Rezoning Decision Next Week Board Rejects School Hour Change

For the second meeting in a row the Seminole County School Board voted Wednesday not to change school hours as a large crowd of parents again seemed primarily concerned with school rezoning.

The board will not make a decision on the proposed new zoning for the 74-75 school year until the Jan. 23 meeting.

After a short debate on changing the school starting time the board, except for Jean Bryant, went on record supporting no change in the schedule.

Alan Keeth, vice chairman of the board, said his vote for no change was to "maintain the status quo. I don't think the situation is critical enough at this time. Next year we can plan for different bus schedules."

The board said it felt changing the hours would adversely affect those children on double sessions because they could not participate in activities because they would get home so late.

The board said morning darkness would subside in a short period of time.

The board's rejection came after receiving a petition, with 367 signatures, supporting a schedule change due. The list was compiled by two Sanford women, Bobbie Fiatt and Ann Smith, and represented, in part, Winter Springs, Fern Park, Altamonte Springs, Longwood, Lake Mary, and Casselberry.

Middle school starting time will continue to be South Seminole-8:30 a.m.; Teague-7 a.m.; Milwee-8:30 a.m.; Seminole-8 a.m.; Lakeview-8 a.m.; and Jackson Heights-7 a.m.

Herring, Sheriff Disclose Threats

TITUSVILLE, Fla. (AP)—A plot against the life of Brevard County's sheriff and an attempt to extort State Atty. Abbott Herring were revealed by those officials Wednesday.

"A contract was let out on my life about a year ago that called for \$12,500 payment before and \$12,500 to be paid after they read my obituary," says Brevard County Sheriff Leigh Wilson.

Wilson said Wednesday he thought he had located one of three men involved in the contract and had broken up the plot.

Wilson said he believed a Florida man arrested Wednesday in Ann Arbor, Mich., on a Prevez warrant charging possession and sale of LSD was connected with the alleged \$25,000 plot to assassinate him.

Conspiracy charges were pending against the man, officers said.

Sheriff's vice squad agent Theo York said the suspects in the alleged contract plot had been involved in a Central Florida drug operation in which 30 arrests have been made.

"They said the other two suspects in the plot are already in Florida jails on other charges."

In an unrelated Brevard County case, officers said Wednesday that three persons were arrested in an alleged extortion attempt involving an assistant state attorney and a pornography case.

Officers identified the trio as adult bookstore owner Ben Brown, Evelyn Levine and Thomas Crews, all of the Titusville area.

They were charged with trying to set up Asst. State Atty. Abbott Herring in a compromising situation with a woman. Officers said the arrests came after an undercover agent was allegedly asked to take part in the scheme.

County Judge Ken Morton placed the three under \$50,000 bond.

Officers said the Levine woman is awaiting trial on charges of selling obscene material to minors and that Herring has been successful in the past in prosecuting such cases.

"The idea was that Herring would be put in a position so that he would not vigorously prosecute pornography," Wilson said.

Disney's Work Force To Lose 2,000 Employees

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—Where does an unemployed mouse go to look for work?

Some employees of Walt Disney World who make their living walking around in costumes of Mickey Mouse and those of other famous Disney characters may be asking that question today.

Other cuts were predicted for the complex's maintenance, hotel and marketing divisions. No executive cutbacks were mentioned.

Officials attributed much of the cutback to the energy crisis.

"We intend to level off at about 9,000 employees this month," said Disney spokesman Charlie Ridgeway.

"We employed around 11,000 at the peak of the Christmas season," he said.

"But we will have about 2,000 fewer workers than we had at the Christmas peak."

Closed Door Meeting Revealed

State Atty. Abbott Herring's office declined today to say whether an investigation is or will be conducted into an alleged "sunshine law" violation Sunday night when two Winter Springs councilmen reportedly met behind closed doors in a private home.

Mayor Roy McClain who hinted earlier this week he secretly taped-recorded a meeting with Councilmen John Booth and Irwin Hunter at Booth's home also refused today to say if he filed formal charges Wednesday afternoon.

He did admit, however, he met with Herring's Chief Investigator Jack Fulwider and other members of Herring's staff at the courthouse office for some 90 minutes Wednesday and took a tape recording with him.

McClain also said he signed an affidavit.

At Monday night's city council meeting in Winter Springs, Booth and Hunter accused McClain of taping the meeting, saying it was held and city matters were discussed.

McClain indicated at the same time that at the confab held before he was officially sworn in to office the two councilmen said that four city council members were in agreement on commission appointments to be made.

City Atty. Tom Freeman Monday night gave the opinion that meetings at which decisions were made must be in the public view. Wednesday night he expanded his opinion to include meetings at which discussion on which future decisions may be made also must be held in the open.

