Aspirin Should Not Affect Sex Life DEAR DR. LAMB - For a rheumatoid arthritis condition I am taking 60 to 80 grains of aspirin daily. Could this saturation dose adversely affect my sex life? The arthritis is in the left hip, left knee and both hands. Could pressure at these points as in the missionary position retard my performance or completely wipe it out?

DEAR READER: There is no reason why large amounts of aspirin should affect your sex life although there are some reports that aspirin will decrease fertility. I assume that you are not interested in fathering more children and are more interested in performance and the little valve-like sphincters essential to normal performance are affected. It can also be caused by impotence or by a very small percentage of men whose potency or capacity decreases because of a gradual decline in the level of sex hormones. Decreased male hormone is seldom the real cause for impotence. And that is why giving testosterone to men is often useless.

So impotence is a symptom and requires careful evaluation before one concludes what causes it. 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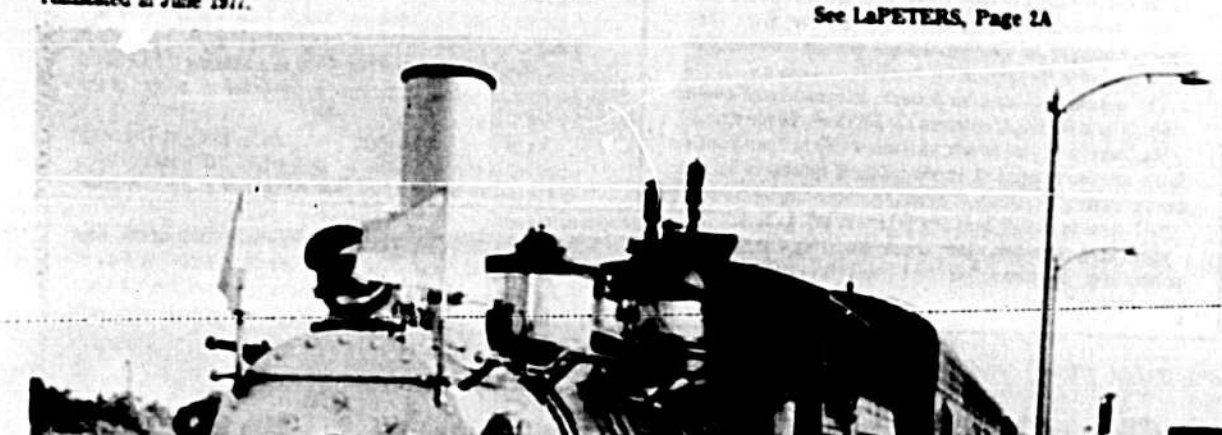

## SCA Loses \$9,000 For 'Meals'

The administration of a Meals on Wheels program by Seminole Community Action (SCA) may be running out of gas. The organization has been notified by J.A. Mowbray, director of the Areawide Agency on the Aging (AAA) that \$9,806 which had been received by SCA to administer the program will not be renewed. The funds instead have been awarded to Project OASIS (Older Americans Service of Seminole). In addition a request for \$20,000 in additional funding by SCA from AAA was denied.



Who's The Man Of The House? THE HAGUE, Netherlands (UPI) - A 43-year-old Dutchman has asked a court to order his wife to refrain from entering his home on the grounds she is a man. The man's lawyer told the court that since Dutch law forbids people of the same sex to marry, his client did not have to provide a home for his particular partner. He said two years ago, his client met the person he thought was a woman in Bangkok. After he returned to Holland, they exchanged letters and finally he went to Bangkok to get married. He said he was told that according to Thai custom, a woman never undresses in the presence of her husband and that any sexual contact should take place only in darkness. The lawyer told the court that the plaintiff got suspicious after a sex shop where his wife worked told him clients complained his wife was a man. The husband insisted she dress as a man. She pretended to leave for work but took off his shoes and stole up the stairs again in stocking feet, peeped into the bedroom and discovered his disrobed wife really was a man. The lawyer said after repeating quarrels between the couple, his client lodged a complaint and a police doctor established beyond doubt the wife was a man. The man no longer felt safe at home after the wife returned with a friend and removed the furniture, the lawyer said, hence the request to the court to ban the wife from re-entering the house. The court will announce its verdict in a week.

