FCAT scores higher, but more will fail

A higher number of Seminole County third-graders passed the FCAT reading exam this year, although a larger number from last year may be held back as a result of a new state law.

Of the 1,795 Seminole students who took the test, about 4,075 — or 85 percent — scored at Level 2 or higher on this year's test. The remaining 15 percent of the class failed to pass the exam, which means they may not be promoted to the fourth grade unless they can prove their reading has improved by the end of the summer. Last year, 18 percent or

Students who score at Level 1 in reading must repeat third grade, according to new law

Seminole's third graders scored at Level 1. Gov. Jeb Bush announced Monday that 23 percent of the state's third-graders failed the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test. It's fewer students than last year, but with the end of social promotion, more students than ever will repeat the third grade.

"We continue to see real progress, but the number of students scoring at Level 1 shows that we still have much work to do," Gov. Bush said. "With the end of social promo-

tion, we have an unprecedented opportunity to provide students with the time and tools they need to be successful in the classroom."

The purpose of the FCAT is to make sure students are learning the basic skills they are supposed to be learning in school. These basic skills are called the Sunshine State Standards, and were created by teachers in the mid-1990s.

FCAT scores fall into one of five levels —

Level 5 is the highest; Level 1 is the lowest. Beginning this year, third-graders who score Level 1 in reading on the FCAT must repeat the third grade, unless there is other evidence that proves these students can read on grade level. For example, students who scored Level 1 on the FCAT but have already passed the Stanford 9 will be promoted. They may also be promoted if they pass by completing a portfolio, pass the Stanford 9 after summer reading assistance or are EST (Exceptional Student Education) students who were previously retained.

FDOT tells businesses to deal with profit loss

SANFORD — The Florida Department of Transportation tells businesspeople along State Road 40 in Sanford to deal with profit loss caused by incorrect and missing directional signs until construction ends.

As reported last month in the *Seminole Herald*, businesspeople say would-be patrons traveling east and west bound on I-4 are unaware of their businesses on State Road 40 because of the lack of signage.

For example, when traveling westbound on I-4, the only directional signs at the State Road 40 exit are for gas stations. However, while traveling eastbound on I-4, there are no signs to direct people to exit for restaurants, hotels or gas stations.

"That intersection has been under construction," said Roger Eudy, DOT state administrator for the logo sign program. "Although we have been dealing with this issue for some time, there is nothing we can do about it because of the construction. It is just now reaching a point that we can make some type of decision."

According to Eudy, logo signs are the last items to be added to a road under construction.


The contractor, Florida Logos Inc., plans to meet with the district traffic operations engineer in a few weeks to decide what signs can be installed, he said.

During the meeting, officials will determine whether the proposed signs meet the requirements outlined in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD). According to this manual, which is followed by all DOT offices within the United States, there must be a minimum of 800 feet between signs on a major interstate. This allows drivers time to look at the sign, make a decision and follow through. Off-ramps require only 150 feet because of decreased speeds.

"We do the best we can with signage as many people as we can according to the rules," said Eudy.

The logo program is a great program.

According to Fred Fennell, district traffic operations engineer with DOT, the first-time Florida Logos Inc. submitted the plans for logo signs at the State Road 40

Officers feel effect of Taser during training

More than 100 Sanford law enforcement officers are in shock over a new weapon recently acquired by the city's police department.

The gun is called the Advance Laser M-26, a less lethal weapon that uses electricity to stop suspects in their tracks. Within the next 60 days, every sworn officer on the city's force will carry the new device — but not before they experience for themselves the intense electrical force of the laser.

"We've got the lasers in inventory," said Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen. "There are 111 lasers, enough for each sworn position. But, before they can carry one, they have to go through one day of training."

The recent laser acquisition follows two years of research by police and city officials. Police Chief Brian Tooley previously said he wanted to make sure the weapon was the right product for his department before purchasing the device.

In January, an in-house demonstration was held at the city's police headquarters. Tooley approached City Commission soon after and

Decision expected for lease agreement

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners will vote Tuesday on whether to accept a lease agreement to relocate the Seminole

County Supervisor of Elections office to the Orlando Sanford International Airport. The proposed lease

would give Sandra "Sandy" Goard, supervisor of elections, and her staff an estimated 18,168 square feet of office and warehouse space. This is more than double their current location on West 1st Street in Sanford.

