

# Cold Wave Brings Snow, Winds, Rain

A cold wave, which brought seven-inch snows in Texas and high winds in Mississippi and Georgia, drove deep into Dixie today and eastward across the Appalachians.

Overnight readings plunged to near 15 below zero in northern Minnesota and eastern North Dakota while near zero temperatures chilled northern Illinois, a drop of 20 degrees from the previous night's low.

Wind gusts of 40 miles an hour powered the cold air into the Gulf of Mexico where Jackson, Miss., registered a 35-degree reading

early today after reaching a high of 65 Thursday. Light snow accompanied the cold in Jackson.

In the Texas Panhandle, high winds piled a seven-inch snowfall into drifts. Authorities said roads were open but slick and hazardous. Four inches of snow accumulated at Dalhart and Dumas, Tex. A dense fog which shrouded sections of the East and South in advance of the cold air Thursday played a part in a series of airplane accidents.

At Portland, Conn., a four-engine Air Force C-54 Skymaster crashed in flames during a dense fog Thursday night, killing two of three men aboard. The survivor was hospitalized in serious condition.

An Eastern Air Lines DC7 with 59 persons aboard crashed-landed off a runway in a heavy fog at New Orleans. No one was injured. A fog bank blanketed Moody Air Force Base near Valdosta, Ga., just as three Air Force jets ran out of fuel. Two of the jets landed safely on highways and the third crashed into a farm. The five airmen aboard the planes escaped injury.

Damaging winds also plagued the South Thursday as a small twister was reported near Cumming, Ga., and violent wind gusts damaged 25 homes at Kosciusko, Miss. Gusts of 51 miles an hour hit Atlanta.

Snow was general during the night in the upper Ohio Valley into western New York and northern New England. Heavy rains soaked Alabama, Georgia and Florida with amounts of up to one inch reported at several points.

## Judge To Appear In U. S. Court; Has No Comment

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—Alabama Circuit Judge George Wallace will be required Jan. 25 to show cause why he should not be found in contempt for refusing to surrender voting records to the Civil Rights Commission.

Federal Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. cited Wallace for contempt here Thursday after the Clayton jurist earlier this week handed over the records to grand juries for a local vote fraud investigation.

Wallace refused comment but a spokesman on his behalf said the commission "backed down" on every issue. They came down here arrogantly and have backed down, showing that states' rights have won the issue."

Johnson, a former law school classmate of Wallace at the University of Alabama, ordered the segregationist "to show cause if there be any reason why he should not be found guilty of criminal contempt."

Three times the 39-year-old Wallace refused to honor subpoenas or, as he put it, to "dignify" the commission by appearing before it.

He sidestepped the third order by turning the registration books over to the grand juries of Barbour and Bullock counties. The grand juries allowed commission agents to examine the books.

Wallace could be fined up to \$1,000 or given six months in prison if found guilty of contempt by a jury, or \$300 and 45 days in jail if found guilty by a judge.

## Heart Operation Outcome In Doubt

## Guilt Pleas Made By 2 Ex-Deputies

BARTOW (UPI)—Two former deputies involved in the sensational 1956 Polk County bribe scandal have pleaded guilty to perjury charges.

Rolie Arnold and James L. Busbee, deputies at the time of the scandal, each pleaded guilty Thursday to charges of perjury and conspiracy to commit perjury.

Their cases were referred to a parole officer for a presentence investigation.

The scandal came to light in the May, 1956, Democratic primaries when state Rep. Boone Tillitt Jr. accused state Sen. Harry King of offering him a \$10,000 bribe to withdraw from the Senate race.

King, former Polk County sheriff Pat Gordon, Arnold, Busbee and another deputy were tried and convicted on perjury charges during the investigation. But the state Supreme Court threw out the verdicts on trial technicalities and ordered a new trial.

King won the right to a separate trial which opens next Tuesday.

