

### \$300 Million Estate Enters Long Fight

SARITA, Tex. (AP) — Sitting on dusty folding chairs beneath a forbidding oil portrait of the late cattle and oil baron, Capt. Mifflin Kennedy, 100 Kennedy descendants crowded into Kennedy County courthouse Monday to begin a summer-long fight over a \$300-million estate.

The hearing is scheduled to run through September. At stake is the 200,000-acre holdings of Sarita Kennedy East, a granddaughter of Mifflin Kennedy. Her last will brought a middle-aged Trappist monk into a hassle over some of the Kennedy millions.

The tangled estate of Mrs. East has been the subject of mountains of litigation since she died of cancer, Feb. 22, 1961, at the age of 71. With her at death was Christopher Gregory, 50, formerly "Brother Leo" in a Catholic order.

Some 100 relatives of Mrs. East are challenging a 1960 will. They charged on Feb. 22, 1961, that the will was written when she was under influence by Gregory. A 110-page will, written by Gregory and shipping executive J. Peter Grace of New York "consigned" to get Mrs. East to draw up the will.

Mrs. East's holdings were valued by the federal government at \$20 million for tax purposes. The discovery of a vast pool of oil and gas beneath her part of the La Parra Ranch built up by Capt. Kennedy more than a century ago, boosted that estimate to around \$300 million.

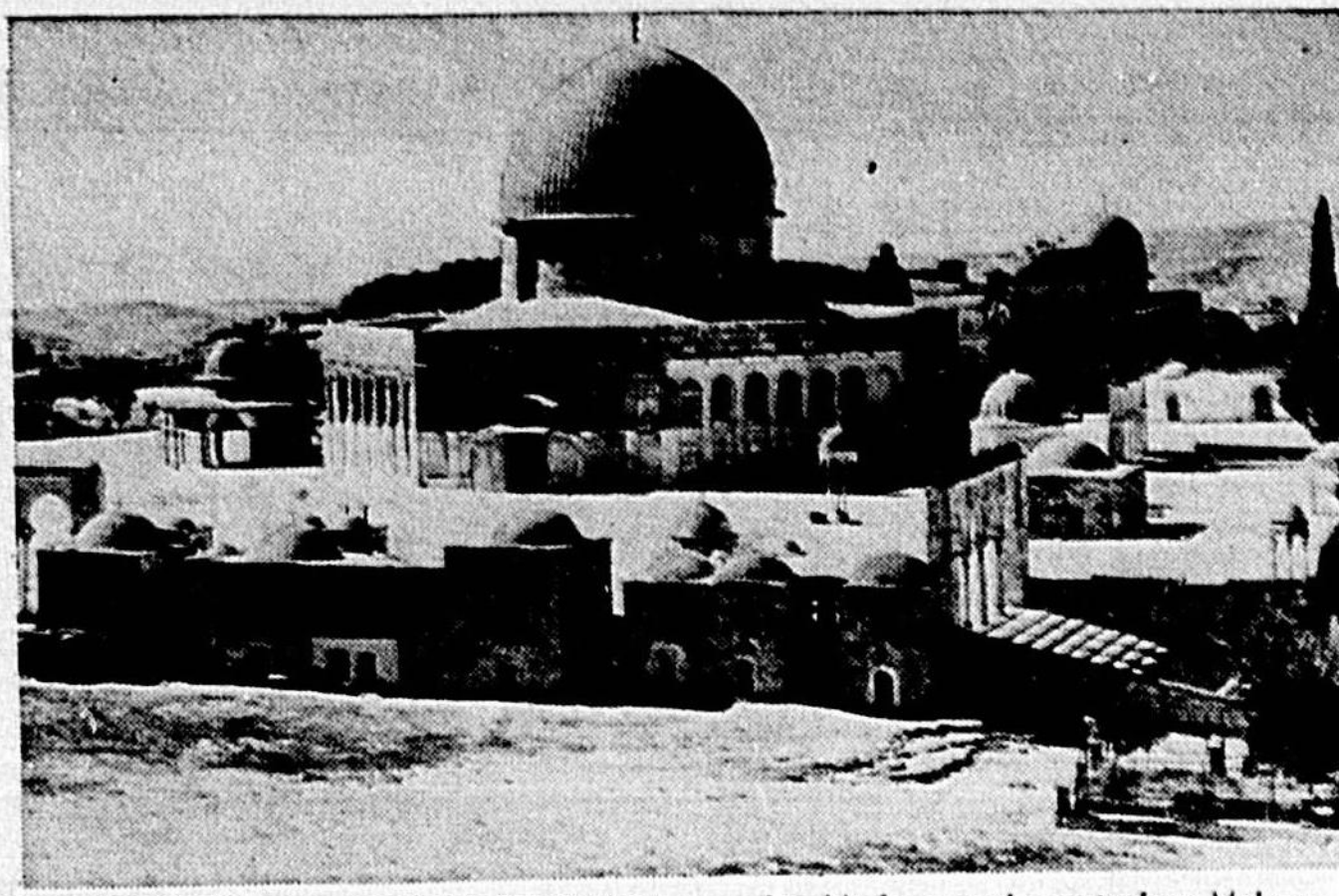
The case is being heard by special Probate Judge William R. Edwards, a Corpus Christi attorney.

