Sanford City Commission has given first reading to an amendment to the zoning ordinance to permit construction of churches in single family zones and multi-family zones. The new comprehensive citywide zoning ordinance adopted in January deleted church construction form all residential zones except multi-family as a conditional use. The amendment, expected to be adopted April 9 after second reading, allows chruches as conditional uses in all

single family and multi-family zones. The amendment couldn't be adopted on first reading this week because one commissioner, John Morris, was absent. Waiver of rules to adopt on first reading requires the unanimous vote of all five city commissioners.

Adoption will mean the Salvation Army can drop its request for change from single family to general commercial zoning between Holly and Maple Avenues and 22nd and 24th Streets - proposed site of a new 22,000 square foot Salvation Army citadel.

The Sanford Zoning and Planning Commission has tabled the request until city commission can adopt the zoning ordinance amendment. With the adoption of the amendment the Salvation Army

can apply for a conditional use in the single family zone west of French Avenue. The former zoning ordinance permitted churches as

conditional use in all residential zones and Z-P Chairman Art Harris said, in error, the section was left out of the new zoning ordinance. City Planner Gerald Dake recommended church con-

struction be allowed in multiple family residential zones but not in single family districts.

Also affected by the proposed ordinance amendment is the Nazarene Church which requested rezoning from singlefamily to multi-family on six acres in the 2600 block of S. Sanford Avenue for a new church, parsonage and educational facilities.

Action Tabled

Commission tabled action until April 9 on a public hearing to vacate and close part of Grandview Avenue as requested by the Nazarene Church.

Commission has scheduled a public hearing that night on an appeal by Ted Williams on the Z-P commission's recommendation against rezoning from single family to multi-family and general commercial property adjoining the Nazarene church tract.

Williams proposed a small shopping center at the northeast corner of Sanford Avenue and 26th Street. He said Monday he owns the south 350 feet fronting on Grandview and oppose the church's request for vacating the street until he gets his property rezoned. Area residents opposed Williams' rezoning request

and was told the engineering plans will be submitted to the city by Friday for approval so the contract can be negotiated. Mize said another meeting has been set for 1:30 p.m. Knowles reported a check with Hallmark's engineers

showed the plans have been waiting for the developer to pick them up. "I've been getting the run around by this developer for five months," Knowles said. Commissioners Gordon Meyers and A. A. McClanahan

said they favor a complete shutdown of construction on 85 homes in Washington Oaks Unit Two Monday.

Knowles slapped a building moratorium on the project Jan. 29 and Davis told commissioners his client faced financial disaster if the ban wasn't lifted. March 12 commissioners ordered building inspections be reinstated on Unit Two so the houses could be completed but no new building permits or occupancy permits be issued.

Grandma's house was old-fashioned and had been built at a time when "home" meant something more tha just a place to stop long enough to change your clothes and go someplace else. But what else was there? Probably the floor was covered by a carpet gay with pink roses, and there might be a small rug showing a huge sleepy lion reclining among bright flowers. There was a center table, of course, with a kerosene lamp on it, and various books so intellectual looking that it took a great deal of courage to even open them, and nobody even dreamed of reading them.

There were little stands and brackets holding vases filled with dried flowers and sprays of smoke bush, and dainty ornaments too precious to touch. There were straight-backed, plush-covered rocking todians be instructed in the care

chairs which nobody could sit in for fear of disarranging the hand-crocjeted "tidies" and antimacassars with which they were decorated

There was the horsehair sofa which was about as uncomfortable a piece of furniture as could be imagined. It was so prickly that even all the clothes people wore then weren't enough for real protection, and it was so slippery and the seat so rounded that it took the utmost willpower to even stay on it. But it was great fun to sit on the arms or back, stick your feet straight out, and go sliding down to land on the seat and bounce up and down.

Propaganda Battle Isn't Everything

Panama may have won a propaganda battle against the United States but the war of words over the Panama Canal promises to go in in

Panama obviously scored points over the United States at the U.N. Security Council meeting in Panama City March 15-21.

