Fake drowning leads to arrest

TALLAHASSEE - Kerry Steven Scheele, 29, a former Florida resident now living in Wisconsin, is charged by Florida Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson of faking his death in a scuba accident to collect on a \$1 million life insurance policy. Nelson said Scheele, while in the middle of a divorce, led his estranged wife and others to believe he drowned during a lobster diving trip off the Florida Keys on Aug. 8, 1998. Investigators later tracked him down through phone records linked to a girlfriend. Scheele was arrested Wednesday in Detroit, Wis., where he faces extradition to Florida. He was charged by the Florida Department of Insurance with application fraud, claims fraud and first-and-third-degree grand theft. Bond was set at \$20,000. Investigators said Scheele named a girlfriend as a beneficiary on a \$1 million life insurance policy. She left Monroe County within days of his reported drowning, but not before making a number of long-distance phone calls, investigators said.

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I-4 corridor leads county's economic boom

SANFORD — Anyone looking for a service or high tech oriented job might want to look in Lake Mary's booming Interstate-4 corridor.

Lake Mary is competing with Baltimore, Md., for an AIG Warranty Services center that would provide administration of

contracts for clients such as Whirlpool, Volvo, BMW, Mitsubishi and Best Buy.

However, this is just a portion of the growth taking place in the I-4 corridor and across Seminole County.

More than 2,500 new jobs are expected to be generated in Seminole County this year, according to an economic development study by the County.

"Most of those jobs are in the I-4 corri-

dor," said Bob Turk, director of Economic Development for Seminole County.

Seminole County is experiencing steady economic growth since 1990, with a 40 percent growth in employment from 1990-1998.

"We are outpacing the state and the nation in job creation," Turk said. "We have surpassed the Orlando Region. Consistency is the key."

The Heathrow International Business Center is a hot spot for finding new jobs. First USA and Convergys Corp. are both expanding into second buildings. Fiserv, a financial software company, also recently moved into a new facility.

At the International Parkway and State Road 46-A intersection, Pizzuti Developers are holding discussions with See Boom, Page 5A

Local residents mixed on school voucher issue

If it withstands a legal challenge, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush's plan for a state-wide school voucher system is one of the most dramatic developments to affect public education in the state in some time.

Approved by the Florida legislature, one piece of Bush's educational reform package calls for the state to provide the parents of children who attend failing public schools, vouchers worth approximately \$4,000 per year to help offset the cost of

their education in private or parochial schools.

Criticized by most public school officials and teachers unions and hailed by those who advocate a massive overhaul of our public school systems, the issue has left few straddling the fence. Although not a scientific method of polling, the Seminole Herald visited the Sanford Walmart this week to see what local residents feel about the idea of tax dollars being re-appropriated. While sample size of this approach does not guarantee statistical validity, person-on-

County bans nudity where alcohol is sold

SANFORD - Two Marks tried to make their mark on Tuesday. The Rev. Mark George, who opposed nudity and drinking in public places. And resident Mark Clifford who finds the two to be a splendid blend for those so inclined.

Rev. George from Casselberry pleaded with the Seminole County Commissioners to adopt the same ordinance adopted in his city in January.

Clifford, who said he was a retired Air Force pilot, suggested the commissioners back off.

"You can't regulate this," Clifford said. "There will be loopholes. And there will always be a demand for this type of thing."

To the satisfaction of the Rev. George, The BCC voted, 5-0, to approve the ordinance, which Sheriff Don Eslinger vowed he would uphold. There will be no more "Nude MacBeth" in Sheriff Don's territory.

Rebuilding History: Fire truck runs again

Efforts continue toward restoring 1922 LaFrance fire truck

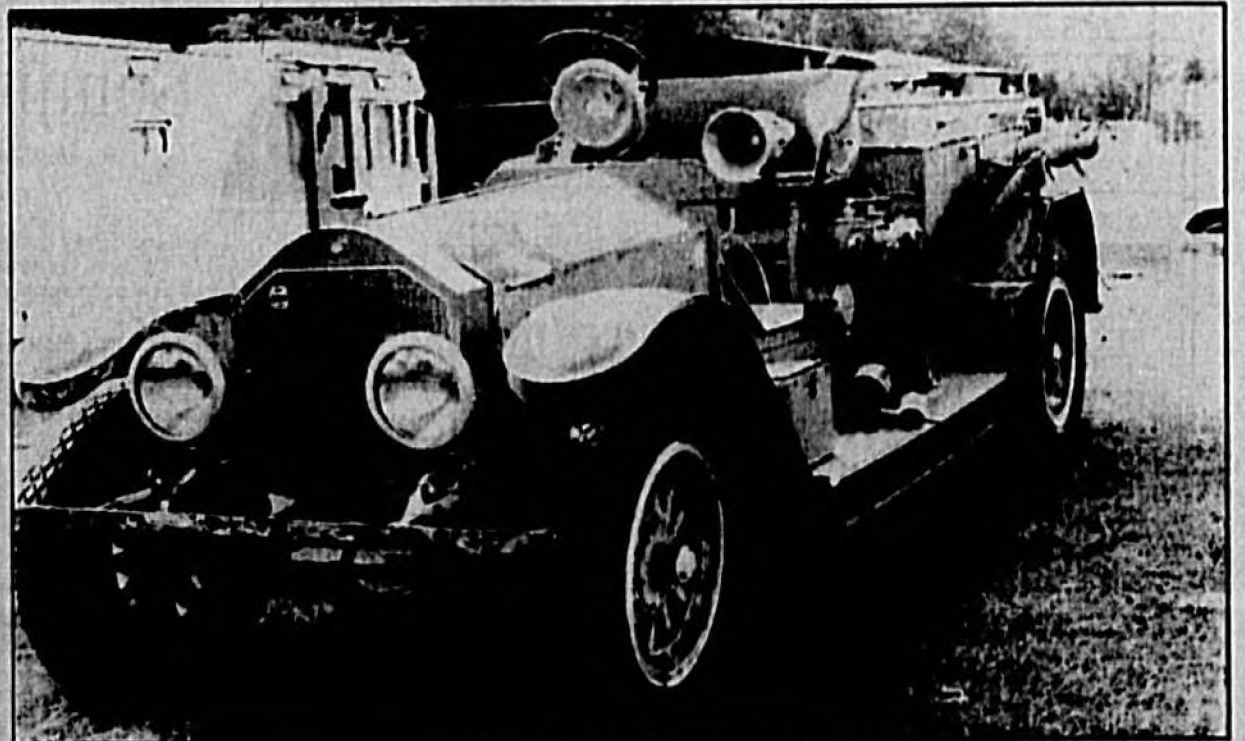
SANFORD - It's not gone, and for some people, it's not forgotten. There is still hope that the re-acquired 1922 LaFrance Fire Truck, owned by the city of Sanford, will once again roll through the city streets, probably in parades and for special occasions.