The proposal to move the offices to the airport was first brought before Commission by Goard in early April. At that time, Commission voted 4-1 to negotiate a lease agreement between the county and the Sanford Airport Authority, with Commissioner Carlton D. Henley voting against it.

If approved, the airport authority will move forward with plans to build the office site. Goard's move-in deadline is April 2004.

The original floor plan was an estimated 20,000 square feet. However, in an attempt to keep costs low, Commissioner Grant E. Maloy requested that Goard work with county staff employees to review the space needs in hopes of reducing the size of the building.

Goard fulfilled this request, reducing the overall structure by nearly 3,000 square feet. The revised floor plan was designed specifically with additional personnel and voter services needs in mind.

The building reserves approximately 4,000 square feet for warehouse storage, nearly 1,000 for training purposes and approximately 2,500 as a bin room. The remaining areas include offices, conference rooms and common

First public hearing scheduled regarding new Magnolia Club development

SANFORD — City Commissioners will hold the first of two public hearings regarding the proposed development of Magnolia Club, a residential townhome community, Monday.

If approved, approximately 25 acres of private property will be annexed into the city and then rezoned from agricultural to planned development to allow for the construction of the 114-unit townhome community. Currently,

two single-family homes and accessory structures reside on the property.

The property to be developed is located west of Mellonville Avenue and east of Andrews Road. Residents of the adjacent community of Rose Hill are concerned that the new community will "affect their way of life."

Taking this into consideration, Commission asked engineers to review the proposed site, looking at traffic, water drainage and compatibility issues.

According to their findings, the proposed development would not cause adverse impacts to the water drainage or roadways in the area.

Furthermore, city staff found the development to be consistent with other projects in the area.

"We're trying to work together with the community," said Ken Burke, property owner on Andrews Road. "I've never run into a situation like this. We've been verbally attacked — all for selling our land."

In order to further ensure the least impact on the surrounding

areas, mandatory buffering between the Rose Hill subdivision would take place. This would include a 10-foot high masonry wall located approximately 38 feet from the west property line, and the internal access road will be shifted to the east of the masonry wall.

Also, the proposed units will remain 105 feet away from the property line on the west, and the 35-foot wide natural buffer area along the west property line will remain.

The Burke's plan to move their house from Andrews Road to a

community adjacent to Rose Hill if the acquisition is approved.

"We have put our lives on hold for six months," said Rebecca Burke, homeowner. "Our house has been vandalized. We're no longer trying to cause problems, we just want to sell our property."

City Commission will also



Under the contract with the Sanford Airport Authority, the lease rate would be \$8.09 per square foot and include custodial service, HVAC maintenance, pest control and landscape lawn maintenance. The cost per year would be \$146,980.

The proposed lease is standard for the county except an addition made by the airport authority to charge \$.29 or 1.5 percent, whichever is greater, if the lease payment is more than 10 days late.

The proposed lease is for 10 years, with two five-year renewals! The lease rate will remain the same for the first five years and will increase by three percent in years six through 10.

Commission will also:

- Decide whether to approve final plans for the Florida Power & Light unmanned substation expansion. The site is needed to meet increasing demands for electricity in the area. The 3.34-acre project is located approximately 200 feet south of State Road 46, on the east side of Rinehart Road. The expansion portion encompasses 2.25 acres of existing unmanured substation leaving .09 for development.
- Decide on proposed amendment to the Seminole County Code in regard to alcoholic beverage consumption. The amendment states that the sale and service of alcoholic beverages must cease at 2 a.m. However, patrons may remain in establishments

SEMINOLE SUMMARY

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Ready to run. The worst kept political secret in Seminole County was officially let out of the closet this week when District 1 County Commissioner **Grant Maloy** announced he would run for county tax collector, a position currently held by **Ray Valdes**.

The rumor mill has been buzzing about a possible Maloy-Valdes race for at least a year. Maloy was first elected in 1996, at which time he made a **Newt Gingrich**-type pledge to serve only two terms as county commissioner. After Maloy won re-election in 2000 with a commanding victory over **Andrew Van Gaale**, speculation turned to whether the young commissioner would uphold his pledge.

He has, if only to the letter of the promise and not the spirit. It's semantics, I know, but volunteering to retire from one political office only to jump into a campaign for another isn't exactly the best example of shunning a political career that politicians would have us believe when they pull such stunts.

Still, Maloy is the first elected county official in more than a decade to leave on his own terms. (Former Sanford City Commissioner Whitey Eckstein did the same in March.)