## Marshall Always Answered Duty Call

Gen. George Catlett Marshall is a man who never could say no to his country when it needed him.

Marshall, who suffered a brain spasm Thursday at his Pinehurst, N. C. winter home, played a prominent role in U. S. affairs first as a military man and then as a statesman and cabinet officer from the years after World War I until his final retirement from public life in 1953.

Although the foundation of his fame rested on military achievement, the 78-year-old Marshall won the Nobel Prize in 1953 for his contributions to peace.

Former President Truman once characterized Marshall as "the greatest living American." Only Thursday, one of Marshall's famed military protégés—President Eisenhower—spoke feelingly of his "almost veneration" of Marshall.

The soft-spoken general directed the greatest array of armed might in military history as army chief of staff during World War II. When the war was won he wanted to rest.

But seven days after his retirement, President Truman asked Marshall to be his personal representative in an effort to end the civil war in China.

After more than a year of patient but futile efforts, Marshall quit his mission in disgust and again sought retirement.

But Truman asked him to become secretary of state. Marshall, always a man of Spartan devotion, could not refuse. It was in this post that he enunciated at Harvard University in 1947 what was to become famed as the "Marshall Plan," later credited with saving Europe from economic chaos and Communist domination after World War II.

With the Marshall Plan doing his work, the general once again resigned and returned to the quiet of his tree-shaded home at Leesburg, Va. He wanted only to tend his garden and rest.

But there was no rest for Marshall.

Named Defense Secretary, he was called back into harness as secretary of defense when troops of Communist North Korea invaded South Korea and the United States went to the aid of that threatened little democracy. After

whipping the country's armed forces into fighting shape, Marshall again retired to private life.

Marshall is well known for his stern way of dealing with his associates. It is said that during his public career he never addressed any of his associates by their first names.

Marshall married twice. His first wife, Lily Carter Coles, was a childhood sweetheart. Following her death, he married Mrs. Katharine Boyce Tupper Brown of Baltimore.

He has no children of his own but was stepfather to his second wife's three children. One, Lt. Allen Tupper, was killed in action during the Italian campaign.

Hurd devoted most of his life to printers organizations, and he served for 13 years as secretary-treasurer of the International Allied Printing Trades Assn. Burial will be in Indianapolis.