The fire truck, obtained through city and private donations in 1996, is still unusable. Firefighters at the Sanford downtown station did a great deal of the initial work when it

was first obtained. A number of citizens and the firefighters themselves helped defray some of the costs including a very generous gift of moving the vehicle to Sanford from Tennessee where it had been located.

The restoration work however, became too complex and time-consuming. Entering the picture at this point was Seminole High School, where the metal fabrication, assembly and painting was accomplished in 1998 by the school's Auto Body Class, under the instruction of Ernie McPherson.

Everything is ready to roll now except the engine. The vehicle is presently stored in Sanford Fire Station 38. The engine however, is out of commission. From the outset, it was determined that to purchase an operable LaFrance truck engine, See Truck, Page 8A

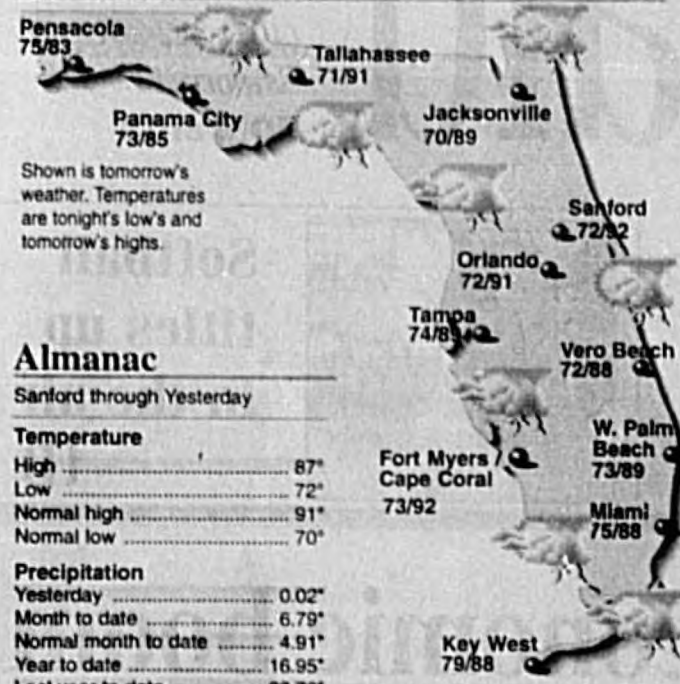

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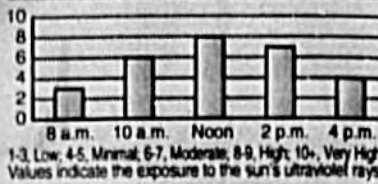

Most people don't like talking to reporters. "You're not going to put this in the newspaper, are you?" they ask. Or "You didn't hear this from me."

Reporters are paid to ask questions they themselves wouldn't want to answer. It's part of their business to find out what it is that half the world is trying to hide from the other half.

In recent years, I believe many editors and reporters have tried so hard to find out what's wrong in the world that they have forgotten an equally important obligation — to report what's right.

Most of the reported news

these days saddens rather than gladdens. There are kind, gentle stories to tell but few are telling them. For this, I believe many news organizations are to blame. Not every story has to be "hard-edged."

Yes, newspapers are the "watchdogs" of a community. But why can't there be a "puppy dog" instead of the "watchdog" in the driveway now and then?

Random acts of violence are reported, random acts of virtue ignored. Indecency creates headlines, decency is unexplored.

This newspaper — as many others — runs a daily crime log,

listing the misdeeds of men, women and some children. Imagine a newspaper running a daily Kindness Log, listing the good deeds of men, women and especially children.

Headings such as DUI, Murder, Rape, Forgery and Grand Theft would be replaced with those for Civility, Courtesy, Compassion, Gallantry, Honesty and Virtue.

A Kindness Log sampling would read:

Courtesy

Honesty & Virtue

Mr. Forget's credit cards and \$256 in cash.

I have this feeling that more people are tempted to do good deeds than they are tempted to do bad ones in the course of a day. We just don't emphasize the good deeds. Newspapers are so filled with bad news that there is little or no room left for the good news.

If newspapers began running more good news than bad news, chances are more people would buy those newspapers — and more people would be willing to talk to reporters who worked at those newspapers.

This "slanting" of the news would be far more acceptable. Consider the fact that millions and millions continue to read the work of four writers named Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, who do not deny a certain slant to their reporting.

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Police step-up enforcement of helmet law

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The Altamonte Springs police department is bringing an end to its "soft" enforcement of bicycle helmet laws within city limits, a move the department says is designed to reduce head injuries by young riders.

The change in policy could also result in the accumulation of points against future driver's licenses by those who fail to comply.

For the past year the Altamonte Springs Bike Patrol has been issuing primarily verbal warnings to enforce a 1997 law the Florida State Legislature crafted for riders under the age of 16. Widespread notifications have been made through school resource officers, but compliance by young riders has been spotty.

"It seems like the kids were not getting the hint," reflected Senior Patrol Officer Kristen Bates. "Seventy-five percent of all head injuries are directly related to riding without a helmet."

The Altamonte police department has taken considerable steps to bring more kids into compliance, including sponsorship of several bike rodeos in the city and the donation of more than 50 bike helmets for kids whose families can't afford them. Bike patrol officers have also done safety checks to make sure riders have helmets that properly fit and are complete in their design with hard shell covers and foam or pad inserts. Since verbal warnings have had limited effect, police will now begin issuing citations which will cost violators \$45, and the Community-Oriented Police Services Division will notify parents of offenders in writing that their children have received a citation.

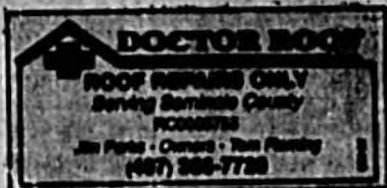
"A lot of kids never tell their parents they've been cited, the parents never know, and the fine goes unpaid," said Bates. The first offense following a

citation may be waived by either showing proof of purchase of a helmet to the Clerk of Court or producing a helmet itself. Families unable to afford bike helmets for their kids will be provided resource information on how to receive a free helmet.