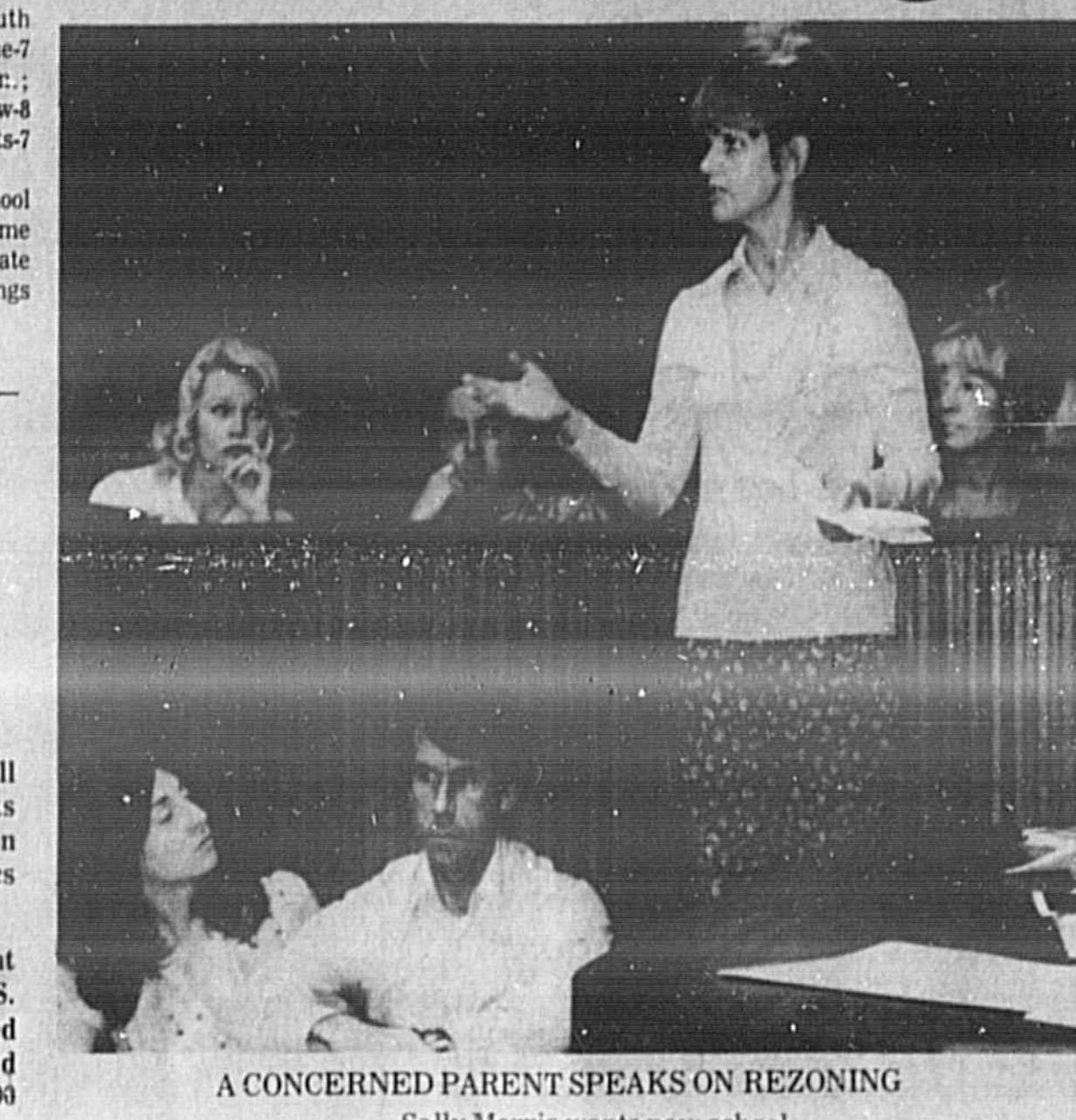
"All steps in the decision making process must be in the public," Freeman said. He added that the intent of the elected officials in meeting off the public would be a key factor in whether conviction would be possible.

Freeman said two remedies are available under the law. In one instance a private individual can take civil action to prohibit members of public bodies from meeting in private and secondly, a criminal charge can be brought which upon conviction is a second degree misdemeanor punishable by 60 days imprisonment or \$500 fine.

Booth also asked the attorney for a definition of entrapment, and Freeman said it is when a recognized law enforcement officer entices an individual to commit a crime.

"I don't think six honest Seminole County jurors are going to convict anyone if officials are merely trying to exchange information," Freeman said.

The attorney said from court decisions it is not in the best interest of elected officials to talk of business outside the public. He added that very few persons have been convicted of criminally violating the law.

Board Seeks Service From Page Airways

The Sanford Airport Authority today authorized Airport Manager J.S. "Red" Cleveland to prepare a lease supplement intended to get full services from fixed base operator Page Airways Inc. or to require Page negotiate new terms for airport occupancy.

Page has requested a five-year renewal of its lease that expires June 30. Page proposes present terms be continued with two exceptions—fuel flow not be assessed as rental and a flat rate for the sale of large aircraft instead of the present one per cent of gross sales price.

Airport Atty. Bill Hutchison told authority board members, in his opinion, Page hasn't fulfilled requirements of the existing lease and its renewal possibly could be denied by the authority.

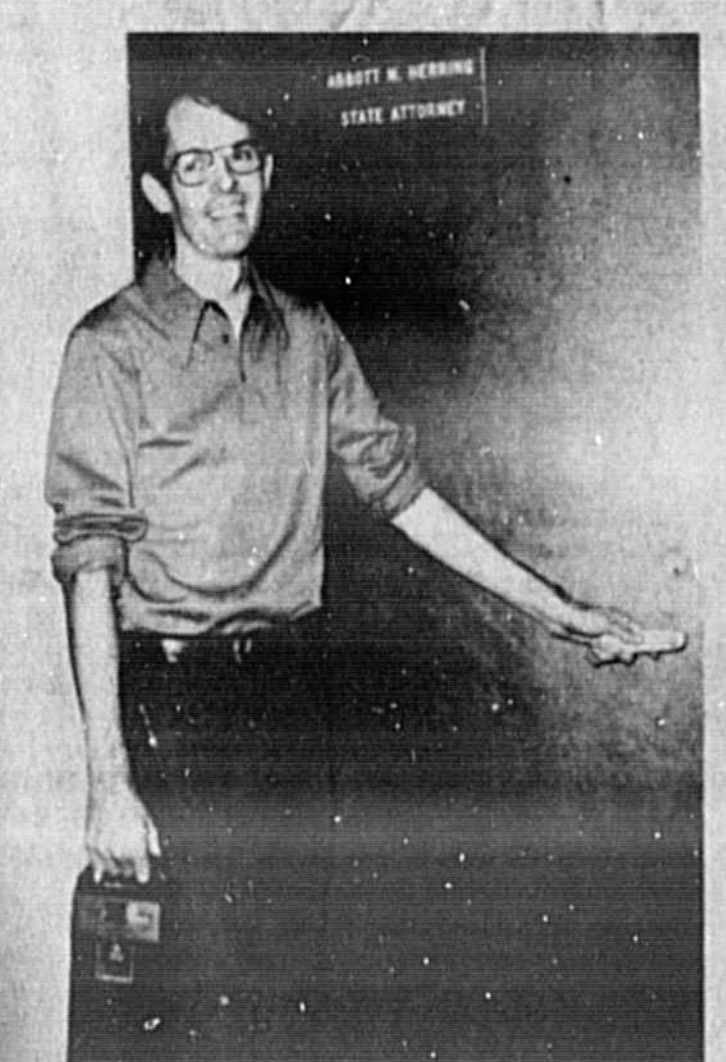
Cleveland said Page had provided none of the service facilities they agreed to provide at the time the original lease was signed. "I know of no other airport where the fixed base operator comes in and supplies fuel, but no other services."

Authority member R. M. Rosemond proposed Cleveland draw up the lease supplement and present it to Page in the spirit of cooperation, not as an ultimatum.

Chairman John Mercer said the authority has six months to reach an agreement with Page and should start working on it now. "We don't want to spring any surprises on them two weeks before the lease is up," said Mercer, urging negotiations get under way.