La Parra borders on the King Ranch. Capt. Kennedy and Richard King once were partners before each carved out a kingdom from the South Texas coastal plains.

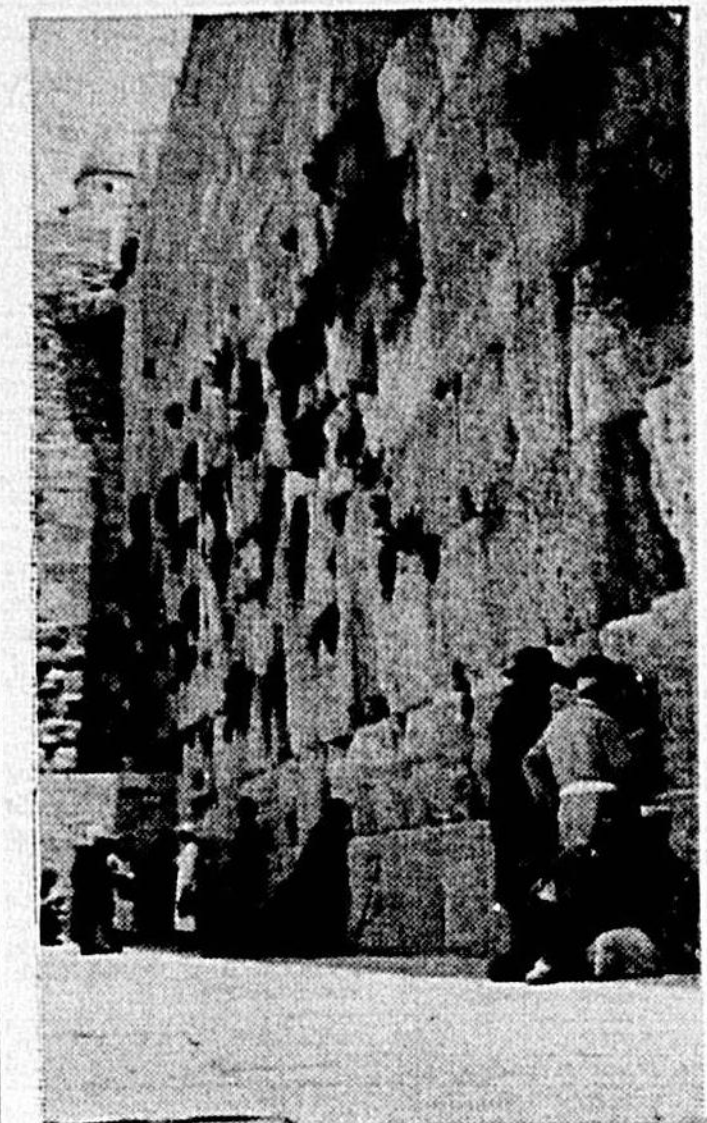

### Kirk Veto Of Purchase Bill Analyzed By Demos

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Patronage and personalities were listed by Democratic Cabinet members as the main reasons for Republican Gov. Claude Kirk's veto of the state central purchasing bill.

