DUI crackdown

TALLAHASSEE--More than 1,000 Florida law enforcement officers wrapped up round two of a year-long crackdown on drunk driving with nearly 200 arrests, state Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Nelson announced Wednesday.

Nelson, at a meeting of the Florida governor and Cabinet in Tallahassee, unveiled the latest results of Booze It & Lose It - a year-long campaign he is heading up to rid Florida's roadways of drunk drivers. Nelson is chairman of Drive Smart Florida, the non-profit agency behind the campaign.

"Once again we have seen positive results from an outstanding effort by our police, sheriff's deputies and highway patrol officers," Nelson said. "And we're just getting started." Booze It & Lose It was launched in March with the largest single crackdown on drunk drivers in state history including checkpoints around the state where more than 16,000 motorists were stopped and more than 150 were arrested for intoxication.

The second round of the crackdown took place May 23, involving 17 roadside checkpoints, 33 undercover patrol units called "wolfpacks," and a total of 1,025 law enforcement officers from 73 state, county and local agencies. The number of DUI arrests totaled 188.

Several other statewide Booze It & Lose It sweeps are planned within a year from the first crackdown that took place on March 23. Further information also can be obtained by calling FHP Major Ken Howes at (904)487-3139.

Rash of bank robberies

3 armed hits in one day

SANFORD — Seminole County sheriff's deputies and Casselberry Police are still looking for the robbers who Wednesday hit three banks in Longwood and Casselberry.

They believe the perpetrators in two of the holdups are the same.

According to Ed McDonough, public information officer for the sheriff's office, three men stormed into the SunTrust bank at 701 Miami Springs Road in the unincorporated county near

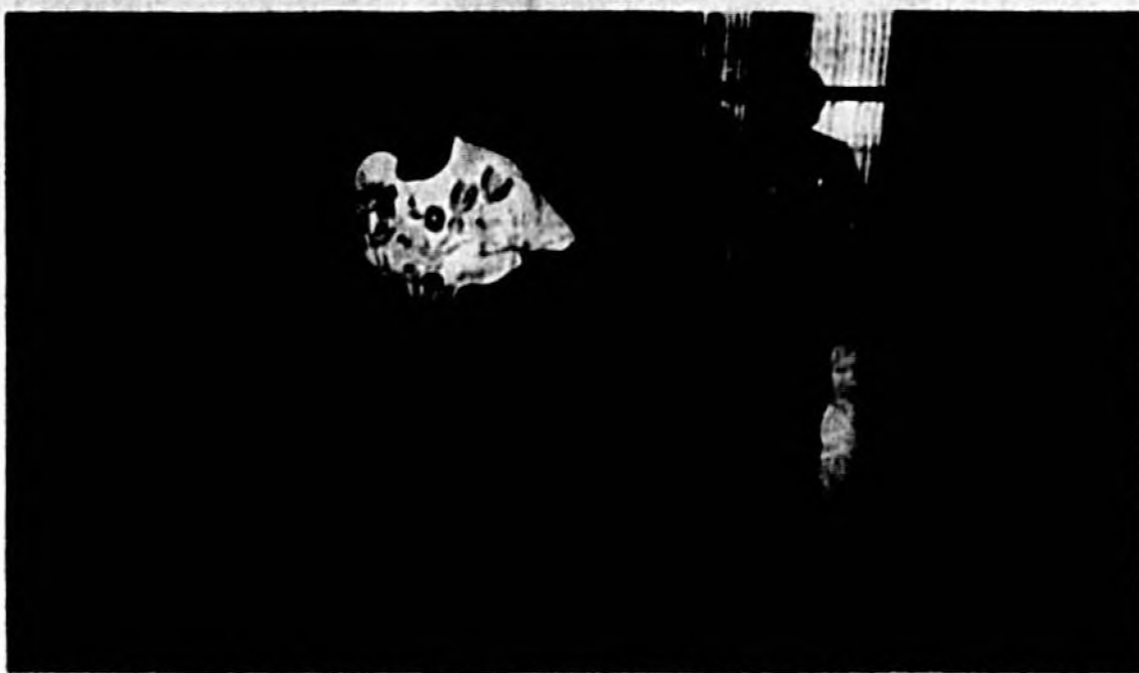
Sanford cops arrest man in second heist

More parents disgruntled about busing kids to school

SANFORD - Frustration and disbelief were the dominant feelings at a consent decree implementation update held Tuesday evening at Idyllwild Elementary School.

"It's not fair," said Dave Underwood, "you could live directly across the street from a school and have your child bused across town

to another school. I don't want my 5 year old daughter to have to ride a bus to the other side of town to attend a school where she may not be safe." His wife, Jill, agrees. "When we bought our house 10 years ago, school zoning was a major factor in our decision. Now we don't know what school our daughter will be attending."

The source of the Underwoods' anguish is the United States Justice Department's desegregation order which forces Seminole County to create a plan to eliminate racially identifiable schools. The Seminole County School

First USA charges into Seminole County

700 jobs to be created, with \$40 million impact

HEATHROW — One of the nation's largest credit card companies plans to bring 700 new jobs into Seminole County. The estimated economic impact will be more than \$40 million, according to company officials.

First USA Inc., headquartered in Dallas, Texas, made the announcement Wednesday in its soon-to-be finished building at Heathrow International Business Center in Lake Mary. The 125,000-square-foot, three-story facility was leased to the company by Pizutti Commercial Real Estate Inc.

"Central Florida provides an excellent location for our new center," said Richard W. Vague, chairman and chief executive officer of First USA. "The region has an experienced diverse and well-educated work force. No locations are any better."

Although Vague would not disclose a pay scale for the new jobs, he said the company offers highly competitive wages and benefits. There is a potential, he added, for up to 1,500 jobs and other services such as marketing and credit technology at the Lake Mary facility. Available positions range from entry level to customer

support to management.

The average wage for Seminole County is \$24,103. The average pay offered by First USA is between \$20,000 and \$23,000, according to Maureen Brockman, vice president of the Economic Development Commission of Mid Florida. When asked if the company received any kind of economic incentives from the county, Brockman said no because First USA's did not qualify since its average pay did not exceed the county's.

A temporary recruitment center has been opened at 300 International Parkway, Suite 230 until the main building opens in August. Applications are now being accepted or call 1-888-967-5178 for more information. The web site is <http://www.firstusa.com/florida>.

