



Pig Thief Makes Escape Good By Using Helicopter

JACKSON, Mich. (AP) - For Dale Otto Remling, badcheck artist and pig thief, the Great 'Copter Caper is a success so far. For two persons who police say helped him flee from the world's largest walled prison in a hijacked helicopter, it is less so. Remling, plucked from the huge Southern Michigan Prison by a helicopter that swooped in and out unnouced by guards, remains at large. Police are also seeking Gertrude Woodbury, an alleged accomplice. But Don Hill, 23, who authorities say hijacked the helicopter, is in custody, charged with kidnaping; and Jolyne Lou Conn, 32, has been arrested and charged with aiding and abetting the escape. The caper was remarkably similar to an escape in the movie "Breakout," in which a helicopter is used to pull off a prison break. The movie is, in turn, based on a real-life escape in Mexico.

Board Ponders Utility Action

The Board of County Commission (BCC) is working on an ordinance to allow the county to acquire water and sewer lines from developers in efforts to provide extended utility service to unincorporated areas.

The proposed ordinance, drafted by Bill Dale director of environmental services allows for an agreement between the BCC and land developers on the reimbursement for certain types of water and sewer pipe. The proposed ordinance will be discussed by Dale and

BCC Monday at 10 a.m. in a worksession in the county Under the ordinance, developers, preparing land for utility service areas, would lay the pipe and then donate

The ordinance is intended to do two things: save the county money because the developer lays the pipe, and allows the county to extend potential utility service areas. The County currently has the philosophy of purchasing several private utilities in order to provide a better regulated utility service for unincorporated residents. In a 9:30 work session, the BCC will decide on what to spend \$1.1 million in federal revenue sharing funds during the next two years.

DELAND (AP)-James Perry Ables has been sentenced to life in prison after a circuit court jury convicted him of first-degree murder in the death of radio disc jockey Fred West. The 12-member jury deliberated 80 minutes before

handing down the guilty plea Friday, and then decided in 10 minutes to recommend life in prison rather than the death penalty for Ables, 29. Judge Uriel Blount agreed with the jury and sentenced Ables to prison making him ineligible for parole for 25

The bullet-riddled body of West, 21, was found last Oct. 26, a day after he failed to report to radio station WKKX. The station had received a \$10,000 ransom demand for Ables, of DeLand, did not testify in his own behalf



Action On Energy Can't Be Delayed

The contest between President Ford and Congress over a national energy policy is more than an exercise in power, despite the emphasis given to the sniping between Capitol Hili and the White House.

A firm response to the problem of fuel shortages and skyrocketing fuel prices is essential to efforts to get a grip on the American economy and to give confidence to our trading partners abroad.

The United States is the leading consumer of energy and energy problems shake the foundations of our entire monetary and security systems. Continued disruption of the domestic energy market perpetuates uncertainty and instability worldwide.

The President had little alternative to the actions announced in his May 27 broadcast to the nation, ordering the second \$1 increase in the tariff on imported oil and a phaseout of price controls on domestic oil.

Congress has fumbled the pledge of a comprehensive program to which Mr. Ford had deferred in delaying initiation of his own proposals. We have reservations about the impact of the President's plan on that segment of the population

which must cope with increases in the cost of heating and lighting their homes on a fixed income. Legislation shaped in the House Ways and Means Committee, if pushed through to congressional approval, would impose a heavy tax in the area of greatest energy use and abuse automobile fuel - as a method of discouraging

But Mr. Ford's decision, debatable though its consequences may be, is infinitely preferable to continued vacillation.

It would be premature, probably, to call the policy adopted for the United States "firm." Almost certainly, the Democratic majorities in Congress will renew their efforts to reverse the tariff action and veto the elimination of price controls on "old" oil which must currently be marketed at about one-half the \$11-per-barrel price of imported oil and oil produced in excess of 1972

domestic capacity. Mr. Ford has, however, again focused public attention on Congress and its failure to deal with a root cause of America's most serious problems.

Congress cannot escape the publicly administered presidential prod to put together legislative package that will encourage fuel conservation and promote research and development of new energy sources.

Cleaver No Deal



From his world travels he may have decided that the American system of justice is not so bad after all, but he must still think it

A new law requiring that members of the U.S. Senate file a public report on how much they collect in fees on the speech and lecture circuit casts a revealing light on this fringe benefit that comes with being a senator. Two senators actually earned more out on the stump than they did from the government, which pays them \$42,500 a year for what their constituents must surely consider a full-time job.

It is also revealing about the temper of the times that 10 per cent of the senators did not file their outside-income reports by the deadline. We didn't think the post-Watergate era of scrupulous attention to a new set of rules for political conduct would be fading already.

