RESOLUTIONS

Resolved, That the mayor and city clerk are hereby authorized to execute the contract with the Sanford Light & Fuel Co. for lighting the city of Sanford.

Resolved, That the sanitary committee be instructed and authorized to have such wells and flush basins put in as are necessary to keep sewers in a healthy condition.

Resolved, That the street committee be instructed and authorized to receive bids and execute contract with lowest bidder to put down well at the intersection of Commercial street and Park avenue and Second street and Palmetto avenue, with basin suitable at the latter place for watering stock and each well fitted with pipes adapted to filling water wagon used for sprinkling streets.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the bills for vouchers attached, approved by president of city council and

finance committee be paid. Moved, seconded and carried that council adjourn.

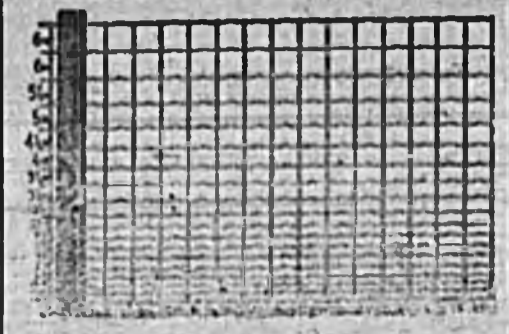

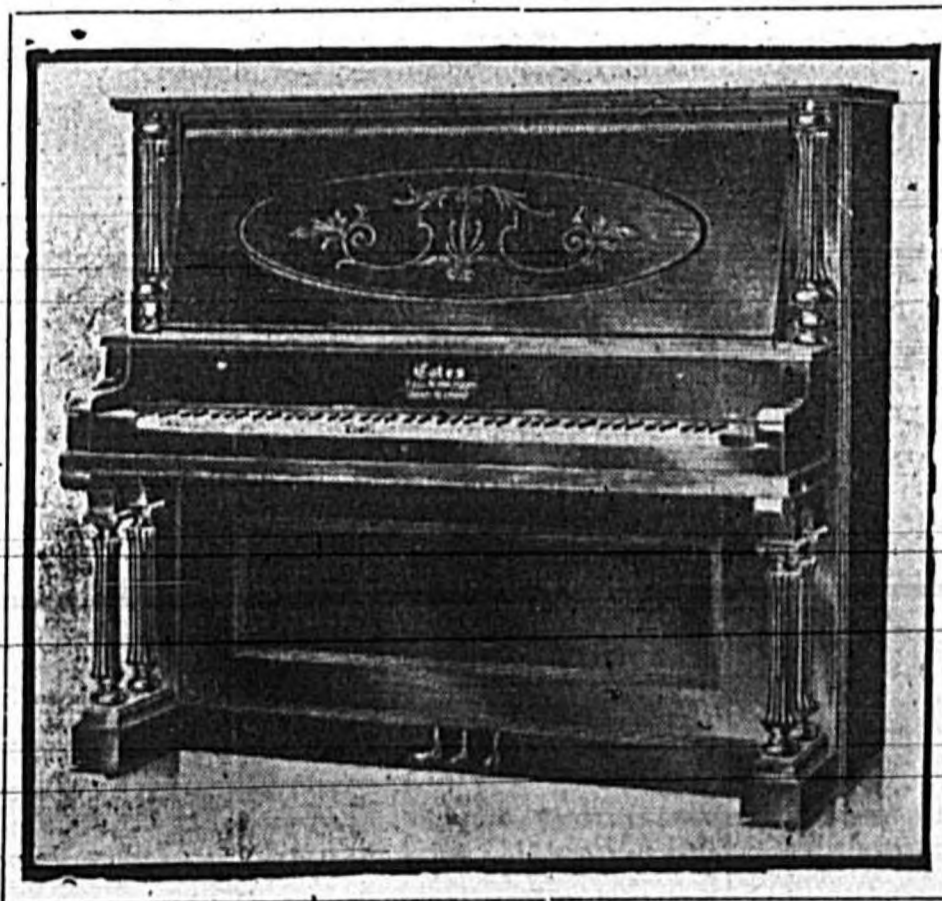

Three Interesting Games Are Played With The Ocala Team

Monday's Game

If anyone has any doubts along this line he should have been at the new ball grounds Monday afternoon and witnessed the daylight pyrotechnics that were let off. There certainly was something doing when the Ocala bunch of ball tossers locked horns with the Sanford bundle.

