Fire department issues Fourth of July safety tips

During this time of year, we celebrate our independence. Although there is no ban for fireworks this summer, citizens shouldn't sacrifice safety for the thrill of shooting a firework.

In the State of Florida, sparklers are the only types of fireworks permitted by law. Fireworks that shoot into the air or create a loud "explosion" are not allowed without a permit.

Each year more than 200 deaths have been reported as a result of fireworks. Most of those occur on the Fourth of July and New Year's Eve. In addition, more than 25,000 people are hospitalized because of firework-related accidents. Most of the injuries are burns, due to the fact that a common sparkler can reach 1,800 degrees in temperature.

The Seminole County Fire Department recommends that parents leave fireworks to the professionals. There will be a host of celebrations around Seminole County this weekend.

If you are going to play with fireworks, use these simple safety precautions:

- Adults should supervise children playing with fireworks.
- Only buy sparklers from registered dealers.
- Keep a pail of water, a fire extinguisher, or a garden hose close by.
- Light only one sparkler at a time.
- Follow labeled directions.
- Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.
- Monitor children around sparklers. This is the primary cause of scalding among all the types of fireworks.
- Fireworks that are leaking powder appear to be old or show any signs of mishandling should be avoided.
- Avoid fireworks that appear to have been wet and then dried. Water degrades the explosive chemicals inside and may affect the fuses.
- After the Fourth of July, store all fireworks out of the reach of children.

Police: Tasers are a life-saving tool

SANFORD — Sanford police say a man approaching officers wielding a butcher knife is lucky to be alive.

They do not take full credit for their life-saving action stating it was merely one of numerous cases across the state that have a very different outcome due to the use of tasers.

In the past few months, however, tasers have earned a bad reputation around Central Florida because of deaths, most notably in Orange County, associated with the device. Despite the recent setbacks, area law enforcement officers are praising the relatively new tool, and they say a Sanford police incident last month is a perfect reason why.

On June 26 at about 11 p.m.,

Sanford officers responded to a report of a fight in progress at a residence on West 13th Place. The officers moved inside the residence to investigate and found William Love, 64, lying on a sofa. He approached them with a large kitchen knife in his hand.

Officers commanded Love to drop the weapon, but when he didn't they fired their taser at him. Love dropped the knife

and he was transported to the Seminole County Jail for the charge of resisting an officer.

The incident was rather cut and dry, but Sgt. Marc Kovacs said if it had been more than a year ago before Sanford officers were issued tasers, Love would have definitely been shot — and maybe killed.

"Instead of going to lethal force, two of the officers were able to draw their tasers. While

it's not a catch all — it's not a guarantee — we have a better option by using the tasers because the subject is going to drop the edged weapon," he said.

The taser gun-like apparatus employs electro-muscular disruption technology to subdue unruly suspects. At a range up to 21 feet, an officer can inca-

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Schools advise parents to register kids soon

SANFORD — Frustration spreads like an annual epidemic at Seminole County schools as parents wait too long to register children for kindergarten.

"What happens is parents wait until the last minute and arrive without the necessary information to register," said Deborah Wright, principal at Lake Mary Elementary.

Parents could prevent problems by getting immunizations and physicals done ahead of time. Those in the northeast and northwest clusters of the county must allow even more time to register.

"What would really, really help the school is if parents can bring in all the registration material the first time they come in," Wright said.

A 680 immunization form, proof of residency, a copy of the child's birth certificate, and a physical within the last year

Librarian checks out after 31 years

SANFORD — The Seminole County law library may be small, but it continually receives praise from visiting attorneys. Ask anyone, the reason for the admiration is simple: Librarian Jan Cara.

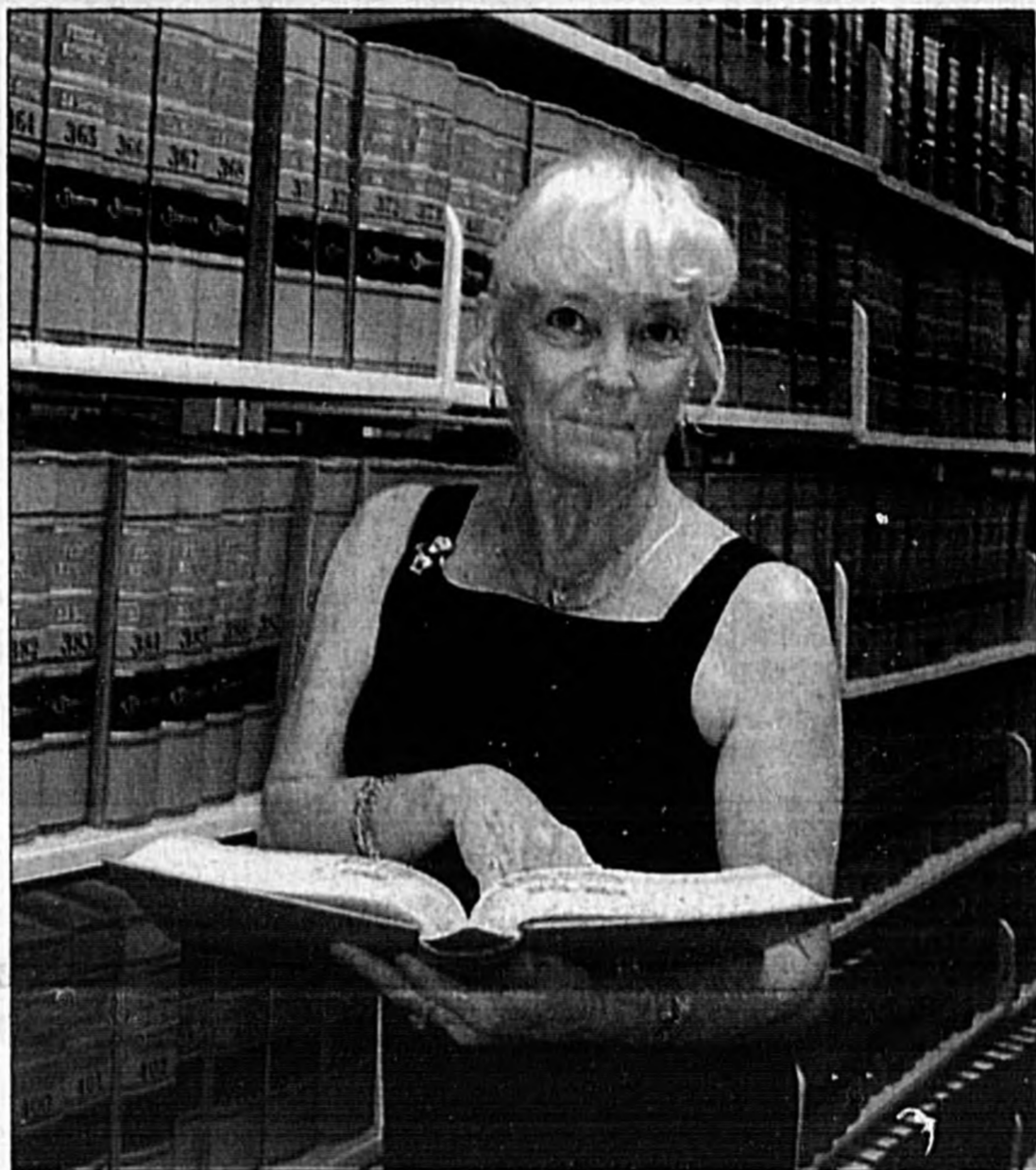
For 31 years, four months and 11 days, Cara has been a fixture at the Fred R. Wilson Law Library, currently located at the Seminole County Courthouse Annex on Park Avenue. Attorney and Lake Mary Mayor Tom Greene says it's her day-in-and-day-out winning attitude that sets her apart from others in the area.