What's his chance of winning? It's early but I wouldn't bet against him.

Tom Maloy is a tireless campaigner who has beaten the odds before. He's also not afraid to buck the system and stand alone for what he believes. Many a time Maloy has been the lone dissenter on commission action, earning him the nickname "Commissioner No." That hasn't stopped him from being an effective commissioner, and he has earned the respect, grudgingly in some cases, from his colleagues.

In addition, Maloy is reaching out to some of the county's top movers and shakers, most notably former Sanford mayor and current airport czar **Larry Dale**. They had lunch last week at the **Colonial Room**, to bury the hatchet, as Dale put it.

Maloy, a Republican, might first have to dig the cleaver out of Dale's back, or vice versa, depending on your point of view. During the 2000 District 1 race, Dale, also a Republican backed Van Gaale by raising money for the GOP-turned-Democrat candidate. One of Maloy's campaign mailers blasted Van Gaale for **warning support from "Larry & the good ole boys."** The piece — complete with a menacing picture of Dale chomping on a cigar and wearing a top hat and tails — referred to Dale as a "controversial developer/politician" and claimed Van Gaale was "on Mayor Dale's payroll for years."

Maloy's claim that Dale is a controversial developer/politician is a fair assessment. Larry likes to use the shock and awe method when dealing with problems, though in recent months he has adopted a more diplomatic approach. (Maybe dealing with all those Brits out at the fair port is finally rubbing off.)

The assertion that Van Gaale was on Dale's payroll is disingenuous. Van Gaale was employed with the city of Sanford during Dale's administration but, as anyone who studied the recent strong mayor referendum should know, Dandy Andy owed his employment more to the city manager than the mayor.


Whether Dale and "the good ole boys" choose to back him, Maloy has a shot at winning the seat. Like any long-term incumbent, Valdes is ripe for the picking. Already Maloy is making hay of an **Orlando Sentinel** article from last year detailing land purchases made by Valdes and his family during property auctions for back taxes. (The buzz **Around The Clock** at the time was that Maloy or his supporters planted the story with the daily paper.) The land purchases weren't illegal, but bet on Maloy to play the ethics card over and over in the coming campaign.

If Valdes chooses to run for re-election, and at this point it appears he will, this will be one of the more competitive county races in 2004.

The assertion that Van Gaale was on Dale's payroll is disingenuous. Van Gaale was employed with the city of Sanford during Dale's administration but, as anyone who studied the recent strong mayor referendum should know, Dandy Andy owed his employment more to the city manager than the mayor.

Whether Dale and "the good ole boys" choose to back him, Maloy has a shot at winning the seat. Like any long-term incumbent, Valdes is ripe for the picking. Already Maloy is making hay of an **Orlando Sentinel** article from last year detailing land purchases made by Valdes and his family during property auctions for back taxes. (The buzz **Around The Clock** at the time was that Maloy or his supporters planted the story with the daily paper.) The land purchases weren't illegal, but bet on Maloy to play the ethics card over and over in the coming campaign.

If Valdes chooses to run for re-election, and at this point it appears he will, this will be one of the more competitive county races in 2004.

was given approval to purchase the new weapons with money from a law enforcement grant. The cost of purchasing and implementing the Taser is \$83,000, which includes the guns, holsters and officer training.

The all-day training began earlier this month and will continue for the next few weeks, Cohen said. As part of the learning experience, every officer and investigator who carries the Taser must first experience what it feels like to be shot by one.

The Taser handgun employs electro-muscular disruption (EMD) technology to subdue unruly suspects. At a range of up to 21 feet, an officer can incapacitate a person regardless of mental focus, training, size or drug induced dementia.

The Advance Taser is far more

effective — and at times safer — than other less-lethal self-defense devices, such as pepper sprays. It is solely used to stop the most hardened of targets — the extremely violent, aggressive and drug induced suspects.

According to D.G.G. Taser President Russell Slender, who presented January's demonstration to the police department, the M-26 allows officers to do something they've never been able to do before — act quickly and proactively without causing harm to the suspect or the officer. The Taser is not intended as a substitute for lethal force. However, it may help prevent injury when a suspect resists arrest.

Incapacitation occurs in a suspect less than a second after being hit by the Taser's two probes. An automatic timing mechanism in the device applies an electric

charge for five seconds.