"We're trying to make it as easy as possible to comply," Bates said. "We want to make sure we get the message out that if young riders don't comply and receive citations, they must be taken care of. When riders turn into drivers at the age of 16, those citations will be reflected on their driver's licenses as unpaid fines and

they could be subject to having their licenses suspended before they even get behind the wheel of a car."

Altamonte Springs police also receive help in providing free helmets to kids from the Seminole County SAFE KIDS Coalition as Operation C.H.I.L.D. (Child Helmet Implementation Lessen Danger of head injury) continues.

the-street interviews do tend to give an accurate measure of the intensity of response.

Here's what some Seminole County residents feel about the voucher program.

"Am I for vouchers? Absolutely not," replied Wanda Malone of Sanford. "If people want to send their kids to private schools they should pay for it. I've had my children in both private and public schools and they did much better in a public school setting."

Sanford's Lahoma Fayso echoed those remarks but for different reasons.

"I don't think that anything that negatively affects the public schools is a good idea," she said. "If they are going to spend more money on education, they should spend it on more money for teachers, technology, and reducing class size. I don't think we should take money away

from programs that are already established."

Paul Johnson, also of Sanford warmly embraces the ideas of school vouchers.

"I'm all for it," agreed Johnson. The public school system is a mess. If nothing else it needs some competition. I think the competition from private and parochial schools would make for a healthier educational environment period."

James Anthony, visiting from Orlando had this to say about the school voucher program.

"It's ironic you ask because me and my roommate were just having a discussion about that very topic last night. I would have to say I'm against it. I think there should be a separation of church and state and the state plays a major role in public education. I don't think the government should get involved in subsidizing religious schools."

Gary Martin of Winter Springs saw the issue in a different light.

"Anything the governor can do to help with a child's education is fine with me. I don't think public schools should necessarily have a monopoly on education our children."

Longwood's Diana McCrate was adamantly opposed to the idea of school vouchers.

"I'm not for it at all, I don't think the government has any business getting involved in private schools. If we are doing a lousy job with the public school system, we should focus on fixing it and I don't think we can fix it by channelling resources to private schools."

One final Sanford voice who asked not to be identified responded, "I'm against it. I think educational money provided by the state has to and should go to the public schools.

Public education is a tradition in this country. If parents want to send their kids to private schools let them pay for it. The state shouldn't have to."

The school voucher legislation was approved by the Florida House of Representatives by a vote of 70-48 on April 28. A day later the Florida Senate approved the bill by a vote of 25-15.

Although Florida currently has only four schools that are classified as "failing," that number could skyrocket to as many as 170 as performance standards are raised throughout the state. Those rising standards could leave as many as 156,000 sunshine state students eligible for the vouchers by the start of the 2000-2001 school year.

State constitutional challenges are certain to come from teachers unions and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Are the kids bored already? Schools sponsor adventure program for summer months

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - For the first time, elementary school students in Seminole County are taking weekly field trips to the Lake Brantley High School in Altamonte Springs for swimming lessons as part of the school board's Summer Adventure Program.

Nine elementary school sites throughout the county are participating in the program. More than 350 students are participating in the extended day child care program, up from 250 last summer.

Other activities in the summer program sponsored by the school board include trips to the Central Florida Zoo and the Student Museum in Sanford, the Environmental Center near Winter Springs, General Cinema in Lake Mary, and Home Depot in Casselberry.

"We're trying to make the programs as fun as possible," said Laura Sanborn, administrator for the extended day child care program. "There's lots of learning, but the kids don't even realize it."

Each elementary school sends student on a bus to the Lake Brantley High School pool once per week, from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Open areas are provided for students who don't want swimming lessons. A life guard and extended day care workers watch over the children.

"The kids are learning something new all the time,"

Sanborn said. "And, we have instructors that can really make it fun."

Middle schools will participate in the program starting this fall.

The increase in participation this summer could be influenced by the program's increased emphasis on recreational activities, Sanborn said. Last summer, the day care program focused on premed and space camp activities.

"It's a nice local program," Sanborn said. "They are having a ball. Adults and the kids."

Registration in the extended day program is \$90 per week or \$20 per day for the first child, with discounts for additional children. There is also a \$10 registration fee. The fee to participate in the swimming program is \$3 per day for open swimming, and \$8 per day for lessons.

The program began May 27, and it will run until Aug. 6. Activities are held from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. during the week. Students take field trips twice per week.

Sites for the program include Carillon Elementary in Oviedo, Heathrow Elementary in Lake Mary, Forest City Elementary in Altamonte Springs, Sabal Point and Wekiva elementary schools in Longwood, Rainbow Elementary in Winter Springs, Sterling Park Elementary in Casselberry, Wicklow Elementary in Sanford, and Winter Springs Elementary School.

a major hotel chain about building a 300-room hotel with conference capabilities.

The Northpointe business park is growing, with Scholastic Bookfair adding 40,000 square feet of office space. Six months ago, Florida Power Corp. moved into a new regional office.

At the Rinehart Ridge industrial park, ABB Power decided to build a new manufacturing facility instead of relocating to Mexico.

A second building is also being planned with more than 100,000 square feet of office space in Rinehart Ridge. Although a client has not been identified, the

County Commission has approved preliminary plans. The Commission has not taken action on a third new building planned in Rinehart Ridge.

The Port of Sanford and the Orlando Sanford Airport are also experiencing growth.

Entering its third year, the Small Business Incubator in the Port of Sanford has created 115 light manufacturing jobs, and it has 100 percent occupancy.

A third building was recently completed for the Small Business Incubator in the Port of Sanford. It will focus on high tech jobs in association with a NASA incubator program. There are 14 light manufacturing businesses currently in the Incubator.

Featherlite By Vantaré is expanding its sales and service facilities in the Port of Sanford.

The incubator, part of the Seminole Community College Small Business Incubator program, is staffed by the Small Business Development Center. County government and Port of Sanford officials also work together. Counselors provide advice to small businesses.

"Overall, economic growth in the region is due to strong communication between educators, business and government leaders," said John Jones, Senior Planner for Seminole County.