In other action, the authority approved three new leases. The first was the month-to-month lease of Building 118 and ramp space to Mickey's Aviation Service at an annual rental of \$984. The building will be used for office space and an aircraft maintenance storage facility. Ramp space will be for parking one large airplane.

Fl. Lauderdale Steel and Manufacturing Co. will lease Building 297 for corporate office space for \$8,436 a year. A five-year lease was approved with three five-year renewal options.

Blackburn Case Goes To Jury Today

The Harlan Blackburn case in the 1971 shooting of gambler Clyde Lee went to the jury today with the key — alleged hit man Sam Cagnina — still waiting to be turned.

Even though Cagnina was acquitted in the shooting by a Thrusville jury in December, the state this week candidly admitted it had to "re-try" Cagnina's legal ghost before it could prove Blackburn put up the portly Tampa resident up to the shooting.

Beverly Matthews, Blackburn's ex-girlfriend, Wednesday made her third attempt to convince a jury that Blackburn admitted hiring and paying off Cagnina for both a June 11, 1971 and an earlier (in March) attempt on Lee's life.

The state also presented multi-convicted felon Willie Fox, Blackburn's one-time left hand man, who repeated testimony that "Blackburn told him to get a rifle and mess up Lee," and told him to pay Cagnina.

During closing arguments Monday, defense attorney Cheney Mason accused the state of conspiring for political reasons of rigging testimony against Blackburn, one time high roller of Central Florida Crime, although original charges in the June 11 shooting were brought against two men never connected with the 54-year-old Blackburn.

Mason, continuing to heap sarcasm and withering scorn upon the state's case, said Lee's eyewitness testimony that Cagnina shot him was concocted to gain a pardon because Lee knew he would stay in jail if he named the two men originally charged.

Lee did not agree to testify in the case until last year, telling the jury Fox, Reubin Askew must be "crazy as hell" if he thought he (Lee) would talk for anything less than a full pardon.

In rebuttal, prosecutor Abbott Herring indignantly denied any state plot against Blackburn, saying the witnesses all feared for their lives and that no impropriety could be inferred by the jury because the state paid rent and other expenses for Fox and Lee, who were "put on ice" in exchange for their promised cooperation.

Herring admitted the state had to "re-try" Cagnina in order to prove its claim against Blackburn, but said new evidence including telephone records and Tampa Police testimony on Cagnina's physical appearance made this possible.

Blackburn, known during his days as "The Colonel," shocked the courtroom Wednesday afternoon by apparently contradicting his defense attorney's efforts to discredit testimony by Ms. Matthews and Lee's sister, Mrs. Laura Adcock, saying both women told the truth as they understood it, but were confused.

In a chatty, 90-minute appearance in the witness chair, Blackburn reserved his anger for 20-year associate Lee, saying he did not, does not, and never will believe a March 19 attempt was made against Lee.

Blackburn admitted telling Ms. Matthews Cagnina was the hit man for June 11, but said he was merely repeating what he had been told by Lee and other people.

Now serving a 22-year federal prison sentence for gambling, Blackburn admitted paying \$3,000 to Cagnina's representative in Lakeland after the June 11 shooting but said it was to help a friend of 30 years set up a private business.