There are no long term injuries associated with the Taser. A person will feel dazed for several seconds after being hit by the device, but recovery is fast and the effects stop the instant the M-26 shuts off. The only evidence that a person has been hit by a Taser is the minor skin irritations inflicted by the two probes and the data stored in a microchip located on the handheld device.

A suspect hit by a Taser, however, will feel pain. Officers who have already gone through the one day training will vouch getting hit by the gun is far from a pleasant experience.

I would rather get hit by the dog than get hit with this thing," said K-9 Officer Robert Shull, who went through the training on Thursday. "It is the most intense tool the department has ever had."

Shull said the Taser experience was literally breathtaking.

"Every muscle I have was constricting," he said. "In my mind, I was trying to move my arms, but I couldn't."

According to Cohen, Sanford officers have already used the Taser on two different occasions. In both cases, the suspects were incapacitated and apprehended with no injuries reported.

In the future, the police spokeswoman said it is possible the threat of the Taser may stop suspects without the weapon being drawn. The device's reputation may make people think twice before they run or become violent.

It may be like what we experience with the canine," Cohen said. "Sometimes, when a suspect hears that the canine will be deployed, they get back in the car and don't run. When an officer draws a

Taser, maybe the suspect will also decide not to run."

"Just talking to the officers who have been through the training, again,"

they don't want to repeat the experience," she said. "Most have no desire to be hit by a Taser again."



exit, they failed to fall within these restrictions.

According to Ferrell, the company has not made an effort to re-schedule the meeting to submit new plans, as believed by Eudy.

As for the directional signs, the Herald reported that drivers traveling eastbound on I-4 who take Exit 101 to State Road 46, a two-mile off ramp, are becoming increasingly frustrated because of the incorrect signage. The directional signs located on the exit read as though State Road 46 only takes drivers to Mount Dora, and implies that is the home of the Sanford Historic District. Furthermore, it directs those looking for Sanford to take State Road 417, which leads them to Orlando.

According to former Sanford-resident Monarcha Marcell, she drafted a letter regarding the issue of the directional signs to the Sanford City Commission in March 2002.

"I wanted to get people pointed in the right direction so the historic district can be enjoyed by all," she said.

As a follow-up to Marcell's letter, City Commissioner Art Woodruff instructed City Planning Director Jay Marder to look into the issue.

"He [Marder] spoke with the correct people within DOT in August of last year and requested that an additional green sign

pointing to the city of Sanford be placed there," explained Roger Iftikhar, city engineer. "We are in time to follow up, but we are waiting to hear back."

According to Ferrell, DOT was aware of the above-mentioned problem and is working to correct the issue.

The construction on the ramp is part of the St. Johns River Project and this section of construction should be completed in the fall or early winter. When construction is complete, a brown Sanford Historic District sign will be placed about a mile before exit 101 to show drivers to take I-4C for the district and Amtrak Auto Train.

That will help orient people as to which exit to take to get to the

The current signs will remain the same. However, once drivers reach the traffic light at State Road 46 another sign will direct them to the right to reach the Sanford Historic District and to the left to travel to Mount Dora.

"One of our biggest problems when the beltway came through is that all roads lead to Sanford and we have to properly educate that," said Ferrell.

Marcell and others are concerned it will now cost taxpayers more money to resolve the problem because the road is functioning.

According to Ferrell, there is no difference in cost caused by the timing of the sign installation.

to offer reading camps or other programs during the summer for students who scored at Level 1. Those who show they possess required competency in third-grade reading will be promoted to the fourth grade.

"Through a concerted effort this summer among parents, teachers and educators statewide, I am confident a significant number of students who scored at Level 1 will build the skills they need to move to the fourth grade," Gov. Bush said.

Although some experts say children who don't meet the basic reading skills by the end of the third grade struggle with their school careers, not every educator agrees with holding a student back based on one test.

"I am not for mandatory retention," said Idyllwild Elementary School Principal David Scott. "It's based on a single test. It's one day, one test, that determines your future."

As a principal, Scott has been involved in the retention process for many years. He doesn't disagree that some students should not move to the next grade level if they are not ready, but he believes one test should not determine a student's fate.

"There are good retentions where students are not mentally or developmentally ready to move on," he said. "The decision to have a student repeat a grade level is made by teachers and parents. I know of numerous examples where students have repeated a grade and have done very well. But, with the new law, I think it's placing too many burdens on one event."

Scott said he found out Wednesday which students at his school scored at Level 1. Although he expected to see some students' names on the list

it includes all curriculum groups including special education students. There was one name that appeared on a page that shocked the principal.