Officials are planning a similar incubator at the Orlando Sanford Airport that would generate international warehouse distribution and light manufacturing jobs.

The incubator would benefit from the airport's proposed free trade zone. Officials hope to have the incubator in place within fiscal year 1999-2000.

Just west of Sanford, manufacturing facilities are looking into opening up new businesses in Rand Yard, on the north end of SR 46.

Meanwhile, AIG Warranty Services would bring an estimated 550 jobs to Lake Mary by 2004, at an average wage of \$36,000.

The state is tentatively planning to give \$1.3 million in incentives to lure AIG Warranty Services to Lake Mary, in combination with the City and County each contributing \$165,000.

"The incentives are to entice them to come," Turk said. "They are not to reward them for coming."

The annual City tax revenue from AIG would be \$42,000, while the County would receive \$177,000. The school board would receive an estimated \$112,000 in annual taxes. Turk said he expects AIG will make a decision on where to move within 30 days.

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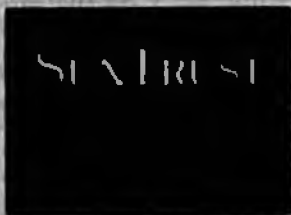
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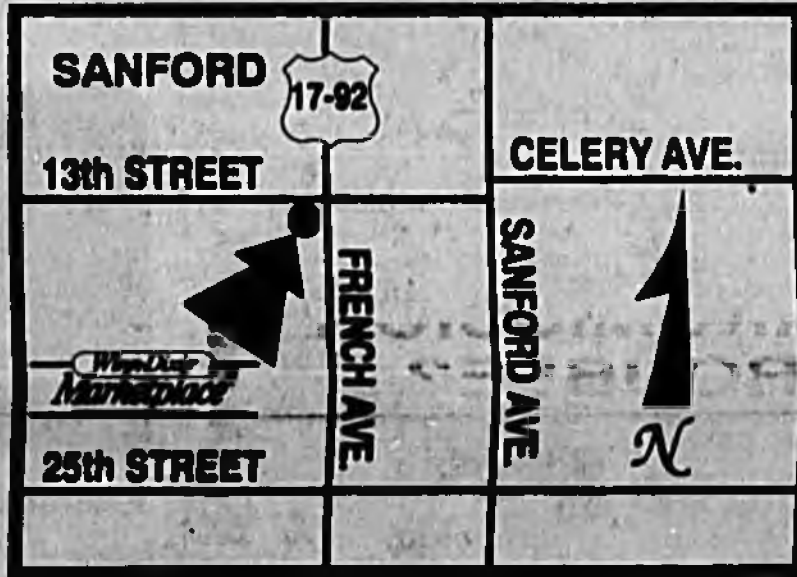

Employers must maintain certain records

The Fair Labor Standards Act establishes minimum wage, overtime pay, recordkeeping, and child labor standards affecting full-time and part-time workers in the private sector and in Federal, State, and local governments. The Fair Labor Standards Act requires that all covered employees be paid at least the minimum wage and not less than one and one-half times their regular rates of pay for overtime hours worked, unless exempt. In order to ensure that employers are paying their non-exempt employees at least minimum wage and not less than one and one-half times their regular rates of pay for overtime hours worked, the Fair Labor Standards Act requires that the employer maintain certain records.

Following is a listing of the basic records that an employer must maintain: (1) Employee's full name and social security number; (2) Home address, including zip code; (3) Birth date. If younger than 19; (4) Sex and occupation in which employed; (5) Time of day and day of week on which the employee's workweek begins;

(6) Regular hourly rate of pay for any workweek in which overtime compensation is due; (7) Hours worked each workday; (8) Total hours worked each workweek; (9) Basis on which employee's wages are paid (e.g., "\$5 and hour", "190 a week", "piecework"); (10) Total daily or weekly straight-time earnings; (11) Total premium pay for overtime hours; (12) All additions to or deductions from wages paid each pay period, including employee purchases orders or wage assignments; (13) Total wages paid each pay period; and (14) Date of payment and the pay period covered by the payment.

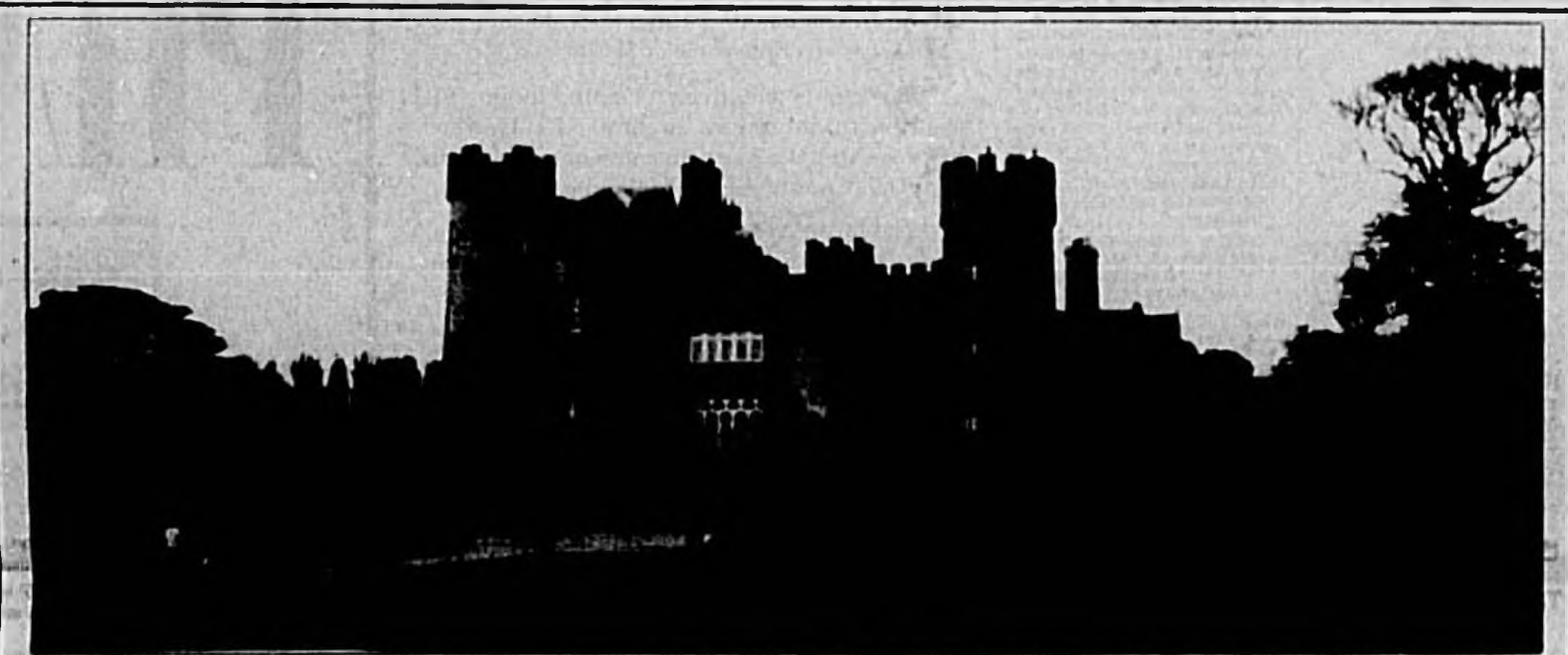
This recordkeeping adds to the administrative requirements of any business to which the Act applies. However, it is a must. Failure to comply with the requirements of the Act can subject the employer to a maximum fine of \$10,000 and imprisonment of up to six months. Fortunately, these records don't need to be retained for the time business starts and until it dissolves. The length of time the employer must retain records, however, depends on the type of record. The employer must preserve for at least three years: (1) All payroll and other records; (2) All written collective bargaining agreements and any amendments or additions thereto; (3) All written plans, trusts, and employment contracts; and (4) A record of total dollar volume of sales or business total volume of goods purchased or received.