"I think what different attorneys have told me about this library is it has always been a friendly library. I've even had Tallahassee attorneys tell me that," Cara said.

She was set to retire in February, but she was asked by the law library board of trustees to stay until the transition of the facility was made to the county. The board is made up of three attorneys who practice in Seminole County and currently include Greene, George Wallace and Thomas Speer.

"Jan has been our first librarian," Speer said. "The library before that was on an honor system with the lawyers. There were only

New high school information system to give better access to student grades, homework

SANFORD — Seminole County Public Schools will roll out a new program giving parents information about their child's attendance, grades, and homework, according to the head of the Information Services Department.

Three high schools will use the system initially. Starting in August, Lake Brantley, Crooms and Lyman high school parents can access the secure system, said George Kosmac, chief information officer.

Participation will be voluntary, said Regina Klaers, who handles student information. Parents will visit the school and receive an

attendance code, she said. They can enter the system through the district's Web site.

Attendance can be checked by parents within 24 to 48 hours, Klaers said. Information will be listed class by class, she said. Absences will be labeled excused or unexcused. Homework assignments will be listed by class weekly and monthly, and parents will be able to send e-mail to teachers through the system, Klaers said.

When report cards are issued, the information will be on the site. To track progress, the homework assignments page will include how many points each task is worth. Other information on the system will include the school cal-

endar, lunch menus, graduation requirements and Bright Futures Scholarship criteria.

"This is a supplement to teacher-parent communication, not a replacement," Klaers explained.

A link from the system will take users to the Florida Department of Education Web site. That will provide parents with access to student transcripts, officials said. The school district sends student information to the state Education Department three times a year, Klaers said. Parents can check the transcripts for errors with the link.

Once the system is operating, she said, an evaluation will take place, probably in the form of an

online survey. The system will be improved and expanded from there.

Kosmac said a goal is to have the system available in all eight high schools by the second semester starting in January. An important aspect, he said, is that the system can transfer data from teachers' electronic gradebooks, meaning they will not have to reenter the information.

Klaers said a pilot project tried last year using a vendor program was too restrictive. She gave credit for the new program to Robert Curran's team from Information Services.

"We think of it, and they make it happen," she said.

Author takes the guessing out of choosing a romantic flick

Rent a movie, grab a blanket, open a bottle of wine and nestle into the sofa with that special someone.

Just make sure you have leafed through a copy of "Reel Romance: The Lovers' Guide to the 100 Best Date Movies," a new book by Leslie Halpern, which helps couples find movies that both men and women can enjoy.

"My husband and I have movie night once a week," Halpern said. "We always disagreed about what movies we wanted to see. He wanted action movies and I wanted art films."

The movies Halpern included in Reel Romance contain romance and witty dialogue for women and action for men.

"I wanted to write a book where couples

didn't have to compromise," Halpern said.

Some of the 100 movies included in Reel Romance are Dirty

Dancing, There's Something About Mary, Bridget Jones's Diary, Risky Business, Meet the Parents and My Big Fat Greek Wedding.

Halpern screened all the films with her husband, who approved almost every movie included in the book, with the exception of the Julia Roberts and Hugh Grant romantic comedy Notting Hill. The movie made the cut anyway, because Halpern knew other men who had enjoyed the film.

Reel Romance has a fiery "make-out meter", where the kissing quo-

tient of each movie is represented on a scale of one to five candles.

But even the five candle films would probably not be labeled extremely sexual. For example, The Wedding Planner and Don Juan DeMarco scored high on Halpern's makeout meter. Most of the films in the book are rated PG or PG-13.

"I think romance is more of a hint, a suggestion of what is to come," Halpern said. "R movies may be sexy or erotic, but not romantic."

Some of Halpern's favorite date movies are The Princess Bride, Witness, Romancing the Stone, Casablanca, and almost any movie starring Johnny Depp.

Halpern, an Oviedo resident who has worked as a professional entertainment writer for about 20 years, began by reviewing films for her college newspaper and now writes a monthly film column for Markee Magazine.

Reel Romance is being billed as a unique gift idea for anyone involved in a wedding, after Halpern noticed that women were buying her book to give to newly married couples or to bridesmaids.

"I found it's generally women who buy the book," Halpern said.

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Don't bank on it: Though the city of Sanford is studying the possibility of purchasing the Wachovia Bank building at the corner of 1st Street and Park Avenue, don't count on City Hall moving to the six story building.

The city's option on the building was to have expired June 30, but City Manager Al Grieshaber told commissioners Monday afternoon that Lago Real LLC had extended the option to purchase until July 27 so that city officials can complete their due diligence. The city need not rush. The building has been on the market for several months, and to date, there are no other serious buyers.

Furthermore, there doesn't appear to be much support from city commissioners to purchase the historic bank building. Mayor Brady Lessard says he won't support the acquisition, and Commissioner Kevin Hipes, who suggested the city consider the purchase, reportedly has curbed his enthusiasm for the project.

The idea behind considering the purchase is a valid one: move City Hall off the lakefront and sell the property to help development along the RiverWalk. The problem with this particular proposal is threefold.

First, the Wachovia building is overpriced. Lago Real is asking \$1.715 million, about \$400,000 more than the company paid for the building in January 2002.

Second, the building will require a substantial amount of cash to complete major renovations, construct a new and larger elevator and land some new tenants. Since purchasing the six-story structure, Lago Real has not made any physical improvements or attracted additional tenants. The top five floors remain vacant.

Third, the city must remember the old real estate maxim: location, location, location. Relocating City Hall to the Wachovia building is not a logical move. The city would move a government facility, which is exempt from property taxes, from one high-profile location (the waterfront) to another high-profile location (1st and Park). Why not move City Hall to a piece of property that generates little if any tax revenue and could use redevelopment?

Though there is plenty of work to do downtown regarding redevelopment, the area has turned the corner and you're beginning to see private investment. Instead of moving City Hall to the heart of downtown, why not build a new facility in Goldsboro or near Seminole High School? Both neighborhoods need an infusion of redevelopment and are more centrally located than downtown. In addition, the city is already considering building a new fire and police headquarters behind the State Farmers' Market on 13th Street and Lake Avenue. Putting City Hall on or near the same site would be a nice fit, at least I think so. We'll see if the city is likeminded.

Street talk: The delays surrounding renovations on 1st Street may be resolved sooner than the July 19 hearing date before the St. Johns River Water Management District.

Carey Farrell has filed a petition asking St. Johns to withhold a permit for the city because of concerns about the project. Farrell's concerns about the need to replace stormwater pipes under 1st Street have been addressed by the city, and Word Around The Clock is Farrell is open to withdrawing his petition.

Problem is, the real force behind Farrell's petition is Bill Kirchhoff, a long-time Sanford resident and former county commissioner. In a meeting with Farrell, Mayor Lessard, Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) chairman Bob Parsell and property owner George Saunders, Kirchhoff offered little reasoning for his objections to the project other than he doesn't like the switch from angled parking to parallel parking. He spent much of the meeting demanding the city build a parking garage downtown and belly-aching about the demise of the Sanford Main Street organization.

The CRA agreed about a year ago to fund Main Street when Kirchhoff was president, but the board pulled its funding when Kirchhoff began a campaign to oppose the CRA's 1st Street renovations. Talk about biting the hand that feeds you.