The weather was of the quality that makes the tallow drip, and the attendance of fans and fannibelles was of the kind that encourages good ball playing, and tends to make the game interesting. The game itself was sort of a double-headed surprise to everybody in more ways than one. The knocker was relieved of his little hammer, and the doubter had to go way back and occupy a seat in the shade of his thoughts. Of course, everybody who browses on celery at a well-appointed dinner, wanted to see the home team win, but from the way things had been going since the season opened, some had misgivings. True lovers of the sport expected to see the boys put up a winning game, and they were not disappointed. It was a big crowd, a motley crowd, that greeted the players when the umpire called play ball.

Up to the seventh inning the Ocala gentlemen had displayed their generosity to their Sanford friends by presenting them with six beautiful large-sized swan's eggs of royal pedigree. At this stage of the game the Sanford players stopped long enough to take an Esquimau lunch (that is, they took up an extra hole in their belts), respectfully declined with thanks any more delicacies for the time being and proceeded to help themselves to one run. This whetted their appetites and in the next inning they helped themselves to five more nice juicy ones, and took one more nibble in the ninth, which evened up the love feast. Then came another display of magnanimity on the part of both teams. Nice fresh swan's eggs were handed out freely up to the end of the fourteenth inning, when Sanford grabbed another run and won the game, which the score said was 8 to 7 in favor of Sanford.

Then everybody went wild with enthusiasm—big and little, old and young, white and black—all stuck to it that they knew our boys could play ball if they had a mind to.

It was a good game all the way through, in fact, it was the only really interesting game played on the home grounds this season. Costly errors were made on both sides, but the few brilliant plays that were made helped to offset them. For once, the home people had no just cause for knocking. There was no wrangling or high kicking, as often happens at ball games; the decisions of the umpire were accepted good-naturedly. It was good ball playing, and the best of it all was the players conducted themselves as gentlemen.

Mansell pitched an excellent game, and it was no fault of his that Sanford did not win. It was a case of everybody playing ball on both teams. There were but few errors. The public should feel that they had received their money's worth.