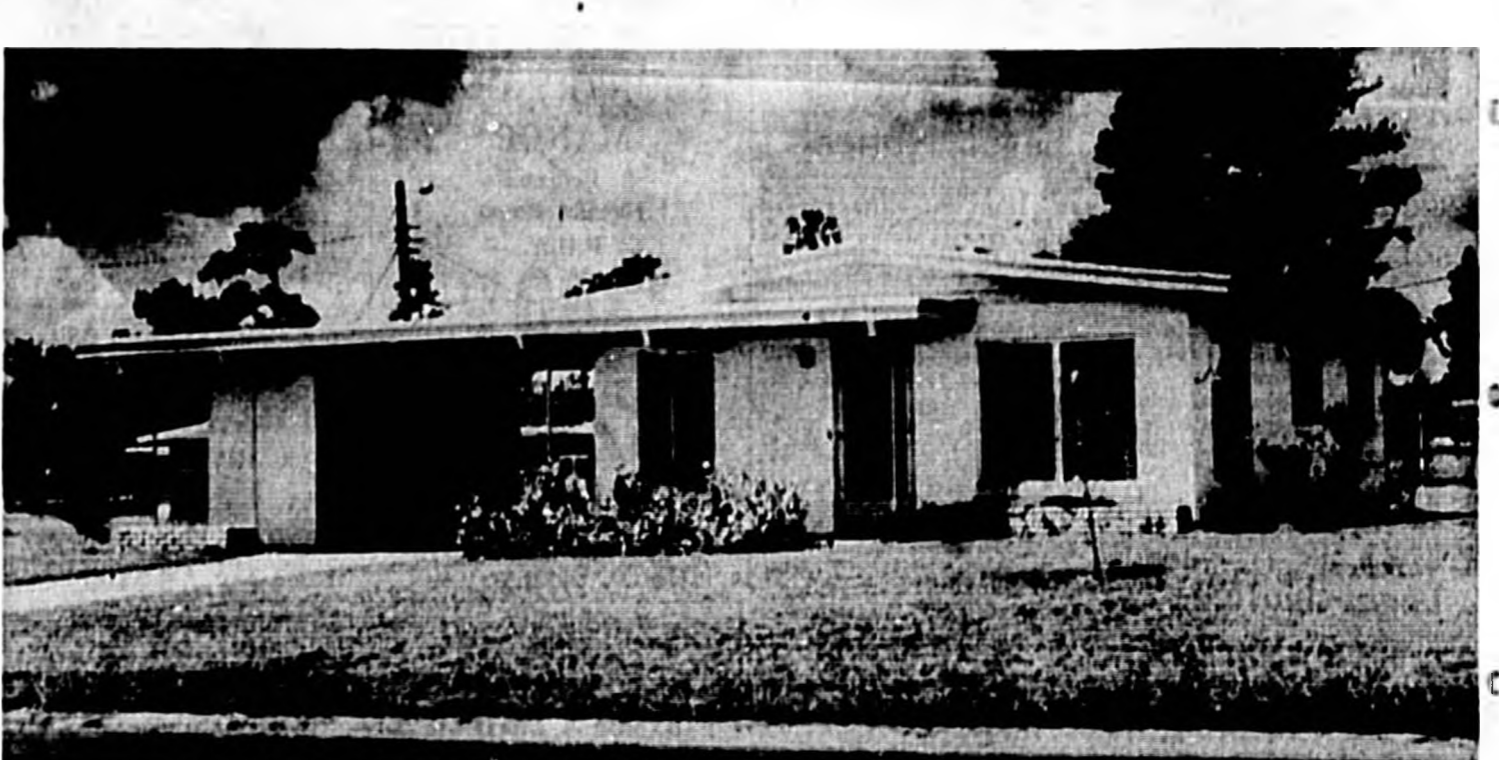

## Teen Treat

What teenager wouldn't vote "the hamburger" number one on a popularity list of favorite foods? It's probably safe to say that ground beef in a hamburger is as favored by the teenager as it is by the men folk.

No why not give this recipe called Teenage Special a trial run in your home. The teenagers might consider this innovation a cousin to the hamburger.

It's a hearty warmer-upper or thawer-upper before or after a cold afternoon at a football game.

Reba Stagg, home economist versed in the field of meat and meat cookery, explains that chopped onion and green pepper strips are first cooked in lard or drippings until tender. The ground beef is added, browned, and the drippings removed. Then a can of condensed mushroom soup is combined with milk and seasonings and added to the meat mixture. The whole combination is cooked until heated through, and served on toasted English muffins.

**Teenage Special**

- 1 pound ground beef
- 2 1/2 teaspoons lard or drippings
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup green pepper strips
- 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed mushroom soup
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 large English muffins, split and toasted
- Paprika

Cook onion and green pepper in lard or drippings until tender. Add ground beef and cook until browned. Pour off drippings. Combine soup, milk and salt and add to beef mixture. Cook until heated through, about 5 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika. Yield, 4 servings.

**Crabmeat Recipe Told**

NEW YORK (UPI)—King crabmeat mushroom pudding crams a lot of flavor and nutrition into a one-dish meal.

Remove membrane from 2 (6 1/2-ounce) cans crabmeat and mix well with 1 (4-ounce) can sliced mushrooms, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 package dehydrated onion soup, 1/2 cup grated raw carrots, 2 eggs, well beaten, 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 teaspoon thyme. Spoon into buttered 1 quart casserole and bake 45 minutes in 350-degree oven. Remove and let stand at room temperature 10 minutes before unrolling.