The problem, as I see it, is Kirchhoff longs for the days when he served on the county commission and could help shape the future of the community. Kirchhoff can not seal the deal like he did in the old days, particularly regarding the parking garage he insists the city needs, and people are beginning to snicker. When Kirchhoff walked into the Colonial Room restaurant Thursday at lunch time, he was met with catcalls from, among others, former city commissioner Lon Howell and a group from the State Attorney's Office.

"Hey Bill, when are you going to get that parking garage built?" one patron joked. "I had to walk two whole blocks to get here."

Instead of finding other ways to contribute — and believe me, Kirchhoff could be an asset to the city — he continues his Quixotic quest to stop change downtown. During Wednesday's meeting with Saunders et al., Kirchhoff mentioned he might file a lawsuit to stop 1st Street renovations.

Let's hope it doesn't come to that, and the city is able to complete the 1st Street project quickly.

about 16 lawyers in Sanford and two judges." When she was hired in February of 1973, Cara said there were about 900 books in the library. There are 10 times more books in the library today, but it's not the only noticeable difference. "When I first started here most of the visitors were judges and attorneys," she said. Cara now estimates 70 percent of the law library visitors are members of the public. She said more and more citizens are becoming interested in learning a variety of legal subjects from divorce proceedings to landlord-tenant issues. "And people that just want to do self-help claims," she said. "We even have self-help books for those people, and even my young attorneys like them." Cara said it's the visits from the public that she will miss the most. "I think (what I will miss is) the interaction with the people here that I know, but also with the general public," she said. She is known by many throughout the area as a great source of Sanford history. Judges sometimes refer to Cara for immense knowledge on the

city. Among her collection of historical documents for Sanford is a group of Seminole High School yearbooks and various postcards. Like the shelves of books in the law library, Cara's hobbies are diverse. Having lived in Hawaii for three years, she studies and teaches Hawaiian culture. She also has a love for gorillas. She is 30-year member of a foundation to protect gorillas. Her odd compilation of hobbies runs in the family. Her grandfather Thomas Ratliff Sr. was known in Sanford for his strange collection of various items such as Indian skulls, old vehicles and even a Mastodon tooth. One of her son's even helps run a toy collectible store in DeLand. "When you become a librarian it's like being a collector," she said. With her newfound free time, she said her collections and hobbies would probably expand as he is also planning a trip to Hawaii. Cara also said it will give her more time to spend with her two sons, Robert Earl Cara of Apopka and James Burbridge Cara of DeLand, and her three grandchildren, Alyssa, Jace and Cynthia.

pacitate a person by firing two wire-attached electrodes. With small barbs on the end of the electrodes, the projectiles stick into a subject and allow an officer to administer a 1.62-amp, 50,000-volt shock for five seconds. "The electrical impulse that is set out by the taser mimics the brain's signal to cause the muscles to lock up," Kovacs said. "So what you are doing is sending an artificial signal into the body to tell the muscles to lock up for five seconds. By doing that you have taken away total motor control of the person." "The interesting thing is although the heart is a muscle, the heart operates on a total different phase than this impulse so the heart is totally unaffected and you run no risk of harming a person lethally." The taser is far more effective — and at times safer — than other less-lethal self-defense devices, such as pepper spray and batons. Since pepper spray does not affect everybody the same, the success rate of it working is about 80 percent, Kovacs said. The Orange County Sheriff's Office has been using the taser for three years now and deputies have documented 36

cases where the taser probably saved a suspect's life. "We're talking 36 people that probably would have been dead if we had not had the tasers," said Capt. Bernie Prescha. "I'm talking about people we were clearly justified in shooting and probably should have shot." Unlike Sanford police that use the taser far less because of the volume of calls, the Orange County Sheriff's Office has experienced three suspect deaths associated with tasers. As a result, critics have argued that the sheriff's office is abusing the tool, and some politicians have joined the fight. While drug overdoses were linked to the three deaths, some law enforcement officials are worried that their newest tool could be headed for the shelf. "Here is a man's life that was saved," Kovacs said. "He was saved because we have this tool. And it's a great tool to have in our arsenal, and I just hope it doesn't get taken away because of the politicians." Besides saving lives, police maintain the tasers reduce suspect and officer injuries and even minimize the level of force police need to use to control a suspect.

Kovacs and Orange County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Paul "Spike" Hopkins have heard the talk on the street about the tasers. It's sometimes referred to as the "phazer" and "the chair," but Hopkins favorite reference locally to the taser is "two guns — don't run." The Orange County Sheriff's Office documented fewer instances of deputies having to use force between 2002 and 2003 and Hopkins attributes the decline to tasers. "There's no doubt that's because of the taser," he said. "People look at us now and they see the two guns on our hips. They know we have a taser, and they don't want to go against it because they have heard about it." In Sanford, officers have the choice between tasers and pepper spray in the initial stages of a use of force scale. Kovacs said the department "encourages officers to use it before they physically try to control somebody." As a result, Kovacs said worker compensation claims by Sanford officers have declined. Hopkins said the Orange County Sheriff's Office has also documented an 80 percent reduction of injuries to deputies because of tasers.

fills the prescription of requirements. Sometimes children will need a final dose of immunization, said Carol Chanter, principal of Pinecrest Elementary in Sanford. "It's not deliberate," she said. Wright concurred: "It's just a concern. We go through it every year." Some parents understand, others show their frustration, the principals said. Some may not have transportation, but the hardest pill to swallow can be at the packed health clinics. "We start two weeks before and go two weeks after school begins," said Rosaly Guzmán, health promotions coordinator for Seminole County Health Department. The daily caseload swells from 60 clients to more than 300 in that four-week period, she said of the Sanford Health Clinic location at 400 W. Airport Blvd. Six sites in the county offer the free immunizations (See information box). Only the Sanford site handles both physicals and inoculations. Physicals cost \$25. Copies of

birth certificates can be made for a fee at the county Health Department. All but the chicken pox immunizations require more than one inoculation, but students can enter kindergarten as long as they complete the first dose, Guzmán said. Many families can mend the situation within a day or two, Wright said. She said she usually has to add two or three more children to each of her five kindergarten classes. "I think every day is important," Chanter said. If a child misses the first few days, they will fall behind, she said. "It puts them behind in many ways." Parent information, for example, is sent home at the beginning of the year, she said. She has seen some children delayed from the start of school as much as two weeks. At that point, they have missed about a third of the time for their first progress report. The prognosis appears critical again this year. Five kindergarten classes are planned at Lake Mary, but none

are currently full, meaning a lot of registration still needs to occur. "It makes it hard to plan," Wright said. As of last week, Chanter said she had 60-plus young people registered for kindergarten. That is just a little more than half of the normal 120 or so that usually start school, she said. School begins Aug. 2. Pinecrest is one of three Northeast cluster schools along with Hamilton and Midway elementaries. Northwest cluster schools are Idyllwild, Bentley, Wicklow, and Wilson elementaries. Anyone wanting to attend these schools must start registration at the Choices office at the Educational Support Center on Lake Mary Boulevard. Parents will have to fill out a request form ranking the schools of their choice, said Leslie Reilly, coordinator of the Choices Department. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. A computer program assigns the student to a school. A letter is generated in 10 days to two weeks, Reilly

said. "Then the parents can go to the school to complete registration," she said. "Our office chooses the school, but we do not do enrollment." Time grows short, but the schools stand ready with what-

ever cure will remedy parents' frustration levels. "We do whatever we can to help them," Chanter said.

Cherish freedom

It wasn't difficult to determine what I would write for this column. Naturally, with this weekend's observance of Independence Day, it's only logical that I reflect on it.