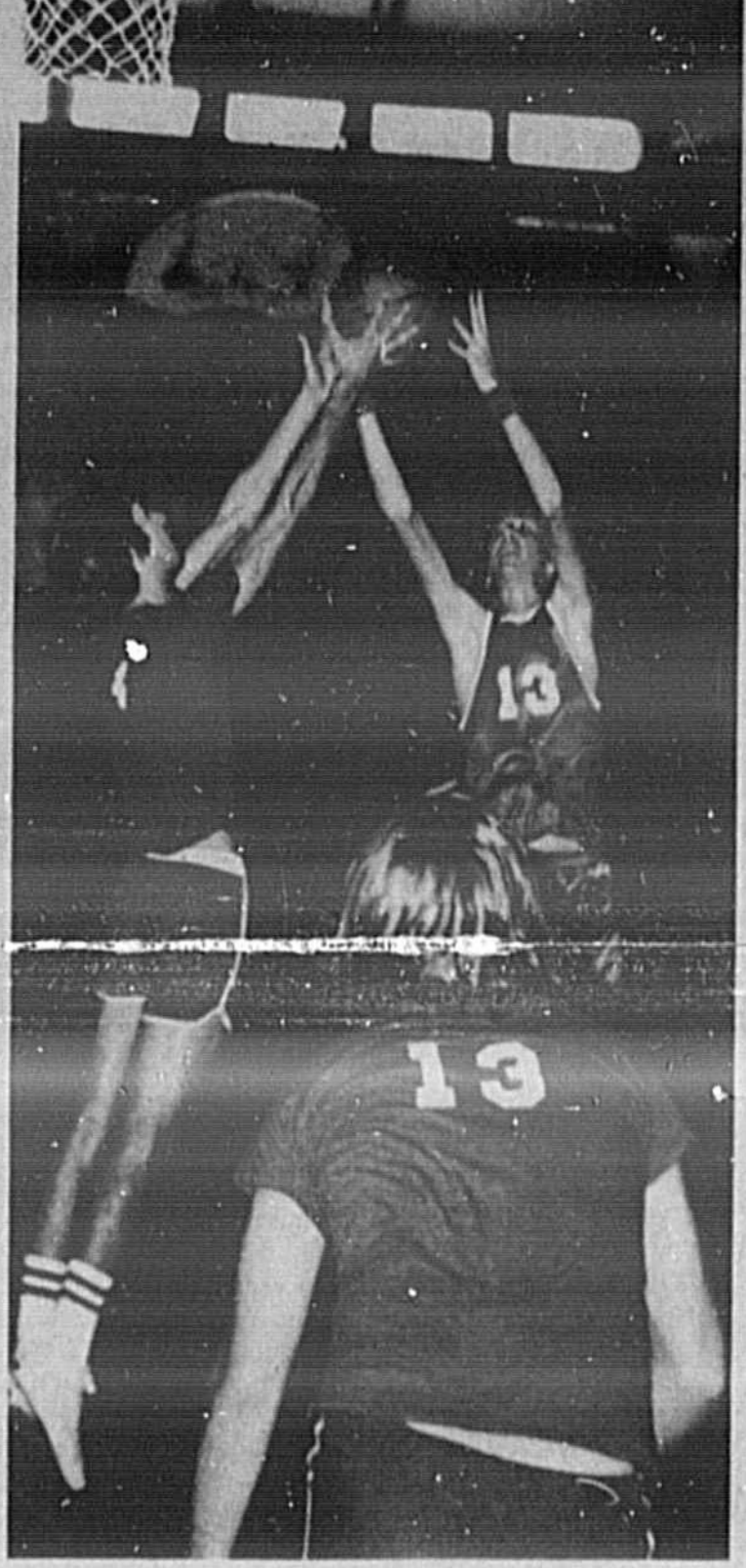
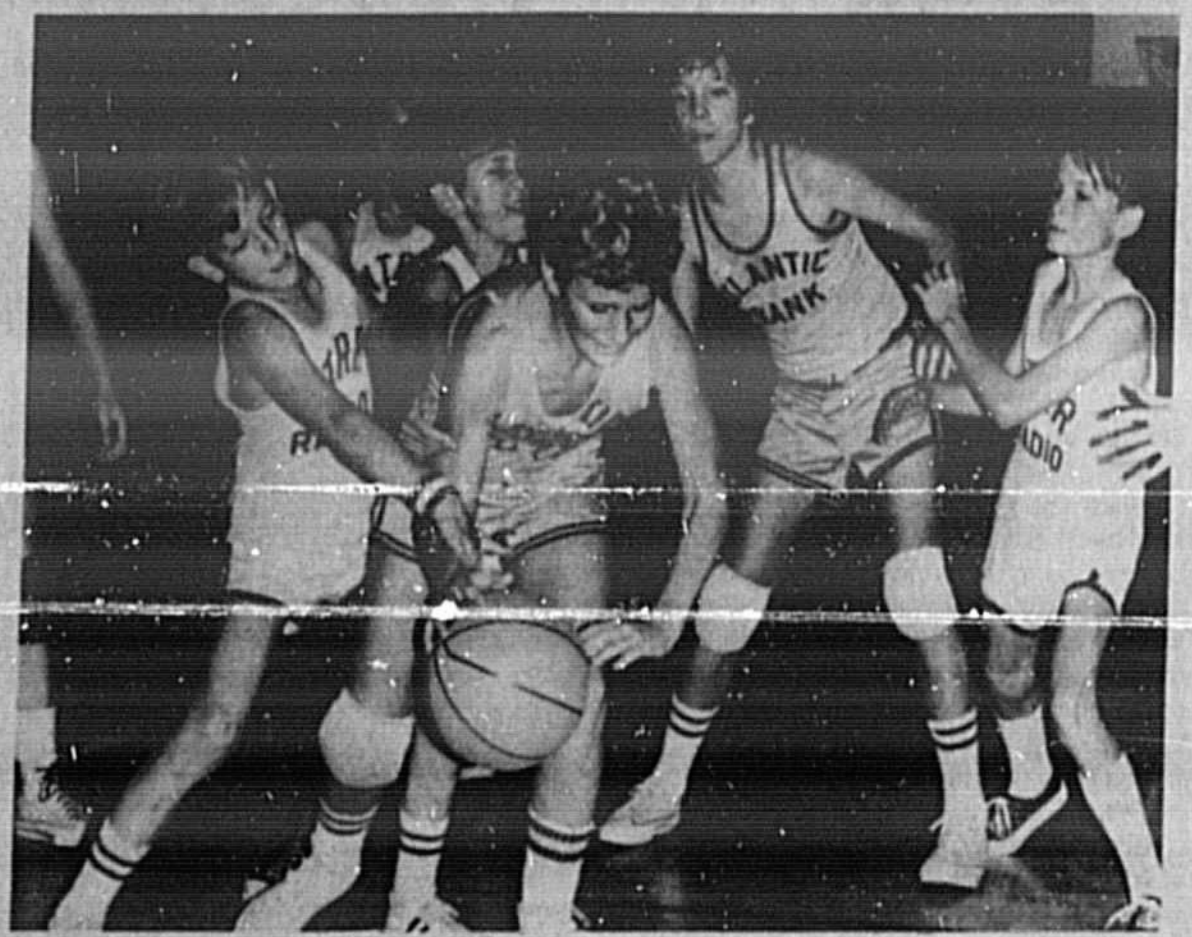
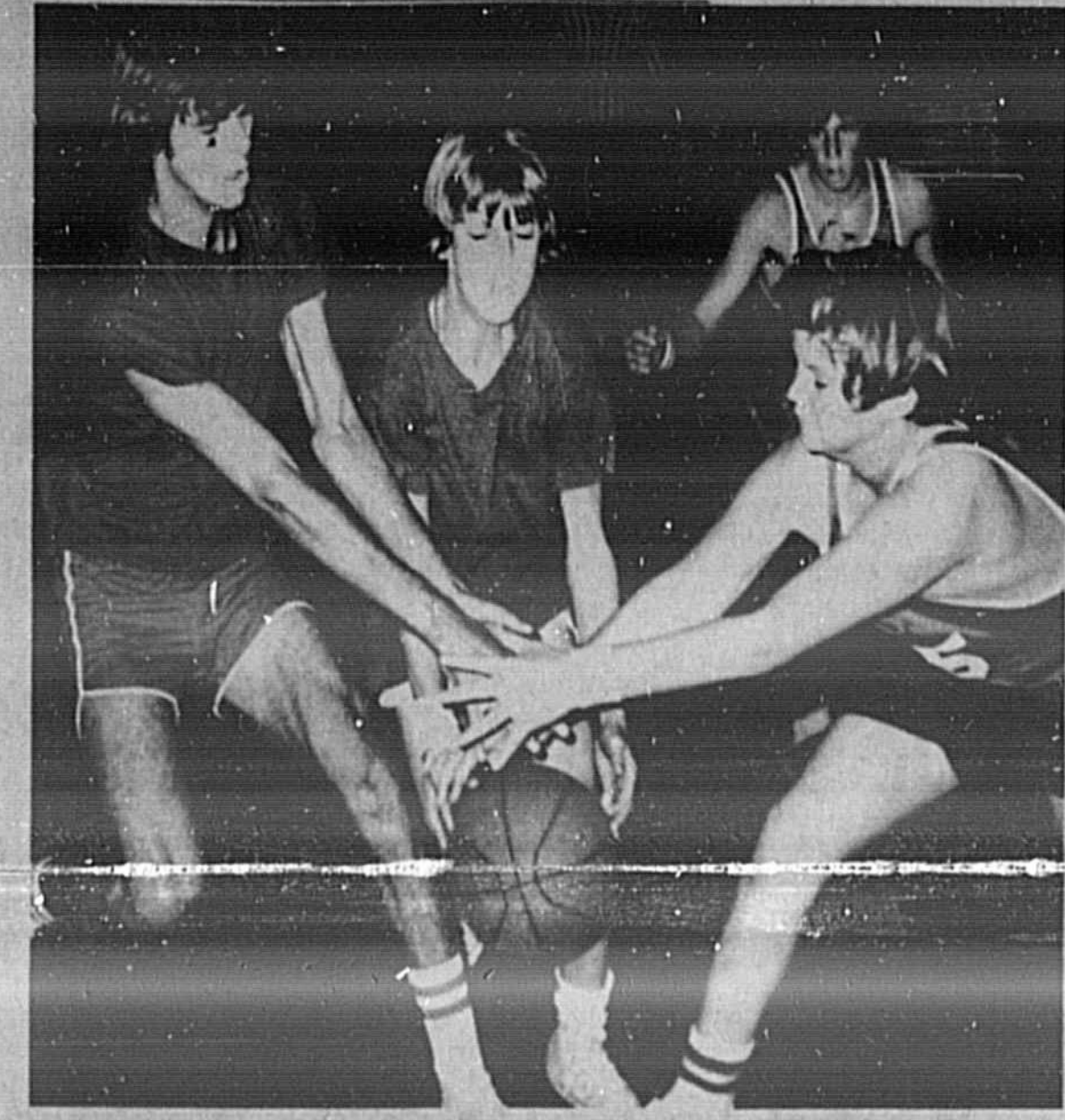
Blackburn said the March 19 meeting with Lee was made to arrange a \$10,000 payment on a \$100,000 bond which had been posted to free Lee earlier that day.