Serve garnished with spicy horseradish sauce made by blending 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish with 2 tablespoons milk and 4 ounces cottage cheese. Serves 6.

## Segregation Out, Pennsylvania Says

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI)—Segregation in Pennsylvania public schools has been virtually wiped out, the State Public Instruction Department reported to Gov. George M. Leader Thursday.

The department reported on a survey ordered by Leader in 1957 when he learned racial segregation was found in three school districts.

The governor said he was "pleased to learn that the conditions have been corrected with the full cooperation of local school officials."

The survey disclosed there are 24 elementary schools having all-Negro student bodies, but each is in a predominantly Negro community. The department said there is no evidence of community boundaries or attendance areas being drawn to deny pupils access to public schools most convenient to their residences.

## CONANT TO SUGGEST Reducing Schools

NEW YORK (UPI)—James Bryant Conant, president emeritus of Harvard University, will recommend on the basis of a two-year study that the nation's high schools be reduced in number from 21,000 to 9,000, it was learned today.

The study, which will be published Jan. 28, was based on visits to 55 high schools in 18 states. Conant found only eight of these schools satisfactorily fulfill the job of providing students with a general education, job training or preparation for college.

Conant said a major reason for inadequacy is the smallness of many of the nation's secondary schools. He said the number of high schools should be reduced by about 13,000 in order to provide "comprehensive schools for the youth living in a town, city or district."

"I early became convinced that a high school must have a graduating class of at least 100 to function adequately as a comprehensive school," Conant said.

The educator and former ambassador to West Germany, whose study was financed by a \$700,000 Carnegie grant, said only a few of the schools visited provided a wide enough range of academic studies with sufficient challenge to make students want to work hard.

"The able boys too often specialize in mathematics and science to the exclusion of foreign languages and to the neglect of English and social studies," he said. "The able girls, on the other hand, too often avoid mathematics and science as well as the foreign languages."

# Washington Calling

 WASHINGTON—Give it his extraordinary capacities and the great power he exercises as majority leader, the victory of Senator Lyndon Johnson in the rules fight was not in itself surprising. But the sweep of the Johnson bulldozer as it overran the opposition was a surprising demonstration of the power of the operator from Texas.

Some of the Democrats who went along in the big Johnson push are already beginning to ask what the victory means for the future. It was, above all, the triumph of a theory, the Johnson concept of politics.

Public controversy is bad—bad for the party and bad for the country. That is the heart of the Johnson conviction. You have to work things out in the cloakroom and then when you've got them worked out you can debate a little before you vote.

In the politics of manipulation and maneuver Johnson, as he proved once again, is a master. But this ignores the content, the substance, of political give and take. It draws off the fire, the fight, the conviction, the real thing.

The latest Johnson victory may in this respect prove in the end a costly one. It has left in its wake a vague sense of frustration. What was the triumph all about? What is the meaning of labels such as "liberal," "conservative," "progressive"? What it may come down to is doubt and indecision about a rallying point—what the party stands for after the skill of the managerial operation has been proved once again.

One thing painfully evident in the crisis in France last May that saw the end of the Fourth Republic was that the content, the idealism, the conviction, had gone out of French political life. When the paratroopers threatened to come over from Algeria and seize power there was no force to stop them except General Charles De Gaulle. The managers of all the splinter parties had been so busy managing their own fortunes while the trade unions and the left had been bargaining for social security and a few more francs per hour on their contracts that the end was simply a vacuum.

This is not to say that any parallel exists. But it is to suggest that when the content goes out of political life the vacuum that is left can be filled only by authority imposed from on high.

An interesting instance of what this signifies is seen in the Republican party. Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona, one of the few Republicans to win reelection, took an extreme anti-labor, reactionary position which he prosecuted with the utmost vigor. In the Arizona campaign you heard his defenders say, "Well, at least he stands for something." "Now you've won and you've got something," they said. "You've got something, you can't beat something with nothing. However violent and distorted the Goldwater 'something' may have seemed it did beat nothing."