"Erosion of executive powers," contended Secretary of State Tom Adams.

Adams said patronage stood out as the main reason for the veto in view of the fact that Kirk had let other executive duties be placed under Cabinet control.

He mentioned the newly created Board of Archives and History and the expansion of the Budget Commission to provide state planning.

In his veto message, Kirk said that executive powers would be further diffused if he allowed the bill to become law.

The proposal, which legislators said would save the state many millions of dollars, would place administration of the competitive bidding and central purchasing under the purchasing director, who works for the full Cabinet.

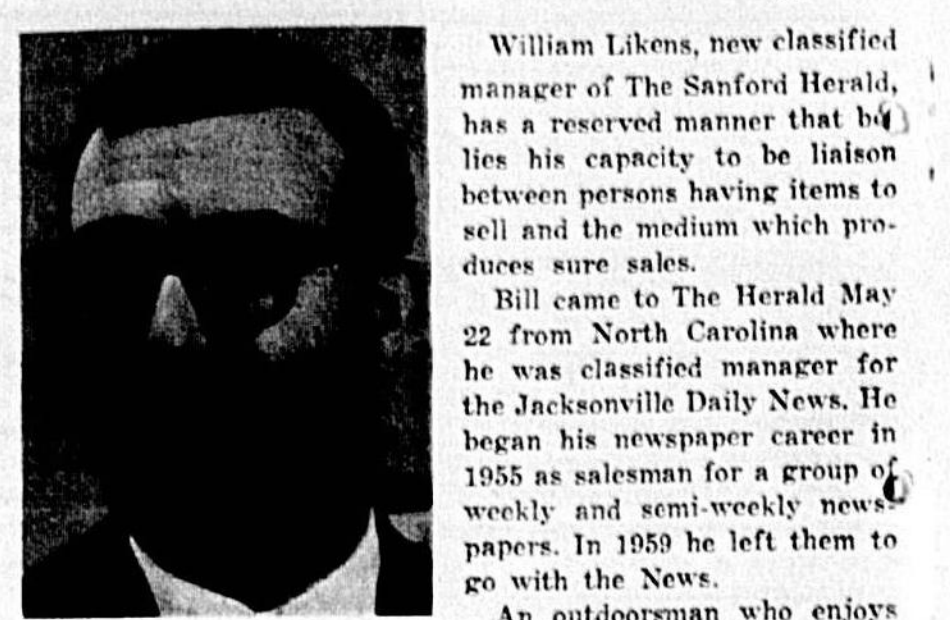
Broad buying and printing jobs in the governor's so-called "little cabinet" agencies — the road department, development commission, beverage department and others — would have been turned over to the purchasing commission.

Republican legislative leaders recently said they planned to introduce a similar purchasing bill which would put the power over all state purchasing under the governor.

State Comptroller Fred Dickinson said Kirk "obviously" let his difference with Adams influence his judgment.

"He's let feelings about personalities on the Cabinet overshadow sounder reasoning," Dickinson said. He said the bill which would put the power

### Swofford Hits Tactics In Delaying Bond Issue

County Commissioner W. Lawrence Swofford today blasted the delaying tactics used in the floating of a \$1 million bond issue for purchase of rights-of-way for state roads in the county.

"The bond issue ought to be pushed but instead it is being purposely delayed," Swofford declared. He declined, however, to reveal by whom the issue is being delayed.

"We should go for the maximum \$3 million in a bond issue and only validate what is necessary at the time for the road program for the next ten years.

Purchasing rights-of-way for roads such as SR 44 from SR 427 to E. 1st and for SR 46 east to the Volusia County line should be considered for inclusion in the bond issue. If we don't move soon it will be too late," Swofford warned.

He hit the present park situation in the county terming it "inconsistent and unrealistic" and warned "the people are not going to stand for it much longer."

"It is not right that the county maintain community parks and swimming beaches in some areas and not in others. One of the county's biggest problems is to have a consistent policy in order that all the people of the county can be served," he said.