"There was one student who took us off guard," he said. "She has been on the honor roll. She was just a few points away from scoring at Level 1."

Scott said he doesn't believe the third grader will be held back because she possesses the skills required by the Sunshine State Standard. Her classroom work - which will be used for her portfolio - along with her projected score on the Standard will enable her to move on to the fourth grade.

As an alternative to student retention, Scott said he would prefer to see third-graders who score at a Level 1 on the FCAT receive intensive reading instruction during the fourth grade. It would enable students to move on to the next grade level while allowing them to catch up with their peers in regard to their reading skills.

"Testing helps identify children with academic needs," he said. "That helps us make some dynamic changes in our teaching."

Based on previous scores, Scott said his school has seen improvement in the areas of reading and writing. Along with resource assistants, the school now has a reading coach as a result of previous test scores.

The additional instruction and emphasis on reading and writing has "worked" at Idyllwild. Although the completed FCAT results haven't been released yet, students' scores at Idyllwild decreased from last year and for the first time an Idyllwild fourth-grader scored a one on the perfect score on the writing assessment.

I cry a lot

There's nothing wrong with tears of joy and sorrow

When my father was in his late 50's and I was a teenager, I often criticized him for getting tears in his eyes as the result of a particular situation.

One benefit of being allowed to write a personal column for the Seminole Herald is that I am allowed to vent my personal feelings. In effect, now that I am in my 70s, I find I am in the same boat as my father.

Yes, I'll admit, I have tears in my eyes on many occasions. Perhaps a few of you have heard of the Gaither Vocal Band, or the Gaither Homecoming TV programs. I often find tears gathering in my eyes when I hear certain musical selections.

While I don't consider myself as a "religious fanatic," I have a religious background, and am prone to follow those tenants. Some of their music brings deep meaning to my being. Of particular instance, I mention the video tape (which is difficult to locate) of the program "Mark Lowery on Broadway." Although it is humorous, it has some depth to it that I don't believe any other religious video tape I have seen will contain. I laugh at the comedic parts, but get tears in my eyes, especially when Mark does the song he wrote "Mary did you know?"

I would like to take this personal opportunity to recommend you seek out and purchase this tape if possible. If you are like me or my father, it will bring you to tears and a superlative religious position.

But there are other instances which bring tears to my eyes. For example, a recent episode of "Ed" in which an innocent man was exonerated from a murder charge brought moisture to my eye lids. I had never liked the program before, but if the series continues like this, I will become a regular viewer.

Of late, probably the one thing that brought me to tears was the memorial service for the seven astronauts who perished in the explosion aboard the space ship Columbia. I had listened to NASA spokespersons discussing the tragedy, to President George Bush giving his comments, and the magnificent voices of the Naval choir with their presentation, which was outstanding. I was in my car at the time, and while I didn't see the program, I could listen. After the final singing, there was a fly-over, the aircraft formation which depicted one plane missing. I heard that, and had to pull over on the side of the road — the tears in my eyes for just that one instance was more than I could take.

Later, I began to think about people who cry at what seems to be the most ridiculous situations, or at the slightest provocations. I beg you — don't think of them (or me) as being odd or overly sentimental. It's just the way we depict what is happening in our lives and the lives of others.

It took me possibly 50 years to understand why my father seemed to cry at unusual circumstances, but it's clear to me now, and I beg the younger generation to accept this as true feelings on the part of us members of the older generation.

There is nothing wrong with tears. It doesn't make a man or woman into a "wimp" if we cry from time to time. Each of us has our own mental recognition of either sadness or appreciation. (Yes, I often cry when someone is recognized for outstanding achievements.)

If you see your father, mother, grandmother or grandfather observing a situation which may bring tears to their eyes, accept it, and appreciate it. They are looking forward to your achievements which may also make them proud, regardless of the outcomes.

The Office of Research of the State Department periodically distributes "Issue Focus" papers reprinting foreign press reaction to the events of the day. One was issued on Monday, which included commentaries from 25 countries, under the heading "Iraq Shuts Uprisings: A Paradox of Freedom or Islamic Awakening?"

The paradox noted particularly by newspapers in friendly countries, beginning with Great Britain and Canada, focused on the fact that the U.S. military liberated Iraq's majority of Shi'ite Muslims to openly practice their religion and politics of the street — and the awakened Shiites used their new freedom to demand that the United States get out of their country.