Postal Pact Averts Strike WASHINGTON (UPI) - Postal Service and union negotiators reached tentative agreement early today on a new contract for 578,000 postal employees. The tentative pact provides for wage increases of 1 percent, 3 percent and 5 percent over three years. The wage issue was the only major one that was still unresolved when negotiators "stopped the clock" to extend the contract, which expired at 12:01 a.m. today, while the talks continued. Union workers had promised for days to stage a major strike if they did not have a new contract when the old one expired. The tentative agreement came about 4 a.m. EDT. Postmaster General William Bolger had joined the negotiations about 2:30 a.m. "This wage package is respectable. It is not inflationary," said Jim Lapenta, secretary of the coordinating committee for the unions negotiating the pact. He described the wage package as a slight improvement over the last one. The negotiators had resolved an array of major issues Thursday afternoon and evening, compromising on some issues that previously stalled negotiations and threatened to deadlock them. The threat of a rash of regional strikes, not a nationwide walkout, had appeared serious enough before these breakthroughs for the Army to make contingency plans to help carry the mail.

Son's Ashes: Half To Mom, Half To Dad GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (UPI) - In a judgment reminiscent of Solomon, a judge says a divorced couple should have the body of their son cremated and each claim half the ashes unless they can agree who has the right to bury him. Kent County Circuit Judge George Cook issued the opinion in a case involving the parents of Greg Dunn, 12, who died of cystic fibrosis last week. The parents, James Dunn and Anne Simmons, could not agree who should have the right to bury the child. Cook said Thursday his opinion was one of the most difficult he ever had to make. "We are asked to play God, a role we are neither trained or prepared for," Cook said. Cook said he saw no other solution to the dilemma unless the parents could decide out of court which of them should have custody. "It's obvious that both deeply loved their son," the judge said. "Both have gone through their own private hell which probably most of us do not understand or appreciate and hopefully will never have to repeat."

Budding Crisis  
In Energy

The nation's need for energy, so clear to Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger, sometimes seems to escape the secretary's colleagues.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission ordered another halt in construction of the Seabrook nuclear power plant in New Hampshire, shortly after a capital demonstration by anti-nuclear zealots.

Work on the plant was stopped last year for seven months and only resumed in August.

Opponents question the safety of the site and the plant's cooling system, but it is apparent that the central issue is one of philosophy.

Hard-core critics cannot separate the peaceful applications of nuclear energy from the horror of its destructive powers demonstrated at Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The Seabrook project, with a price tag of \$2.3 billion, is 15 percent complete, but is in danger of suffering the same fate as California's Sundersert plant — scrubbed by state agencies and the Legislature after a huge investment by San Diego Gas and Electric Co.

As Schlesinger insists, the U.S. is experiencing a "budding crisis without a visible shortage" in energy.

Government contributes to the crisis with congressional neglect of an energy policy and by failing to support a proven source.

Capital Gains

The threat by President Carter to veto a huge cut proposed in capital gains taxes indicates that there will be some give and take between the House Ways and Means Committee and the White House.

The President indicated that legislation now under consideration would mean "huge windfalls for millionaires and two hits for the average American."

Rep. William Steiger, sponsor of the capital gains proposal, also has some persuasive arguments.

The Wisconsin Republican news reduction in capital gains taxation as a way of increasing the supply of venture capital which is vital to our true enterprise economy.

However, many average citizens have been hit hard by taxes when selling property or businesses at inflated prices.

All Unions' treatment of Ryan and Moore, said he is "astounded we will develop a tax reduction bill that will compensate for inflation and encourage capital investment."

Inflation & Wages

A boost in the minimum wage to \$2.50 an hour, scheduled for Jan. 1, is "in jeopardy," a statistic, according to G. William Miller, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board.

Miller told the Joint Economic Committee of Congress that he would like to see the increase postponed for two years as a means of getting the brakes on inflation.