First USA has 4,800 employees and operates four other customer service centers in Dallas and Austin, Texas, Baton Rouge, La., and Wilmington, Del.

First USA is one of the largest providers of Visa and MasterCard services in the country with about 18.3 million credit cards issued and \$23.2 billion in total loans outstanding.

The company also announced a pending merger with Banc One Corporation which would almost double their customer base, making it the third largest credit card provider in the nation.

Complaint is filed against Greenwood Lakes assistant

SANFORD — It looks like trouble continues to pursue a Seminole County Middle School teacher, charged with molesting and harassing a teacher at another school with whom he had had a previous relationship.

According to school district records, Julius Francis, an assistant principal at Greenwood Lakes Middle School in Lake Mary, has been accused of sending erotic poetry to his Hersh, a science teacher at Milwee Middle School in Longwood.

Hersh has asked the Florida Department of Education's Division of Professional Practices Services to investigate the matter.

Calling the poetry offensive, Hersh said she received the poems through the district courier service on Feb. 4.

The poems were sexually explicit and signed "Lightfoot," a pen name Francis has used in the past. There were no other items sent with the poems.

Hersh is a friend of Susan Olyeto, another Milwee teacher, who is the woman with whom he was involved in a relationship, and who he

allegedly harassed after the breakup of that relationship.

Francis was arrested by Winter Park Police earlier this year after Olyeto accused him of making nuisance phone calls to her home after their relationship broke up. The State Attorney's Office dropped the charges, however.

Hersh said she believed Francis sent her the poems only to harass her friend. Though the assistant principal has stated his poetry with teachers, Hersh said he had no reason to send her any poetry. She said she knows Francis only on a professional level. He would, she said, be out of line sending her any type of poetry, especially poems that are sexually explicit.

Hersh filed a complaint with the school district earlier this year regarding the poems.

District ombudsman John Rebert responded by calling Francis' actions "inappropriate" and directing him to not send unsolicited poetry to other employees and to not use the district courier service for personal communication of any kind.

Francis was not punished for his actions, however, Hersh believes he should be, so she is taking her case to the state level.

Francis was not available for comment this morning.

Just five days after the Constitutional Convention met in Philadelphia in 1787, the Virginia Plan was proposed. It called for the establishment of a new governmental organization consisting of a legislature with two houses, an executive chosen by the legislature and a judicial branch.

The county's EMS choice

The county's firefighters and medical technicians are gravely concerned that three members of the Board of Seminole County Commissioners are intent on giving away all Emergency Medical Service duties to a private company.

On Tuesday, these fears were compounded. By allowing LifeFleet/Atlantic to stay alive in the EMS bidding process, commissioners Win Adama, Grant Maloy and Dick Van Der Weide ignored the county purchasing manager's declaration that LifeFleet failed to include basic ambulance service costs in its RFP.

Adama confirmed at Tuesday's BCC meeting that he believed from the start that a private company would serve the county better than its own fire/rescue teams but he needed to know all the costs and numbers. Hence, the RFP.

Oddly, Adama wasn't the least bit alarmed that LifeFleet left out the most important numbers in its bid. A deviation, he said, but not serious enough to disqualify the company.

So, the competition goes on. LifeFleet, the county's fire-rescue division and another private company (Rural Metro) make presentations before the Proposal Review Committee today. The committee will report to the BCC, which makes the contract decision on June 24.

Before the BCC makes its choice, we urge each of the commissioners to reread the proposal the county's highly trained fire/rescue division has submitted - especially focusing on THREE major considerations:

- Continuity of service.
- Cost.

The county's First Response System is considered by other jurisdictions to be one of the best in the country. No matter where a 9-1-1 call originates, a county rescue unit arrives within five minutes.

The current system - a two-tier partnership with LifeFleet - requires that the private company (unless there is a life-and-death situation) transports patients to the hospital. The system works, but could work even better says County Fire Chief Terry Schenk if the county also transported patients to the hospital.

Once a county paramedic has attended to a patient, relieved the patient's anxieties and eased all fears, what's the purpose of waiting for the private ambulance crew to arrive and transport the patient to the hospital? And at the hospital, wouldn't the first EMS people on the scene be better prepared to inform the medical team what they found and did at the scene of the crisis?

The only reason the county would charge any patients for transport is that these revenues would help offset taxes - monies collected by a private firm would belong to the company not the citizens themselves.

We believe the BCC has at least TWO winning choices.

No. 1. It can award all EMS services to the county's fire/rescue division.

No. 2. It can THROW away the RFP (as commissioners Randy Morris and Daryl McLain said at the get-go) and continue the present two-tier system allowing the county/lifefleet partnership.

If the BCC has a third choice, it owes the citizens more legitimate reasoning than is has rendered to date.

Getting rid of damaged infants

In 1984, Congress, after bitter debate, passed the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act. When it became law, child abuse and neglect were redefined to include "withholding medically indicated treatment from disabled infants with life-threatening conditions."

Part of the impetus for this child-saving law had been the widely reported death by starvation of a Down syndrome baby in Bloomington, Ind., in 1980. The parents had agreed with their obstetrician that this child could not attain "a minimally adequate quality of life" because it would be mentally retarded. A horrified pediatrician at Bloomington Hospital tried to bring intravenous equipment to feed the baby, but he was too late.

In 1982, an article in the Archives of Internal Medicine reported that "it is common in the United States to withhold routine surgery and medical care from infants with Down syndrome for the explicit purpose of hastening death." The requests sometimes came from the parents.

Additional cases of summarily dispatching infants with other defects had surfaced in the news. These decisions ending life were made

on behalf of born children, not fetuses. Though handicapped, they were entitled, at birth, to equal protection of the laws.

During the 1984 debate in the House I was dismayed to see some of the most prominent Democratic liberals -- Henry Waxman, Barney Frank, Charles Rangel, Geraldine Ferraro, among them -- oppose these protections for handicapped infants.

It should be up to the parents and doctors, these humanists said, to make such life-and-

death decisions. Children, therefore, were chattel, with no rights of their own.

The new law required each state -- in order to get federal child abuse and neglect grants -- to create a system that would report to state child protection agencies whenever damaged infants were being denied treatment. No action would be taken by the state, however, if treatment would merely prolong dying or if the infant were "chronically and irreversibly comatose."

