"You are hereby directed to close up and keep closed all gambling places in your county not authorized by law, and to arrest all persons operating said gambling places and all persons participating in gambling. All officers of the law are to co-operate with you in the performance of this duty.

"These instructions to you include all gambling of every kind and nature such as roulette, bookmaking, crap games, marble boards, pin table machines, slot machines, bolita and all other gambling devices". In conclusion the Governor says he has asked for a report on all prosecuting officers who neglect their duty.