This Sunday, we observe the 228th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. That term alone is in error. The Declaration was actually signed on Aug. 2, 1776, but on July 4th, it was approved by voice vote by Congress. One delegate, Thomas McKean of Delaware, didn't sign it until 1777, - but that's a minor situation.

Each year at this time, my family and I watch our video tape of the musical, "1776". While it shows Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and others in song and dance routines, it is still filled with factual information.

For those who haven't seen the musical, Tom Jefferson, who did most of the drafting of the declaration, spent a great deal of his time playing the violin. John Adams occupied his time talking to his wife Abigail, who appeared to him in spirit, and urged him on to fight for independence from Britain.

Ben Franklin, suffering from gout, was depicted as quite a self-centered man, who liked to chase women.

Of major interest however, is the changes in the document, forced by representatives of Pennsylvania, South Carolina and other states. One insisted that references to the elimination of slavery be deleted. Others objected to referring to the British as tyrants. As a result, line after line was struck out of the document. It leads one to believe, that had it been approved as Jefferson originally presented it - we may have had a much different nation from the very start. It took many decades to put what was deleted back into the laws of our land.

One flaw in the production centered on Caesar Rodney of Delaware. In the musical, he was a very sickly old gentleman, near death, but coming in at the last minute to give Delaware a plurality in the voting. According to history however, he was actually 48 years old when he signed the declaration. When the U.S. started re-making 25 cent pieces recently, Rodney was shown on horseback in the Delaware quarter, and was said to have been a hero in the Revolutionary War. One can only wonder about the difference. Oh well, I guess that's literary license.

Regardless, if you can obtain a copy of 1776, spend some time watching it. It's entertaining but it's informative as well, and at times, heart-wrenching, especially with the song "Does Anybody Care", concerning General George Washington's plea for help from Congress, and another number, "Hey Mama, Look Sharp", about a mother searching for her son who was killed in battle.

July 4th is Independence Day - a time to reflect on all of the people who were responsible for the freedoms we have, especially those in the armed forces. The signing of the Declaration brought about the Revolutionary War (which was already underway at the time). While it was often brother against brother, as was the Civil War, this one was responsible for the establishment of the United States of America under our own government. As such, it should be remembered as a freedom war and treated as such.

Be cautious however. Independence Day is NOT a time to have a few too many drinks, beat up on the wife or kids, or get involved in an accident on land or on the water.

Enjoy the day with your family, and have a good time celebrating our freedom. But whatever you do, take a few moments to think about the independence we have in 2004 and where we might be if we didn't have our freedoms.

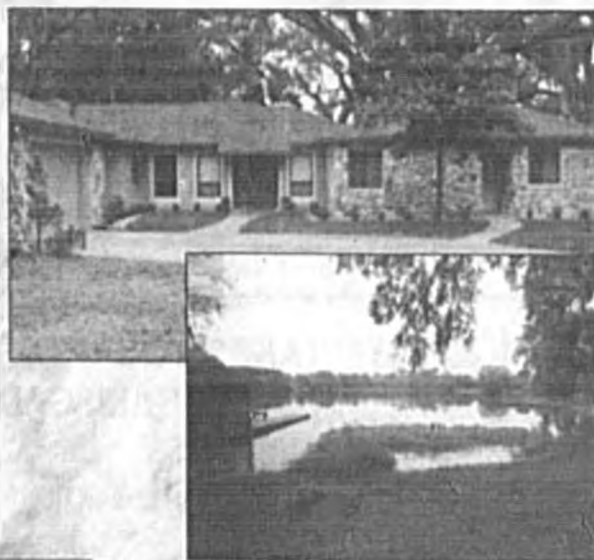

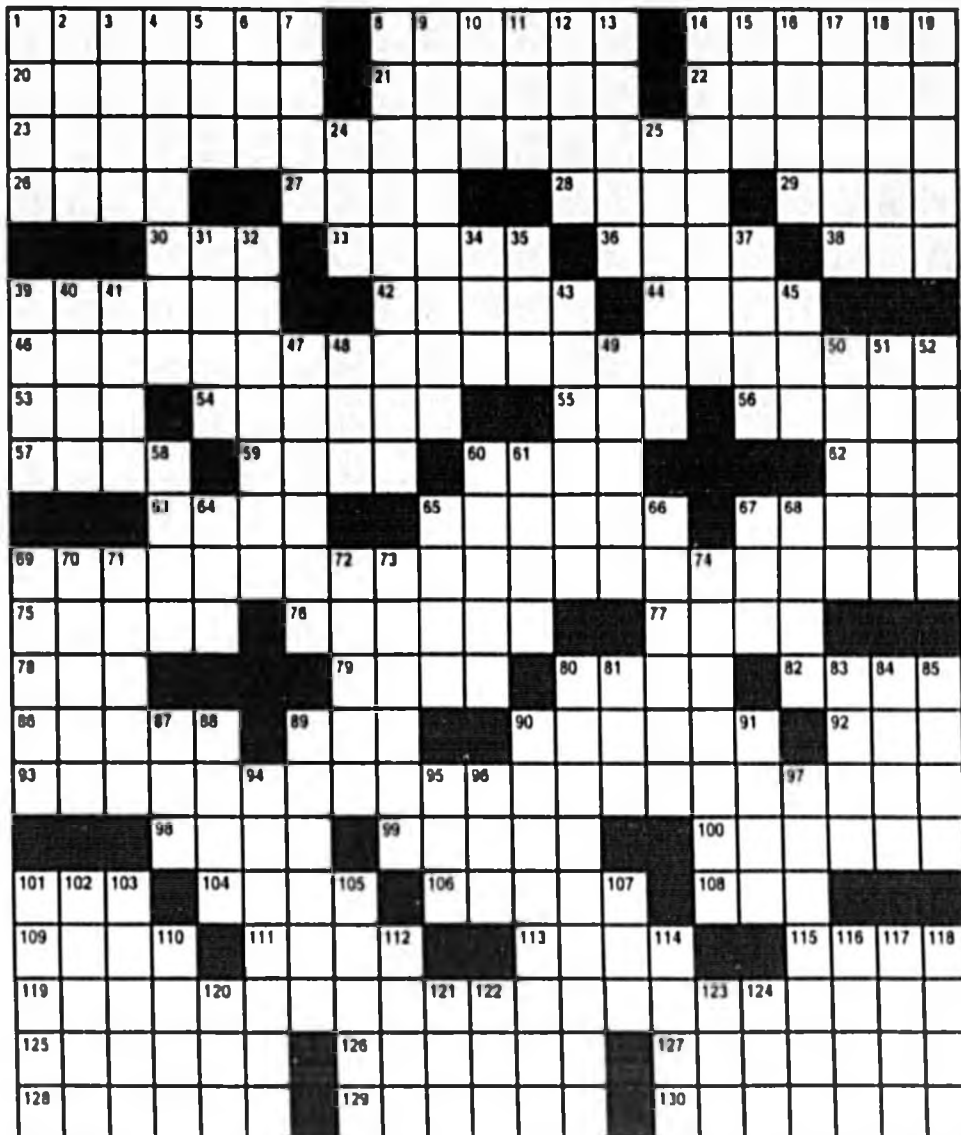

The goggles are used in the traffic and DUI enforcement portion of the academy. The device simulates various stages of impairment, as the wearer would feel if they drank too much. Class members wear the goggles and try to walk or drive a golf cart, according to a July 1 new release.

The purpose of the Community Law Enforcement Academy is to educate citizens of Seminole county in the concepts and procedures of law enforcement.

The course also includes riding on patrol with a deputy, observing the communications center as well as a morning on the gun range using Sheriff's Office weapons.