In the wake of the Johnson sweep the Republican liberals have come forward to say in effect, "Now you've won and you claim that this liberalizes the Senate rules. We are going to make you put up or shut up and we are going to do it by bringing forward civil rights measures to test your claim."

Senator Jacob Javits of New York has said that he and Clifford Case of New Jersey, Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania and Kenneth Keating of New York are introducing civil rights legislation.

## St. Johns Proves Power Increasing

ST. JOHN'S, N.Y., re-appearing once again to the magic touch of old Celtic Joe Lapchick, has raised New York City basketball prestige to the higher level since the college scandals of 1952.

A smashing 97-72 victory over St. Joseph's at Philadelphia Saturday night wiped out all doubts of St. John's right to national ranking and established the Redmen as the strongest independent team in the country. They are almost certain to move up from their No. 10 ranking of last week and may soon be challenging Kentucky, North Carolina State and Kansas State for No. 1 honors.

St. John's victory was easily the most significant of a Saturday night program which saw the seven teams rated among the top 10 win. The lone loser was ninth-ranked Northwestern, which lost in Ohio State, 84-72, in a typical Big Ten Conference upset.

Kentucky, the nation's first-ranked team, beat Tennessee, 79-58, second-ranked North Carolina State topped Wake Forest, 64-59, third-ranked Kansas defeated Missouri, 75-60, fifth-ranked Cincinnati whipped Drake, 97-60, and seventh-ranked Auburn shaded Alabama, 57-55, in other games involving the top 10.

Kentucky's 10th victory in 13 games this season also marked the 59thth win of Coach Adolph Rupp and Auburn's win extended the longest major college unbeaten streak to 22 games which sits at the season and 11 last season. St. Bonaventure, the only other major unbeaten, downed Canisius, 84-72.

AAU Coach Named  
NEW YORK (UPI)—Henry Wiltenberg, Yeshiva University wrestling coach and former Olympic champion, has been named coach of the AAU squad which next June will compete in Russia as part of a cultural exchange program.

PILADELPHIA (UPI)—The National Football League will complete its annual draft Wednesday and then buckle down to pleasing the players it already has under contract plus its growing host of fans.

## Wall Wins Crosby Open; Arrives Via 'Back Door'

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—As Art Wall well knows, there are more ways to win (or lose) a golf tournament than meets the eye.

Wall, the top money-winner of 1958, backed into first place in the \$50,000 Bing Crosby national professional golf tournament Sunday by bogeying the last three holes and still winning top money of \$14,000.

Two weeks ago in Los Angeles, where top money was \$5,500, he finished second—because Ken Venturi came from eight strokes off the pace to beat Art's one-over-par 73.

In the Crosby event, the 35-year-old Wall came close to seeing a duplication of that feat as he three-putted 16 and 17 and hit a trap on 18.

"I never won a tournament that was in my life before," said the mild man from Porono Manor, Pa.

Actually, Art won the championship, along with the pro-amateur title trip, which netted him a total of \$20,000, by starting the final 18 holes of competition with three straight birdies.

So he'll be the big man to watch when the touring golf brigade and some of the West's finest amateurs, head for Palm Springs and the big invitational tournament starting there Thursday.

Wall ended up with a 72-hole score of 279 after a final round of 73. Gene Littler finished with a 281 in a tie with Jim Dwyer for second place, each collecting \$2,150. Fourth place also ended in a tie between Gene and John McDougal and Bob Rossburg, both Californians. They had 283 for \$1,500 each.

Wall, with some fine help from national amateur champion Charley Cox, won the best ball competition with 252—five strokes ahead of the field. The team of Doug Ford and amateur Art Anderson of Studio City, Calif., finished second with 237, good for \$1,500 for Ford, Littler and his partner, Jack Minger, Dallas, Tex., came in third, Gene picking up an additional \$1,200.