The fact that 13 of the 15 members of the council voted in favor of a resolution urging the two countries to conclude a new treaty on the Panama Canal without delay suggests that sentiments were swayed overwhelmingly in favor of the Isthmian republic. Only Britain

But even if the United States had not exercised its right of veto and killed the resolution, it would have amounted to little more than another exercise in U.N. futility

What the Security Council was asking was something Panama and the United States have been doing the last nine years, seeking the prompt elimination of the causes of conflict

Or put another way, after almost a week of intensive, on-the-spot study of the canal question, the U.N. delegations of Communist China, the Soviet Union, France, Guinea, Sudan, Kenya, Indonesia, India, Yugoslavia, Australia, Austria, Peru and Panama, reached much the same conclusion that Panama and the United States did almost a decade ago.

The similarity in wording between the U.N. draft resolution and the Joint Declaration that Panama and the United States signed April 3, 1964, suggested that the United Nations con-

Wounded Laws

To permit Indians who seized and occupied the South Dakota community of Wounded Knee to identify themselves and leave the village without facing immediate arrest is as generous an offer as the government can afford to make. It would then be left for a grand jury to decide who would be held to account for any law violations that may have occurred during the seizure of hostages and exchanges of gunfire.

These Indians have chosen an unorthodox way to make a point about the management of Indian affairs. The government also has a point to make-that citizens of the United States of America stand equal before the law. While members of minority groups often appeal to that concept to obtain redress, they must also accept it when they violate laws which must apply to all if we are to have a peaceful society.

The Security Council deadlock means that pending resumption and successful conclusion of the U.S.-Panama treaty negotiations that were interrupted by Panama's preparations for the Security Council visit, relations between the two countries will go on being governed by the still very valid, if admittedly imperfect, Hay-Bunau Varilla treaty. Under that 70-year-old document "The Republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation and control of a zone of land and land under water for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection" of a ship canal across

the Isthmus of Panama. Panama also gave the United States all the rights, power and authority within the zone "which the United States would possess and exercise if it were the sovereign of the territory...to the entire exclusion of the exercise sovereign rights, power or authority." Panama has been objecting to treaty terms for almost 70 years, although the document was ratified by the Panamanian government in February, 1904.

But it was not until after the bloody riots along lives of a score of Panamanians and four U.S. soldiers that the two countries started making a serious effort to revise their treaty relationship.

Leniency Reprehensible

Courts Mask Public Enemy No. 1

President Nixon has reminded us in his radio message on crime that "public enemy No. 1" in America can no longer be identified as a name and face on a wanted poster. The greatest criminal threat to our society is far more menacing. It is drug abuse, and it is exacting a toll in ever-widening circles throughout our society, defying all the forces we have so far arrayed against it.

Despite impressive seizures of contraband in the effort to pinch off the flow of drugs into this country, they remain available on an illicit market reaching into every city and town. The predatory addict and user, supporting his expensive habit, is the primary cause of the increase in crimes of violence on our streets. Drugs are a factor in the decay of inner-city neighborhoods and our welfare problem. The public is picking up the bills in higher budgets for police and

the courts and in higher insurance rates. Far worse is the incalculable cost in human terms. Heroin addiction is rampant across the land. Addictive misuse of barbiturates is described as epidemic. The availability of drugs has transformed the atmosphere on college and high school campuses. Even elementary schools

wandering down the blind alley of a "drug culture" that robs them of motivation and responsibility and leaves many in a squirrel cage of addiction from which they may never escape. Drugs truly have become a poison in our national

So prevalent is the use of marijuana, at the bottom rung of the drug ladder, that police often ignore it on grounds that their limited manpower should be directed to drying up sources of supply in the drug underworld. The distributor, the pusher, the trafficker in "hard stuff" has become the primary target. The glaring truth is, however, that the law is hardly more effective in dealing with those who, in Mr. Nixon's words, "persist in living off the suffering of others." In the parade of drug offenders through our courts, for

instance, convictions for sale of drugs are surprisingly rare. A great educational effort is being made to awaken our population to the danger of drugs. This will never succeed in urning back the tide of drug abuse until those who traffic in drugs and help popularize them are treated as the dangerous criminals-the public enemies-that they are.

