The shortage of newsprint is forcing many papers to raise subscription rates, restrict circulation, eliminate some of their editions, and reduce the number of pages.

Sabotage In France

French schools for saboteurs, for agents of the French underground, are today being held throughout France and have become "dangerously big," Walter Davenport, associate editor of Collier's, reveals from London.

"In France today there are schools for saboteurs, for agents of the underground," one of the three French agents, an engineer by profession, told Davenport.

"The Boche are very flattering. They call the agents of the underground criminals. There is no soldier with a greater decoration than to be denounced by the Boche as a criminal. A criminal for France. From us criminals for France, the Norwegians and the Dutch—whom we call Singing Kettles—and Belgians from the frontier of France are learning to be criminals for liberty."

"The paralyzation suffered by the French people in the months immediately following the collapse of their country, according to Davenport, has been replaced by a fighting, patriotic fervor, a willingness on the part of the people to risk violent death to serve their country and regain their liberty."

"The soul which is France revived," the former French university professor asserted. "It watched and listened to Marshal Petain—Petain of Verdun. 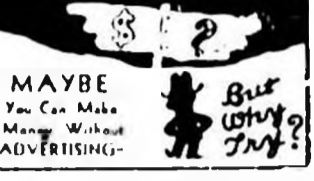

INTERNAL TRADE BARRIERS

Nothing has done more to deplete these United States than the state tariff barriers erected in recent years, under various pretexts. Not only have they tended to destroy interstate commerce and thus impoverished the country, but they have been contrary to the federal Constitution, which clearly declares that states shall not establish tariff laws against each other.

It seems incredible that in view of the harm they do to the nation as a whole, the constitutional prohibition, apparently, has not been invoked to stop the practice. Warnings have been given over

and over again that such procedure was " Balkanizing the United States." That is, turning the Union into a mere group of states which, in unwise efforts to take advantage of their neighbors, were restricting commerce and thus impoverishing each other. Professing to protect home industries in general and thus their efforts react against themselves. It is done subtly by "trick" rulings by truckers."

The Office of Defense Transportation has finally moved to stop this suicidal procedure by corrective action among the 48 state legislatures in session this year. But this is as low and roundabout process. Would it not be better to invoke directly the basic Constitutional ban, and have the Supreme Court stop this evil once for all? It would seem hard on some states at first, but would benefit all in the long run.