"Closer cooperation between the county and the cities in the county is needed. The County Commission is supposed to serve the people in the cities as well as those in the county," Swofford said, pointing out city residents in unincorporated communities. "We should also have closer cooperation with the School Board."

He got our answer the other day as to why the City of Longwood is building a jail rather than a Civic Center. "The jail is a revenue facility," one of the conditions he said. "We wouldn't make any money off a civic center."

## Rainfall For June Soars

The proverbial April showers have arrived . . . belatedly, but already the June rainfall is above the normal average for this month.

And today is the first day of summer!

Last night's 1.60 inches of precipitation pushed the total above the month's normal rainfall.

Weather Bureau records are tallied from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. daily by the Central Florida Experiment Station and the Seminole County Agricultural Center.

The Experiment Station, on Celery Avenue, reported "no rain" before 5 p.m. Tuesday but the Agricultural Center, on S. Hwy. 17-92, reported 1.60 inches. (South Sanford area saw a near deluge in a short space of time.)

That 1.60 inches brought the Sanford total to 4.11 inches since last Friday.

The U.S. Weather Bureau at Lakeland . . . where statewide records are kept . . . reported the normal rainfall in the Sanford area for June is 7.10.

The Agricultural Center on S. Hwy. 17-92 this morning reported a total of 8.22 inches has fallen in the area since June 1 through last night.

## Verdict Due Tomorrow On Hickson

The Civil Service Board is expected to hand down a verdict in the Joe T. Hickson appeal tomorrow morning, the Herald learned today.

City Attorney William C. Hutchison and Hickson's attorney, Gordon Frederick, wrapped up their final summary last night and the board went into executive session for 90 minutes before adjourning until 8:30 Thursday.

Hickson was fired from the department in late March. He appealed his ouster in May and the board has been meeting on and off for three weeks listening to some 1,600 pages of testimony.

In his final summation, Frederick took jabs at the City Commission, City Manager W. E. Knowles and Police Chief Ben Butler.

He called Butler an "innocent dupe" of Knowles and that the police chief acted at the "whims of the Commission and the city manager."

In his angry opening remarks, which took close to 90 minutes, Frederick urged the board to "have the guts not to prostitute yourselves. Do not bow to the dictates of the City Commission or City Manager," he charged.

"Look at yourselves and show statute. You stand on the threshold of justice . . . or tyranny."

He attempted to show a conspiracy between Knowles, Butler and the commission to oust Hickson. "The burden of proof is on the city . . . They haven't shown any innocence, ninety percent of duty or intoxication," Frederick charged.

Hutchison in a brief summary emphasized that Frederick's entire case was to try everyone but Hickson.

"They accused chief Butler, the City Manager and the City Commission — everyone but Joe T. Hickson. Hutchison brought up the charges against city laws than a rookie police officer."

Apparent low bidder on section A of the system which includes well and well pumps was Lockwell and Pump Company of Orlando, \$17,710. For section B including ground storage tank, aerators and pumping station, low bidder was McMahon Construction Company of Deland at \$181,000 while section C for extensions to distribution system was Meredith Corporation of Orlando with \$7,594.75.

Original engineers' estimates of anticipated cost of the three sections was \$222,000.

Bids were referred to Glace Engineering Company, town engineers, for checking of mathematics in the bids and determination of qualifications of bidders.