Applications are being accepted for the 15-week course. The class meets Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Members of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office teach the free course. There are no physical require-

ments to participate, the news release said.

Participants must live or work in Seminole County. They must be at least 19 years old and possess a valid drivers' license. Convicted felons cannot take part. Participants must file an application with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

At the first Seminole High School Band Parents Association meeting on Sept. 22, presided over by Martin Stinecpher, the members voted to accept the bid for the band's appearance at the King Rex Mardi Gras Parade in New Orleans. What is good about the Village of Geneva this week is that one young girl here is bold enough to go out into the world and say "enough is enough" when it comes to the selection of clothing available at local retail outlets and paraded around campuses by teen girls who follow the trend that says "less is better" when it comes to clothing.

This 15-year-old is circulating a petition to appeal to fashion designers and merchandisers to provide young buyers with greater choices in their clothing purchases by offering an expanded array of modest style casual, semi-formal and formal attire.

Those who have stepped onto middle or high school grounds lately, or attended a homecoming or prom in the last few years, can perhaps understand her cause.

Sexy halter-tops, skin tight tank tops, bare midriff shirts, cheek-showing shorts and everything-showing skirts have become the norm there (even though the administration will tell you that such items are against dress code), in part because that is what is marketed and sold to the 10-and-up crowd as "fashion."

Says the petition being presented by this high-schooler: "We, the undersigned, are a part of a ground-swell movement around the world who desire to find more

modest fashions in department stores.

"We support the youth in our community who are striving to uphold modest standards. We urge you to stock and display more clothing that covers the midriff, bust, shoulders, back, legs to the knees and clothing that shows respect for the body. Please consider the needs of a significant portion of the fashion market when designing and buying your lines of clothing."

Hundreds of signatures have so far been collected at area churches, picnics, club meetings and other public gatherings, and the name gathering effort will continue until the end of July. At that time the petitions will be sent to the Atlanta area where many department stores are headquartered.

They will be presented to fashion industry executives there in the hopes that they will come to understand that the body-displaying outfits currently offered do not necessarily represent what the quiet majority of young women really want to wear.

An additional online effort has been

launched so that individuals wishing to add their names to the list of modesty promoting public can simply visit www.goodworks.net and www.ldstoday.com/petition and support this "cover up."

"I hope people will want to sign this and help our cause," said the petition totting teen, who wishes to remain nameless in this column. "It's so hard to shop and find something that I feel comfortable wearing and that doesn't have to be altered to make it decent. Finding an appropriate dress for the prom and other dances is impossible."

Our Geneva gal is not alone in her sentiments. A group of Kansas teens have also taken a stand on the latest sexy fashion trends by organizing a campaign to bring more modest clothes to their local department store racks.

The young women there decided to take action last December after repeated shopping trips for formal dresses failed to yield them modest, yet stylish, clothes. One of their mothers decided to voice her concerns to Nordstrom's customer service desk and was surprised when they asked the girls to put together a presentation and include some examples of dresses they considered modest.

The girls spent four months researching, preparing the presentation, designing and making dresses and lining up the

fashion show.

In an April meeting with a Nordstrom store manager, clothes buyer and other store executives, the girls presented their ideas in bound folders as well as by modeling dresses that defined their interpretation of modest styles that they wished they could find in department stores.

Reports of the fashion show at *The Kansas City Star* and the story was picked up by the Associated Press, Knight Ridder and *New York Times* wire services. As a result, 90 minutes of a Kansas City talk radio program was devoted to discussing the topic of modest clothes and two of the girls were interviewed by the BBC in London.

Church to celebrate move to Sanford

SANFORD — On Sunday, July 4, a free community barbeque at noon and church dedication service at 3 p.m. will celebrate the miraculous purchase of City Church's new home at 650 E. Airport Blvd.

The miracle started four months ago when the church board placed a bid on the property — without a dollar in the bank towards the project. When the bid was accepted, the 250-plus member church needed a \$125,000 down payment within three months.

Earlier that year, the board promised to build a church in Mexico and needed an additional \$14,000 for building supplies and the trip. Other members were heading to Africa to visit 15 cities and assist a missionary to buy a brick-making machine so laborers could to build a church and a home for 26 AIDS orphans.

"God is the God of the impossible," said Pastor Eugene Smith, who wasted no time preaching faith and encouraging the congregation to believe God for all three needs.

By Easter, the church had raised about \$75,000 and the youth planned a car wash. In addition, funds were received from other churches and individuals in and beyond Central Florida. Materials and services to upgrade the building arrived from area business owners and ministries. With all the funds in, the church closed on the property on May 28 and the next day Smith and seven members left for Mexico while those who went to Africa traveled home. God had provided miracles for all three churches.

Smith and his wife, Laura, came from Seattle, Wash., to Central Florida with two other couples to start the church five years ago. At its first service, there were more paid nursery workers than attendees.

The first three years were spent in two different Altamonte Springs movie theaters and, at times, in clubhouses, hotel rooms and parks for mid-week services.

The next year, the church moved to a huge storefront in Longwood where the church quickly grew. While church buses

gathered neighborhood children on Sunday mornings, adults expanded food and clothing give-away programs to those in need.

As the church focused on praying for and helping others, miracles began happening — healings, salvation of loved ones and financial blessings.

In August 2003, a miracle happened that would continue to ignite a passion for helping others. Kim James, who attended the church a few times, called requesting prayer for a friend's son, Bob Jones, 20.

Jones had been out the night before with friends using Oxycotin, Zanax and cocaine when he stopped breathing. When his friends couldn't revive him, they disagreed about what to do. By the time they dropped him off at a hospital, 45 minutes had passed. Jones was put on life-support and his family was given no hope.

Smith and other members visited Jones and his family every day for the next week. Smith, who had recently lost his father to illness, prayed for a miracle, but knew the reality if one didn't happen.

The next Sunday, Smith ended his sermon about The Miracles of God early, told the congregation about Jones and asked them to pray.

"One day this week when I

looked at Bob, I saw my own son's face," Smith told the congregation as tears fell and his voice began to break. "Pray for Bob as if this were your own son, your own child. Without a miracle, this kid won't make it."

At the exact moment the church prayed for him (with his family who were at church that Sunday), Jones woke up from the drug-induced coma and sat up in his hospital bed to the shock and awe of the six trauma team doctors who happened to be at Jones' bedside. Jones would live and not die.

Thankfully, God granted another miracle. By Wednesday, Jones was in church with his mother, albeit, a little unsteady on his feet and with limited speech due to minor throat problems, but with no brain damage at all.

While the church has also been unsteady on its feet at times with four moves in three years, members are excited about joining other great churches in Sanford. Besides their regular outreach programs, the church is starting a pre-school for children ages 2-4 and a school of music to teach children how to play musical instruments.

Sanford will be well represented when the inaugural Florida Collegiate Summer League All-Star Game is contested at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium Sunday.