Voices from the rest of the world, some with sadness, spoke with foreboding, questioning American intelligence in more than one sense of the word. As President Bush was on the USS Abraham Lincoln, proclaiming victory 30 miles from California, Gen. Tommy Franks packed up to go home to Florida. This is what the world was saying, with translations where necessary, by the State Department.

In Pakistan, Dawn, an independent newspaper in Karachi, wrote: "The Americans are still unable to comprehend why the Iraqis' joy over the departure of the despots has not translated into any gratitude toward the U.S. The inability to predict such a response clearly represents a massive failure of U.S. intelligence and betrays a complete lack of understanding of the highly complex system on the ground. If not boasting such possibilities well in time, the U.S. could now end up trapping the bitter harvest of a wholly unnecessary war."

In Great Britain, *Associated Press* reported: "Bush's triumphal jet flight could cause future turbulence

In 1993, according to front-page headlines and blaring broadcast reports, Clinton shut down Los Angeles International Airport to get a frenzied hour of time with a celebrity stylist. *Huffington Post*, which turned out to be dead wrong, took on a life of its own because of alleged inaccuracy in the passenger list, leading to frustration.

Later news reporters put the episode in perspective — there were no delays or scheduled commercial flights — ended up on the back pages of newspapers or were mentioned briefly at the end of broadcast reports.

fact, the Lincoln was 39 miles off California, well within range of Bush's Marine One helicopter.

Parliamentarians donate book to Sanford Museum

This year marks the 70th anniversary of the incorporation of the National Association of Parliamentarians. A former member of the association, Dr. John Leonard, of Sanford, has donated his copy of the 1931 "Parliamentary Procedure," which he used while he was a law professor at the University of Florida.

Leonard, a citizen of Sanford in the 1920s and 1930s, was a nationally recognized parliamentarian, a distinguished teacher and a dedicated writer. She organized the Florida Association of Parliamentarians in 1953 and served as the first president. Her expertise in the field developed while she was attending Stetson Law School, where she graduated in 1926.

She married lawyer and state Rep. John Leonard of Sanford, and they set up a thriving law practice in offices at the Garner & Woodruff Building on 1st Street.

In 1951, Leonard was admitted to the U.S. Supreme Court—the first woman in Florida so recognized. The same year, she served as state agent of Daughters of the American Revolution. The couple also had a son, sharing the surname, John C. Leonard.

Leonard assisted in the preparation of Roberts' Rules of Order, the standard authority of Parliamentary Procedure. She was also the author of "Laws and Customs of the House of Commons," a manual of Parliamentary Procedure.

Walker says her goal is to encourage, teach, empower women and to help couples find the foundation to ground them in the word, and to learn idiom, to express one's self in a positive way.

Both pastors have served their ministry in Denver, Colo., at the Heritage Christian Center for men and women. They held weekly Bible study classes and maintained a home fellowship group of 50 or more from 1993 to 2001. Pastor Carolyn ministered to inmates at the Colorado Prison.

Minister Walker has a bachelor of arts degree in general studies from Northwestern State, a master in counseling from Cornerstone University, a licensed and a master in business resource development from Western Carolina University of NC.

Pastor Walker most recently served as a chaplain at a county Corrections Facility Enforcement Academy, which is a pre-requisite for becoming a chaplain for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

She is the mother of a son and daughter, four stepchildren and one grandchild.

To promote flowering of aquatic plants, a pool site should be selected which receives a minimum of four to six hours of sunlight and is close to a water source. For the hobbyist, a simple fish garden is popular and can be purchased in many retail stores.

Select a site that is not located in low areas into which lawn runoff containing pesticides and fertilizers can drain into the pool harming plants and fish.

To prevent frequent fluctuations in temperature and ensure a biological balance, an in-ground water garden pool should have a minimum surface area of 40 to 60 square feet and a minimal depth of 18 inches.

Plants For Your Water Garden

Many colorful water garden plants are available from specialized aquatic nurseries. Water lilies are the favorites. Many return year after year in an array of colors and sizes.

There are two kinds of water lilies, hardy and tender. Lotus species and hybrids are less reliable. In winter, they are valuable additions to any water garden. Lotus plants are noted for their large leaves and fragrant flowers; however, dwarf varieties are now available.

Lotus plants develop from tubers and rhizomes and some varieties are hardy. In addition to water lilies and lotus, marginal, floating and submerged plants add to the diversity of form and color