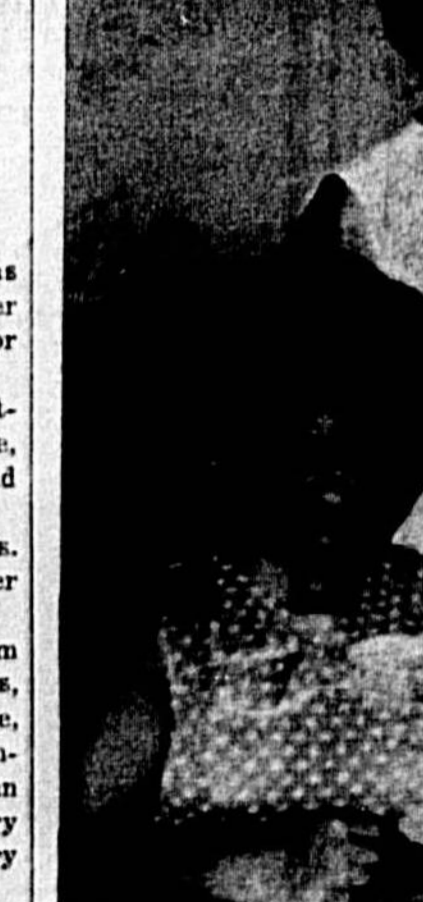

### Gain Respect Of The Public, Agencies Told

County Planner Jack Goodin today urged members of boards, commissions, agencies, departments and committees to be "informed of the goals and objectives" of their respective groups in order to gain the respect and confidence of the public.

Goodin, who formerly served with the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, is presently advising to the county zoning and planning commission and the Board of Adjustment as well as official county planners.

"Often there are numerous boards, commissions, agencies, departments, committees and others who stumble along because they are not really sure what it is they are supposed to be doing," Goodin said. "If these groups are not sure of their purpose, how can the public's business be conducted in a rational, logical and consistent manner? How can citizens develop confidence in and respect for groups that aren't well informed about their mission?"

Goodin urged, "The next time you serve as a member of such a body, ask yourself what the group is trying to accomplish. If you're not sure, request a statement of its goals and objectives."

"There are numerous improvements that can be made in most communities. Many are minor undertakings requiring the expenditure of vast sums of money. Others are minor changes that do not cost anything, but which may have far reaching consequences. One such improvement can be simply stating the definition of goals and objectives," he declared.

"Some organizations do a good job of defining why they exist," Goodin stated. "The agencies have developed the following credo:

"We believe:  
That faith in God gives meaning and purpose to human life;  
That the brotherhood of man transcends the sovereignty of nations;  
That economic justice can best be won by free men through free enterprise;  
That government should be of laws rather than of men;  
That earth's great treasure lies in human personality. And that service to humanity is the best work of life."

## James Marlow Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first source near the U.N. de facto Arab blockade of Israel shipping lanes, which Johnson said was more than a mere blockade, was the Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban, who was replying to his speech.

It was Eban and the Soviets who explained later that Eban had left to keep an appointment. But millions saw this on television.

No doubt many concluded Kosygin was expressing contempt for reasonable debate, that he was rejecting on power politics—the number of nations already lined up on Moscow's side—to win the day for him.

Even if this were not a cynical act, before the first day's discussion was over Monday it was clear this debate was going to be neither altruistic nor idealistic. But nobody ever thought it would be.

Moscow asked for debate in the U.N. General Assembly, wanting Israel condemned as an aggressor, told to give back the land it had captured from the Arabs, and ordered to pay for damage done them in the startlingly short war.

In order to get in a word ahead of time, one hour before the assembly was due to meet, President Johnson took to television, too, to lay out this country's ideas for restoring peace in the Middle East.

But Eban's was the most brilliant speech of the day in or out of the United Nations. It was a classic example of making a point by eliminating literary flourishes, which Johnson always tries, and relying entirely upon documentation.

He cited not only all the threats Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser made about demolishing Israel before the war began but listed by number, which must have startled the Soviets, how many weapons they had given Egypt.

Nevertheless, the Kosygin-Eban debate was very often on the intellectual level of filibuster.

To show long-time Soviet prejudice against Israel, Eban listed the times through the years when Moscow sided with the Arabs in U.N. problems. And he accused Moscow of encouraging the Arabs in building up the Mideast frenzy.

Kosygin condemned the Israelis as aggressors, accused the United States and Britain of encouraging them to violence, and declared Mideast peace is possible only if the Israelis withdraw from the captured Arab land.

While there was little new of discussion, anyone who followed the Arab case for the assembly probably would up the day just as much impressed by what was left unsaid as by anything Eban and Kosygin did say.

For instance, Kosygin never mentioned the Gulf of Aqaba

although from the moment Nasser closed it to Israeli shipping, promising it was closed for good, Israel and the Arabs were on a collision course.

Both Johnson and Eban singled out the gulf blockade as the most critical move in the series of events which led to war.