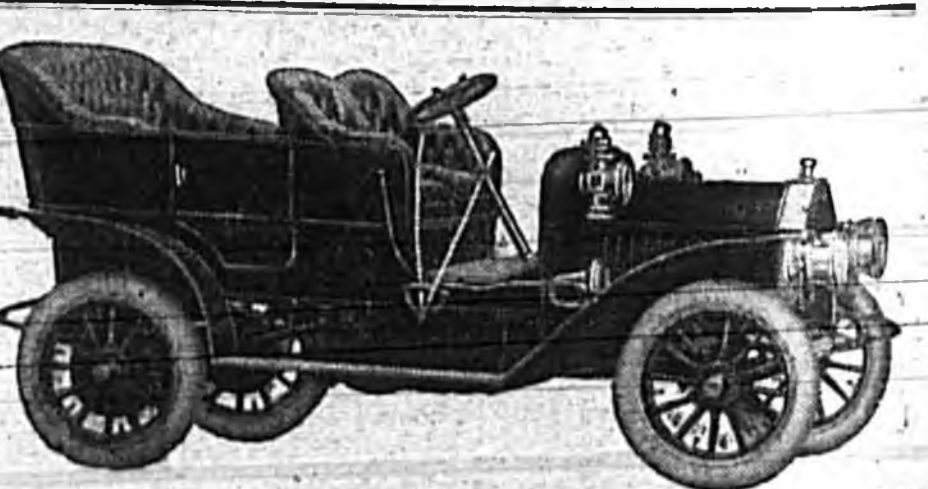

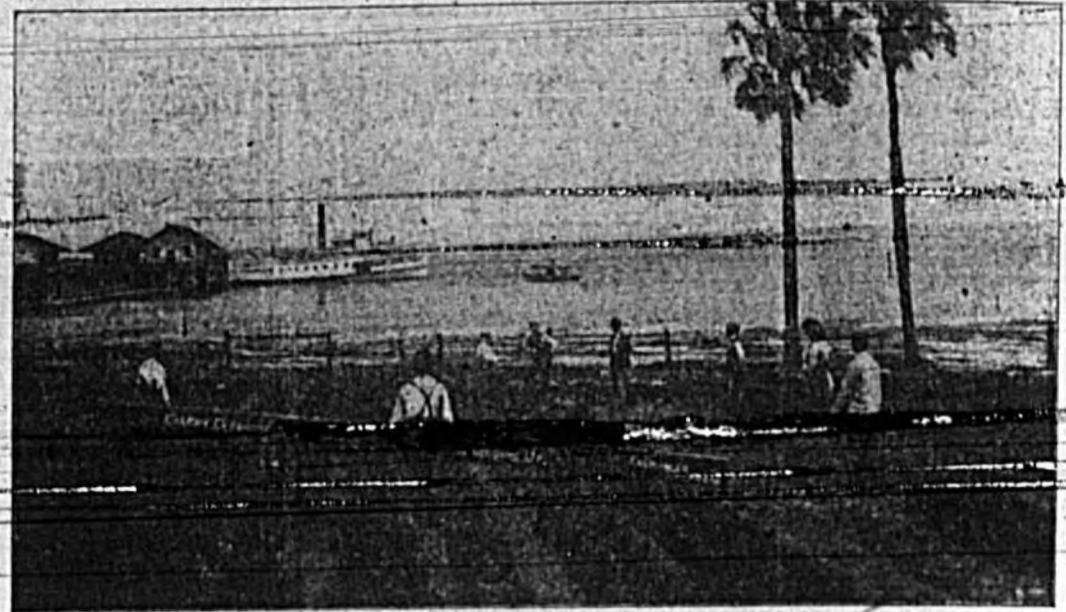
The Title "King."