McDougal Winner Of Gehrig Trophy  
COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—In field star Gil McDougal of the New York Yankees today was named the winner of the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award presented annually to the major league player who most typically represents the spirit of the Hall of Fame first baseman both on and off the field.

## Warm, Arctic Air Clash; New Storm Is Triggered

A snow storm, triggered by a clash of warm and cold air masses, swirled across the Midwest Monday while snow mixed with rain laid down a treacherous ice south of the snow belt.

Strong southerly winds reaching gusts of 40 miles an hour at Springfield, Ill., collided with an arctic air mass to produce the storm which ranged from northern Missouri and eastern Iowa across northern Illinois and Indiana and into the Great Lakes.

Rain or a slippery mixture of rain and snow slicked highways along the southern flank of the storm area. To the north, snow accumulated to one to two inches with drifting and blowing snow reducing visibilities over much of the area.

A storm blast in the Northeast brought heavy snows and howling winds to update New York Sunday, piling up drifts of 12 to 15 feet. Boreas Bridge, near Pultaski, N. Y., was buried under a 30-inch snowfall.

The snow, which began Saturday, blanketed upper New York with an average accumulation of one foot, and snow plow crews gave up bucking drifts for a time Sunday when they were unable to keep ahead of the snow. The wind abated later and highway crews opened all main roads.

The main area of precipitation shifted to the Midwest during the night when a new storm system brought a rush of mild air flowing up the Mississippi Valley.

At Des Moines, Iowa, caught in the middle of the warring air masses, an ice layer snarled traffic Sunday night. Police warned all motorists to stay off streets unless absolutely necessary to risk travel. Civil defense volunteers and off-duty policemen were called out to cope with a rash of traffic crashes.

The new snow hampered efforts of the South Bend, Ind., area to recover from a paralyzing 18-inch snowfall Friday. Authorities reported main highways open, but all roads in the South Bend and Mishawaka regions were hazardous.

## War On Inflation Asked By Ike

### Prosperity Seen, But Rising Prices Viewed As Danner

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower today called for a declaration of war against inflation.

In his annual economic report to Congress, he said the nation has snapped back strongly from last year's recession. Production is up, unemployment is down, and there is "reason for confidence" that business will show further improvement in the months ahead, he said.

But the President warned that U.S. economic health is jeopardized by an upward spiral of wages and prices that continued even during the recession. He appealed to Congress, consumers, businessmen, and especially to labor leaders to join in a "relentless war" against this creeping inflation.

He said that labor leaders, because of the "great power lodged in their hands," have a "particularly critical role to play" in stabilizing living costs and protecting the value of the dollar.

"Urging them to exercise 'self-discipline and restraint' in contrast demands, the President said that wage boosts which are not justified by increased productivity are 'inevitably inflationary.'

Eisenhower called on businessmen to "redouble their efforts" to keep production costs down, in setting prices, he said, businessmen should always keep in mind the economies that can be achieved through mass production and expanding markets.

His appeals to business and labor were buttressed with a warning that if wages and prices cannot be stabilized through voluntary action, it may be necessary to resort to government controls "which are alien to our traditional way of life."

The President assigned to individual consumers the "important role" of "shopping carefully." Housewives can do much to protect their own pocketbooks, he said, by insisting on quality merchandise at fair prices.

He said the most valuable contribution Congress can make is to keep government spending within the limits of the \$7 billion dollar balanced budget which he submitted Monday.

### U. S. Tour Ends, Mikoyan Departs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan thanked Americans for their warm welcome and friendship today and headed for home.

Mikoyan, whose 16-day goodwill tour of this country ended on a sour note, left by train for New York. He was to leave this afternoon aboard a Scandinavian Airways plane for Europe.

Mikoyan asked reporters at the railroad station to "please convey to the people of Washington and all the people I have met in the United States my gratitude for their warm welcome and the friendship they have shown for the Soviet Union."