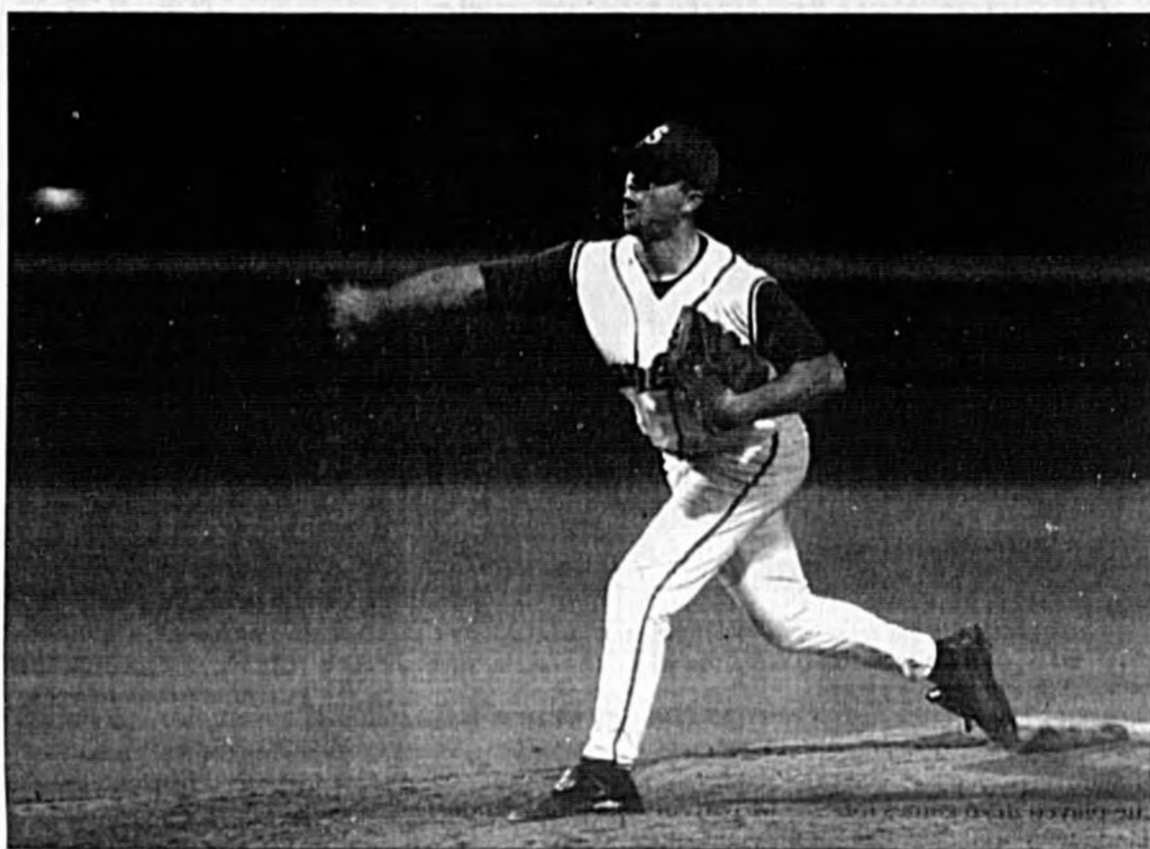

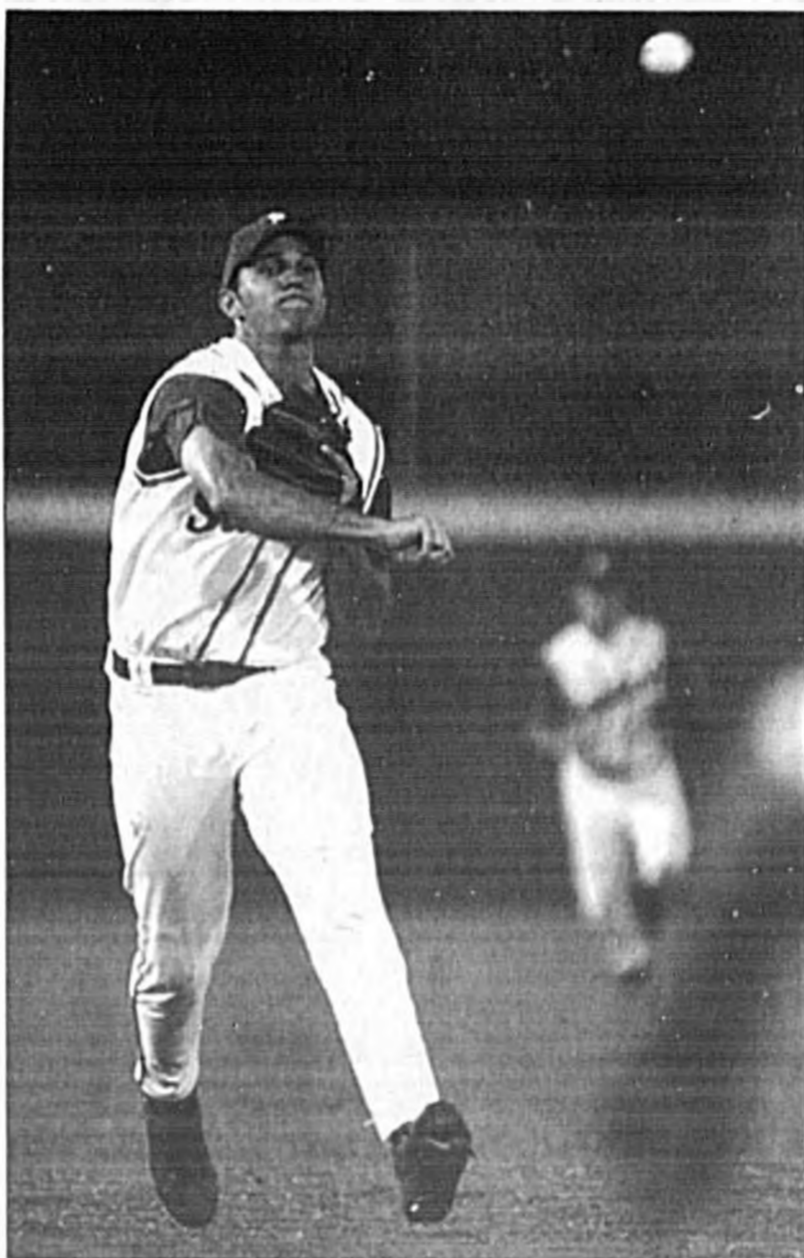

The Orlando Magic have acquired NBA All-Star guard Steve Francis, guard Cuttino Mobley and center Kelvin Cato from the Houston Rockets in exchange for guards Tracy McGrady, Tyronn Lue and Reece Gaines, and forward Juwan Howard, General Manager John Weisbrod announced Tuesday.

Francis ranked among NBA

leaders in minutes played (T-4th), assists (9th), steals (9th) and scoring (38th).

A three-time NBA All-Star, Francis joined Oscar Robertson, Magic Johnson and Grant Hill as the only players in NBA history to average 15 points, five rebounds and five assists in each of their first five seasons. He has played in 374 regular season games during his NBA career, all with Houston, and averaged 19.3 ppg., 6.4 apg., 6.1 rpg. and 1.63 stpg. in 39.6 minpg. Francis has recorded 78 career double-doubles and six triple-doubles during his career.

In 2002-03, Francis and Minnesota's Kevin Garnett were the only two players in the NBA to average at least

Jeff Gordon won his third straight NASCAR NEXTEL Cup Series pole and the 50th of his career by turning a fast lap of 188.659 mph in his No. 24 DuPont/Pepsi Chevrolet on Thursday during Circle K Pole Qualifying Night at historic Daytona International Speedway. Gordon will lead the 43-car field to the green flag for Saturday's 46th annual Pepsi 400.

"I'll tell you what," Gordon, who's car is crew chiefed by Lake Brantley graduate Robbie Loomis, said after his lap. "This team is on a roll right now. I hope we can hang on to it. The car was good at practice. That was certainly a great lap. We unloaded and the thing was really stout."