Their first, last Oct. 30, prevented South Africa's expulsion from the United Nations. The council voted 10-3 with 2 abstentions on Friday defeating a resolution sponsored by nonaligned nations that all countries should stop supplying arms, ammunition and military aircraft, vehicles and other equipment to South Africa.







### Rachel Lee: Another 'Nightingale'

A double honor will come to Sanford's own modernday Florence Nightingale when members of District 7. Florida Nurses Association (FNA) gather Tuesday to present veteran nurse Rachel Lee with her 25-year membership Lamplighter pin and to submit her name for the FNA Community Service Award.

Certainly no nurse in the area is more deserving than Miss Lee, who has served the sick, aged and lonely in Sanford continuously for the past 35 years. She has been a faithful member of the FNA, and recalls traveling by Greyhound bus to the District 8 Negro Nurses Association meeting in Orlando before black and white nurses associations were integrated in 1951.

Although she officially retired from nursing in 1962, the 78-year-old Miss Lee has kept her registration current and is a regular volunteer at Sanford's Good Samaritan Home and at the Seminole County Unit of the American

"When you start getting older," it's good to let the young people have the jobs," explained Miss Lee. "Besides, I really enjoy volunteer work — there's no clock to punch, no card to pull.

"The thirgs I do may seem small: helping an ailing patient feed herself, combing their hair or trimming their nails. But these are important to the patients, and often the nurses just don't have time to take care of those little

Most of Miss Lee's work is with older people. "But then, I've always been partial to old folks," she said. "If I can make their lives a little happier, it brings sunshine into my own."

It was a childhood experience which inspired Miss Lee to become a nurse. When she was but 10 years old, her mother died after a lingering illness. "I still remember how helpless I felt because there was nobody in the community who could do anything to help. That's when I decided to become a nurse and work in the community

Her dream was delayed several years, however, because as the oldest of 11 children, she had to take care of her younger brothers and sisters and keep house until her father remarried. She then returned to Piney Woods High School near Jackson, Miss. and upon graduation was accepted at Hampton Nursing School in Virginia, one of the few schools in those days which accepted black students. She wrote her State Board examinations in Charlottsville, Va. in 1931.

After serving as school nurse back in her home town for several years, an arthritic condition forced her to move in 1940 to Florida's milder climate. She has lived in Sanford ever since, but makes a yearly pilgrimage back to Mississippi to visit the many

friends and family members still living there.

Most of her nursing service in Sanford was done at the County Infirmary — now the Agricultural Center on U.S. 17-92. Her duties included milking the hospital's cow, collecting eggs from its chickens and squeezing fresh juice from oranges which grew in nearby groves!



#### Dorothy Pearson: Blackmarket Babies



A large percentage of 'licensed' adoptions in Central Florida are handled by the Children's Home Society under the direction of Dorothy Pearson. The extent of 'baby farming' and blackmarketing of infants in this area is not known; that it is a widespread practice in Florida is an established fact, however.

when there are babies for sale, business is booming.

At a high of \$40,000 a head, you can't go wrong, was obviously the thinking of a group of unscrupulous racketeers in the Miami area - until the law caught up with them. And although there were found to be no real grounds for prosecution (a loophole in the laws governing adoptions let most of them off scott free), the baby black marketing had been exposed.

As a result, there is now a bill on the Governor's desk setting a maximum fee of \$500 for "independent" adoptions (lawyers, doctors and other individuals handling adoptions) and providing that out of state adoptions be

handled by a licensed adoption agency. The Central Florida Division of the Children's Home Society of Florida is such a licensed agency. Its executive director, Miss Dorothy Pearson, was guest speaker at a

recent meeting of the Rotary Club of Sanford. She introduced her subject by showing a film compiled from a series of television films on the "baby farming" uncovered in the Miami area. Although Miss Pearson has heard rumors of similar, though much smaller, operations in Central Florida, she has no definite proof that they exist.

The film showed first the so-called "baby farms" -

houses owned or rented by a few Miami attorneys in which pregnant women were housed until their unwanted children were born. In many instances, there was no supervision in these homes, even though some of the inmates were only 14 years old, and little had been done to prepare the women for the process of childbirth or the emotional trauma of giving up their babies.

A breakdown of costs to the individual handling these independent adoptions revealed that approximately \$600 was paid in doctor's fees; \$100 in pediatrician's fees; \$500 to the hospital and \$1,200 to feed and house the pregnant woman. A total of some \$2,500 - yet an average price per independent adoption of \$8,000 was being charged. Rates as high as \$40,000 for a single child were discovered.

"Eight thousand dollars or a two-year wait" is the difference between an independent adoption and an adoption through a licensed agency, was the way the film summed up the situation.

At the Children's Home Society in Central Florida the waiting period is three to eight months, and the fee is based on the adoptive parents' income, with a maximum charge set at \$2,150.

According to Miss Pearson, there are definite advantages for both parents and child to adopt through a licensed agency.
