva Rivers and destroy the game fish population. Other commissioners have expressed identical reservations.

But lakeside homeowners have submitted petitions asking that the lakes be stocked with the amur to rid the three waterways of pesky hydrilla. French criticized the recent cabinet action.

"The cabinet did nothing," he said. French had hoped the cabinet would assign responsibility for the amur to the game and fresh water fish commission.

Also, French said he has similar reservations to Kimbrough's. The Democratic commissioner said he needs assurances that the amur will not make its way into the rivers where it can spawn and threaten the game fish. The amur, according to research, cannot spawn in a lake. Spawning requires swift running water, such as a river.

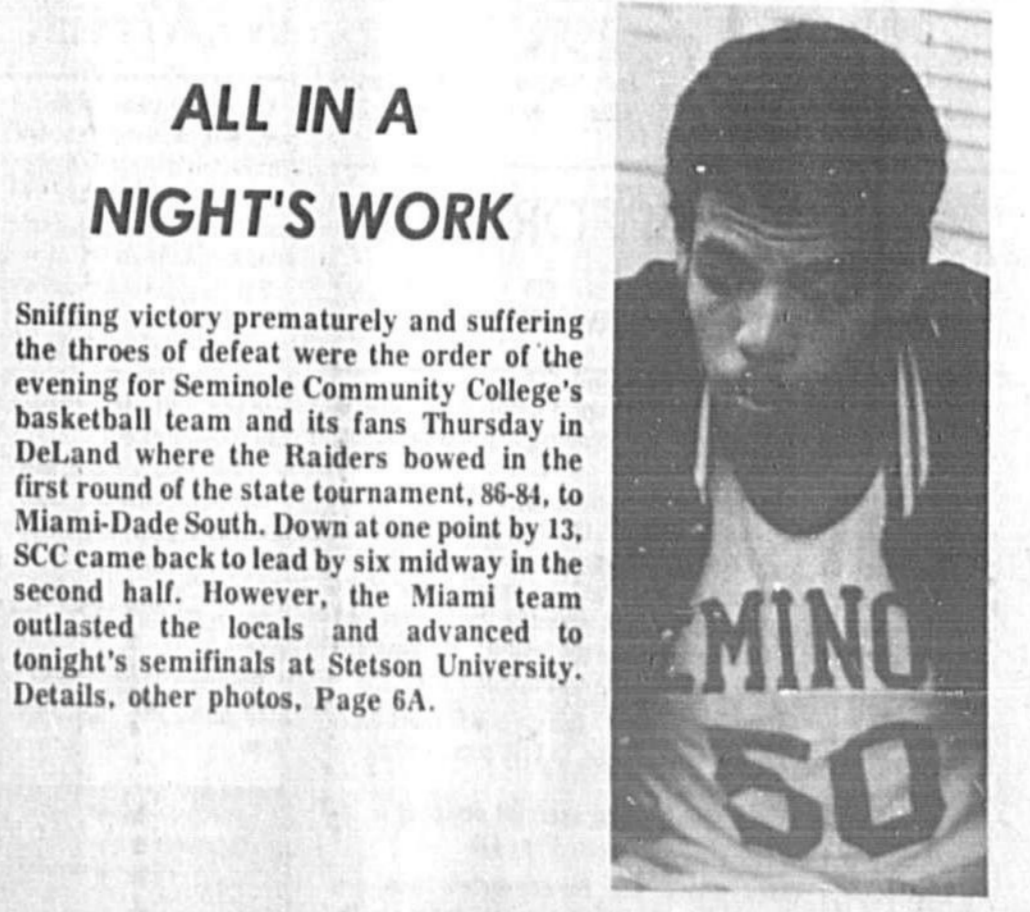

Cheshire said he instituted the no-plea bargaining policy in burglary and robbery cases four days before state Attorney General Robert Sherrin issued a memo last week urging state attorneys to end plea bargaining in nearly all armed robbery and burglary cases.

Cheshire says he is one of five state attorneys around the state so far to support the Sherrin request.

"I believe each of you is in a position to know your own court dockets and to experiment accordingly instead of my seeking legislative changes in plea bargaining which may prove too restrictive," he said.

Cheshire noted that prosecutors must be careful not to "overcharge" burglary in situations that are actually larceny so as to get a jury to larceny.

Grand larceny is a third-degree felony, punishable by a maximum of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. Burglary is punishable by five years and up depending upon the type of burglary charged, auto, structure, dwelling etc.

Cheshire noted that prosecutors must be careful not to "overcharge" burglary in situations that are actually larceny so as to get a jury to larceny.

Cheshire also expressed the belief that if a defendant faces multiple burglary charges he should plead to all counts. "Why do a burglar a favor?" he asked.

Sherrin is expected to legislate on plea bargaining, according to Cheshire, but Cheshire said, "If the legislature proposes legislation on plea bargaining I'll support it."

Prosecution of burglaries has been given a top priority by Cheshire. He says he sees a trend toward more burglaries than robberies because defendants know the penalties for burglary convictions are less than robbery.