O.J. Simpson Credits Coach For Honor

LOS ANGELES (AP)—O.J. Simpson today credited his coach and offensive line for his 1973 successes which brought him the Associated Press award as the National Football League Most Valuable Player.
"I don't think I did anything different than I did before, but we had that good offensive line," said a smiling O.J. who rushed for a league record of 2,003 yards for his Buffalo club this past season.
He shattered the record held by Jim Brown for a decade.
"Lou Saban came back as coach in 1972 and he gave me the football that year. Despite all the problems we had with our offensive line, I still led the league with 1,250 yards.
"This year, with Reggie McKenzie healthy all season, Donnie Green healthy and rookies playing well, we did better."
The Bills picked up Paul Seymour and Joe DeLamielleure in the draft first round. We made a few great trades including getting up Mike Monitor from the Jets and you know you put those guys on the offensive line and it's very formidable.
Simpson added: "I think next year we'll take up right where we left off. We had two rookies on the offensive line and we had a rookie quarterback in Joe Ferguson. I expect them to improve and with my improvement I expect myself to improve."
The 25-year-old Simpson, in his fifth season with the Bills and a former Heisman Trophy winner at the University of Southern California, was an overwhelming choice for MVP honors. A panel of three top sports writers and sportscasters from each NFL city vote. Only John Haddad and Harold Johnson of the Los Angeles Rams were named in addition to Simpson and each of them received only two votes.
Buffalo, with a strong finish, posted a 9-5 record and finished behind Super Bowl-bound Miami, 12-2. Behind in the division were the New York Jets, New England Patriots and Baltimore Colts.

It's Exciting To Work For Henry Kissinger

WASHINGTON — What's it like being the personal secretary to the world's diplomatic man-in-motion, U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger?

"It's enormously exciting," said Bonnie Andrews who joined Kissinger's staff in January at the White House and followed him to the State Department in late September.

"There's always so much going on so much activity. At times it does get a bit hectic," she said. Mrs. Andrews has been on two of Kissinger's six trips to Peking, including the most recent one, and has accompanied the secretary to Paris several times to Moscow, Iceland, Key Biscayne and San Clemente.

CHINESE HOSPITABLE

"The Chinese are extremely hospitable," she said.

"They try so hard to make you comfortable. They pay great attention to detail."

In response to a question she replied, "No one in any of the foreign countries we've visited has ever asked me about Watergate."

As Dr. Kissinger's personal secretary, Mrs. Andrews, 33, handles the secretary of state's personal correspondence, keeps his social appointment book up-to-date and looks after the thousand-and-one details that surround one of Washington's busiest executives.

"... At times it gets a bit hectic" — find time to play a lot of tennis. "We're outdoors people," she said.

"I've been riding all my life," she said, "starting back in San Diego (Calif.) when I was younger. Sure I've taken some falls. I do very little jumping."

After graduating from Hoover High School in San Diego, she went on to the University of Oregon where she majored in romance languages. She later earned a master's degree in history at San Francisco State. She became an airline stewardess and lived in Miami, Fla., and Sausalito, Calif.

She is frank in admitting that she did but "stumbled" into her present job.

"The only reason I came to Washington was because my husband had a job offer here," she said. "But I was enormously glad to get here and took a job at the White House and eventually moved into the National Security Council staff."

GOVERNMENT NEEDS WOMEN

Mrs. Andrews said she wished more American women had the opportunity to spend some time in government work. "There are some very good jobs here and anyone working in this atmosphere gets a more positive idea of our government operations."

Marine Invasion Breaks Tradition The First Lady Commander Of Male Unit Is Opera Buff

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — A 44-year-old green-eyed brunette who loves opera will shatter a 198-year-old U.S. Marine Corps tradition come Jan. 15. And she is not likely to be the last lady to do it.

Col. Mary E. Bane will take over command of a Leatherneck unit at this sprawling World War built Marine staging base, casting the shots for 2,150 Marines, most of them male.

The first woman in corps history to be given direct command over men, Col. Bane says she is "overwhelmed" to be selected to command.

"I'll do everything in my power to do the job that would be expected of any professional Marine officer."

BREAKING TRADITION

Before Col. Bane could break tradition, somebody had to clear the way for her. Running her interference was Gen. Robert E. Cushman Jr., Marine Corps commandant. A week

before he named Col. Bane commanding officer of the base Headquarters and Service Battalion, Gen. Cushman had promised the corps would wipe out all career obstructions for women — short of combat duty.

Col. Bane's new command serves as administrative center for this base of some 30,000 Leathernecks and civilian workers. Currently she is assistant chief of staff for personnel services.

A native of Normal, Ill., the colonel has a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Illinois. Since joining the corps in 1952, she has served as a court-martial trial counsel, commander of a woman Marine training unit, a staff officer with the Pacific Fleet Marine Force and as an enlisted promotion officer. Col. Bane also is a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College.

CLEARING THE WAY

As significant as the lady colonel's assignment to a command is the fact that Gen. Cushman's move obviously

clears the way for more distaff side officers to take over commands.