Johnson, putting the blame on Nasser, said: "If a single act of folly was more responsible for the debate, the reason seemed clear enough: to mollify the Arabs who felt let down by Moscow's failure to back them up in their demand for a 16-mile long strait."

These Moscow maneuvers, to be sure, have been obviously carefully contrived to make "either necessary measures" against the Israelis if they do not quickly heed the U.N. resolutions to cease fire.

Nevertheless, all the official and unofficial word is that the Soviets have no intention of renouncing any of their own military aid to Israel.

Kosygin, a mild-mannered man, looks more like a technician than an innovator such as Nikita Khrushchev. Khrushchev on his own might have been glad to take on Johnson.

The three leaders of the Republican-dominated State Senate were conferring with Gov. Rampton over 200 gubernatorial appointments which require Senate approval.

During the conference the governor had inadvertently left the rarely used alarm button which summons emergency help.

## Money Chief Renominated

WASHINGTON (AP) — William B. Dale will be nominated by President Johnson for his third two-year term as United States executive director of the International Monetary Fund, the White House said Monday.

Dale was first named to the post in November 1962. He was reappointed in April 1965.

Dale, 45, a native of Detroit who now lives in Bethesda, Md., entered government service in 1948 as an economist in the Treasury's Office of International Finance.

This prospect, plus the frustrations felt particularly in Moscow after nearly two decades of painful reverses from the defeat of the Berlin blockade to Nasser's collapse in 1957, invests Vietnam with high explosive charge. To lose there is almost to admit that the big world game is over—at least for a time.