Since any delay would have to be approved by Congress, the bill from the present rate of \$2.00 seems likely to stand.

Original bill, which sought for the increase, would fight a delay.

Miller concluded that postponement of the increase would mean no more than a 4.86 percent sharing of the inflation rate, but his remarks serve to dramatize the need to control the inflationary rate.

Labor Department statistics released recently gave emphasis to Miller's fears. The inflation he envisioned as perhaps 7 percent this year could be as high as 11 percent.

Congress should get the message, even if the postal workers don't.

Trailers, Trailers, Everywhere

MANCHESTER, Ky. — The first thing you notice in the trailers, certain at the windows and doorways, is the clutter. It is a clutter of clutter, on every hillside, along every road winding through the mountains in the coal country of Eastern Kentucky.

The trailers are the ghetto housing of Central Appalachia. They are not real property, in the eyes of the law, so there is no property tax.

They can be bought with money from the finance companies and placed down on any patch of ground big enough to hold them. They may not be fancy, but they're better than nothing.

The minimum property standards of the Department of Housing and Urban Development which dictate site slope, lot size, sewage and water arrangements, access, sidewalks, curbing and all the other requirements which must be met before federally subsidized loans can be made for conventional housing don't apply to trailers.

So you have trailers, everywhere trailers, in this isolated pocket of rural America where two-thirds of the housing is officially substandard and more than half the families have incomes below the federal poverty level.

Jack Watson saw the trailers last week when he and two staffers from the White House, where Watson is one of President Carter's top aides, toured Eastern Kentucky to see what the federal government is doing right and wrong — about rural development in this country.

And Jack Watson saw the people who live in the trailers and the shacks and the scattered decent houses throughout these mountains and who get their medical care — all of it, in many cases, from clinics of the Frontier Nursing Service like the one he visited at Owsley, Ky.

