### The "Cuba" racket must stop

In a statement released for publication yesterday and appearing in all the principal dailies in the state, Gov. Fred P. Cone revealed that he has ordered all the law enforcement officers in Florida to put a stop to all forms of illegal gambling.

"You are hereby directed to close up and keep closed all gambling places in your county not authorized by law, and to arrest all persons operating said gambling places and all persons participating in gambling.

"These instructions to you include all gambling of every kind and nature such as roulette, bookmaking, crap games, marble boards, pin table machines, slot machines, bolita and all other gambling devices".

Simultaneously with this statement from the Governor, comes a similar announcement from Attorney General George Couper Gibbs declaring that he has instructed state attorneys throughout the state, as well as the various county solicitors wherever there are criminal courts, to proceed at once with civil and criminal prosecutions wherever violations of the gambling statutes are found.

In the light of these statements from the Governor of Florida and the Attorney General, the two highest offices in the administration of State laws, it must be fairly evident to every fair-minded person that Assistant State Attorney Lloyd F. Boyle is only carrying out instructions from the heads of the State in prosecuting law breakers and in trying his dead level best to break up the "Cuba" racket in Seminole County.

That is his job. He has taken an oath of office to enforce the laws of Florida to the best of his ability. Whenever the laws of Florida are violated in this county, it is his business to prosecute the violators, whoever they may be.

The law-breaker has every opportunity in this county to come clear, if he is innocent, regardless of what the prosecutor may do or say. It takes 12 out of 18 men on the grand jury to indict him in the first place. It takes an unanimous decision on the part of the petit jury to convict him.

It is the circuit judge who sentences him if he is found guilty. The judge decides whether he shall pay a small fine, a large one, or serve time in jail.

The law enforcement officers in Seminole County, as well as the grand juries and the petit juries which have been concerned with this "Cuba" racket, have shown a clear-cut determination that these violations must stop.

### Lessons From Fascist Rally

Several things can be learned from the recent Fascist rally in New York's Madison Square Garden, writes Willis Thornton for the Newspaper Enterprise Association.

"They are things which the United States needs to learn, and to learn quickly", which he lists as follows:

#### ROBINS DESTROY INSECTS

Last week J. C. Russell, a senior student in entomology at the University of Florida, examined several Robins that had been shot in Sanford strawberry patches, to determine what these birds had been eating.

This account is not intended to be any refutation of the fact that robins will eat strawberries, and will damage a great many berries by picking them. However, if some means can be used to keep the birds from the strawberry fields in the height of the season other than shooting them, the robins will prove their worth during the remainder of the year by consuming tons and tons of insects destructive to farm crops.