Additionally, the employer must preserve for at least two years: (1) All basic time and earning cards or sheets on which are entered the daily starting and stopping time of the individual employees; (2) All tables of schedules of the

employer which provide the piece rates or other rates used in computing straight-time earnings, wages, or salary or overtime pay computation; and (3) All records of additions to or deductions from all wages paid.

The Fair Labor Standards Act requires that the employer maintain certain records. As noted, those records must be quite detailed and may add considerable time and expense to the administration of business. However, that recordkeeping helps ensure that employers will pay their non-exempt employees at least minimum wage and not less than one and one-half times their regular rates of pay for overtime hours worked. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of Employment Law.

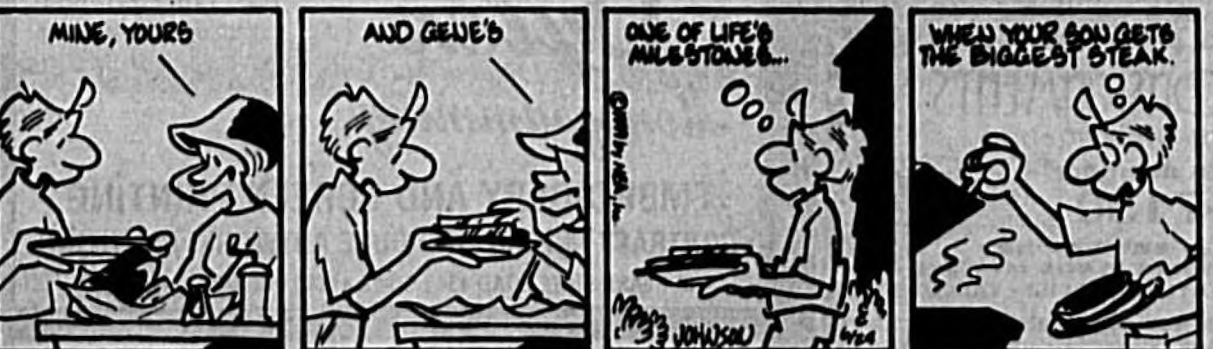

Ten to the century

A longtime friend of mine, Albert Benjamin, celebrated his 90th birthday a couple of months ago. He has a broad Scottish accent, writes with humor, plays an excellent game, but isn't at his best as a nonplaying captain! (It's a long story.)

In today's deal, two clubs was strong, artificial and forcing. Two spades promised at least five spades and eight points. Now North used the Grand Slam Force, asking his partner to bid seven with two of the top three spade honors.

West's double was absurd. With the opponents looking for seven, he was doubling for one down, turning 100 into 300. It's not clever when it paints a picture of the distribution for declarer.

Benjamin realized West had all four

missing trumps for the double. So, he took dummy's two heart winners, followed by the three top clubs, discarding a diamond from hand. After the ace-king of diamonds, a diamond ruff in hand, and the heart queen, everyone was down to four cards, North, West and South having only trumps remaining.

Benjamin led a low trump from hand, forcing West to split his honors; otherwise, dummy's nine would win the trick. However, Benjamin just played low from the dummy, leaving West to lead away from the Q-J-9 into dummy's K-9-6 and his A-7-5. West couldn't win another trick, so six spades doubled made.

Albert's wife, Judy, played in six spades undoubled, going the normal one down. After teasing her for failing to find the winning line, Albert said, "I received the well-deserved punishment meted out to all erring husbands."

ASK DR. GOTT

Study shows hair/breast cancer link

DEAR DR. GOTT: I read somewhere that X-ray analysis of hair samples can diagnose breast cancer. Is this off the wall or what?

DEAR READER: I, too, was floored by the revelation reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association (May 5, 1999). Veronica James, a physicist at the Australian National University, Canberra, recently released the findings of her study in the Journal Nature (Volume 398, 1998). By using sophisticated X-ray analysis of human hair, Dr. James discovered that women with breast cancer had consistently distinctive changes in the X-ray diffraction patterns, to the point that the test might well be appropriate for general use.

Predictably, the initial response of the medical community was disbelief — until her findings were unequivocally confirmed by three other investigative teams. Now, scientists at the Brookhaven National Laboratory are attempting to validate her results.

Basically, when exposed to a special type of X-ray analysis, hair samples from women with breast cancer showed a distinctive pattern. So did women without breast cancer, but who were considered to be at risk

because of a family history of malignancy. Dr. James believes that the altered pattern is caused by an abnormal phospholipid bilayer of the cell membrane that reflects the risk of cancer. Ordinarily, scalp hair was tested; if a woman dyed her hair, pubic hair was substituted.

