In his annual economic report to Congress, he said the nation has snapped back strongly from last year's recession. Production is up, unemployment is down, and there is "reason for confidence" that business will show further improvement in the months ahead, he said.

But the President warned that U.S. economic health is jeopardized by an upward spiral of wages and prices that continued even during the recession. He appealed to Congress, consumers, businessmen and especially to labor leaders to join in a "relentless war" against this creeping inflation.

He said that labor leaders, because of the "great power lodged in their hands," have a "particularly critical role to play" in stabilizing living costs and pro-tecting the value of the dollar. Urging them to exercise "selfdiscipline and restraint" in contract demands, the President said that wage boosts which are not justified by increased productivity are "inevitably inflationary."