After the law went into effect, there was much anger from physicians writing in some of the medical journals. Their professionalism was being interfered with, they said. There were pledges that the statute would be repealed.

What actually has been happening to disabled infants since then has been very difficult to determine. Not all records of the reasons for ending treatment are thorough or painstakingly honest. The hostility of many physicians to the 1984 law continues, and some have pointed out that since no doctor has been held responsible under that statute for civil or criminal liability, the law should be ignored because it is irrelevant.

Appropriate schmappropriate

A Polish artist named Zbigniew Libera recently unveiled a new, um, well, sculpture, I suppose.

Then he took a photograph of the assembly, disassembled it, and put it in a LEGO box. It looked like something you could actually grab off the shelf at your local toy store.

The LEGO Group had given him the original pieces for free, not knowing what he was going to do with them. Harper's magazine reports that, according to a LEGO Group press release,

"If the artist had described his ultimate project to us in advance, he naturally would not have received a single LEGO element from us."

I like the exclamation mark. It makes LEGO sound, even in translation, more overexcited than appalled by Libera's work. Personally, I like that in a moral stance. Though what that moral stance is, I'm not sure.

Libera had been invited to Italy's Biennale exposition, which is according to the Los Angeles Times, "one of the world's premier arts events." But, alas, the organizers said he couldn't bring the Legos. So he refused to attend.

And what was the Biennale's moral stance?

A curator of Venice's Polish pavilion explained that the works were "explosive material" that "treat too frivolously one of the darkest moments in European civilization."

Well, you know, it's one thing for LEGO to decide that a reproduction of a concentration camp in little plastic bricks might not cause its fine products to jump off the shelf.

I don't applaud this decision, but I understand it. LEGO is in the cute little toy business; it brings families together through obsessive building activity. I've LEGOed away some winter evenings myself. I love LEGO. What's to hate?

And I can understand government figures thundering against the NEA, and the public funding of the arts in general. Screaming about basket-weaving or gaudy performance art allows an elected representative to appear as a staunch moralist, anti-elitist, anti-big government activist, and master of public relations all in one gesture. And it saves the government pennies a year.

But where do artists get off, telling other artists what they should or should not create? I don't want any kind of committee, artist or otherwise, deciding what is or is not an appropriate artistic approach regarding the more unpleasant aspects of human history. And the Holocaust is way beyond unpleasant.

Like it or not, the Holocaust has entered popular culture. It has been the subject of a great comic book series: "Maus." The death camps are tourist attractions, for God's sake. There's a Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C.

I'm sure the whole approach to these attractions is tasteful as hell, and many hundreds of thousands of dollars were spent on consultants to ensure taste control, but if the aim is to acquaint fifth-graders with the horrors of Nazism, we shouldn't be surprised if they eventually use the tools of their childhood to express their new understanding of reality. And we shouldn't be surprised if -- eventually -- some toymaker gives them those tools. Libera was just predicting the future, that's all.

Rewriting rules of conduct

BOSTON--As the saga of the Air Force and adultery came to its public conclusion, as the sex life of the poster pilot and the con man, Kelly Flinn and Marc Zigo, became a national spectacle, I thought about the other woman.

I don't mean Gayla Zigo. That battered and betrayed ex-wife managed to turn her rage on the other victim of Marc's attentions. I leave her and her self-deception to Ann Landers.

I mean Sheila Widnall, the secretary of the Air Force. It was her unhappy fate to decide the unhappy fate of a young pilot who was wiser in the air than in love.

On Thursday, Sheila Widnall was the one who brokered a general discharge instead of a court-martial. She was the one who had to disappoint those who wanted to see Flinn behind bars and those who wanted to see her back in the cockpit.

On paper these two women, whose lives collided, look like a mother-daughter act of "fists."

In 1980, Widnall was one of only 21 women among 800 men in her graduating class at M.I.T. She was the only woman to go directly to graduate school, the first to head the M.I.T. faculty. She was on the visiting committee at the Air Force Academy long before Kelly Flinn was admitted. She was the first woman to become secretary of the Air Force.

This aeronautical engineer and a self-proclaimed feminist worked her way up to the narrow point of the pyramid while holding out a helping hand to the young women behind her.

If life doled out happy endings, such a story would have concluded the day that the First Female Secretary of the Air Force was flown by the First Female B-52 pilot. What a photo for a feminist album.

But in this sad postscript, the first woman in charge had to pass judgment on the first B-52 woman pilot. One woman had to decide how much to enforce rules and how much to remake them.

The clash of cultures around this 26-year-old pilot's love affair with a married man, the lurid questions she was asked and the lies she told, are familiar by now. To many civilians, this was a case of the Air Force going after a fine officer whose crimes deserved a traffic ticket. To many in the Air Force, like the chief of staff, Gen. Ronald Fogleman, this was "an issue about an officer entrusted to fly nuclear weapons who lied."

But the buck stopped on the desk of the civilian leader of the military branch, the female head of this male order, the former outsider who was very much inside. It was up to her to say she was making a deal to uphold

"the values of officership," "the importance of integrity" and "order."

The secretary of the Air Force sits on a hot seat shared by many successful women. It's shared by certified change agents who become CEOs and find themselves in charge of the bottom line. It's shared by women reps, who lobby for family hours and then become editors in charge of the newsroom schedule. It's shared by women politicians who start to work within the system and wonder if they've gotten wise or gotten co-opted.

Those who identify their movement up with the women's movement face greater expectations and disappointments. From others themselves.

In this highly publicized and well-spun case about either a "woman in love with the wrong man" or "integrity and obedience to orders," the secretary was in what one lawyer on women's military matters called "a no-win situation." It's a familiar location for women renting rooms at the top.

Did Widnall ever wince at how a Flinn-younger than her own daughter--was treated by this man and military? Did she understand why this isolated "showgirl" pilot fell for a guy who said he would follow her anywhere?

Perhaps that's why Widnall said, "I don't look at this in terms of a victory." But in the end she cut the best deal she could.

The secretary denied that there was a double standard in Flinn's case. "I have to say from a personal point of view, that it is extremely important to me that we hold men and women to the same standards of officership." It's impossible, though, to deny that in dealing with sexual conduct the single standard is an arbitrary and archaic standard.