I don't know about you, but I am thunderstruck by this information. Not only does it have the potential for displacing mammograms as a screening strategy, it holds promise for identifying women with a higher-than-normal risk for breast cancer, long before these mammograms would indicate a problem. Instead of undergoing the uncomfortable and expensive procedure of mammography, tomorrow's

women may be able simply to submit a hair sample to a national laboratory and discover if they are at risk. A breakthrough? You bet. However, before you write me for specific information, wait until Dr. James' discovery has been verified and is in general use, a process that may take several years.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm slim and always thought I was in good shape, until I took a stress test last year. I had to quit before I reached the maximum heart rate; I was beat. Since then, I started exercising in a carefully monitored program at our local gym. I feel better and have improved my muscle tone, but I've been gaining weight. I'm a 40-year-old female. I'm tempted to stop exercising. Should I?

DEAR READER: Your question is more a series of statements. I'll counter with a question: Exercise is beneficial and has made you feel better, so rather than stopping it, why not eat less?

if one could even be found, would be nearly impossible. It was decided to rebuild the present engine. In doing so, any parts which may now be beyond replacement, may have to be specially manufactured.

The cost involved in such a rebuilding however, and the lack of funds, has brought the matter to a complete halt. The present need is for additional financial assistance, and offers to rebuild the present engine.

In recalling the good old days when the vehicle was still in Sanford, Deputy Fire Chief Ron Neel said it was located at the city's fire station, in the 100 block of south Palmetto Avenue.

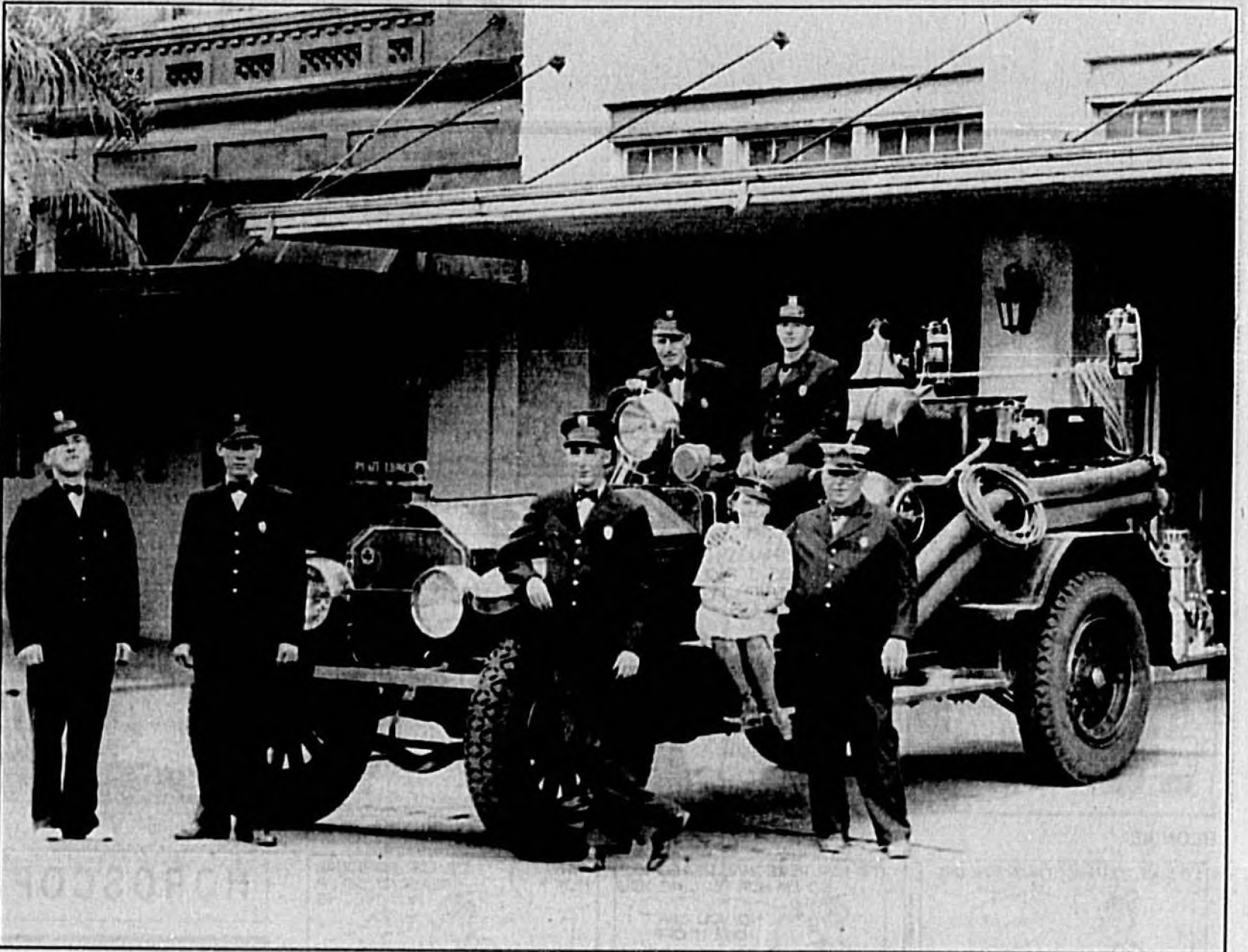
"Every Thursday, one of the officers would start up the truck by winding the crank," said Neel. "Once it started running, he'd drive it outdoors and around the block. That old engine used to smoke and smoke, but I can still see him driving around, usually without

a shirt and smoking a big cigar. Neel said actually, the drive wasn't necessarily to keep the engine running, but was to pull it out of the fire station so the men could wash down the floor.