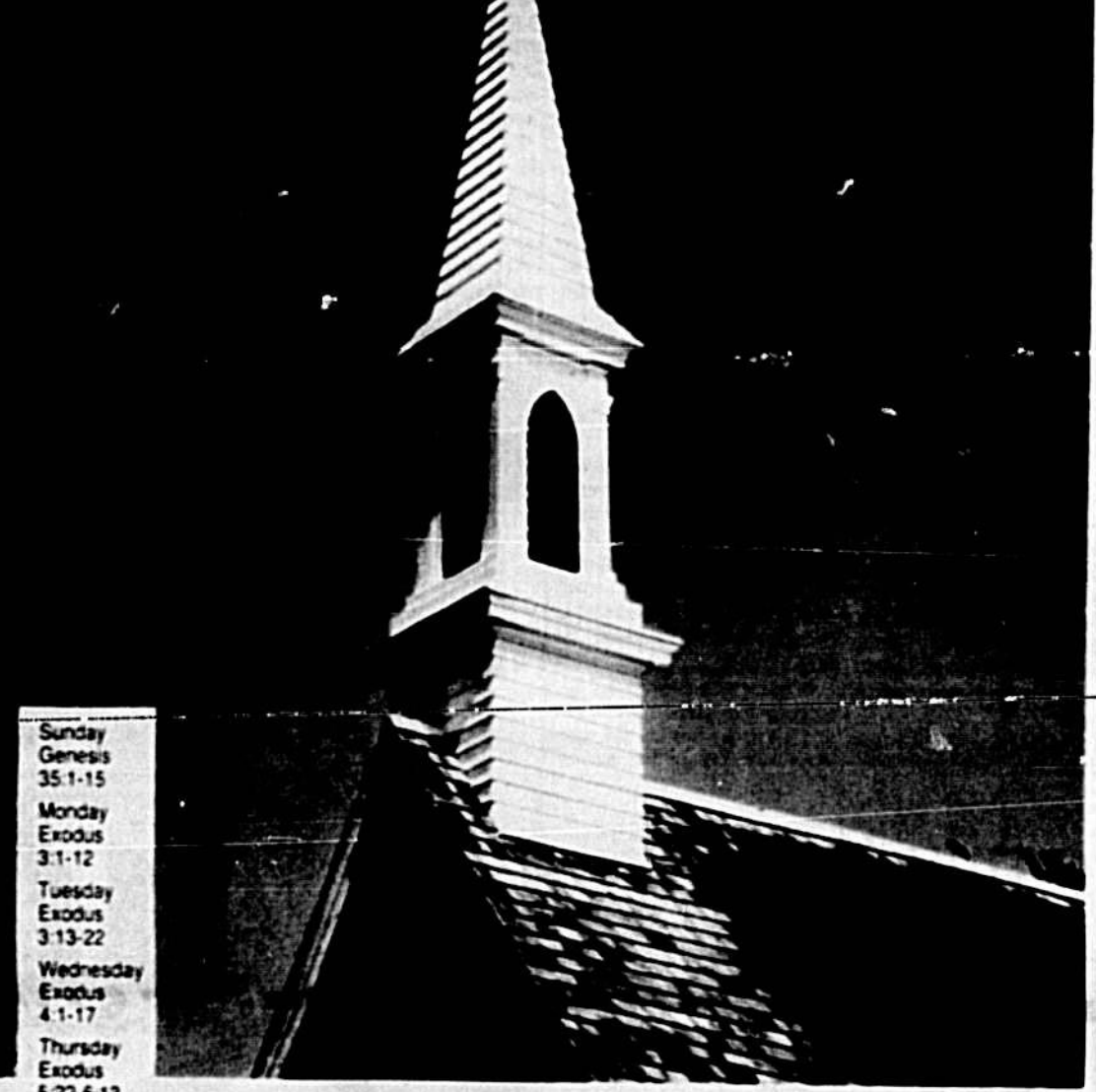

Methodists Face Gay Issue

The 15-million-member United Methodist church will be the next major Protestant denomination engaged by the current religious debate over the role of homosexuals in church life. An acknowledged homosexual has received, for the first time in United Methodist history, official sanction for service as a pastor of a denomination. Group Asks Papal Reform

When Pope Paul VI marked the 10th year of his reign over the Roman Catholic church earlier this year, the 80-year-old pontiff made pointed reference to the end of his life and his impending death. Pope Paul has for some time suffered from a severe arthritic condition that makes walking very painful and that, coupled with his own sense of mortality, has given repeated rise to rumors that he is either gravely ill or that he would resign. Neither appears to be the case, but the reality of Pope Paul's situation has once again focused the attention of Catholics and non-Catholics alike on election process for popes. Traditionally, the pope is elected by the College of Cardinals, a gathering of the world's top hierarchy of the church, who meet and ballot in order to choose the new pope from among their ranks. A group of North American lay and clerical church members, appalled by the system, have formed what they call "The Committee for the Responsible Election of the Pope."

The purpose of the committee is to gather information and make it available not only to the cardinals themselves but to interested individuals throughout the world," according to James F. Andrews, co-chairman of the committee and chairman of the board of the publishing firm of Sheed Andrews and McMeel, publishers. "More alarming was the fact that a cardinal's perception of another cardinal seldom matched the views of the more and women who lived in the prelate's domain and had an opportunity to observe the man close over a period of years." In addition to the book, the committee has also begun publishing a monthly newsletter, "Conclave Confidential," which seeks to give background on Vatican officials and behind-the-scenes reports on the political maneuvering of potential papal candidates. The committee says that it hopes, by making information available to the world community about this process, to improve and reform the very system of papal selection.