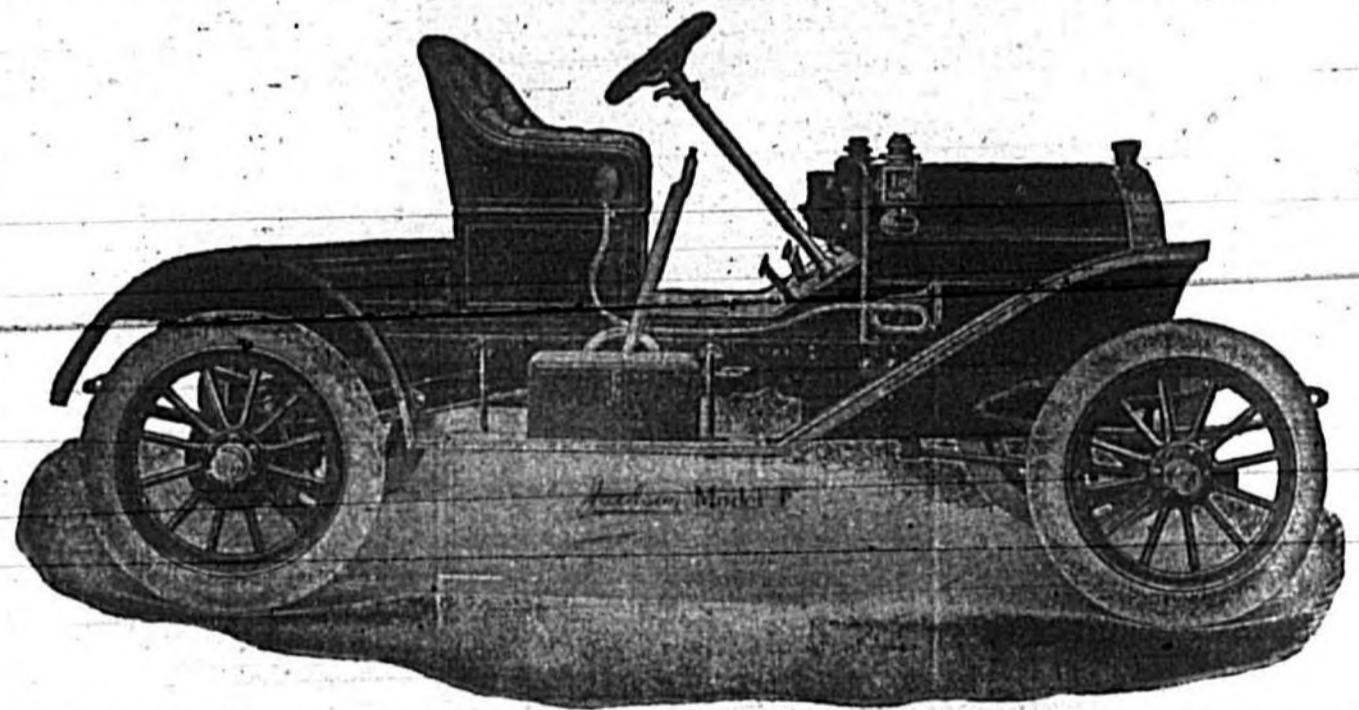

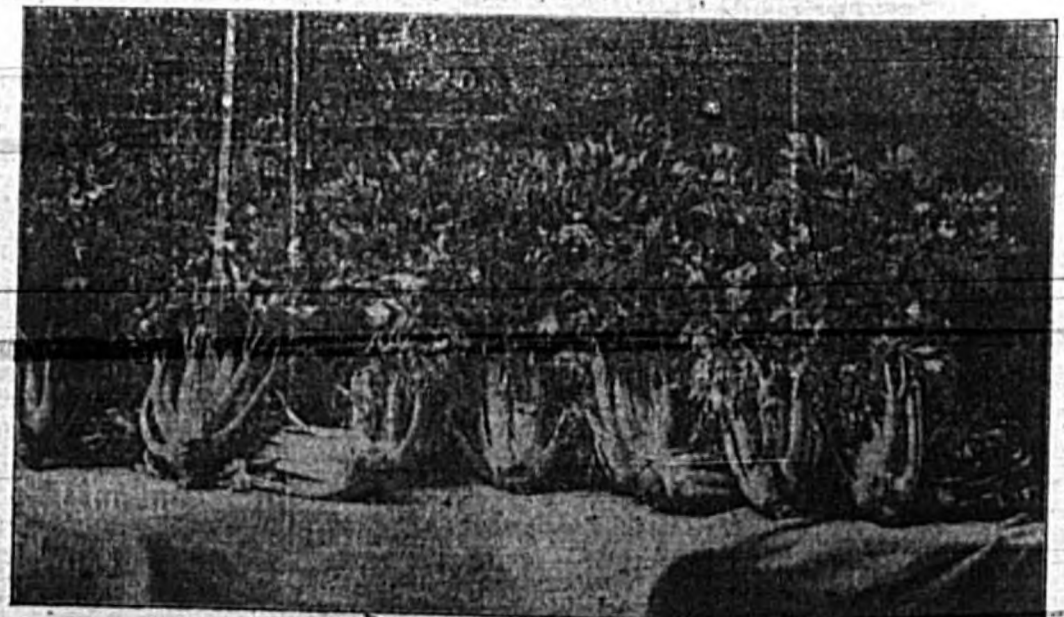

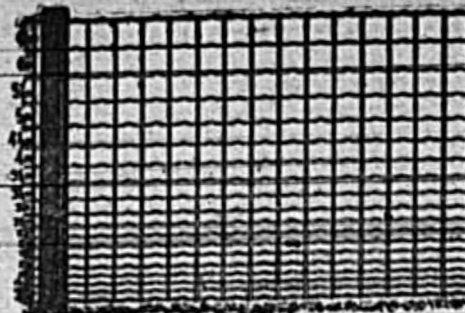