"What I did was to remove the restrictive regulations against a woman Marine commanding anything else except a woman Marine unit," Gen. Cushman explains.

"There are a number of units that could be commanded by a woman if she has the proper qualifications. But they would not be combat units."

"We don't intend to send women into combat and I don't think the American people want their daughters sent into combat."

Col. Bane says she is looking forward to the challenge of a command which gives her authority to direct the activities of men and women alike.

COLONEL IS FEMININE

Col. Bane, while she is a dedicated career officer, has not lost her femininity to the often cob-rough atmosphere of the Marine Corps. Those who know her well say the colonel is a knockout in a party dress. She admits to being a con-

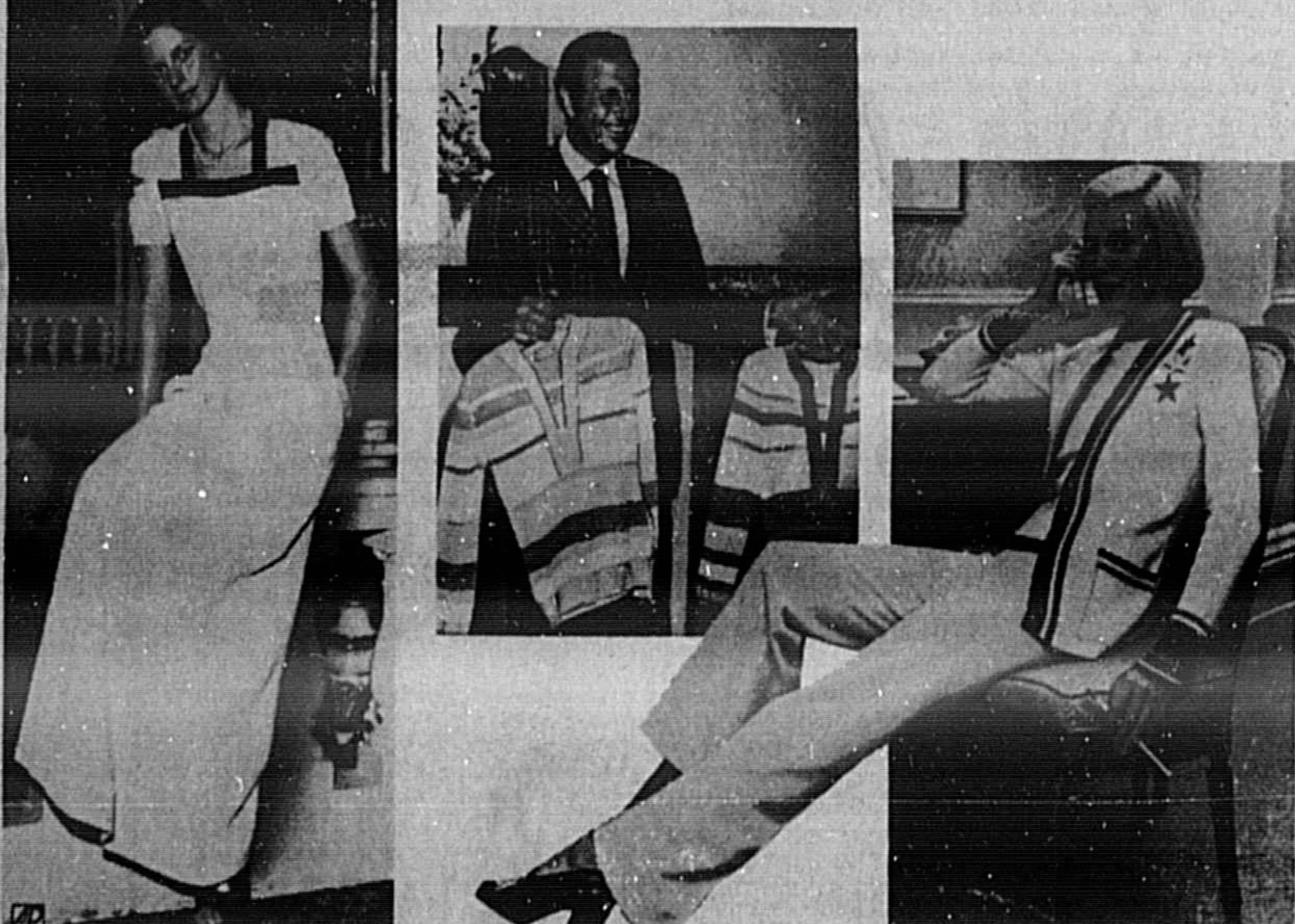

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Expert Reviews Supermarket Counter Power Like It Is

NEW YORK (AP) — Adeline Garner Shell enjoys making comparisons between cereals. She said consumers don't get enough information to make intelligent buying decisions because "We have a lot of facts, but not a lot of information."

Information is what she provides in her classes for buying clubs, and now in a new book, "Supermarket Counter Power."

Mrs. Shell has worked in almost every area of the food consumer industry, and most recently worked with Bess Meyerson here in the department of consumer affairs as director of consumer services. She has done product promotion, research, marketing, education; been a magazine food editor, worked as a public health nutritionist and a home agent.

"Cereal packaging is another area we need more information about. Unit pricing helps. You know you pay 88 cents a pound for a large box of cereal and \$1.57 a pound for the small boxes packaged together. But the cost per serving is still different. Small boxes are often not one-ounce servings, but five-eighths of an ounce. Instead of costing you 5.5 cents per ounce serving, those deci-

ful packages are costing you 9.9 cents.

"The question is not which cereal to buy, but whether you should buy it at all," Mrs. Shell said.

She wrote the book about these things out of her frustration with the lack of consumer information available.

"I think cereals in some cases should be labeled 'Fortified Sugar with Cereal Added.' They're not real food. The reason I despise them along with coals, instant sugar drinks and chips, is that they force out of a child's diet things he really needs for growth and development."

"Television advertising for such products is immoral. Directed at children, it is the same thing as a lecherous person tempting a child in a dark hallway. It is corrupting his intelligence," she said.

Mrs. Shell said some companies have started in the right direction. Consumers must, she added, take a stronger stand against large companies so that they can get more shopping information and better nutrition.

"I think we should appeal to the Protestant ethics of companies to make them more responsible to society," she added. "The food crisis is far

more crucial than the energy crisis. It has come about because of our greed for excessive profits, because production of junk food returns higher profits.

"It is the consumer's responsibility to take a more active role, using the only real power he has: voting his spending dollar for the best possible product," Mrs. Shell said.

The affluent society is sold on convenience foods, which sacrifice taste, nutrition and money for ease of preparation. Mrs. Shell said they sometimes take longer to prepare than "real food."