In his departure statement, the No. 2 Soviet leader apparently sought to soften the angry controversy raised Monday by his blunt criticism of U. S. trade policies and other cold war problems.

He said he will tell the Russian people about the "warm hospitality I encountered throughout my trip."

The State Department accused Mikoyan of abusing this hospitality by making "fatuous" statements about the U. S. government.

### No Access Road, Man Tells County

A Lake Monroe farmer told Seminole County Commissioners that the Interstate Highway is cutting off his road, and once construction starts, he will have no way of getting to his poultry farm.

J. O. Boston said that there is not enough room between the highway and one of his poultry barns for an access road. Boston was advised to contact his lawyer, and meet with County Attorney Mack Cleveland and Commissioner Homer Little to investigate county roads in the area.

## Red Congress Holds Fate Of Khrushchev, Others

LONDON (UPI) — A three-way fight faces the forthcoming Communist Party congress in Moscow and experts said today the outcome would be decisive for the survival of Nikita Khrushchev as Russia's boss.

The rift has been caused by ideological differences in the Red camp, threatening seriously the unity of the Communist world.

Russia, under Khrushchev's leadership, is now following the middle-of-the-road course of the ideological battle between the Yugoslav Marshal Tito's revisionism veers to the right, and Peiping's commune policy leans strongly to the left.

The 21st party congress, due to open in Moscow Jan. 27, was believed to have been called for a major mending operation in this three-way rift.

Peiping's Communist leaders and possibly Mao Tse-tung himself will be present. The Yugoslavians are expected to be represented but not by Tito personally.

Much of this very delicate and highly explosive mending operation is expected to be tackled in behind-the-scenes moves or in direct talks between Khrushchev and the "deviationists."

A studied silence in Moscow and Peiping has covered up the degree of difference in the ideological battle. All that has so far emerged was that there has been a cooling off in the Moscow-Peiping axis with Khrushchev opposing Red China's hurry toward setting up the commune system.

Experts said the differences were vital because they affect the Soviet hold over the satellites and the closeness of Sino-Russian relations.

### 'Eternity Ticket' Promised Planes Flying To Berlin

BERLIN (UPI)—East German propaganda chief Gerhard Geyer has warned that Western planes will be shot out of the air if they attempt to fly to West Berlin without permission, the West Berlin newspaper Der Abend said today.

"When anyone flies over our territory without permission he will have a free ticket to heaven or hell in his pocket, depending on his virtue," the newspaper quoted Geyer as saying.

The Communist propagandist spoke in Potsdam Monday night on the Soviet plan to turn control of air, highway and railroad routes to West Berlin over to the East Germans next May 27.

The East German government gave its unqualified approval of the plan in a note handed to Soviet Ambassador M. V. Pervukhin in East Berlin. West Germany and the Western Allies have rejected the Soviet proposal.

## Business Outlook, Personal Outlook Same, Rotary Told

The business outlook for 1959 depends, to a great extent, upon the personal outlook of the businessmen.

This was the gist of a speech to Sanford Rotarians yesterday by Norman B. Thomson, member of the College of Business Administration faculty at the University of Florida.

Thomson said economic experts are predicting that the total to be spent by American consumers for goods and services in 1959 will be a little more than eight per cent higher than the total for 1958.

For the average businessman to reap his share of this harvest, however, he cannot sit idly by, Thomson warned.

Securing a greater share of this increased business will call for a better job in promotion, merchandising, advertising and selling, particularly from the retail level," Thomson said.

Proposing the slogan, "Sell Like Sixty in '39," the business expert told Rotarians that "you'll have to go after the business; it won't come to you."

He added that the merchant who goes after the business is the one who will get it.

Thomson cited figures to show that the 1958 recession could be used as a guide for 1959 business. He said the recession was not marked by less spending; it was highlighted by a shifting of funds by the consumer, who still spent his money, but expended it for new and different items.