Longwood at about 1 p.m. Wednesday afternoon. The men, dressed in black, were allegedly waving semiautomatic handguns, McDonough noted. They ordered several employees and

several customers to drop to the floor. One of the suspects then jumped on the counter and ordered another employee to give them the money.

McDonough said they got the money and fled in a white Pontiac Grand Am which was later found abandoned in the Governor's Point subdivision nearby. It was later determined the car had been stolen.

About 2:45 p.m. the Citrus Bank at 2675 W. State Road 434 near Longwood was struck by a trio of robbers who appeared to be the same as the ones who robbed the SunTrust bank.

According to McDonough, the three entered the bank and fired at a customer who was seated in a chair. They missed him, but fired twice more into the ceiling.

Tellers then gave them the money they requested in a bag that also contained a dye pack.

Several hours later, Apopka Police found the gray Buick in which they had escaped from the bank. It was also reported stolen. The dye pack had apparently exploded in the car.

There was no sign of either the

money or the robbers, McDonough said.

The vehicles used as getaway cars in both robberies are being checked for evidence this morning.

In an apparently unrelated robbery, a lone gunman robbed the SunTrust bank on Oxford Road and State Road 436 in Casselberry at about 2 p.m.

Also armed with a semiautomatic pistol, the suspect wore a long-sleeve shirt, baggy jeans and a ski mask, Casselberry Police spokesman Sgt. Greg Hepburn said.

He said no one was injured when he entered the bank and pointed a gun at tellers before emptying tellers drawers into a backpack and leaving the bank in an older model gray car with tinted windows. The car was last seen heading east on State Road 436, Hepburn noted.

McDonough said Crime Line has offered a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspects in any of the robberies. If you have any such information, call Crime Line at 423-TIPS.

The bond issue baffled police as a judge set bail at \$14,000 which was paid and Constable went free. Sanford Police spokesman Tom Skiba said that Officer Ron Daugherty made the arrest on Constable for the May 12 robbery. A teller from the Barnett Bank gave a positive identification of Constable as the man who perpetrated the crime.

On Friday, Constable, 35, of 780 Creechwater Terrace, Lake Mary, was charged with robbery, grand theft and wearing a mask during the commission of a crime. Before then, he had led police on a chase that went through both Sanford and Lake Mary.

In the May 12 robbery, an unknown white male had entered the aforementioned Barnett Bank wearing a dark stocking. In addition to the stocking, the suspect wore a dark baseball cap and dark sweat shirt. The suspect then handed over a duffel bag and demanded that the teller fill it. The vehicle that he was driving headed southbound on Orlando Drive.

It was not known if the suspect in the May 12 bank robbery used or implied he had a weapon of any sort. In the May 23 robbery, a weapon was implied. No one was hurt in either instance.

It is unclear as of yet if bail will be granted to Constable this time.

Board is currently reviewing three separate plans designed to meet that objective.

Each of the plans address the problems of racial diversity and educational quality in substantially different ways. The three plans do have one thing in common however, none of them seems to make very many people happy.

In each of the plans, students are placed in school clusters. Idyllwild, Wilson and Wicklow (currently under construction) make up the north west cluster. Pine Crest, Midway and Hamilton make up the north east cluster. Parents will be given limited school choice within each cluster, subject to the maintenance of prescribed racial quotas.

Desegregation transfers are the top priority regarding attendance in each of the plans. Exceptional students and their siblings are given the next level of priority, followed by children of school employees and students who will be 5th graders in the 1998-99 school year. At this point, the plans diverge.

"Plan A", established by the task force and sent to the justice department for review on May 15, favors proximity to the school as the next most important factor in establishing attendance. The plan also forces parents to make a choice between keeping siblings together, thereby increasing the chance that they will not fit into the prescribed racial mix and therefore not be able to attend the school they have chosen, or separate the children, allowing one to go to the first choice school and the other to be put on a preferred waiting list. The justice department has indicated it does not favor any plan which bases attendance zones on proximity.

"Plan B", a possible proposal from the justice department, would prioritize students based on a lottery system. Under this plan, all students not already placed by the desegregation transfers, would be placed in a lottery system, from which names would be randomly drawn. Those with the lowest numbers would be given first opportunity to rank the schools in their cluster in order of preference. Actual placement in the school would still be subject to maintenance of the prescribed racial balance, not only in the school, but also in that particular grade level. No priority would be given based on either proximity or attendance of a sibling.

"Plan C", created by the parents of Wilson Elementary students, gives priority to siblings of fifth graders already in attendance at a particular school. The next criterion considered would be proximity, followed by a preference for students who have already been rezoned twice and who face a third move due to this plan.

If all of this isn't confusing enough, several of the parents in attendance at the Idyllwild meeting have agreed to begin drafting a fourth plan. Under this proposal, which is being

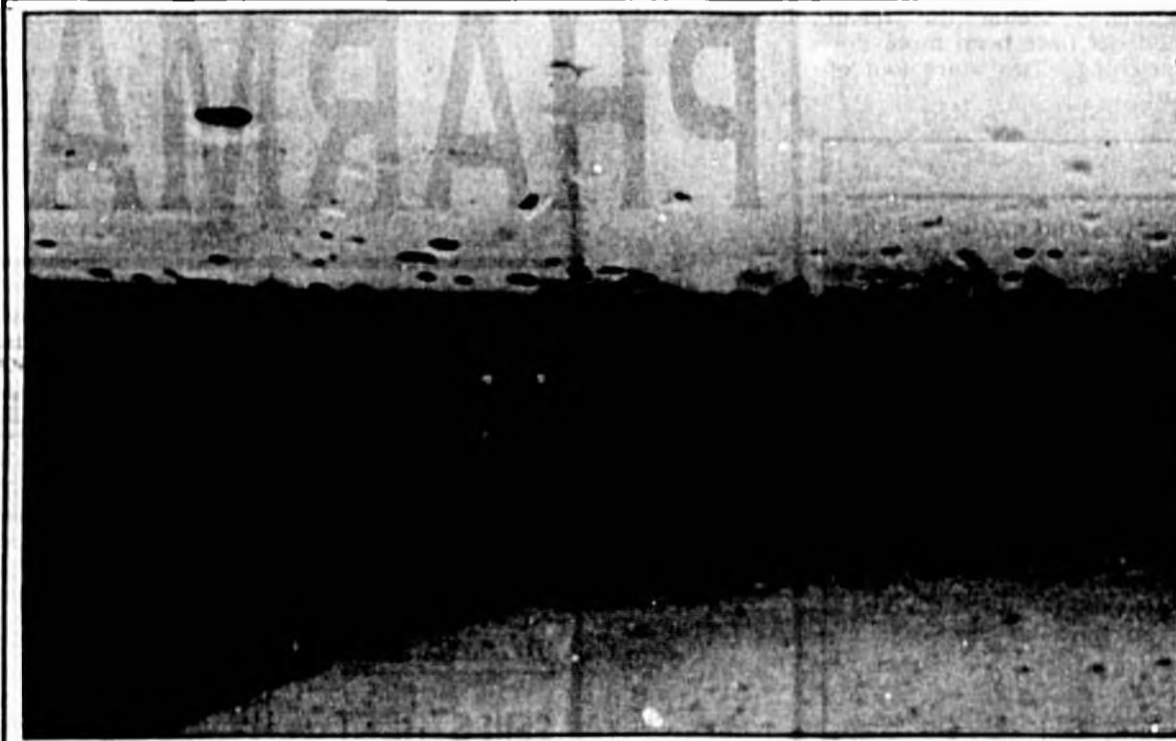
spearheaded by Kathy Hoffman, factors other than race, such as poverty, performance level and income would be considered in the desegregation of the schools.