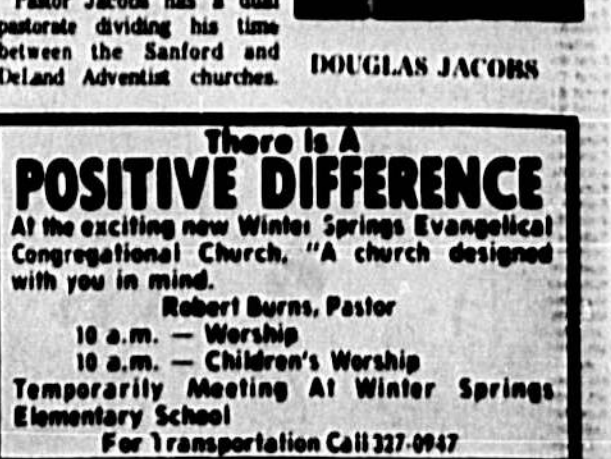

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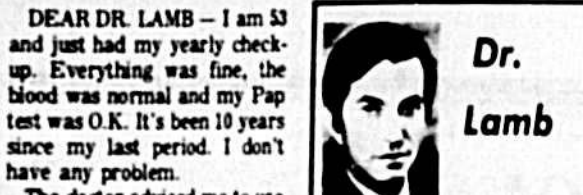

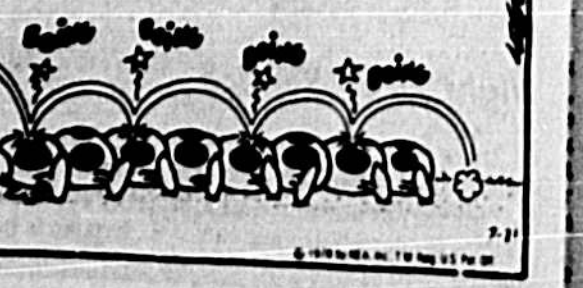

"It's a long time since I've done anything offensively," Speier said. "It's gratifying for me. It's the first time I've ever hit for the cycle."

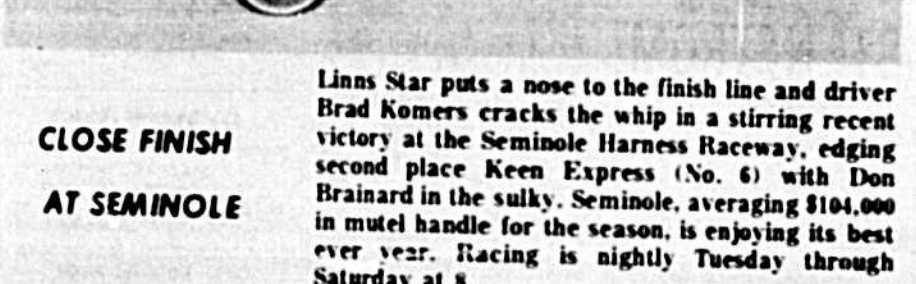
Speier's hitting helped Woody Fryman to his fifth victory in 11 decisions and tagged Jamie Eastery with his sixth loss in eight decisions.