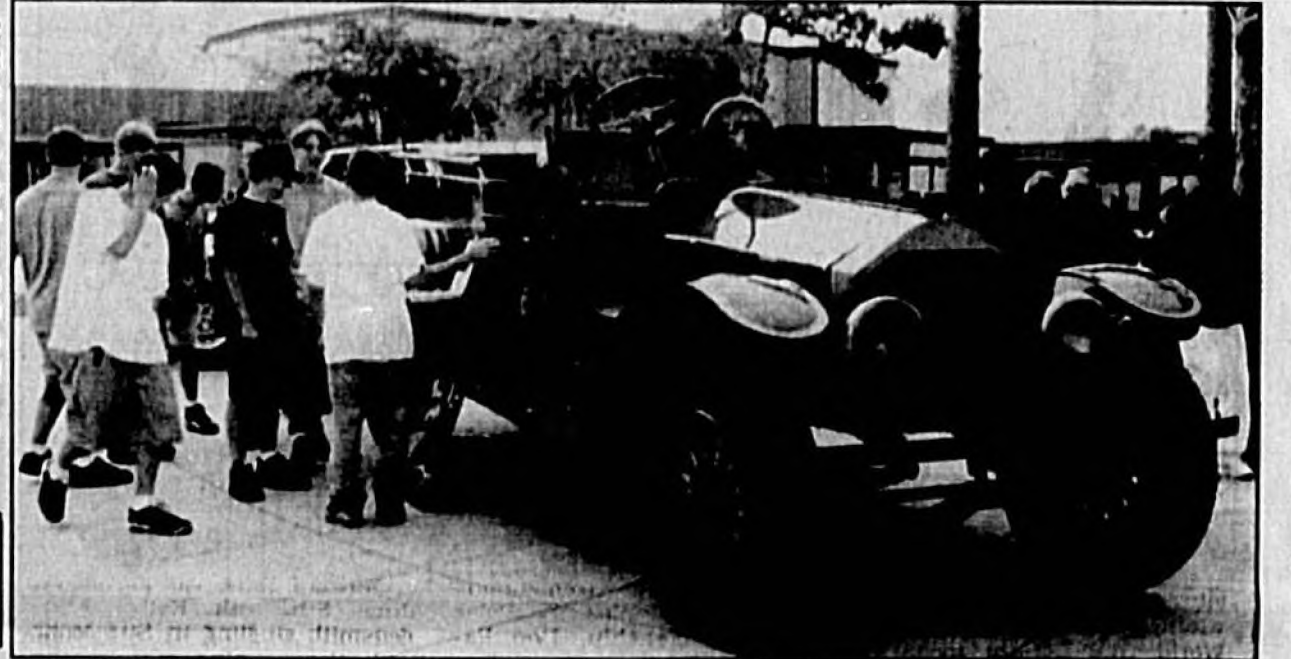
One of the firefighters, seen in the old photo of the truck, was identified as A.L. Thomas, who Neel said not only worked in the fire department but ran a barber shop next to the fire station, (in the structure identified with the sign saying "Plate Lunch," which was an additional neighboring business).

It is said the old truck remained in the Sanford area into the 50s and 60s, but information regarding when it was sold or removed from the city, has not been researched to any specific details.

The law now reads: No nudity in establishments licensed to sell alcohol.

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New UCF women's coaches on board

ORLANDO - University of Central Florida athletics director Steve Sloan announced the hiring of Amanda Cromwell and Patricia Allison as the new head coaches of the women's soccer and tennis teams, respectively.

Cromwell succeeds Karen Richter, who left UCF in late April for the head coaching position at Auburn University.

Allison succeeds Michael Dubin who, as interim coach last year, led the women's tennis team to the Trans America Athletic Conference championship.

Cromwell, a native of Alexandria, Virginia, comes to UCF after a two-year stint at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County.

As head coach of the Retrievers (1996 and 1997), Cromwell posted a 20-15-1 record and led her team to the Big South Conference final in 1997. She took 1998 off from coaching to train with the National Team.

Prior to assuming the head coaching duties at Maryland-Baltimore County, Cromwell spent 1992 through 1994 as an assistant coach at her alma mater, the University of Virginia.

As a member of the U.S. National Team since 1991, Cromwell has participated on the 1993 World University Games silver medal winning and 1995 Women's World Cup bronze medal winning teams. In 1996, she earned a gold medal as an alternate on the Olympic team.

"We are fortunate to be able to hire someone of Amanda's background," said Sloan. "She will bring a lot to our program."

Cromwell, a midfielder for the Virginia soccer team from 1998 to 1992, was a two-time All-America and Soccer America All-MVP team selection (1990 & 1991) and a four-time all-Atlantic Coast Conference selection. A member of the 1990 NCAA quarterfinalist team, she captained the 1991 squad which made it to the NCAA Final Four.

Cromwell, who earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in biology from Virginia in 1992, will begin her new position July 2nd.

Allison comes to UCF from the University of Oregon, where she has been an assistant coach since 1996.

In her four years at Oregon, Allison helped lead the Ducks to the NCAA West Regional for the first time in school history as well as earning their first individual and team national rankings in 1996-97. Off the court, Allison helped guide the Ducks to two ITA All-America team awards for their academic successes.

Prior to her assistant coaching job at Oregon, Allison spent 21 years coaching in the club setting, working with various age groups and levels of experience. She has been the director of tennis at three different facilities in Florida and California. As a member of the United States Professional Tennis Association, Allison has served in its testing program and on the Florida Women's ATP Committee.

A native of Hollywood, Allison earned a scholarship to play at Florida International University which, during her career, finished in the top seven in the country. As a senior at FIU she won the regional tournament and appeared at the ALAW national tournament in both her junior and senior years. Allison earned a degree in modern languages from FIU in 1981.

Allison began her new position at UCF June 22nd.

Scott Goodyear enjoys view from top of IRL entering Pikes Peak

FOUNTAIN, Colo. - The pieces have always been in place for Scott Goodyear to win races. And despite being winless in his first 20 Pep Boys Indy Racing League starts, Goodyear knew that.

Now everyone else does.

Goodyear has won two of the first four races this season, at Phoenix and Texas. He also leads the Pep Boys Million championship points race by 19 over second-place Jeff Ward heading into the Radisson 200 on June 27 at Pikes Peak International Raceway.

"I'm not sure I'm doing anything all that different from before," Goodyear said. "But it's nice to know the competition is probably scratching their heads right now. But the pressure isn't off, because it's been expected that we will win races. We were in disbelief and disappointment last year when we didn't win."

After coming so close in 1998 -- he finished in the top five four times -- Goodyear knew there was no need for a major overhaul of his second-year program. But there was still something keeping Pennzoil Panther Racing from Victory Lane.

Instead of brooding in the frustration, Panther Racing went to work. There was no break between the 1998 and 1999 season -- just a lot of testing and strategy sessions.

Panther considered switching from a G Force chassis to a Dallara, since Dallara chassis won eight of the 11 league events last year. But the team was pleased with the '99 update kit and decided to stick the G Force.

"G Force made such an improvement on the chassis from last year," Goodyear said. "Now we feel we're very competitive with the Dallara, so that's a big step. And that the tires are great, so that's another step.

