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Hitler Tells His Plans

Hitler's speech announcing the start of a gigantic U-boat campaign against British shipping disregards every precept of military strategy.

But, perhaps Hitler, realizing that his plans were probably known anyway, decided to call his shots in advance for the effect on German and Italian morale and also as a means of establishing himself as a prophet.

Or, maybe, the Nazi leader is trying to convince America that passage of the lease-lend bill would be futile anyway in the face of prospects that every ship leaving England would have to run a gauntlet of German submarines.

Hitler's announcement certainly isn't going to change any plans of the British for they have known months in advance that with the coming of Spring "sea wolves" will prowl the seas in greater numbers than ever before, and, what is more important, they have undoubtedly taken steps to counteract the expected increase in underwater attacks.

The clearer, calmer weather of Spring will not only be an aid to German submarine captains but also will be a distinct help to the vast array of defensive forces of the Royal Navy, to their destroyer commanders, and to the crews of smaller escort craft, and to the aviators in long-distance patrol bombers.

Whereas, a clear sky and a calm ocean make it easier for a submarine to stay at sea and to spot merchant convoys, so also does it make the task of destroyers, mosquito boats, and planes much simpler.

As for the effect on the United States, any increase in U-boat activity, to the point where Britain cannot cope with the situation will increase rather than diminish our will to help, even to the extent of sending armed and protected convoys with supplies to England.

WITH 15,000 COLLEGE STUDENTS earning wings, aided by the government's civilian flying program, a thrilling new sport, the "Afrathlon," may win great public following as collegiate football, flying teams of colleges, and universities all over the country are holding sectional meets and sending their champions to a tournament for U. S. titles.

Every year, five hundred pilots from 29 schools competed in the 1940 National Afrathlon, sponsored by the National Aeronautics Association and the National Intercollegiate Flying Club.

The five tests used in intercollegiate flying are: altitude, speed, and distance, set, not a standard, but occurred in 1934 take-offs and as many landings at 1,000 feet.

In one British convoy alone, the base agency said, 180,000 tons of ships, including an auxiliary cruiser, were sent to the bottom in a series of bitter engagements.

It was assumed the tonnage reported sunk in this convoy was the same as that referred to by Adolf Hitler in his speech yesterday at Munich.

Hitler's speech, which was broadcast to the German people, was the first since the outbreak of the war in which he has mentioned the name of the British navy.

Loss Because Of Weight Laws Is Cited By Wilson

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 25.—(Special)—How farmers are losing money because of the weight laws of the state of Florida which prohibit some trucks from carrying their full loads of produce was explained today by William L. Wilson, director of state markets.

The last Legislature approved a measure which would permit the loading of 40,000 pounds on "semitrailer" trucks without booster brakes, but, at the request of the State Road Department, the governor vetoed the bill. This veto will be presented to the coming session of the Legislature which will be given the opportunity to approve or to disapprove it.

The reason given by the State Road Department for recommending a veto of the bill was that there are many small rigs and perhaps some large rigs on through roads which will not hold the weights designated in the measure. This may be so, though some classes of rigs which weigh up to and beyond the limit allowed by the vetoed measure are now operating over these roads.

An interesting incident of this was when the Army sent an expeditionary force of tanks from Columbus, to Panama City. The State Road Department should look upon this problem as one to be solved by rebuilding the bridges as fast as possible, by shoring up existing bridges with additional timber and by signs notifying the public of the weight each weak bridge will carry.

Tourist business was definitely off in January. It began to pick up however, the second week in February, and was at its peak for this season Saturday, Washington's birthday.

Usually heavy March reservations and a later Easter, April 13, brought an optimistic forecast of better business for the remainder of the season.

Reasons given for the lull in January were the nearly nationwide influenza epidemic and the national defense program which kept many at home by business. Others were prevented from making annual trips south by the draft which was taking or about to take sons and employees of prospective visitors.

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Bureau Of Roads Makes Analysis Of Military Highways

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 25.—(Special)—Senator Claude Pepper declared today that the Bureau of Roads has completed an analysis of access roads incident to military establishments over the country. He said that within the next few days this report will be made public.

The State Road Department of Florida has estimated that nearly 18 million dollars will be necessary to build necessary roads needed by military camps and posts in the State of Florida. The senator said that this estimate may materially increase due to design and requirements of the Army and Navy and two additional projects that may be desired.

Senator Pepper also announced that 6,981 housing units have been constructed or are under course of construction or scheduled for construction in Florida by the U. S. Housing Authority.

"Most of this construction," the senator said, "when completed will be in South Florida. Out of 26 projects, he said, eight were in North Florida." The total cost of the program of housing under the auspices of the U. S. Housing Authority when completed, will be \$21,797,000.

Senator Pepper announced that two representatives of the Department of Interior have been sent to Florida to examine the controversy between the State of Florida and the Department of Interior with respect to eradication of cattle tick in the one remaining infested area in Florida—Henry county.

The State has maintained that the complete eradication of the cattle tick rested upon the extermination of deer in Henry county, since deer is regarded to be a carrier of tick. The Department of Interior has opposed carrying out this plan in the Indian Reservation, which includes a portion of Henry county.

Upon the result of the investigation the course of the federal government with respect to the deer extermination and the final elimination of tick in Henry county will be determined.

Senator Pepper said that he expected a preliminary report from the investigators within a short time.

Every player in the cast brings rich reminiscence from anyone who has ever lived in The Village, but the critics saved the most raves for tall, blond Jo Ann Sayers of Seattle, who plays Ellen, the naive main-trap.

Jo Ann never even had seen The Village until she came to New York for the first time last Fall. But she thinks that's really an advantage because she acts more like a stranger would.

Right there Jo Ann tells you just what kind of person she is—fresh and sincere. She's the type that would be described in any town from here to Seattle and back by way of Dallas as a "sweet kid." She loves acting and hasn't been in New York long enough to acquire that glazed, hollow-eyed look that is the stamp of so many veterans and new veterans.

Sometimes you don't think she ever will.

"The story of how I got this part is pretty much a story of happening to be in the right place at the right time," Jo Ann said.

"Mother and I took a vacation trip to Hollywood three years ago after my second year at Washington University. A talent scout who had been in college the previous year happened to see me one night and got me a screen test.

"I worked in five pictures and at the end of three years I hadn't had my session yet.

"I thought, 'I just had to take a trip somewhere, so I went home to Seattle. I have an aunt who is a lawyer for a department store and she happened to be coming to New York. I came along.

Jo Ann doesn't guess she'll ever get back to school, but feels that it wouldn't help her much in her work anyway.

"After you've learned the fundamentals of acting in school," she said, "the best place you can study is on the stage, watching experienced actors. From listening to getting South (after Ruth) I got a sense of very primary things that a movie first teaches."

where around 1,000 "salesmen" a day in Washington, trying to peddle their wares to Uncle Sam. These generally aren't salesmen at all but heads of companies, vice-presidents, etc., of firms that would like government contracts for everything from toothpicks to seppelins.

On the other side of the fence are about 500 major purchasers and thousands of inspectors, consumers, supervisors, etc., who have to be convinced before a government contract can be signed.

ARE you beginning to see the picture? Even before national defense, it was utter confusion daily, but with vastly increased buying in recent months, Washington has become a veritable clutter of harried business men—harried, not because they can't put over a deal, but because they can't even find the person to whom they can make their sales talk.

A few months ago, a letter came across Baxter's desk, in which a beleaguered business man listed 12 persons on whom he had called and he still hadn't located the man he was supposed to see. That was the day of the birth of the Service and Information office.