Goldboro Elementary, which will become a magnet school in the 1998-99 school year, is exempt from the cluster requirements, and has its own set of admission criteria. Lake Mary and Heathrow elementary school are also exempt from the cluster arrangement, although Idyllwild Principal Dave Scott said he was unsure why the predominantly white schools were not included in any of the plans.

A resource room has been set up in the Educational Support Building located on Lake

Mary Boulevard just east of Highway 17-92. The room contains maps, school board minutes, tapes of meetings, copies of the plans going to the justice department and other resources to help residents better understand the proposed changes.

The District Task Force will hold a meeting June 2 at 7 p.m. in the Educational Support Building to discuss the aforementioned plans. Sanford Middle School will host an open house on June 3 at 7 p.m. and Goldboro Elementary will hold an open house on June 5 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. to discuss upcoming changes related to the magnet school program. The school board meets again on June 10 at 3:30 p.m.

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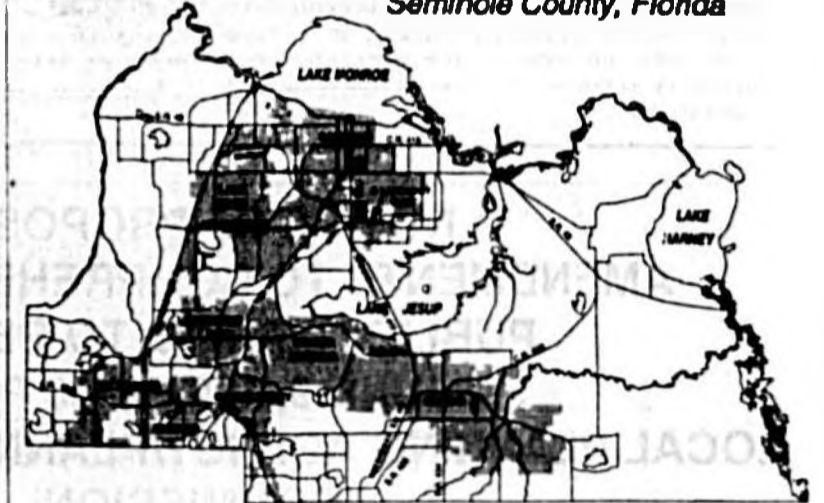

Now's the time to get ready for '97 hurricane season

Ana, Bill and Claudette could prove to be rowdy "house guests" for Floridians in the coming months. And other visitors may follow. But concerned homeowners can take precautions to reduce any damage those uninvited guests might cause.

Now is the time to take action, well before the heart of the Atlantic hurricane season, which runs from June 1 to Nov. 30. Ana, Bill and Claudette are just the first few names on this year's official list of storm names. Forecasters believe we'll dip more deeply than usual into that list before the season is over.

One well-known forecaster, Dr. William Gray, predicts 11 named storms, including seven hurricanes--three of them packing winds of more than 111 mph. Dr. Gray, a professor of atmospheric science at Colorado State University, has made hurricane predictions for the past 15 years based on his extensive weather research.

If his new predictions hold true, then 1996-1997 will mark the most active three-year span of hurricane activity in recorded history. In Florida alone, we've experienced three hurricanes and two tropical storms over the past two seasons.

No matter what the 1997 season brings, you can be ready. For example, you can review your insurance policy and ask your insurance agent or company now about anything you don't understand. Most insurers will not write new policies or allow changes in coverage during a tropical storm or hurricane, or as the storm approaches an area, and for up to 48 hours after the storm.

You may need to update your policy to reflect your home's current value. You also may want to consider extra coverage for valuables such as an-

liqua, jewelry or computers. If you live in a flood-prone area, you should consider the separate insurance needed to protect your home and its contents from damage caused by rising water.

Here are some other steps you can take:

- Hire a professional to remove any dead or dying trees or limbs from your property, especially those likely to fall on your home or automobile.

- Make a list of belongings including purchase dates, costs, serial numbers, and receipts if available. Take photographs or make a video of the current condition of your belongings.

- Keep copies of your insurance policy, inventory, videotape or photographs and related records in a safe deposit box or with a trusted relative or friend. Keep your insurance company's toll-free claims number handy.

- Install wind-tested shutters, windows and roof anchors. Be sure any home improvements meet your local building code and insurance company requirements for premium discounts.

- Clear your yard of any unnecessary items such as unused bikes, car parts or lumber. These items become dangerous and destructive hazards when hurled around by hurricane winds.

- Stock up on repair materials such as marine plywood,

nails and plastic sheeting. Most insurance policies require you to make reasonable emergency repairs following storms, such as covering a hole in a roof.

The Florida Department of Insurance will once again activate a special toll-free Hurricane Hotline if we do get hit this year by any storms causing major damage.