Nixon for Connally

President Nixon's unmistakable efforts to boost the 1976 Republican candidacy of former Treasury Secretary John Connally place him in limited company. Only a few presidents ever have tried to choose their successor nominees and just one. Theodore Roosevelt, succeeded-with his choice of William Howard Taft. From history's evidence, the rule of thumb is that

retiring "lame duck" presidents don't have the political

clout to tell their party what to do. So why should Mr. Nixon imagine he can have major effect? First, while it is early in his second term, he is behaving as if the "lame duck" idea is dead, at least in his case. He exudes a sense of total command, drawn obviously from his smashing 1972 re-election victory and the evident weakness of rival power centers. It is understandable that he and his aides may believe that this huge power advantage can endure throughout his

He is trying to lord it over Congress, and most realistic appraisers think he is going to triumph, despite . the loud fuss from Capitol Hill. If he can bring this off, why isn't it reasonable for him to figure be can dominate his party right through the 1976 convention? Thus far, no real opposition focus of power within the GOP can be detected, though that notion may in time Mr. Nixon is not giving us the benefit of his private

thoughts on the 1976 presidential outlook, but it's fair to guess at them. He not only likes and respects Connally, whose turn to the Republican ranks is expected momentarily, but he very likely believes that he above all prospects has the kind of status and presidential bearing which would

most enhance Republican chances in 1976. The odds-on Democratic favorite for 1976 at this time is, as everybody knows, Sen. Edward Kennedy. The young man may still have certain political handicaps by that time, but he is a prodigious campaigner with more than his fair quotient of the old Kennedy magic. And it can't be forgotten that Mr. Nixon, according to friends, has always had an almost awesome fear of

the Kennedys as adversaries. So the reasonable guessing is that he sees the commanding presence conveyed by Connally as the best Kennedy. The other side of that judgment r is that he does not have similar confidence in Vice President Spiro Agnew. There is painful irony in this, if the analysis is correct.

For choosing Agnew as his running mate carries the corollary judgment that he considers Agnew fit to take over in the White House should anything happen to him. Yet the signs are plentiful that his clinging to Agnew as a second term running mate was almost purely a political judgment — that it would seem a self-criticism o jettison the man he had chosen with such laudatory

Moreover, there was constant evidence in the first term that Agnew was demeaned and ignored by White House top aides, who are presumed naturally to take their cue from Mr. Nixon himself. Agnew's real contacts with the President have been few. So have his serious missions. Even the vice-president's recent visit to Asian capitals somehow fell short of suggesting a new mood of respect and confidence on Mr. Nixon's part. Perhaps the cruelest irony is that Agnew's biggest handicap for 1976 is his image as a political hatchet-man. a role Mr. Nixon assigned him in his first term. The residual consequence of that is doubt about the vice president's ability to develop the needed strong impression that he has the quality, the judgment, the serious

A study at the University of California has discovered some peculiar things about men and women. For instance, when a woman is in the company of other women, she will often see herself as a leader, but in the company of men she will more than likely select a man as leader

This is not new, as women's lib leaders have often pointed out. The interesting thing is the behavior of men. In mixed groups, they are likely to choose themselves as leader over the women, but when in an all-male group. they select themselves as leader less often than do women in all-female groups.

In terms of percentages, women perceived themselves ns leader 24 per cent of the time in all-female groups, but this decreased to a mere 3.6 per cent of the time in mixed groups. Men increased their self-choice as leader from is per cent of the time in all-male groups to 27.7 per cent

Why the difference in the two situations? The sociologists who conducted the study at the U. of C. Riverside campus gave this answer

Traditionally, males have been vested with the leadership role, and thus both men and women in mixed groups have a greater tendency to choose men as leaders. But in single-sex groups, a woman can feel freer to choose herself or another woman as leader because no men are present and, therefore, she is not threatened with the traditional perception of male dominance.

What is surprising, say the researchers, is not that men accept a dominant role and assign a subordinate role to women, but that women do the same thing to essentially the same degree. "Men and women discriminate equally against women,"

Better Nutrition Is A Key Factor When Losing Weight

on empty calories, then tells us that "it's in to be thin, it's out to be stout." Millions of obese Americans spend an estimated \$400 mil-

lion plus annually to lose unwanted nounds, many unhalancing their diets in an attempt to balance the bathroom scale. Yet a recent governmen tion before birth and in early

report warns that malnutrichildhood may tip the balance in favor of obesity later on in life and states that a potentia 80 percent reduction in the incidence of obesity could be achieved with improved nu national success rate for prolonged weight loss is reportedly only 2 per cent.

