

Lecturer of Bible Association Will Speak Here Sunday

C. A. Wise, of New York City, representing the International Bible Students' Association, will lecture at the Miami Theater Sunday night at 7:45 o'clock, according to an announcement made today by members of the association here.



The public is cordially invited to hear Mr. Wise, who has been on the lecture platform for a number of years. His subject Sunday night will be "The Highway to Life."

In connection with his talk, Mr. Wise will point out that building good roads is the foundation for better government. Speaking today on that subject, Mr. Wise said:

"Many have wondered why so many inventions, labor-saving devices and other conveniences have been thrust upon us so rapidly during the past few decades. The penalty against the race was 'Bye-bye thou shalt die'; for mankind has been seeking out an existence amidst laborious toil and hardships while man is a dying creature."

"Man's hope of life lies in the resurrection of the dead. If it has been necessary to earn one's bread through efforts causing 'sweat of face,' may we not conclude that labor-saving machinery is the forerunner of a time when man will not be a dying creature? And as a new government under Christ is promised, may not the easing up of roadways to facilitate the traveling of automobiles suggest the laying of the foundation of a better government in which will be cast in the highway to life upon which humanity shall be invited to walk?"

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington, Nov. 20. — Going home pretty late, some nights ago, I happened to glance upward, toward about the 'tenth floor of a certain Washington skyscraper, and immediately my eye was caught by the peculiar winking of a lone light in an upper-story window. They were rapid winks, at slightly irregular intervals.

While no wire or wireless operator, due to past business activities I do know a little about the telegraph code — not enough to read it, but enough so that I recognized, in this winky-wink-wink winking, something extraordinarily like Morse.

That, probably, is all I'd have thought about it if, passing the same way a night or two later, I hadn't witnessed the phenomenon again. Moved by an undignified curiosity, I got a telegrapher friend to take a look.

'Twas even as I'd suspected. Some thirsty party was "B.O.S.-ing" furiously for hieker, and it must have been quite a large party, considering the amount and variety of refreshments it was ordering, from off in the darkness, toward Arlington.

The Agriculture Department has been at great pains to tell the world that it has no objection to kissing. Why, you ask, should the department suppose anybody did suspect it of objecting? Because it received a whole stack of letters, accusing it of just that thing.

What happened was this: The department issued a bulletin declaring war on mistletoe. With Christmas so close at hand, the country evidently jumped largely to the conclusion that Secretary Jardine was launching an anti-osculation campaign. In reality, it appears, the bulletin was inspired by the forest service, which dislikes mistletoe solely on the ground that it kills trees.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Why shouldn't an internal revenue bureau auditor conceive the idea of a \$5,500,000 Woodrow Wilson Memorial University? Why, having thought of it, shouldn't he go to work to raise the money and found the university? There doesn't seem to be any reason why not, except that raising \$5,500,000 is rather a large order for a not particularly prominent and only moderately paid government employe.

Yet the fact that such an individual—R. Moulton Pettey—is said to have been the original promoter and certainly is now the president of the Woodrow Wilson Memorial Association, appears to be the only basis for a lot of none too friendly publicity the organization is receiving on the eve of its proposed countrywide drive for funds to endow an institution of learning near the capital in the war president's honor.

Nobody says a word, out and out, against Pettey. All they do say is that he's just a special auditor for the internal revenue bureau—and here he is trying to raise \$5,500,000. Having said that, they appear to think they've made out a strong case. But have they? Ask Pettey if the story is true, and his answer is, "Certainly. What of it? Does a man have to be a notability to entitle him to work for a Woodrow Wilson memorial?" Laugh that off.

Pettey isn't widely known and doesn't profess to be, but some of his association's executive committee members are. They include Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, Maj. Gen. Hines, Mayor Walker of New York, 16 governors and half as many senators. The drive starts Dec. 7. I can't see anything the matter with the enterprise unless somebody has something better to urge against it than that R. Moulton Pettey is a treasury department auditor.

