

ILLINOIS BOXING BODY BANS RIXOUX AFRAID TO FIGHT

Carnera Is Observed Of Any Fault In Kink Fiasco Last Week

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Prima Carnera, Chicago's fighting champion, has irked the Illinois Boxing Board, the wood-chopping heavy-weight from Montreal, into an affidavit and involuntary retirement from Illinois rings.

In addition to his banishment, the commission fined him \$1,000 and revoked his license, the new license in this state. Dave Barry, referee of the last brawl, told the commission that Rixoux was only a victim of a conspiracy for a "kick" on the part of the Canadian. Barry said that he saw the kick and that Rixoux appeared to be in pain and when the bell rang for the start of the match, Rixoux fell in the center of the ring and frightened to lift his hands for defense.

The two judges of the match E. L. Cook and W. A. Barry agreed that Rixoux hit Carnera five times, that he hit Carnera enough to knock him out, but that the punch that sent him to the floor, that on his face, in the path and that he was described by them as a "kick" but not a "kick" as such.

Barry admitted he was "green" and that he did not know what it was all about after Carnera landed his first blow.

Carnera was present at the hearing, which cleared him of the charge, but he did not believe, on that basis, was a victim of a kick.

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CUBS ESTABLISH NEW RECORD FOR 1930 CONTRACTS

Every Man On Team Has Signed Up Without Holdout Threat

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—(AP)—William Wrigley's temperamental Cubs, victims of a few undetected records in their recent World Series, sketched with the Athletics, have established somewhat of a different record in signing their 1930 contracts.

Instead of having names Wrigley, President William Wrigley and Manager Joe McCarthy, several financial and managerial heads of the Cubs, including high executives, are in the process of signing every man on the team without a holdout threat.

Even Hank Williams, who last year after playing the holdout role admitted, or spending money, came through with his signature in record time.

Although Wrigley refuses to give out salaries or public knowledge, it is known the big reason for the lack of holdouts among the Cubs is due to substantial increases in pay for the more important members of the National League championship staff. Wrigley is believed to have received a contract for \$250,000, a good increase over 1929, while Chief Executive and P. J. Mahone, head of the pitching staff, also will draw a large pay envelope.

Wrigley also regularly turns down director meetings in his various capacities, and is expected to watch his team play, but he has not yet for another National League title, but for another chance to win the world's championship, probably at the expense of the Chicago Athletics. His spirit of being in the players' pay, and all-around, they do not want to be any longer getting ready for that chance by holdout actions.

Nevertheless, Bob Lewis, manager of the Athletics, says that he is holding short of a contract by the quick signing of 1930 contracts.

"I'm glad to have a lot of holdouts," Lewis said. "I thought that was the way the fellows were going to get their money."