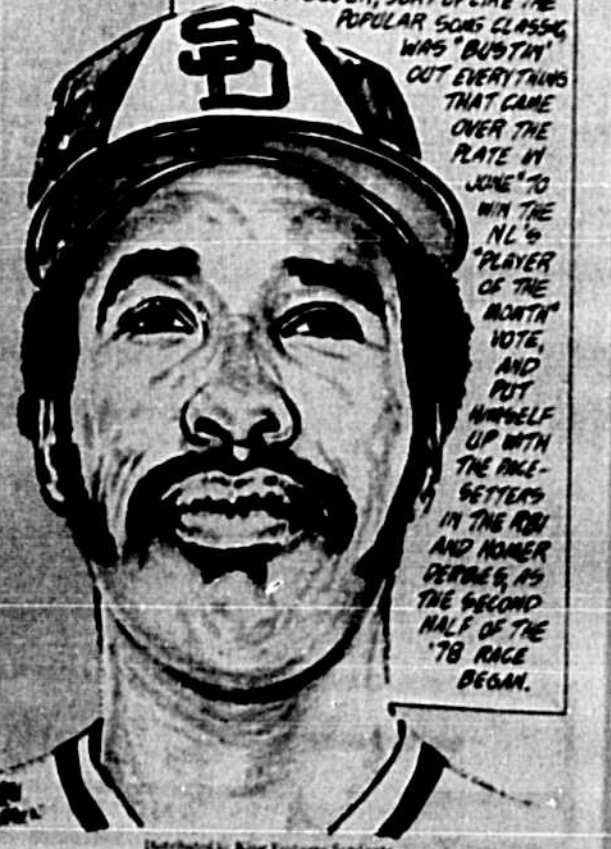

## LaPeters: I'll Tell Everything To Cheshire

A Monday morning meeting between ousted Sanford Chief of Police Wallace LaPeters and State Attorney Douglas Cheshire will cover LaPeters' allegations that City Manager Warren E. Knowles tried to force him to fix a traffic ticket and fire a police officer.

LaPeters confirmed Saturday he will discuss those allegations and a possible sunshine law violation in connection with his firing.

Cheshire, though refusing to admit LaPeters had been summoned to his office, said he will meet with someone involved in the LaPeters firing Monday.

"I won't confirm that it's Mr. LaPeters," said Cheshire Saturday morning, "but I will tell you it is someone who has been mentioned in the newspapers."

LaPeters was sent a letter from Cheshire's office asking him to appear at the state attorney's office at 10 a.m. Monday.

"All I have in the letter is a reference to the sunshine matter," said LaPeters.

Asked if he plans to talk about any of his charges against Knowles, LaPeters replied, "Annoyedly."

"I definitely plan to bring it up," LaPeters said of his charges of ticket-fixing and pressure to fire an officer. "I

Cheshire said he was not aware of a federal investigation into LaPeters' firing.

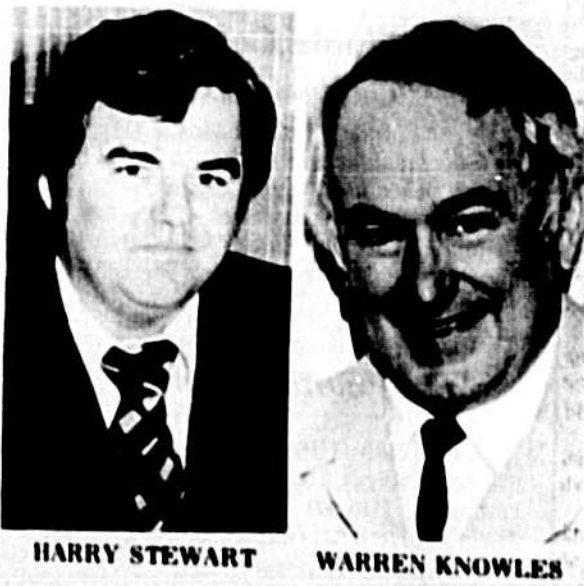
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Department of Justice community relations officer, confirmed Friday the federal government is making an inquiry into the firing. He said the justice department and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) are investigating the matter. An EEOC officer declined comment on the matter.

## Sanford To Seminole County: Want To Take Over Animal Control?

Sanford's animal control department and its \$21,000 budget has been the first area to be cut from the city's proposed \$2.8 million budget for next year.

The function of the department will be offered to the county.

The elimination of the department was included as part of the budget reviewed Friday night by the city commission. The money the city saves would go into the contingency fund.

The commission will attempt to finalize the budget at its Monday meeting and will also schedule public hearings before adoption.

City Manager Warren E. Knowles said all that remains for the city to do is to officially contact the county about the city's decision to eliminate animal control.

The takeover of the function has yet to be discussed by the county at budget hearings, but County Administrator Roger Neuwander said Friday he "would anticipate the county will be assuming the animal control function from the city."

In correspondence between the city and the county in May, Neuwander notified Knowles that the animal control function could be absorbed into the county Human Services Department.

The department's three employees will remain with the city. "We will try to absorb the three employees into the city work force," said Richard Quigley, assistant to the city manager.

The animal control division is part of the police department. The three salaried personnel since they already pay for uniforms and other expenses.

He noted that, in the past when a function was eliminated, the city had no trouble finding another job for the employees.

The only unresolved question is the fate of the building the city had been using at 201 E. 25th St.

Knowles said the humane society had asked about leasing the building.