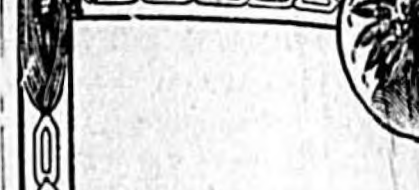

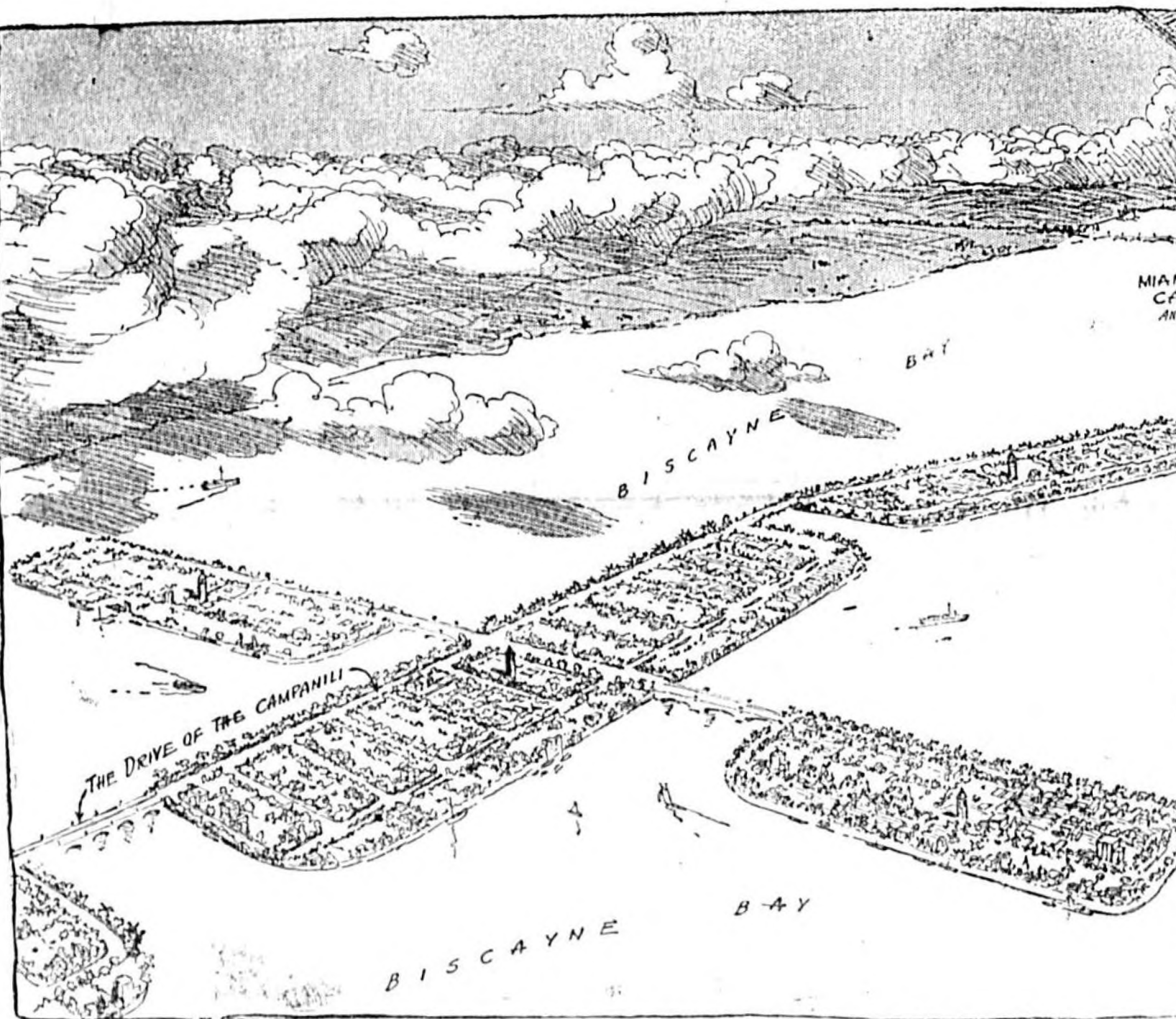

For City Commissioner

With the announcement of Dr. C. J. Marshall that he will not be a candidate for re-election to the office of city commissioner, the election of December 8 has resolved itself into a choice between H. R. Stevens and E. F. Housholder.

As The Herald has previously stated nothing is so far from its intent as to incite a political battle, or such mud-slinging contest so recently witnessed in Orlando, which at this time could only result in harm to the growth and prosperity of this city. The office of city commissioner, however, is an important one, and the election of December 8 should not come and pass without the character and qualifications of the candidates receiving utmost consideration by the voters.