A child may get a head start toward controlling obesity i he's well nourished during early development. The total number of cells an individual will have is determined during the prenatal and early childhood periods, and mainutrition will lower the count. Fewer body cells means fewon life functions. Consequent ly there is a higher proportion of fat in the body.

Physicians also recognize that nutrition is crucial in early brain development. Our appetite control mechanism called the appestat, is locate in one part of the brain. Could early nutrition have an effect on this mechanism?

When our appestat mechanism isn't functioning properly, we eat either too lit tie or too much. If our appestat was "off" in its calculations by only one per cent over a period of 20 years, we would gain or lose about 250

Both diet and exercise seem to affect the appestat mechanism. While "nutrition hunger" is known to lead to 'sugar hunger" and vitamin B) deficiency may depress appetite the appestats of experimental animals whose brains were damaged in the borstory got back in baance after being maintained on a nutritionally sound diet

Where exercise is concerned, automated America should note that one effective way to fatten animals for market is to place them in close quarters where they can't move around very much. Dr. Jean Mayer, Harvard professor of nutrition reports that moderately ac tive people and animals tend to eat less than their completely sedentary counter-

If a sound nutrition and exercise program plays such a key part in healthy body fund tion, it follows that a program of weight loss and maintenance, which incorporated these elements into a continuing life-style, would have the best chances for success.

Obesity is a symptom which may have a variety of causes, and unless the causes are treated also, the symptom tends to return when the treatment is stopped. The frustrated "foodaholic" on a fad diet or reducing pills may





Being Mom Isn't Easy

"I would like to be like Eddie's father on TV's The Courtship of Eddie's Father," says Jerry Brooks, father and sole homemaker for his two children. "But when Eliot (12 years old) watches the show, he aughs and says, 'Dad, that isn't the way it is. We don't have a maid like that. You don't have a car or a big business. You don't always stay cool like Eddie's father. r go out with different beautiful women every night. My son and I and even 6-year-old Elsie recognize the

As I sipped my wine, Jerry talked about how it was to have to earn a living and take care of a house and two children. As he talked, the pride I had felt when I took care of Joanne with flu, our three children, and the house for a three-day stretch seemed pale by comparison. In 1967, Jerry Brooks was an up-and-coming college administrator, dean of an urban education center, work ing the usual nine to six, mowing the lawn of his suburban

function as wife, mother, and homemaker Jerry's situation was aggravated by the nature of his wife's illness, a mental illness which involved manic and depressive periods and some normal spells in between. which gave Jerry hope-false hope as it turned out. Jerry realized that his kids would have a real home only if he became a homemaker, which meant giving up his administrative career. 'I went back to teaching and I began writing a novel.

But then his wife became ill and was no longer able to

It's been a year and a half now that I've functioned as teacher, writer and-out of economic necessity-home "I was never conscious of price before. I spent hundreds

of dollars when my wife first went into the hospital, because I couldn't tolerate the idea of shopping carefully "It took me about a year to realize I was going bank-

Now Jerry knows when to buy two dozen eggs instead of one. He knows that chicken and turkey legs are inexpensive and nutritious and that he can dress up hamburger through skillet dinners and canned add-your-own

"I've become a little more appreciative of women as a result of this, understanding better now the kinds of daily ordeals they face. I have no way of knowing how my kids stack up against other kids in terms of the ruckus they create. They're probably typical. But it gets to me. On the weekends I sometimes have all I can do to hold back from screaming, and sometimes I don't hold back."

When he first took over, Jerry experienced intensely what many husbands of liberated women are experiencing in a milder form-resentment at role reversal.

"I used to feel threatened by all this domestic responsibility. What am I doing washing dishes? What do I know about when the kids had their last shots? But now that resentment is minor. I've more or less accepted the fact that you can do all these things and still be a man.'