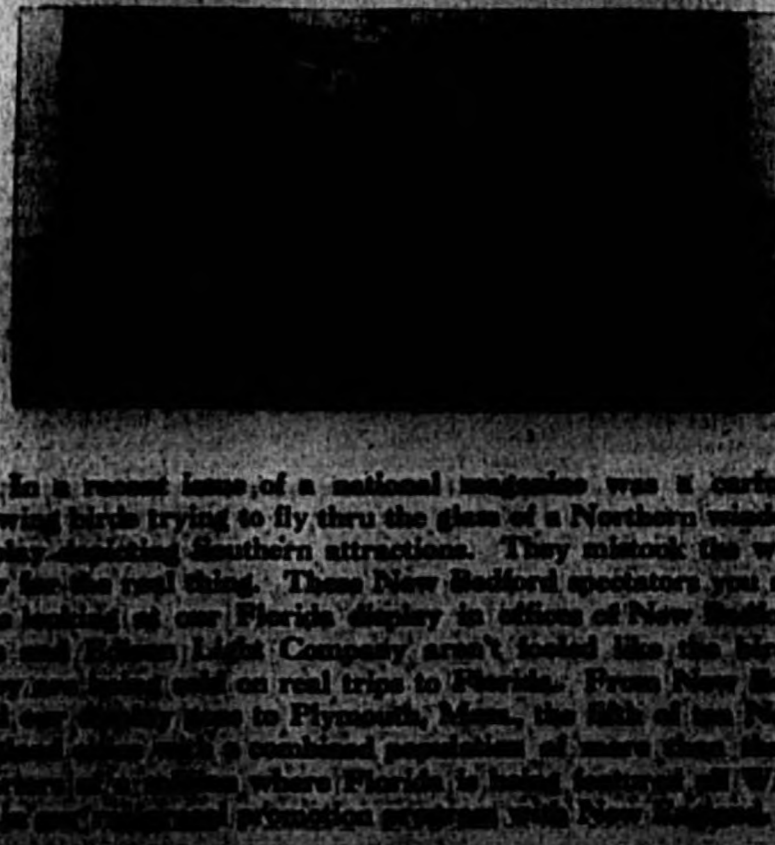

High Court Is Closer To All Around Balance

Appointment Of West-erner Would Give Even Closer Trim

By MORGAN M. BEATTY WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—(AP)—The Supreme Court is closer today to all-around balance in membership than ever—thanks to five Presidents and the accidents of time and history.

The retirement of Justice Louis Brandeis and President Roosevelt's prospective appointment of his successor brings within the realm of the possible an even closer trim, provided the magic number of nine is maintained.

Balance, of course, implies vastly more than the mere parity of numbers. It implies the parity of a man when he sits on the high court—when he is a member of the court should be a member of the bar, but they always have been lawyers.

Every section of the nation wants a sympathetic ear on the high court—a man who understands its particular problems. Too, any minority or religious creed in the great American melting pot takes legitimate

pride in the selection of one of its members for the robes that make a man a justice of the United States.

Five Point Of Division

Most important of all are a man's legal and economic leanings. On this count, balance in the highest court is commonly discussed on the basis of Liberalism vs. Conservatism. But the more finely are inclined to use other terms. Some suggest the division should be made between justices who lean strongly on precedent and custom, and those who believe the Constitution is a flexible instrument admitting of social and economic in government.

But, old school, or new, the views of nine justices (eight at the moment) on social and economic currents have as much to do with John Q. Citizen's welfare as those of the 500-odd members of Congress and the President for they hold the veto power over laws passed by Congress and signed by the President. They also inevitably find their way into the fundamental law, the law that ever has a tendency to change the fortunes of men. For, the "power-to-law is—the power to destroy."

Minus the successor to Brandeis, the court is even split on a close decision in the fundamental law. Regularly in the experimental corners are three Roosevelt appointees, Black, Reed and Frank-

furter. Usually with them is Stone, a one-time Wall Street affiliate gone liberal.

On the other side are two dyed-in-the-wool precedent-followers, Butler and McReynolds, and two middle-of-the-road men, Chief Justice Hughes and Roberts. Their older records put these two pretty close to the conservative camp, but their more recent opinions indicate that they, too, are taking an experimental turn of mind occasionally.

About Even Politically Similarly, the court is split about even in party politics. Hughes, Stone, and Roberts lean the Republican stamp, having drawn their appointments from two Republican Presidents, Coolidge and Hoover.

Reed, Black, McReynolds and Butler are Democrats. As a New Deal follower, first Frankfurter falls squarely into that slot, too, although the record implies that he is agnostic in politics. Or at least he was before Roosevelt came to Washington.

Curiously, one Republican, Stone, and two Democrats, McReynolds (a Wilson appointee) and Butler (a Harding appointee) jumped the tracks somewhere along the road. They found themselves consistently siding with strange bedfellows, so far as politics are concerned. Sectionally, the division of the court is not quite so lumpy. The East is well taken care

Missing is a far westerner, explaining the present lull and cry for somebody farther west of the Mississippi than Minnesota. If such an appointment goes through, then geographical balance also will have been achieved.

On the score of race or creed, the court is closer than usual to proportionate representation. The overwhelming majority of Protestants is represented by six justices. The Catholics have one and the Jews one in Butler and Frankfurter, respectively. Significantly enough, Brandeis, the first Jew ever appointed to the court, withheld his retirement until Frankfurter was timely sent on the court. The only other Jew ever appointed, Justice Cardozo, died recently. Technically, it was he who Frankfurter succeeded. Actually, however, the famous Frankfurter succeeded the great Brandeis. The two of them saw eye to eye on many fundamentals of Supreme Court philosophy, and both constantly harped on the theme of experimentation in government.