Regarding the character of both of the men who have offered themselves to the service of the public, The Herald has only the highest praise. Both are known to be men of unquestioned honesty, excellent ability, and moral principles. They are leaders in religious and intellectual life and their standing in the community is indisputable.

Unfortunately, for a man claiming qualifications for the office of city commissioner, Mr. Stevens has business affiliations with the Atlantic Coast Line Railway. We do not say that Mr. Stevens would allow these affiliations to influence his judgment wherever the interests of the city might be at stake. However, it can be expected that Mr. Stevens would be none other than normal in his possession of certain well known characteristics of human nature.

Mr. Housholder is an unusually successful lawyer for a man of his years. He is young and ambitious. The world lies before him and Sanford is his world of today and tomorrow. His success now will be his success later. There can be little doubt but that he will exert his utmost energies toward achieving all that is beneficial and progressive for Sanford. The successful conduct of his office of city commissioner will not only mean much to the city of Sanford but also will have much to do with the successful consummation of the ambitions of Mr. Housholder.

Eliminating Incompetent Drivers

Out of the twenty million persons in the United States who are now operating motor cars, ten per cent of them "haven't any more business to be driving than a rabbit has to pick a quarrel with a pack of beagles," according to the Popular Science Monthly, a magazine which has been making an extensive investigation of the situation as it exists.

In substantiation of its indictment, the magazine declares that these incompetents killed more than twenty thousand persons and maimed nearly five hundred thousand others during the past year. The Atlanta Georgian commenting upon the subject recently said, "as a result of this deplorable condition, study is progressing along the lines of carefully selecting the types of people competent to engage in a business far more difficult than is that of the locomotive engineer, and surrounded by infinitely more chances of disaster."

A short time ago a committee of psychologists appeared before the national committee of safety, a committee organized by Herbert Hoover. David Wechsler, one of these experts, announced that a series of practical tests has been devised whereby the temperament of those who wish to drive automobiles, can be ascertained. These tests, the expert informs us, will require no longer than fifteen minutes at the most.

Dr. Wechsler, however, admits a weakness in his tests for he says, "it is comparatively easy to weed out those below the minimum requirement, but not so easy to eliminate the ones who are superquick." Their very keenness, the scientist points out, makes them daring and consequently careless, which further leads him to assert that the "very best drivers are those who are neither stupid nor extra bright."

It will probably take some time and a thorough investigation of the situation before an efficient system of tests can be worked out that will have the effect of reducing the number of motor car accidents to the smallest minimum possible. While the real problem before us is, as Dr. Wechsler points out, with the "superquick," still it is a great relief to know that ways and means have been arrived at that will eliminate a few of the incompetents.

Florida at the present time is not betting that tens of thousands of persons will come down from the North this winter, and during subsequent winters. That is an assured fact, and has been true in the past. What Florida is doing is betting that no tens of thousands, but hundreds of thousands and perhaps even millions of persons will be either visiting or residing in Florida during coming winter seasons. It is the guess of this Service that those real estate owners and operators who are betting on an ultimately enormous winter population in Florida are not far from their guess. —Standard Daily Trade Service, New York.

en orator type. As he warmed up to the occasion he said something like this:

"If Columbus were to burn out tonight these cities could build it back in six months—if somebody furnished the material. You can erect a cotton mill twice as large as any in the world and these workmen can completely man it—if somebody furnished the money to build it. Put them on farms and this citizenry can raise enough cotton and food to clothe and feed the state of Alabama—if somebody will pay the rent and furnish the fertilizer. SECOND ANNUAL ART EXHIBIT IS TO FEATURE EVENT OF THIS WEEK

The Second Annual Art Exhibit of the Sanford Woman's Club, which will be held in the club house on Wednesday afternoon from 3 to 6 o'clock, is one of especial timeliness this year, when more new houses than ever before are going up in every quarter of the city. The exhibit includes several types of decorative craftsmanship which are being increasingly used by the leading interior decorators, and as they are for sale, or similar pieces can be made to order, they will undoubtedly find places in some of Sanford's finest homes.

The group of mountain pottery includes choice specimens from half a dozen different kilns, of almost every shape, size, and color.