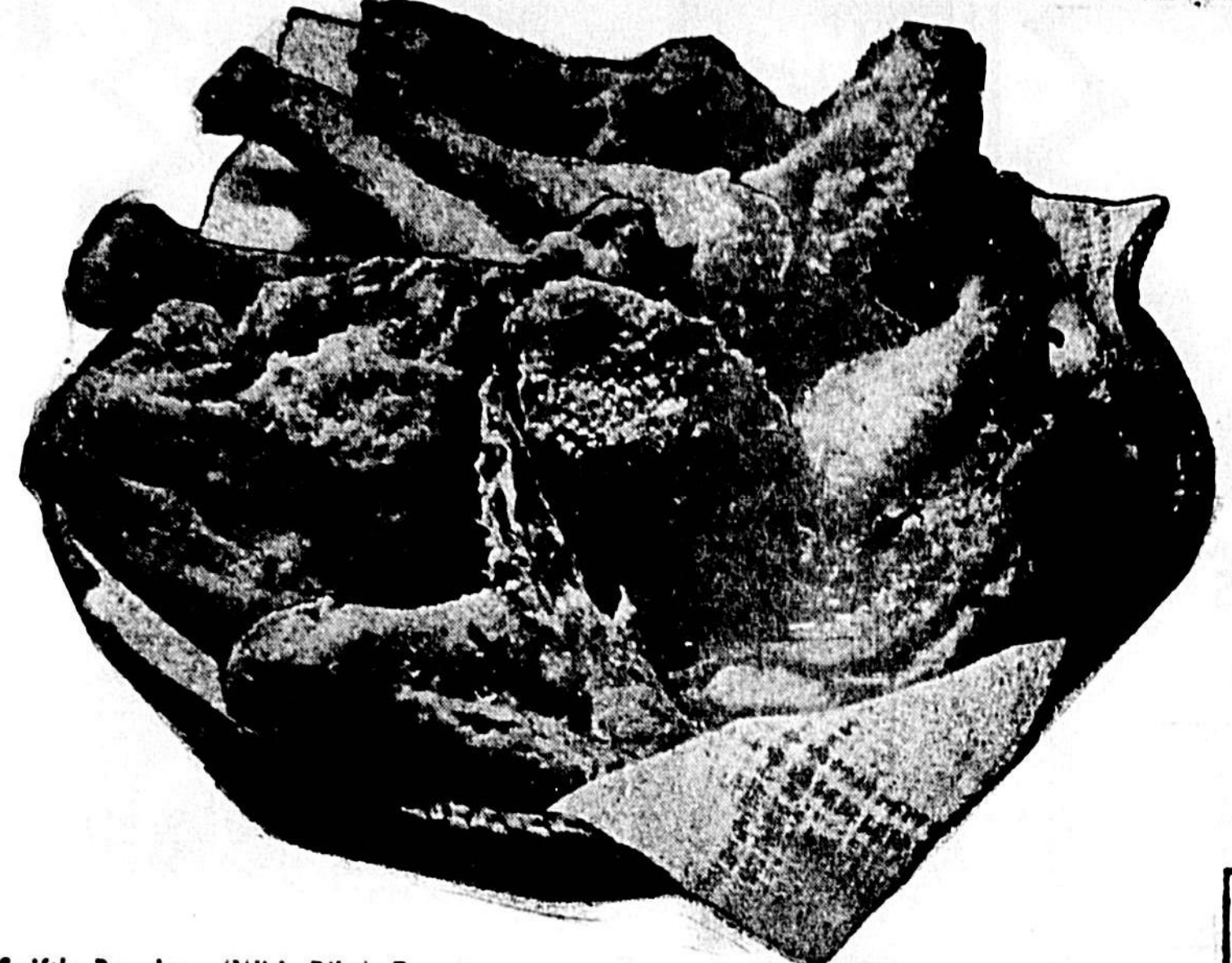

**Safety Rules  
For Swimming  
Are Outlined**

"Drowning is one of the major causes of accidental death in the United States today," Dr. Frank Leone of the Seminole County Health Department, reports. Excluding automobile and other transportation-connected mishaps, drowning ranks among the top three causes of total accidents, accounting for over 5,000 deaths each year.

One factor Dr. Leone cites is the growing numbers of people enjoying water sports in areas set aside for recreation, including fishing, camping, swimming, boating and water skiing. Drownings related to these activities appear to be on the increase, and many deaths could be avoided, the doctor advises, by exercising caution and using common sense when in or on the water. He offers these suggestions for safe use of recreational water facilities:

1. Know rules and regulations of local recreational areas and abide by them.
2. Be sure you have all the proper equipment and know how to use it.
3. Wear U.S. Coast Guard approved life jackets when boating or water skiing.
4. Don't panic in emergency situations.
5. Stay with a raized boat, if it is still afloat, until help arrives.
6. Don't overload your boat or use too powerful a motor on a light boat.
7. Stay away from water during storms.
8. Never swim alone.
9. Do not exceed your limitations as a swimmer.
10. Take lessons from an accredited instructor before engaging in skin-diving.
11. Learn artificial respiration or mouth-to-mouth breathing.

Dr. Leone also points out that water safety is not limited to public bathing and recreational facilities. The large numbers of home swimming pools and portable pools for children must assume responsibility for home owners and parents to practice water safety on their own premises. "Never allowing children to play in or near water unless supervised by an adult, and knowing the swimming capabilities of guests before they use the home pool, are two basic precautions for water safety in the home," he states.

Accidental drownings are not always the result of sport or play. There are many instances each year of small children drowning when left unattended in the bathtub or when they fall into an open well or cistern.

Dr. Leone urges everyone to be careful when using public and private recreational water facilities this summer, and to practice water safety the year round. "Many tragedies could be avoided," he says "by practicing common sense rules of water safety."