Commissioner A.A. McClanahan said he would like the city to control the building for a least a year to see what kind of job the county does and give the city the option to regain control.

The commission also considered charging \$20 to any team that uses the city's baseball fields at night.

The idea was proposed by Commissioner John Morris to help defray the high electric bills the city had been paying—estimated at \$7,000.

The motion was defeated

## Sanford: \$2.13 In The Hole?

It has long been a principle of law that every man has his day in court. At 9 a.m. August 28, Harry Stewart will have his day naming him as defendant in a whopping \$11.87 lawsuit.

The plaintiff? The city of Sanford.

The city already has spent more than it stands to gain if successful in suing Stewart. The cost of filing the suit is \$9 and the expense of having it served on Stewart is \$12. That amounts to \$21 spent to get back \$11.87.

The suit claims that on May 24 Stewart hit a city police car causing \$11.87 damage to the police car's left front bumper. He claims he was not at fault and was not issued a ticket at the time.

"Now that the matter is in court," said Stewart after receiving the papers, "I feel obligated to file a countersuit."

Stewart's suit will ask that the city pay for damages to his car. An estimate of the damages to Stewart's car from a local body shop was set at \$94.50.

## 'We're Just Looking For Down-Home Good People' Sheltered Homes: Seminole Shortage?

A caseworker hurried in to see Tom Weinberg, administrator of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) intake office in Seminole County, in the middle of last week. She was having trouble with one of the children she had placed at a shelter home.

Shelter homes function like short-term foster homes, according to Weinberg.

Children who have been taken out of their homes, because of reports of neglect, abuse or because the children and parents are in conflict are housed in shelter homes.

Children who have been involved in criminal activity are not eligible for the program, according to Weinberg.

One of the boys in the home under discussion in Weinberg's office was beginning to complain.

"I think most of his complaints are mispicking," Weinberg told the caseworker. "The one that the mattresses are too soft. He's just kind of a demanding boy."

"I'll just have to tell him to shape up or ship out," said the caseworker.

"If things don't improve, we may have to return him to his parents," Weinberg said of the boy, "no matter how hostile the environment there."

"The thing that bothers me is that I think it's beginning to wear on her," the caseworker said of the woman at the shelter home, "and she is a super woman."

"It's bound to," responded Weinberg. "After all, she's had kids out there from outside her own family for 87 straight days. That's part of our problem in Seminole County with the sheltered home program, we don't have enough."

At Weinberg and the caseworker were discussing the one child in a sheltered home, another HRS caseworker was clearing the way for children to be removed from the care of their parents in Seminole County and placed in a shelter home in Orange County.

Normally those children would have been placed in a Seminole

County shelter home. However, the three HRS-approved shelter homes in Seminole County are full.

"We have the budget for two more," Weinberg said of the shelter home program, "and we need them badly."

HRS needs shelter homes so badly in Seminole County, according to Weinberg, that he is issuing an appeal for those interested in becoming part of the program to contact him at 221-0888.

"We had put more kids in a shelter home in Orange County last week," he noted. "That is an inconvenience to the kids and their

parents. I want Seminole County kids placed in Seminole County."

The shelter home shortage is all the more important, believes Weinberg, because it is part of an overall shortage of facilities for displaced children in Seminole County.

"I know I could place 40 children in Brevard County, because they have shelter homes, a center for kids and other facilities," said Weinberg. "All we have are the shelter homes."

"Most of the children in the program are young," said Weinberg. "It is unusual to have a 17-year-old in a shelter home."

"These are not bad kids, they are hard kids in many ways and they need a place to live," commented Weinberg.

Each shelter home is screened carefully by HRS officials and must be licensed by the state. A complete medical and social history is made of the family wanting to operate a shelter home before being certified.

"One excluding factor is the use of corporal punishment," said Weinberg, "because many of these kids come from homes where they have been beaten."

The ideal shelter home would have room for from three to seven children, if necessary. The parents in the home would be a stable, mature couple who have had experience with children.

"We're just looking for down-home good people," said Weinberg.