"When you have that, you have the confidence as a team and as a driver to be able to get to the next level."

After thrashing through the off-season, Goodyear fully expected to start his second season with Panther Racing with a win at the season opener in Orlando. He brushed second in the Pennzoil Panther G Force-Aurora.

"When we left Orlando this year, everybody this building was disappointed," Goodyear said. "We'd done so much testing over the winter, making a lot of small improvements that have resulted in a big gain. It wasn't a case of will we win a race, it was when. And now that we've won two it's, OK, great, we want more."

"We've got so much more experience with the crew and our new engineer, Andy Brown. When you walk in the building now, it's different. We're probably more driven now."

That's because the championship is a realistic goal. Goodyear has finished on the podium in three of the season's first four races, including his two wins.

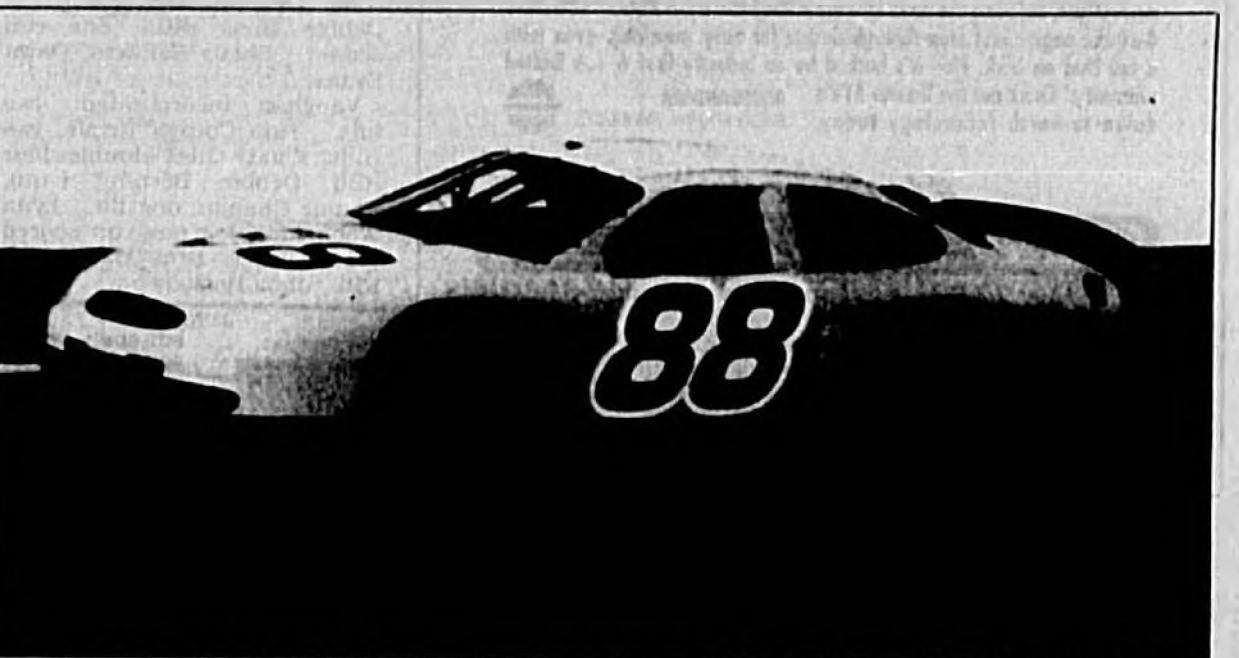
"We just have the right chemistry and the right situation, and right now I'm probably enjoying what I do more than I ever have before," Goodyear said. "We're out there for the wins, and if we win enough races, the championship will take care of itself."

Still with six races left on the circuit, Goodyear knows his points lead is anything but secure.

"In my estimation, the lead doesn't mean a whole lot until the last race," Goodyear said. "It just takes one DNF. If we don't finish at Pikes Peak this weekend, we'll be out of the lead."

There was never any doubt that Goodyear had the talent to win races. He had won two earlier in his career -- the 1992

rookie drivers Elliott Sadler and Buckshot Jones have been testing in hopes of learning the magic that will make their cars competitive for the rest of the season.

Winston Cup rookies share their experiences behind the scenes

DAYTONA BEACH - Week in and week out, hundreds of thousands of race fans can follow the progress of their favorite drivers through television, radio, newspapers and the Internet.

However, the day-to-day lives of NASCAR Winston Cup drivers are not reported as much. This week, a couple of Winston Cup's newest drivers, Buckshot Jones and Elliott Sadler, tested their cars at Daytona International Speedway in preparation for next week's Pepsi 400.

Sadler and Jones entered their rookie seasons as one car teams. Unlike other professional sports, they have spent their rookie year learning from their own experiences and the experiences of their crews rather than as part of a multi-car team.

"You can have all the money in the world, but if you don't have the basic information it makes it tough," said Jones. "Our biggest problem is not having the basic information accumulated by a veteran team."

"I'm with an experienced race team and that's making up for a lot of the disadvantages of being a rookie," said Sadler, second in the Raybestos Rookie of the Year standings. "I'm having a great time with the Wood Brothers, but there's stuff I have to learn on my own."

Competing in the Winston Cup Series means racing from February to November. Drivers are

pulled in every direction from racing to qualifying to testing to sponsor commitments.

"I never get tired of being around a race car or the track," said Sadler. "I get tired of the airports and hotels, but driving makes it all worth while. It's like a vacation to me."

"Monday through Wednesday, there always seems to be a phone stuck in my ear," said Jones. "If I'm lucky, my appearances are within driving distance, otherwise it's commercial flights because we don't have a private jet."

However, from another perspective, the Winston Cup Series can be quite rewarding to rookie drivers.

But just how much have Sadler and Jones learned about the Series, the tracks, and their cars so far this season?

"It's a learning process and it makes no difference if I ran a Busch car at that track or not," said Jones. "Cup cars require a different setup and that can hurt you if you're not where you need to be."

Testing may be just another day in the life of a race car driver, but as these drivers know, it's the testing which can be an invaluable tool in their season and careers.

"We're going to take some on the chin every now and then, but we think that makes for better people," said Sadler.

For sure, they'll both be in Daytona next week looking to show what they've learned and trying to turn that rookie curve right side up.