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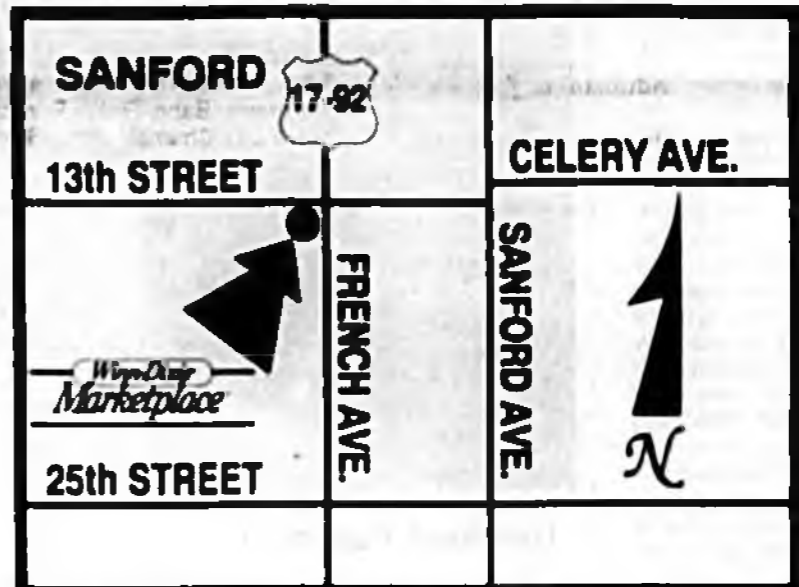

Historic NCAA Leadership Conference examines image of the student athlete

LAKE BUENA VISTA — Over 250 students participating in the NCAA Leadership Conference at Disney's Wide World of Sports complex spent their first day in group team-building sessions and discussions to identify primary problems and potential solutions surrounding the image of the student-athlete.

Main issues identified that negatively impact the image of the student-athlete include stereotyping and lack of communication between college administration and non-student-athletes. Media sensa-

tionism, it was concluded, also contributes to a non-favorable perception of the student-athlete.

Some of the proposed solutions were: more interaction between administrators and student-athletes, increased participation of student-athletes in non-sports student forums such as student government and academic clubs, members from different sports teams on campuses joining for community efforts, supporting other student-athletes for increased accountability on behavioral issues and encourage local media to give equal attention to positive activities.

"Because of the scrutiny that student-athletes are under, there is so much negative stereotyping (by media) that we are constantly trying to overcome," said University of Nebraska student Julius Jackson. "This conference gives us the opportunity to fight through those stereotypes, while helping us build up ourselves as a group and as individuals."

NCAA Group Director for Education Services Ton Stratten said: "We've attracted bright student-athletes and good thinkers from all divisions that have demonstrated leadership on their individual

Equal cuts for guys and gals

"Length has nothing to do with it," Kathy LeRoy said emphatically.

Before anyone reaches a false assumption, let's point out what Kathy does for a living - she cuts hair at Dave's Barber Shop at 105 Palmetto Ave.

It amuses LeRoy and co-barber Donna Evans that there's a spiffy new law in Dade County making it illegal to charge men and women differently for such things as haircuts - a law that one day might apply statewide.

"No problem with us," Evans said, laughing. "We charge \$5, a haircut for men or women. It was \$4 until three years ago. Now it's \$5."

"Sometimes we work twice as long on a man's haircut," LeRoy said. "Flat-tops take awhile longer, you know. You'd be surprised how many flat-tops we do here at Dave's."

Dave Dreifurst's Barber Shop is a friendly, hometown, American classic. Men and women come in for what may be the best haircut for the money in the whole U.S.A. "Basic cuts but good cuts," LeRoy said.

Dreifurst parks his bike under

an old-fashioned twirling barber pole out front and Patti Page sings from a small radio box inside the shop which has served Sanfordites since 1935.

It was the A.I. Thomas Barber Shop until three years ago when Thomas (82) retired after 59 years in business. Upon taking over the shop, Dreifurst made few changes. One was getting a telephone. That and taking in a couple more lady barbers.

"We have some old-line customers - call 'em, good ole boys if you must - that won't let us work on them," Evans said. "No way a woman gonna touch my hair," they'll say. Their granddaddies had men barbers, so did they and so will their

children. Barbering, they say, is man's thing. Always has been, always will be."

Not so to 86-year-old Herman Prachnik who walked over from Brazos Towers to Dave's Barber Shop for a cut on Wednesday afternoon.

"Once upon a time, that may have been so," said Prachnik, a retired Statler Hotel employee from New York City. "First time a woman cut my hair was here in Sanford seven years ago. And you know what, I liked it. Still like it."

When he inquired about a senior discount for his haircut, he was told the price was the same for everyone - men, women, young people and seniors, \$4 a hair cut and later \$5. "I made a deal to get a free haircut on my 100th birthday. Donna's promised she'd do that for me."

LeRoy grew up in Amityville, N.Y. (yeah, Jews town) and as a little girl wasn't allowed to go near the barber shop where her dad, a policeman, got his haircuts. "There was a pool room behind the bar," she said. "You had to go through the barber shop to get to the pool room.

Women weren't allowed. Women got their hair styled at fancy-schmancy places like La Femme, Le Fluff."

LeRoy said she decided as a teenager that that she would a barber someday "just to find out what went on inside a barber shop...and that's what I've been doing for 30 years. Of course, I love it."

Evans, who's from Plattburgh, N.Y., is equally in love with barbering. She worked in an old-fashioned shop in Oviedo before she came to Sanford. She remembers when men bartered for the hair cuts. "A fellow gave me a celery plant one day for doing his hair," she said.

Sometimes, Donna sings when she gives a man a haircut. One regular always asks her to do "Tom Dooley."

Dowright, nice, this Dave's Barber Shop. Good haircuts. Same price for men and women. \$5 for you man, \$5 for you sir.

Although his prices are the same for men and women, Dave Dreifurst said Wednesday he doesn't think Dade County's new law is a good idea. Other barber shops aren't like Dave's. Never have been, never will be.

They cautioned, however, that every crime situation is unique. The unfortunate store employee had no options, but usually the best way to avoid becoming a victim is to stay alert in the first place.

DEAR ABBY: The letter you printed from "Patience, Consistency and Praise in Minneapolis" brought tears to my eyes. As a schoolteacher who has given up on more than a handful of teaching assignments because he couldn't be mean to kids, I pray that every school administrator, policy maker and teacher read that column.