Sharing the front row with Gordon is 2002 Pepsi 400 champion Michael Waltrip, who posted a lap of 188.620 mph in the No. 15 NAPA Auto Parts Chevrolet. Ricky Rudd (188.620), Dale Jarrett (188.328) and 2004 Daytona 500 champion Dale Earnhardt Jr. (187.939) round out the top five.

"We were able to pick up," Waltrip said. "That's really difficult to do. You know when you're practicing, your temperatures are all hot and you have a tendency to get some drafting help and so when you go out by yourself after sitting for three or four hours, it's a real testament to the team."

Said Rudd: "We're actually a little bit quicker than practice, so we're really happy. They had it cranked up here tonight. At Talladega we sat on the pole there, so I knew we could be a factor. We were seventh or eighth in practice and we ran good. I'm a little disappointed we didn't get the pole, but heck, with the way our season has gone so far this is the next best thing."

Scott Riggs, driver of the No. 10 Valvoline Chevrolet, was the top rookie qualifier with a seventh-place effort at a speed of 187.868 mph.

Other notables in qualifying included 2003 Pepsi 400 champion Greg Biffle (ninth), Kevin

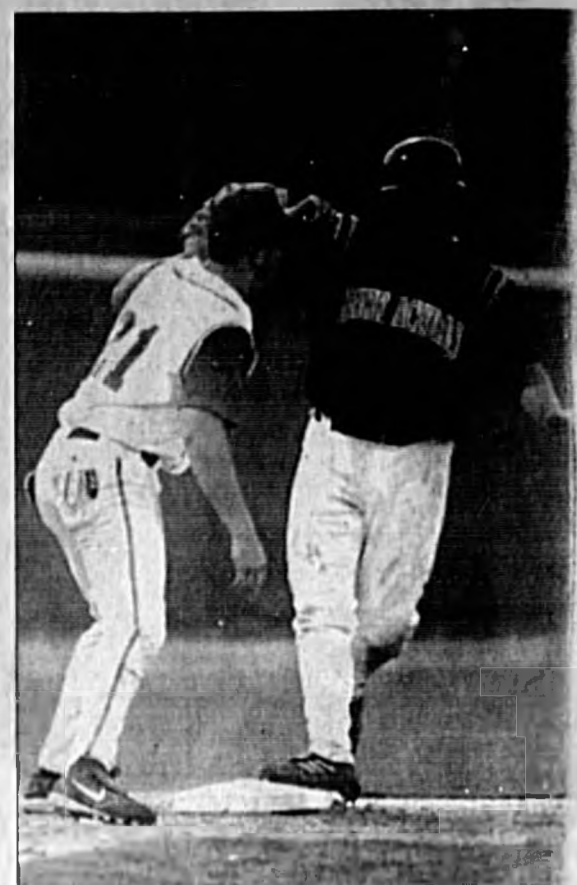
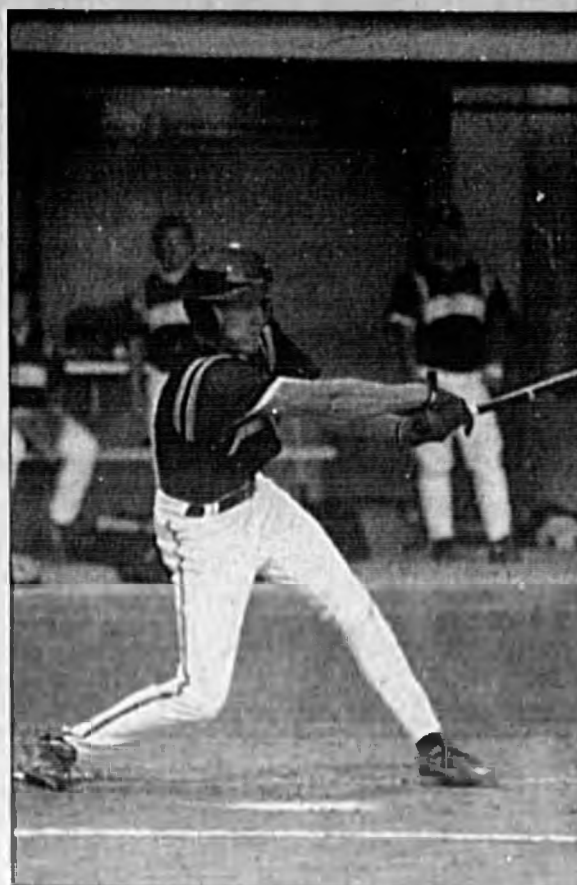

 20.0 ppg., 6.0 rpg. and 6.0 apg. On Jan. 17, 2003 vs. the L.A. Lakers, he scored a career-high 44 points and added 11 assists, becoming the first player in Rockets history to record 40 points and 10 assists in the same game. During the 2000-01 season, Francis became the first Rockets player and 18th player in NBA history to lead his team in total points, rebounds and assists. He was named the 1999-2000 NBA Co-Rookie of the Year, sharing the honor with Elton Brand and was a unanimous selection for the 1999-2000 NBA All-Rookie First Team.

Mobley (6'4", 215, 9/1/75) appeared and started in 80 games last season for Houston, averaging 15.8 ppg., 4.5 rpg., 3.2 apg. and 1.34 stlpg. in a team-high-tying 40.4 minpg. He also played in five playoff outings vs. the L.A. Lakers, averaging 14.4 ppg., 4.8 rpg. and 2.8 apg. in 42.0 minpg. Mobley ranked among NBA leaders in minutes played (T-4th), steals (23rd), three-point field goal percentage (.390, T-24th) and free throw percentage (.811, 40th).

Mobley has played in 436 regular season games during his NBA career, all with Houston, averaging 17.1 ppg., 4.0 rpg., 2.7 apg. and 1.21 stlpg. in 37.5 minpg. In Rockets history, he ranks second in three-pointers made (672), seventh in steals (526), eighth in minutes played (16,343), ninth in scoring (7,448 points) and 10th in three-point field goal percentage (.372, 672-1,807).

Among the players from the 1998 NBA Draft class, Mobley ranks fifth in total points, trailing only Paul Pierce, Vince Carter, Dirk Nowitzki and Antawn Jamison. He finished second in voting to Rodney Rogers for the 1999-2000 NBA Sixth Man Award and was named to the 1998-99 NBA All-Rookie Second Team.

Cato (6'11", 275, 8/26/74) played in 69 games last season for Houston, making 67 starts. He averaged 6.1 ppg., 6.8 rpg., 1.0 apg. and 1.39 blkpg. in 25.3 minpg. Cato ranked second on the Rockets in rebounding and blocked shots. He also appeared in five playoff outings vs. the L.A. Lakers, averaging 5.8 ppg., 6.8 rpg. and 1.00 stlpg. in 29.6 minpg. while shooting .591 from the floor.

He led Orlando in rebounding, while finishing second on the team in scoring and minutes played.

Lue played in 76 games for Orlando (69 starts), averaging

career-highs of 10.5 ppg., 4.2 apg. and 2.5 rpg. in 30.7 minpg. He led the Magic and tied for 29th in the NBA in three-point field goal percentage, shooting .383 (80-209).

Gaines appeared in 38 games for Orlando, averaging 1.8 ppg., 1.1 apg. and 1.0 rpg. in 9.6 minpg. during his rookie campaign.

Injuries from lightning more likely in July

Over the past week, Seminole County has suffered significant damage due to thunderstorms and lightning.

Last week, at least five homes were damaged and many roadways closed due to lightning strikes and downbursts of winds. More people die from lightning strikes in Florida every year, than in any other state, and July is statistically the worst month for lightning deaths Florida.

With many outdoor activities taking place during the afternoon and evening, a prime time for summer thunderstorms, local residents should take precautions.