If Jerry's masculinity is not threatened, his creativity s. He has a contract for his novel from Harper & Row and wants to finish it this summer, but with those medical debts still to be paid, he can't afford summer camp for the kids or household help, Ironically, he can't even get a high school or college girl for the summer, because he's

But even during those long nights when as F. Scott Fitzgerald put it, every hour is 3 a.m., Jerry Brooks rejects the option of shuttling the kids off to grandparents or a foster home. He even turned down an offer of free overnight summer camp for the children, because he felt his daughter was too young and his son wanted to be with





Drain thoroughly and then place the peanuts in shallow pans and bake in a slow oven until all the mois-

DEAR POLLY-and Mrs. R. E.-We raise, salt and roast our own peanuts to perfection and have been doing making several tests for the desired saltiness. Soak pea nuts in this brine for 24 hours and then, if not salty enough, soak some more but not too long as the shells might soften. Dry before giving them the second go-round. When roasting place on a shallow pan so all the nuts touch the bottom of the pan and shake and test often. While soaking keep agitating so the salt does not settle in the bottom. The brine can be saved and used again. -CLARENCE

Gasoline Rationed By Sears Roebuck

MIAMI (AP) — Sears Roebuck & Co. is rationing gasoline sales in 11 south Florida outlets and in two Tennessee cities because of a critical shortage of fuel

Motorists patronizing service stations operated by the department store chain are limited to a 10-gallon maximum purchase at Sears pumps from Palm Beach

The restrictions were imposed Tuesday, said David Faulkner, community affairs director for Sears South Florida district. A company spokesman in the store's Chicago, Ill., headquarters said similar rationing was underway in Memphis and Nashville, Tenn., but not nationwide.

"We're on an allocation from the supplier and gasoline sales have increased," said Faulkner. "So before the situation became critical and we were forced to close stations, the decision was made to limit purchases.

Sears' stores in Florida are provided by the Marathon Oil Co. of Findaley, Ohio, but recently the supplier informed Sears no extra gasoline was available.

"Marathon doesn't have any more to sell," said Faulkner, adding the shortage wasn't created by the low retail price of the gas. A survey of several Miami area stations revealed

Sears regular gasoline was priced as much as five cents below competitors' prices. Faulkner said few complaints had been registered about the rationing but one service station employe

Kimbrough Questions Longwood

LONGWOOD - Mayor Eugene Jaques declined comment today on a letter sent to the city by a county commissioner questioning the contiguity of Lake Ruth South Subdivision on SR 427. District County Commissioner John Kimbrough Tuesday

mailed a letter to Council Chairman William Klosky, en-

closing a copy of a plat map showing the location of the subdivision as well as a copy of an ordinance annexing it to "As you can see, this property does not appear to be ontiguous to the city limits of Longwood," Kimbrough said.

'Please advise the board (of county commissioners) if there are other annexations that may affect this particular parcel of land to make it contiguous." Jaques told The Herald, "We (the city) are apparently

involved in litigation with the State of Florida over road annexation. I have not received Kimbrough's letter and I will not comment on it at this time.

"But there seems to be here and in other cities a question of whether certain annexed properties are within the territorial limits of the city. Before making any comment I would like to discuss this matter with the city attorney (S. Joseph Davis Jr.) since he is representing us on any road

Davis Jr. will be continuing his service as city attorney despite The subdivision is on the east side of SR 427. The city his announced resignation some some months ago annexed a parcel across the highway from weeks ago to become effective Lake Ruth South to be developed into a trailer park. At the time, Councilman E. E. Williamson questioned whether the Mayor Eugene Jaques said trailer park was contiguous and was told by the attorney today the lawyer has "assured

Lake Ruth South provided the link with the city. The subdivision, according to city map, is not land contiguous since it is separated from other city territory by a sliver of county land. The mayor's comments appear to indicate the city will claim contiguity by virtue of prior annexation of the highway.

The city currently is involved in a suit brought by Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin challenging the contiguity of the Shadow Hill subdivision on the Longwood-Markham Road being built by Trim-Tic Development. Since the suit was filed, the city annexed a parcel of land which the city fathers claim now makes the Trim-Tic tract contiguous.

Contiguity is one of the annexation requirements under the city charter and state law.