Jacksonville mayor named chairman of Foundation for Florida's future

MIAMI—Miami businessman Jeb Bush stepped down as chairman of the Foundation for Florida's Future last week and is succeeded at the Foundation by Foundation board member and mayor of Jacksonville John Delaney.

Following the acceptance of Bush's resignation, the Foundation's Executive Committee unanimously elected Mayor John Delaney to take over as its new chairman for a two year term. Delaney's new position as chairman became effective immediately on Monday, May 19th, following the meeting of the Executive Committee.

"I am honored to have this new and exciting opportunity to lead the Foundation for Florida's Future as it continues its mission to change Florida's public policy landscape," Delaney said. "I congratulate Jeb for his outstanding leadership at the Foundation over the last two years - he and the Foundation board of directors have done an excellent job in building a bipartisan organization that is making a difference from the grassroots level to the halls of the state capitol."

Commenting on the selection of Delaney as chairman, Bush said, "John brings a strong legacy of conservative leadership to the Foundation. It's hard to imagine a person better suited to continue the important work we have begun." Under Bush's leadership, the Foundation has emerged as one of the most prolific policy groups in Florida.

As chairman, Bush worked to establish Florida's first charter school, led the drive to cut Florida unemployment compensation taxes, helped to bring elder abuse to the attention of law enforcement, authored the book Profiles in Character emphasizing the importance of character and virtue in restoring our civil society, published a comprehensive survey of viewpoints and concerns of black Floridians, and served as publisher of Impact magazine.

John Delaney is no stranger of Foundation

activities, having assumed a position on the Foundation's board of directors in 1996. Delaney was elected mayor of Jacksonville in 1995 and has been instrumental in the city's growth and expansion. He is perhaps best known for holding the line against new taxes in Jacksonville, and finding savings inside government through better management and privatization.

Prior to his election as mayor, Delaney was general counsel for the City of Jacksonville, where he oversaw and managed the city's legal actions. He also spent a decade as a prosecutor in the State Attorney's Office of Florida's Fourth Judicial Circuit. It was during his time as prosecutor that he was recognized for his work on behalf of abused women, establishing a local women's shelter, the Hubbard House. Mayor Delaney is married and has four children.

The Foundation for Florida's Future is a non profit, non partisan, public policy institute designed to educate, advocate and implement public policy from a conservative perspective emphasizing limited government, and a return to personal responsibility.

