# County Growing, Prosperous

That Was The Year

## By JANE CASSELBERRY

Seminole County kicked off the new decade of the '70s with a continued growth and prosperity not evident in many parts of the nation, where the current inflationary recession is being reflected in cutbacks and unemployment. Many of the projects and goals long sought for have been fulfilled in the past year or are now within our grasp. But we have to take the bitter with the sweet and predictably accidents and crime also have been on the increase

The 1970 census revealed a 50.3 per cent growth in the county over the past 10 years or a current total of 82,656 residents. Altamonte Springs showed a 249 per cent gain and now has 4,225 persons, while Casselberry, the county's second largest municipality, county 7,550 or a gain of 207 per cent. Population in North Orlando went up 88 per cent to 1,142, and in Longwood 84 per cent to 3,108. Sanford with a population of 17,210 showed a loss over 1960 and protested in vain. Oviedo with 1,875 also showed a decrease.

## Clear Air Bill

Tough is the word for the compromise air pollution abatement bill which has received the final approval of Congress. It is doubtful if any piece of environmental legislation to emerge so far stands to have a greater impact on American industry and on our population at

The mandate to Congress to write stern legislation on this subject was clear. The time for talk about our dirty air is past. Yet meeting its own challenge Congress has created new ones for government, industry and the public.

In demanding that auto manufacturers come up by 1975 with cars that produce virtually no pollution, the government is assuming the unprecedented power to shut down production lines in one of our basic industries if the reouirement is not met.

Only the ingenuity of Detroit engneers now stands in the way of what could be an agonizing confrontation between the governmen acting in the public's behalf, and the interests of millions of employes and shareholders who make up a broad segment of that same public

Presuming that auto makers can meet their deadline, and there is reason to believe they can, we are faced with a further problem that is now only vaguely discernible - providing for the servicing and enforcement necessary to assure that smog-free cars designed by Detroit continue to perform as they are supposed to after they reach the highway.

The legislation also gives the government broad new powers to demand a reduction in air pollution from factories and other stationary sources. The effect this will have on the price of many goods and services is obvious, underscoring the fact that clean air in our industrialized society cannot be achieved without paying a price.

Another new power is given to the public itself. The way is cleared for individuals or groups of citizens to bring legal action seeking to force compliance with anti-pollution standards. Certainly this power will have to be used with responsibility if it is not to lead to litigation that is more of a nuisance than a legitimate expression of public concern.

In all, this new legislation is strong medicine. It must therefore be administered judiciously. Cypress Creek is to be a private club available to Orlando residents. Special provisions for non-residents are also avail-able. Membership will be in a non-equity basis only. Guests will be permitted only when playing with a member.

In addition to a super championship 18-hole golf course, Cypress Creek provides other recreational opportunities for its members. Complementing a beautiful modern elubhouse is a unique Y-shaped swimming pool. Four tennis courts have also been built. Breakfast and lunch can be enjoyed in the clubhouse, or you may relax in the bar and grill.

I believe that we can look toward Cypress Creek's becoming one of Florida's finest golf courses. This could be the spot for some top golf events.
