

HAPPENINGS DURING THE WEEK

Here the Readers Will Find a Brief filstorical Spring Flowing For Hurrled Readers

Gold medals have been presented by the Aero Club of America to Wilbur and Orville Wright, the American aviators, as a token of highest regard for the successful building of a practical flying machine. The presentation was made last week in Washington by President Taft in the presence of a large number of distinguished statesmen, diplomats, scientists, aeronauta, aviators, and citizens generally.

Contracts have been let for the conatruction of four torpedoboat destroyers for the U.S. navy, with a speed of 291/4 knots an hour.

On the night of June 10, the Spanish steamship Autonio Lopez, went ashore off Fire Island. Her 526 passengers were safely landed.

Queensboro bridge over the East river at'Blackwell's Island, was formally opened to the public June 12. The construction has taken eight years, and it is the largest public cantilever bridge in the world. WORKING A BUNCO GAME

Same Old' Spanish Trick Tried On A Sanford Man

The following letter was received by Harry Wray, the Jeweler:

Madrid, Màrch 23, 1909,

Dear Sir: Although I know you only from good references of your honesty my sad situation compels me to reveal you an important affair in which you can procure a fortune, saving at the same time that of my dear daughter. I charge you absolute reserve about this affair.

Before being imprisoned here I was established as a banker in Russia as you will see by the enclosed article about me of many English newspapers which have published my arrest in London."

I beseech you to help me to obtain a sum of \$480,000 I have in America and to come here to raise the seizure of my baggage paying to the court the expenses of my trial and recover my portmantequa containing a secret pocket where I have hidden the document indispensable to recover the said sum.







Turpentine Goes Higher

Steady and continued improvement in the naval stores market has been noticeable for the past two or three weeks, and last week spirits of turpentine reached the highest point it has attained for more than eighteen months. During the past week the advance on spirits has been especially rapid, quotations at Savannah Friday being at 40 1-2 cents per gallon, and Saturday 42 1-2 cents.

"There has been a considerable reduction in receipts during the months of April and May, as compared with the same months of 1908. Savannah up to the 10th, was 21,064 casks of turpentine. behind her receipts of 1908. Against this Jacksonville and Fernandina received 3,356 casks more than the same period of 1908. Receipts at Pensacola for the same time are off about 2,000 casks, while information from Mobile, Gulfport and New Orleans is to the effect that receipts are also lighter there.



Turpentine Goes Higher

Steady and continued improvement in the naval stores market has been noticeable for the past two or three weeks, and last week spirits of turpentine reached the highest point it has attained for more than eighteen months. During the past week the advance on spirits has been especially rapid, quotations at Savannah Friday being at 40 1-2 cents per gallon, and Saturday 42 1-2 cents.

"There has been a considerable reduction in receipts during the months of April and May, as compared with the same months of 1908. Savannah up to the 10th, was 21,064 casks of turpentine behind her receipts of 1908. Against this Jacksonville and Fernandina received 3,356 casks more than the same period of 1908. Receipts at Pensacola for the same time are off about 2,000 casks, while information from Mobile, Gulfport and New Orleans is to the effect that receipts are also lighter there.
