## NRA Administrator's Annual Pay Jumped To \$15,000 By Order Of President, July 1

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The salary of Hugh S. Johnson, NRA administrator, has been boosted by President Roosevelt from \$9,000 to \$15,000 a year.

The increase began last July 1 but it was not disclosed by the NRA until today.

At NRA it was said the action was taken in order to give Johnson a salary more nearly in line with his work, and to enable him to meet heavy living expenses.
