Radio Quiz Show Head Sees Skit As Parlor Game

NEW YORK, Apr. 17—(AP)—The way Ralph Edwards figures it, things will be all right in America as long as people get a kick out of laughing at themselves.

Edwards, dapper, red-haired and 37, is head man of "Truth Or Consequences," the hilarious radio quiz show.

Here's how the show works: If you answer your question you get a prize. If you don't, that's not the end of it like on other quiz shows. You have to do some outlandish stunt as a forfeit.

"It really builds up my faith in the American people," Ralph bubbled over a spaghetti-and-meat-sauce lunch.

"We have people making love to seals, chasing greased pigs, putting on crazy clothes, and they love it."

The idea stems from old-fashioned parlor games—the kind Ralph and his two older brothers and their parents used to play on the Colorado farm.

So great is interest in "Truth Or Consequences" that Ralph has gotten up a "party book" of crazy consequences.

"To me," Ralph said, "this just goes to show that Americans at heart are still the democratic folks of pioneer days, when parlor games and square dances were depressions of the community spirit."

Ralph might still be on the farm if his mother hadn't been ambitious for him to go to a "big school." The family moved to Oakland, Calif. While attending University of California, Ralph worked for a small radio station.

After graduation he hitched his way to New York to try to crash into big-time radio. He ate on 29 cents a day while doing bit parts on radio shows, then won out over 68 others in an audition for a chain announcing job. In six weeks he was announcing Major Bowes' program.

After two years he quit, and "I didn't want to be an announcer all my life," he explained, "so I hatched the 'Truth Or Consequences' idea. It was really simple. Most quizzes were brain-twisters or humdrum. I figured that if I kept the brain-twisters and put hilarity into a parlor game everybody would want to hear it. Looks like they did."

Thomasville Will Have Annual Rose Show On April 25

THOMASVILLE, Ga., Apr. 13 (Special)—The twentieth anniversary of Thomasville's famed Rose Show is being observed this year and will be featured by what is expected to be the most beautiful and elaborate display of all the scores of years, on Friday, April 25.

The annual show, which began as a small display of roses in a downtown department store back in 1914, has grown to such an extent that each year for the past decade more than 30,000 visitors have flocked here to see the mammoth exhibit of flowers in the big airplane hangar at the Vose Field airport.

This year there will be more than 45 classifications of individual and group displays ranging from small exhibits of cut flowers to the elaborate nursery and plantation designs.

A late Spring this year held back blooms later than usual and is calculated to result in an even greater abundance of flowers available for the show than in some previous years.

The Pinellas County Council of Home Demonstration Work is promoting a live-at-home program in the county and a large number of families have become interested. Some families have gardens for the first time, after having noted increases in the price of foods at retail stores.

Miss Rossel and County Agent John H. Logan expect to stage a garden tour in the county in the near future. Gardening families are now planning what they will grow this summer.

Day is homcoming time for many former residents in this section. Dances and other events are features of the day and night.

Analysis Of 124th Infantry Shows Linguistic Ability Of 125 Soldiers

CAMP BLANDING, Apr. 13 (Special)—The 124th Infantry, the Florida regiment of the 31st (Dixie) Division stationed here, could make its wants known in almost any country, for 125 soldiers in this unit are able to converse in foreign languages, ranging from German to Jewish, and including French, Spanish, Filipino, Chinese and several others.

These and other interesting facts are shown in a complete personnel analysis of the 124th's enlisted men completed yesterday by a special staff working under the regiment's commanding officer, Col. Fred A. Safay, of Jacksonville. The Medical Detachment, Headquarters First Battalion, and Company D are from Sanford.

The analysis was compiled from information by an classified in four main categories: (1) Education, (2) Linguistic ability, (3) Technical skills, and (4) Other special abilities.

Of the 125 soldiers analyzed, 100 were married and just 25 of these have dependents other than their wives. While 330 have dependents but no wives.

Over one-third of the personnel, 1,010 to be exact, had military experience prior to induction into the U. S. Army under the emergency training program. 488 had infantry experience, 455 had been in the C. C. C., 13 were former Navy sailors, 11 were once coast artillerymen, 11 had medical department experience, and the other 32 were divided among the air corps, cavalry, engineers, field artillery, quartermaster corps and the Coast Guard.

Morganthau submitted this overall picture of the Treasury's plans for the 1942 fiscal year starting July 1.

Spending is expected to total about \$15,000,000,000. Existing taxes are expected to yield about \$9,225,000,000. But the Treasury would like to meet two-thirds of the 1942 expenditures—about \$12,667,000,000—from current revenue, so that new taxes will have to provide the extra \$3,433,000,000. That still would leave borrowed—a little in excess of \$500,000,000 a month.

Contemplated new taxes would mean an average increase of \$25.49 for every man, woman and child in the country. They would boost the total per capita average tax to \$27.51, including all federal taxes except social security deductions. The average taxpayer bill would be much higher, of course, since children and many others actually pay no taxes.

LONDON, Apr. 19—(AP)—Britain, reacting to the Axis thrust toward the Greek island of Larisa, has landed strong imperial forces to "open lines of communication" through that country, the scene of the government overthrow 15 days ago.

All reports from the Greco-British front up until noon today indicated the Allied lines were unchanged in the past 12 hours, despite the relentless and violent Nazi pressure.

"We mow them down by the hundreds as they try to climb the steep mountain sides, but as soon as one wave is thrown back another pushes forward," said one military officer.

German losses, he added, "are tremendous, unequalled, I believe, by anything they have suffered in the European war to date."

The German High Command blamed the capture today of Larisa, 40 miles south of Mount Olympus and said the swastika had been raised on the mountain itself, but the British army headquarters in Athens asserted heavy Nazi attacks had failed to penetrate the Greco-British line at any point.

Green had a cabinet crisis on 16 hands as a result of the expected death of Premier Alexander Korias. Reports were that King George II planned the formation of a military government and it was understood the monarch himself had assumed command of the army.