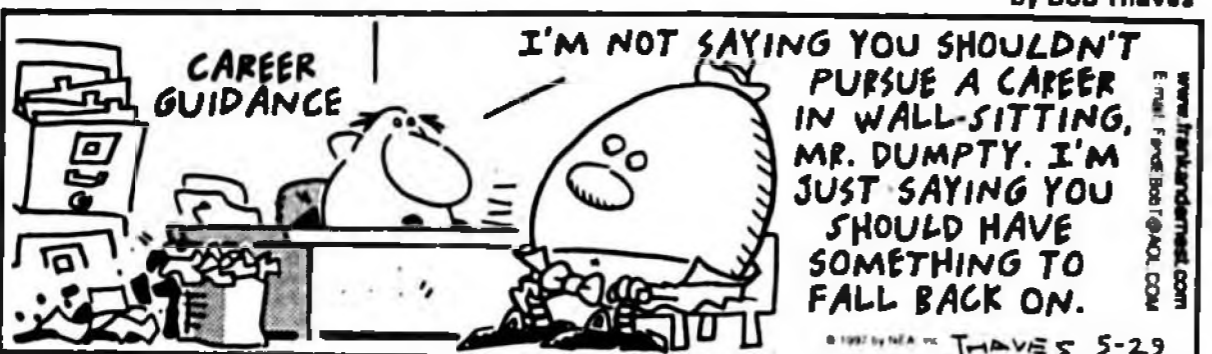

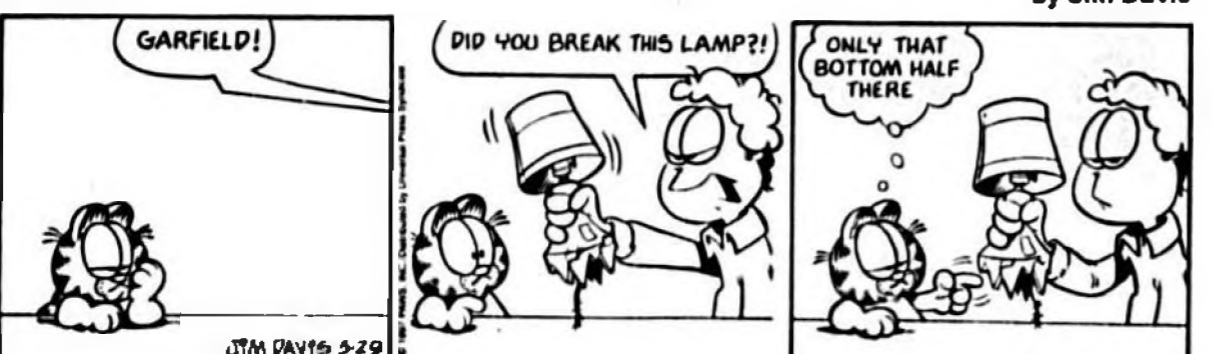

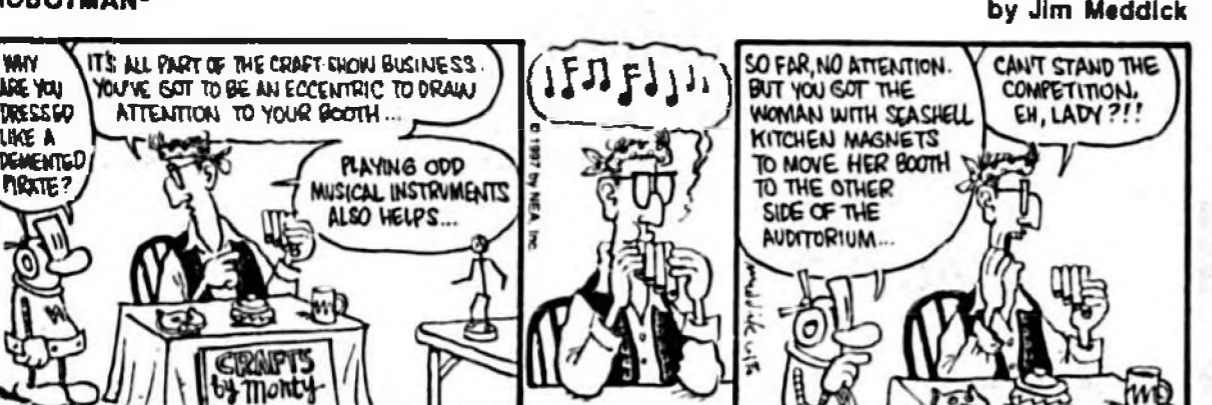

Why to monitor thyroid function

DEAR DR. GOTT: For about 20 years, I had taken Synthroid replacement for an under-active thyroid gland. About a year ago, I was not coping very well; I felt jittery and lost weight. I went to another doctor, who immediately halved the dose of pills. After a week, I felt so much better that I stopped the drug entirely. My life has changed for the better. Is there a way for a physician to determine whether a patient is given Synthroid in error and, if not, how much a person should take?

To help you in your quest, I am publishing the address of the Lyme Disease Resource Center, P.O. Box 1891, Sonoma, CA 95478. Perhaps this national support group can send you a list of such specialists.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have droopy eyelids that interfere with vision. My ophthalmologist wants to operate. Should I see a plastic surgeon? Is the operation dangerous?

DEAR READER: The removal of baggy skin from the eyelids is a simple, quick and safe operation that could be performed by either an ophthalmologist or a plastic surgeon.

If you have confidence in your eye specialist, I'd follow his recommendations.

DEAR READER: Yes, there is and it should be routine practice to assess a patient's thyroid needs.

Thyroid function can accurately and inexpensively be determined by blood tests. I do not know why you required Synthroid replacement 20 years ago, but your needs clearly changed during that time.

In my opinion, your doctor should have annually monitored your thyroid function with a blood test called the TSH. If he were in doubt that you required thyroid medication, he could have slowly reduced the dosage.

Once off the drug, if your thyroid were deficient, the test would have shown it.

However, even if you required Synthroid, the amount might change over time. This is the rationale for periodic testing, which should be obtained on any patient taking Synthroid.

If your dosage were, indeed, excessive, you would experience nervousness, sweating, intolerance to heat, rapid pulse, weight loss, and other symptoms.

I cannot predict whether or not you will need thyroid replacement therapy in the future. For now, you seem to be OK. However, you should continue to monitor your thyroid status with the blood tests I mentioned.

DEAR DR. GOTT: While in college in the Northeast, my son developed Lyme disease. Because of a long delay in diagnosis (because the doctors here at home were unfamiliar with the disorder), he has progressed to the chronic phase. Intravenous antibiotics have not helped him. He is almost immobile because of muscle and joint pains.

A spinal tap was negative. He has even been given steroids, without benefit. Our local doctors are at their wit's ends. My son has been labeled a "treatment failure." Where do we turn?

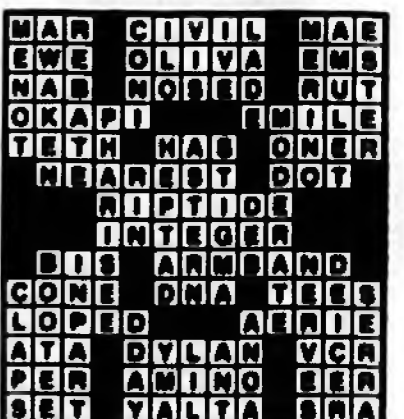
DEAR READER: As I have written before, chronic Lyme disease is exceedingly difficult to treat, much less to cure. In the chronic phase, it can cause joint/muscle pains, heart problems, headache, nerve damage, and many other symptoms. Many patients with persistent Lyme disease do respond to extended courses of

intravenous antibiotics but — as you have unfortunately discovered — some cases are resistant.

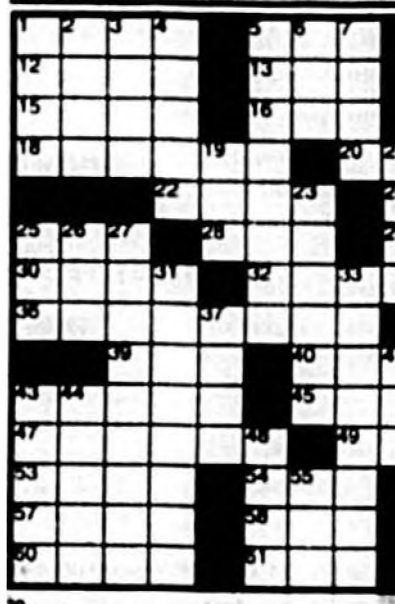
I see from your letter that you live in a Southeastern state where Lyme disease is a rarity. I suggest that you attempt, as a last hope, to find a Lyme specialist in an area where the disease is more prevalent. In particular, your son's doctors should look for a specialist in New York, New Jersey,

WIN AT BRIDGE

Colorful person in colorful shirts

Don von Elaner was a colorful bridge player, writer and lecturer who wore the polychromatic shirts common in his home state of Hawaii. He died at his house in Hilo on January 6 at the age of 87.

A real estate broker and financial consultant, von Elaner also wrote several mystery novels. In some of which bridge was a key feature. Von Elaner's bridge sleuth and expert player was Jake Winkman. Today's deal comes from one of these books, "The Best of Jake Winkman," which is available from Baron Barclay (800-274-2221) for \$8.95 including shipping and handling.

Against four spades, West led the club ace; six, king, eight. West continued with the club seven; nine, jack, 10.

What did East do now and why? The bidding wouldn't escape criticism, but it was critical to the story line. It's called author's license, or something like that.

Could South have started with only two clubs? Unlikely. His two no trump rebid strongly suggested exactly four spades. If so and South had two clubs, he would have four cards in a red suit. With four hearts, he would have responded one heart, not one spade. With four diamonds, probably he would have continued with three diamonds, not two no trump.

East returned the club two. When South covered with the three, it was easy for West to see what was required. He ruffed with the spade nine. This upped the dummy, promoting a trump trick for East. And the inevitable diamond loser meant that South went one down.

If you've never read any Winkman books, it is still better late than never.