Being safe from lightning is all about being in the right place. The most likely place to be struck by lightning in Florida is near water. Group sporting events such as baseball, football and soccer are particularly hazardous. If you can see lightning or hear thunder, even in the distance, you are in danger. Go indoors or into a vehicle and remain there until 30 minutes after the last thunder is heard.

Actions you can take to remain safe include:

- Avoid open high ground and isolated large trees.
- Avoid water (swimming pools, lakes and rivers), beaches and boats.
- Seek shelter inside a building or an automobile.
- Stay away from doors, windows, and metal objects such as pipes or faucets.
- Stay off the telephone and away from electrical devices.
- Monitor NOAA Weather Radio.

New law does little to protect children

WINTER SPRINGS — A new law that takes effect Oct. 1 will severely limit where convicted sex offenders on conditional release can live in Seminole County, but it will do little to further protect children.

"To be honest it's really not going to make any difference," said Stephen Holmes, an associate professor of criminal justice at the University of Central Florida. "Unfortunately it will just force the county to move bus stops

around."

Holmes is co-author of "Sex Crimes: Pattern and Behavior" and several other books on the subject.

Current Florida law states that sex offenders under conditional release cannot live within 1,000 feet of a school, day care center, park, playground or any place where children congregate.

The new law will extend that provision to include public school bus stops. "There are very few places that these people can live," said Glen Hammer, supervisor of routes and

scheduling for the Seminole County Public Schools Transportation Department.

Seminole County has about 12,000 school bus stops, he said.

In considering the law, Hammer created a map showing county roads in blue. On top of the roads he placed green circles representing a 2,000-foot diameter at each bus stop.

The result shows only a dozen or so areas that would fit the criteria for a conditional release sex offender to live. In many cases, the areas are rural and there are no apartments or homes in

which to live.

Conditional release simply refers to the terms under which the prisoner was released. The law defines which crimes will have the new law applied, said Debbie Buchanan, spokeswoman for the Florida Department of Corrections.

"We're all going to have to work together to enforce the law," Buchanan said.

Hammer said the statewide number resulting from the new law will be

A half dozen young people talked about how summer school has helped their education. They are among more than 13,000 Seminole County students to spend part of their summer in the classroom.

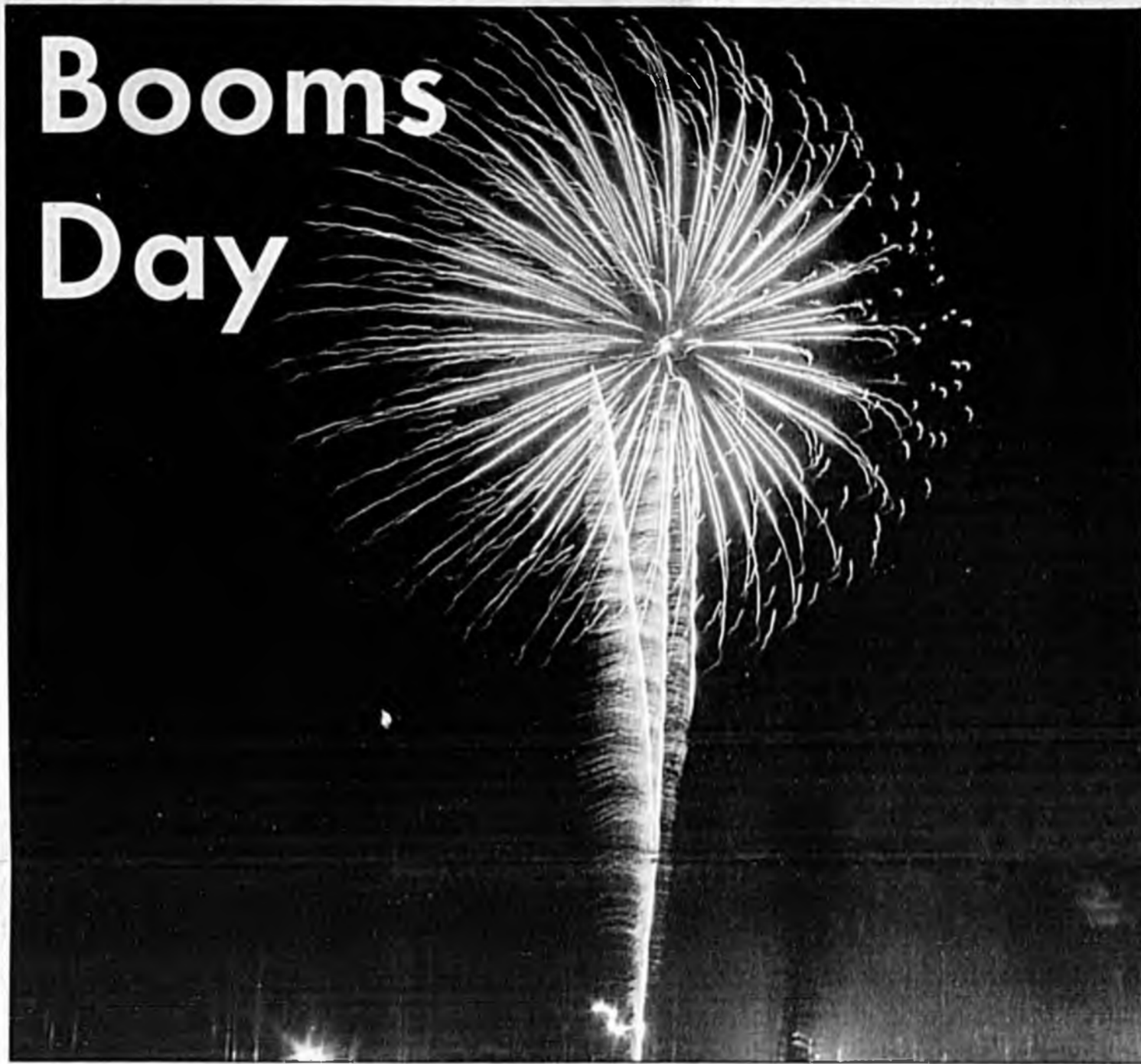

Summer school gives young people a chance to try to improve, to get their credits or to replace a grade, Gaudreux said. "That's how kids get into these activities," he said, listing auto body, TV production, and dance team to name a few.

Alton Hicks, 18, a line-backer for the Lake Mary Rams, said he took geometry this summer even though he didn't have to because he

Football star passes life lessons to youngsters

SANFORD — As a teenager growing up in Sanford, Britt Henderson learned first-hand about the dangers of following the crowd.

While hanging out with his friends one day, he found himself facing an accessory-to-murder charge. One of his friends decided to push a man off his bicycle. The man hit his head on the street's pavement and subsequently died.

Henderson said he had no idea of plans to harass the bicyclist. Because Henderson was with the boys, however, he and the other teenagers were arrested and charged in the man's death.

Henderson fought the case in court and won. He took advantage of his second chance.

He finished high school and earned a football scholarship at Savannah State University where he became a Division II All-American free safety. He led the nation in interceptions.

He left college early to play professionally for the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League. He later returned to Savannah State to complete his degree.

Today, he is back home in Sanford.

For the past eight months he has worked as director of the Boys and Girls Club, where he shares his life experiences with young people in hopes of directing them to the path of success.

Henderson also serves as assistant football coach at Seminole High School. He takes a group from the high school each year to visit Savannah State trying to inspire them to attend college.

Not only does he inspire teenagers, Henderson also gives pre-teens a boost of confidence.

At the Boys and Girls Club Summer Camp, young people are learning life skills, such as self-control. Through