The Lenten season gives us a culinary breathing spell. Meats are in order, less is done and more is devoted to out-door activities. Housewives can let down and enjoy the change.  
Lent however, brings a challenge to make the most of meatless foods and still keep up the family's dietary standards. So get out the recipe files for vegetable meat dishes.

mushrooms is a delightful combination that can be substituted readily for any meat dish. It is flavorful and highly nutritious. Combine one cup of sliced mushrooms with half a cup of cooked celery and two cups of corn. Pour in two cups of soy white sauce and two cups of milk. Cook thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Cooked eggs give a pungent touch to the dinner menu. Brown four tablespoons each of celery, onion and peppers in five tablespoons butter. Pour in four cups of hard-boiled eggs, one cup of boiled rice and two cups of tomato sauce. Season about ten minutes or until the cream thickens. Season with salt and paprika, and serve poured over more rice.

Here's a way to make mushroom and cheese a very satisfactory meat substitute: Melt four tablespoons of butter and add five tablespoons of flour. Mix thoroughly and pour in three cups of milk and one cup of diced cheese. Cook slowly and stir frequently until the sauce thickens and the cheese melts. Blend in one teaspoon of salt, one-fourth a teaspoon each of paprika and celery salt, one-fourth of a cup of chili sauce and three cups of cooked macaroni. Bake forty minutes in a buttered dish in a moderate oven.

### Woods Fires Are Most Harmful In Month Of March

**GAINESVILLE, Mar. 9**—Although likely to be harmful at any time of the year, fires in March generally are especially destructive to timber, says L. T. Nieland, Farm Forester with the State Agricultural Extension Service. High winds coupled with a maximum accumulation of winter-killed ground cover, and new growth starting in most forest trees, all combine to make fire damage severe at this time of the year, he says. Then, too, most of the forest seeds, particularly those of the pines which were shed last fall have sprouted and millions of little forest seedlings are now hidden in the grass. These will practically all be killed in a March fire, Nieland points out. He adds that farmers should exercise particular care to prevent fires in pulpwood cuttings where many dead tops are lying among or near living trees, and in areas where slash pine plantings were made during the past several years. Fires in such areas are almost certain to result in heavy losses of farm timber.

The extension forester urges farmers to take proper precautions in safeguarding their farm woodlands. He says this can usually be accomplished by plowing fire lines around and through the forest tract, by removing distinct fire hazards, by posting the land against burning, and by providing a knapsack fire pump and fire swatters in a convenient place for use in case of emergency. He also suggests that a close watch be maintained over the forest land during days of high winds and dry weather. Fires, according to Nieland, are still the greatest destroyers of forest trees and most of them can be prevented.

luna with one cup of soft bread crumbs, two tablespoons of chopped parsley and three tablespoons of minced celery. Pour in half a teaspoon of salt, one-fourth of a teaspoon of paprika, two egg yolks, half a cup of milk and two tablespoons of melted butter. Lightly stir in two Boston egg whites. Pour into buttered loaf pan and bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven.

Serve this loaf, hot or cold, with a plain cream sauce and with a sauce thickened by addition of chopped pineapple, chopped peach slices and chopped sweet pickles. A unique way to serve it is to surround the loaf with creamed shrimp.

Mushroom omelette is a very tasty dish when a lighter food is desired. To serve four, melt six tablespoons of butter in a frying pan. Pour in half a pound of sliced mushrooms, one-fourth of a cup of chopped celery, two tablespoons of chopped green pepper and one tablespoon of minced onion. Cover and simmer ten minutes. Sprinkle four tablespoons of flour over the top and mix it carefully with the rest of the ingredients. Blend in half a cup of cream and two eggs of milk. Cook this combination slowly until it thickens—about ten minutes. Stir frequently.

You will need a little salt, paprika and minced parsley for flavoring and the result is delicious. Keeping this recipe at hand.

### AAA Assistance Open To Owners Of Farm Land

**GAINESVILLE, Mar. 9**—Farms owned by banks, merchants, trustees of estates, and others who do not actually live on the land may receive assistance under the federal farm program that will be of benefit to both the land and the tenants for carrying out the soil-building practices, according to H. G. Clayton, state administrative officer of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Each farm has a maximum amount of financial assistance available under the program to help the owners and tenants carry out soil-building practices, he said. That amount is based on the farm's acreage and the way it is used. The money is, in effect, set aside by the government for that farm. If the farmer and his tenants carry out approved practices, the money goes to them to help pay the costs of the practices. Terracing, liming, seeding legumes, strip-cropping, green manure crops turned under, establishing permanent pastures, and planting forest trees are some of these practices.

"The program provides that assistance for soil-building practices is to be divided according to the contribution made by each person interested in the farm toward carrying out the practices," Mr. Clayton said.