In her classes, Mrs. Shell teaches methods of baking and preparing foods as well as nutrition and how to buy. She said more and more young men are attending the classes and are "most enthusiastic."

"I want to popularize comparison shopping," she said, "but you cannot comparison shop if you don't have on hand information, such as drained weight of canned foods."

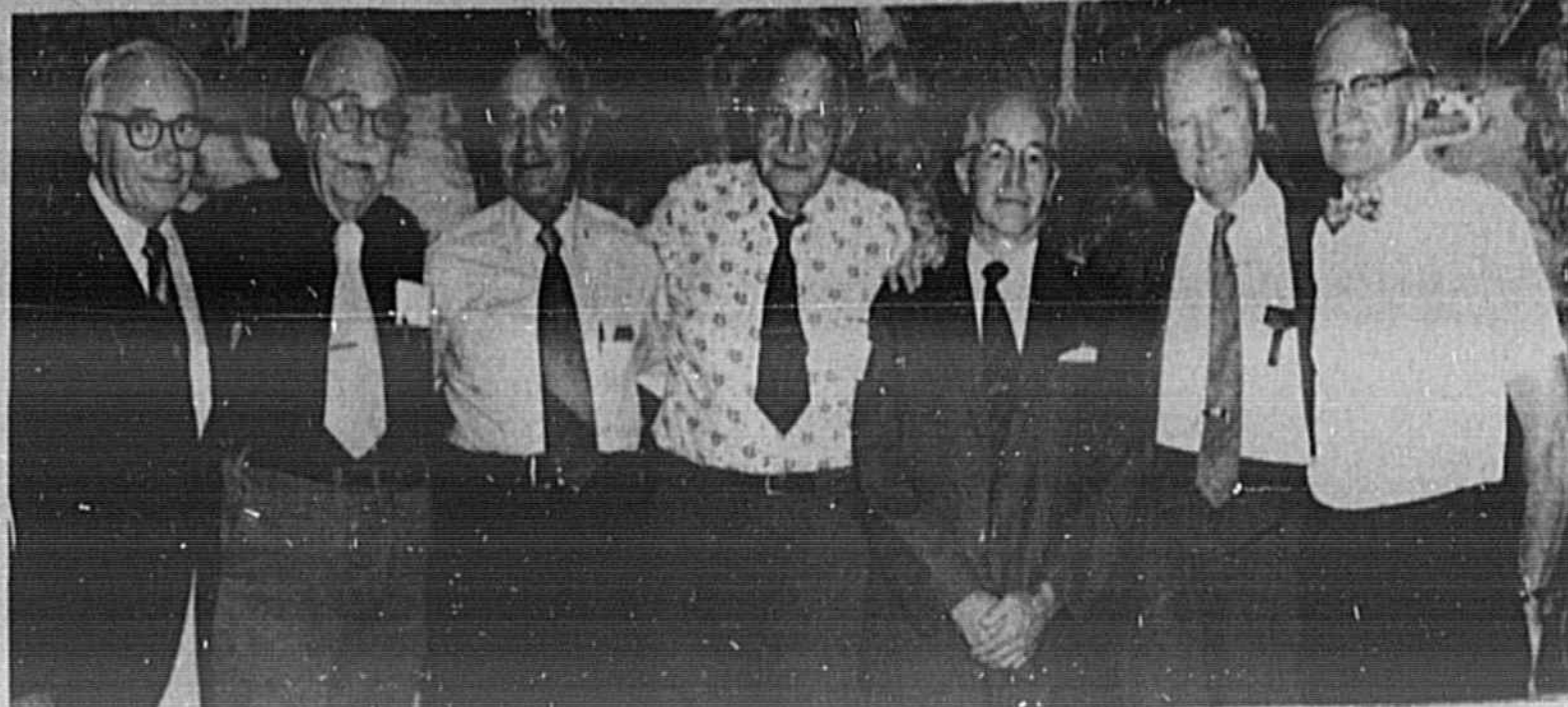

organized, composed of the wives of the Fire-Fighters and other interested women. They started the Blood Bank drawing the following year, in conjunction with the American Red Cross. This is still in operation.

The drive for funds continued through 1968 when the goal of \$18,000 was reached. Mackle Bros. then announced they were donating a second site of land on which to build a fire house in the second area, whenever funds would be available.

On Oct. 10, 1969 a Special Deltona Fire District was enacted in Volusia County by the State Legislature. LeRoy Roth of the Deltona Fire Department was named as one of the three-member Board of Commissioners by Governor Kirk. Because of this, the Deltona Fire Department now receives 1.1 mill tax. The fire department was then able to purchase another new truck on June 30, 1971.

The two fire trucks have a combined capacity of 2,000 gals. of water in the two tanks.

Kissinger To Visit Mideast

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger hurriedly scheduled his trip to the Mideast this week to head off a big Egyptian attack on Israeli forces on the Suez Canal, a Beirut newspaper close to the Syrian government reported today.

Mexicans Arrest 3

GUADAJAJARA, Mexico (AP)—Mexican authorities say they have arrested three Communist guerrillas, including one who admitted participating in the kidnaping last October of the honorary British consul in Guadajajara. The Jalisco state attorney said Jose de Jesus Ramirez Meza, 34, told the police a Guadajajara lawyer and his wife, also a lawyer, planned the simultaneous kidnaping of consul Anthony Duncan Williams, a Mexican citizen, and of Fernando Aranguen, local industrialist. Williams was released unharmed, but Aranguen was killed. The police issued arrest warrants for the lawyer and his wife.

Cambodians Drop Napalm

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP)—Cambodian air force fighters dropped napalm today on Khmer Rouge insurgents threatening Phnom Penh's airport. Front-line field commanders called in the napalm-driven T28s to drop the flaming chemical on a series of villages five to seven miles northwest of the city and less than two miles north of the airport.

NEW YORK (AP)—A member of the United States diplomatic staff in Peking is being forced to leave China because he killed a Chinese girl in an automobile accident, the American Broadcasting Corp. reported today.

Sweden Rations Gas Second Day Today

LONDON (AP)—Sweden is rationing gasoline for the second day today, and Norway and the Netherlands will have rationing this month.

Swedish Rationing

These include 50-mile limits. There is also an unofficial restriction on driving: gasoline prices have risen as much as 18 cents due to the Arab oil squeeze and now run as high as \$1.26 a gallon.

