Traffic Codes For Highways Should Individual States Made

bluch has been said regarding a nation- there are no two intersections alike-just wide uniform traffic code.

And, as in every other category, bureaucrats are trying again to grasp control of states beginning with a misnomer "traffic safety."

Various states have varying laws-that's true and everyone knows it. And such variations are reasonable because state authorities and local authorities know what's best for the roads that pass through their com-

Irving S. Markel, a traffic engineer, in statements to a congressional committee studying highway safety, cited the fact that fewer than 25 states have compulsory inspection of vehicles to determine their mechanical soundness. One big reason is that the huge number of states without such a law realize that a program of this nature is one of the most "politically poisoned" bills that could be presented to any state legisla_ ture-much less a national law. States and communities are wise to have stayed away from this type of regulation.

Mr. Markel goes on to cite that all kinds of variations exist on speed limits, traffic lanes and rules affecting use of the road. Little does Mr. Markel know, then, about highway travel when different widths of roads require different speed zones along the highways-and the control of the traffic along these roads, in any state, is the states preogative-not the federal government's.





Supervisors OK his request, and the Soil Conzervation Service then makes survey of his farm which shows the types of rolls, what the land is best capablt of producing, needs for draingae and irrigation, and a lot of other important tidings a farmer should know about his land.

The owner and the technician go over the entire farm. They study the land capabilities or natural abilities of the land. The farmer tells the technician the kind of farming he would like to do and the technician discusses with him capacity of his land to do that kind of farming. Together they work out a conservation plan for every acre of the form. This is strictly a volunteer program. The fine thing about it is that the district program sells itself. When a farmer sees his neighbor making better crops and more income as a result of good land use and water management, he is ready to get in himself, These services are free of costs to any landowner in the District.

City Manager Warren E. Knowles revealed that David B. Lee, Director, Bureau of Banitary Engineering of the State Board of Health had refused to approve sewer plans for a subdivision already underway just outside of Sanford.

The letter refusing to approve the platts was directed to the engineer for George H. Garrison, a developer who had planned the subdivision. It read: "We regret to inform you that this agency can not consider approval of the project until such time as the city has taken Jefinite and decisive action relative to the construction of alcquate sewage treatment farlines."