**Red Cross News**

Macdonell Type, president, Central Florida chapter, ARC, has issued the following statement on the position of the American Red Cross in the Middle East crisis: quote . . . "Since the outbreak of hostilities in the Middle East, numerous inquiries have been received as to American Red Cross Plans and equipments to assist in meeting needs of the victims of the conflict. The international committee of the Red Cross is the Red Cross agency which serves upon acceptance by the belligerents as the neutral intermediary in times of such emergencies. "Action has been requested that services of the ICRC have been accepted by the parties to the conflict and committee delegations are now stationed in the capitals of the nations involved. Committee staff is being assembled in the affected areas and the needs of the afflicted population will be surveyed by the committees as soon as possible. "All member societies of the International Red Cross family will then be advised as to what emergency relief activities are needed. Such relief is normally provided in such circumstances under the direction of the committee delegates. When a report from the committee is received, the American Red Cross will be in a position to determine its course of action. Meanwhile American Red Cross representatives are in continuing consultation with the headquarters of the International Committee in Geneva. "Persons inquiring regarding status of military dependents in crisis are encouraged to await further word from the dependents as inquiries cannot be forwarded at this time on specific individuals. "Each recipient year of service represents a minimum of 30 hours of volunteer assistance to the community through the American National Red Cross here in Central Florida and in Red Cross chapters and offices throughout the world. Many of these dedicated Red Cross workers have given hundreds of hours above the minimum each year. There is no way for us to estimate the value of this unselfish community service and we are proud and grateful that these volunteers are a part of the Central Florida chapter. Volunteers who were unable to attend the annual recognition service may receive their awards by calling at the Sanford Red Cross office located in Room 205, Meisch Building. "A first aid refresher course is scheduled for early September for those persons desiring to renew their standard first aid cards, which will expire during July to December 1967. It will be taught in two three-hour sessions.

Butler Backed Appeal Set

The Sanford Civil Service Board today refused to reinstate Ex-Police Lt. Joe T. Hickson to the police department. Hickson had been with the department for 18 years. He was fired in March and filed an appeal in April.

Board Chairman Morle Warner said in a public statement that after many hours of deliberation, "The dismissal of Joe T. Hickson by Police Chief Ben Butler on March 21, 1967, is hereby affirmed." At the final hearing this morning were members of the City Commission, Hickson's attorney Gordon Frederick, Butler as City Manager W. E. Knowles, Hickson was not present.

Frederick, after the verdict was read, told the Herald he "would take appropriate action" to get justice for his client. "We'll appeal it to a higher court," Frederick said, indicating a Circuit Court trial.

Their actions were contrary to law. They had no evidence to back up their decision," Frederick charged.

Hickson was fired in March with neglect of duty and conduct unbecoming a command officer. The board started its inquiry in the Hickson case in May and listened to some 1,400 pages of testimony. Some 25 witnesses were subpoenaed and the board held eight hearings spending a total of some 63 hours listening to all the testimony.

After the hearing this morning, Warner told the Herald the board was unanimous in its decision. They started deliberating for 90 minutes Tuesday night and reconvened at 8:30 this morning. They reached a decision 30 minutes later.

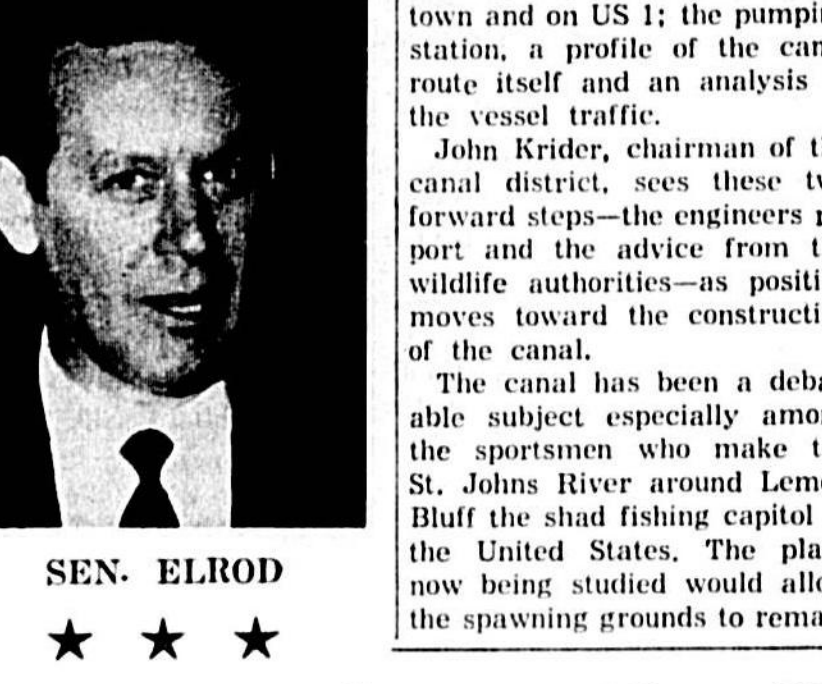