Norway and Netherlands

Rationing begins Saturday and each car will be given 4 gallons a week. Supplementary rations will be issued for business use, allowed on the basis of 1973 mileage less 25 per cent. The government, fearful of a black market in coupons, says the transfer of coupons from one private car to another will not be prohibited.

British Rationing

The government says Europe's first to distribute gasoline ration books, and by mid-December everyone had drawn their allocations. Industry Minister Tom Boardman said this week it is "very unlikely" rationing will be imposed this month but added: "I am not prepared to comment further than January."

Niger Rationing

The government says it is rationing gasoline for the second day today, and Norway and the Netherlands will have rationing this month.

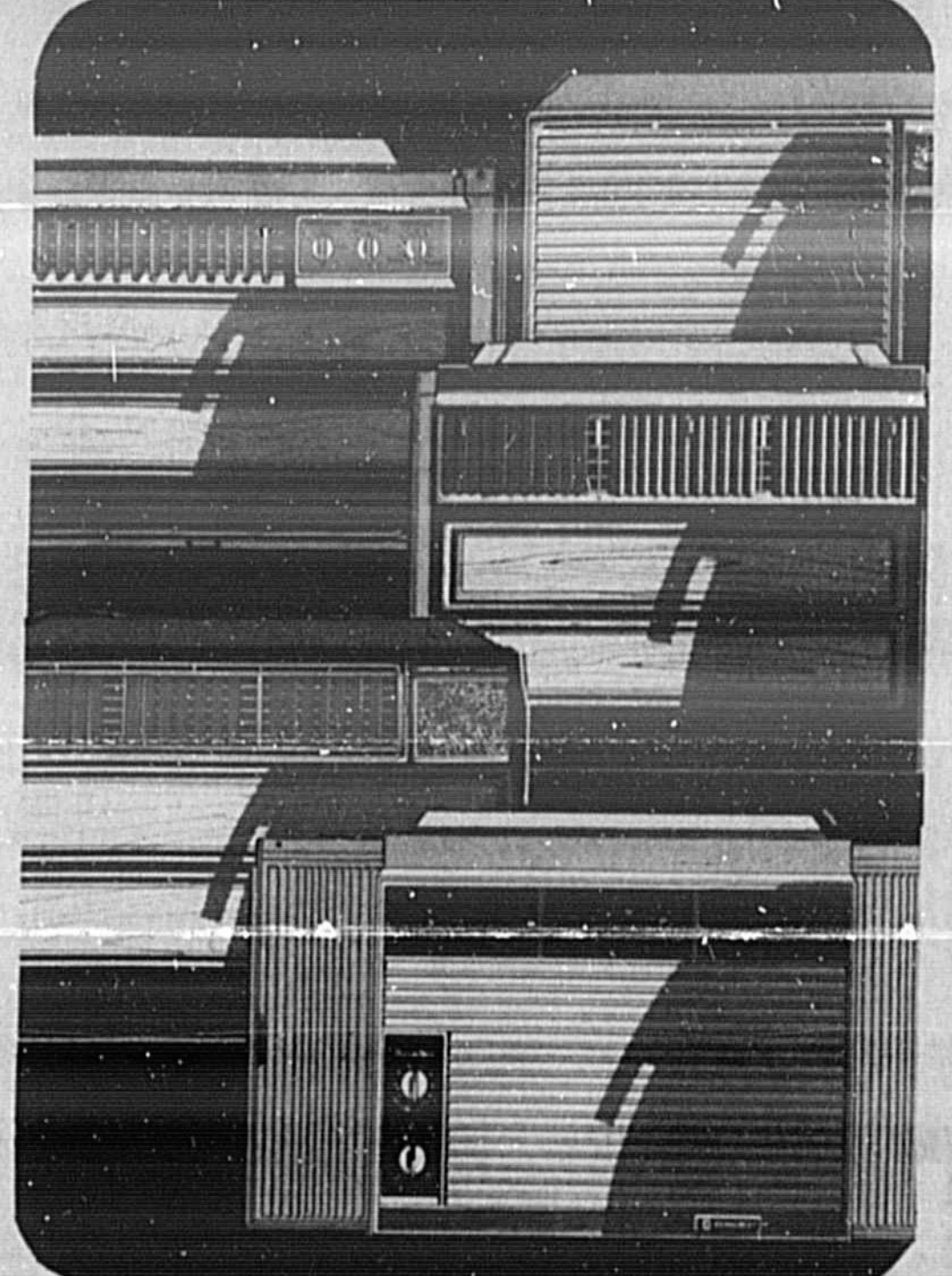

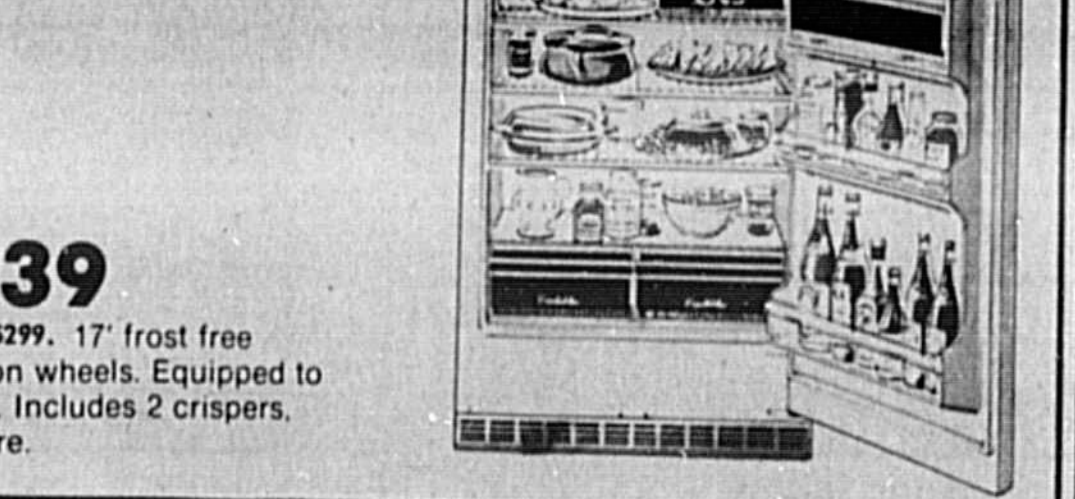

To End Energy Crisis President Asks Global Cooperation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Nixon administration has proposed unprecedented diplomatic cooperation to solve an unprecedented global energy problem and says the world's prosperity and stability is at stake.

President Nixon in a letter to oil-producing nations, released Thursday, said the world stands at a crossroads between cooperation and "increasing political and economic conflict."
