

### Astronaut Lovell May Do Some Target Practice

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Astronaut James A. Lovell's training for his Gemini-7 mission could include some target practice.

Lovell will need to be a sure shot with a ray gun early next year when, during his planned 14-day orbital voyage, he will attempt the first space-to-earth telephone call by way of a laser beam.

Details of the communication by beam experiment were discussed by Douglas Lilly, program manager for the project, and interspersed expert Woodie Thompson.

Lovell will attempt to "converse" with those on the ground at the White Sands missile range in New Mexico.

As the Gemini-7 capsule will be launched from the Cape Canaveral launch complex, Lovell will put on a pair of blue-tinted glasses, take aim with his six-power telescope, and flash an invisible beam of infrared light at the White Sands receiver.

If the White Sands receiver can "lock on" the beam, the Lovell mission will go on.

The touchy part is aiming. Lilly admitted that hitting the receiving station with the laser beam at a slanted distance of 800 miles was about like "trying to hit a 10-penny nail with a rifle bullet at a range of 100 yards."

It is this dimension of the problem—the psychologically important aspects of prejudice—that needs to be attacked next, and on a massive scale."

After studying the report, Johnson over a leisurely weekend at his ranch named a Negro to an important federal judgeship in the District of Columbia, added a Negro West Pointer to the White House military aide staff and among other guests, took a Negro secretary, Jerri Whitling, from his White House staff to church with him here Sunday.

The Negro aide was Maj. Hugh Robinson, Army Corps of Engineers and a high ranking member of the class of 1954 at the U. S. Military Academy. He will be the Army representative on the military aide staff.

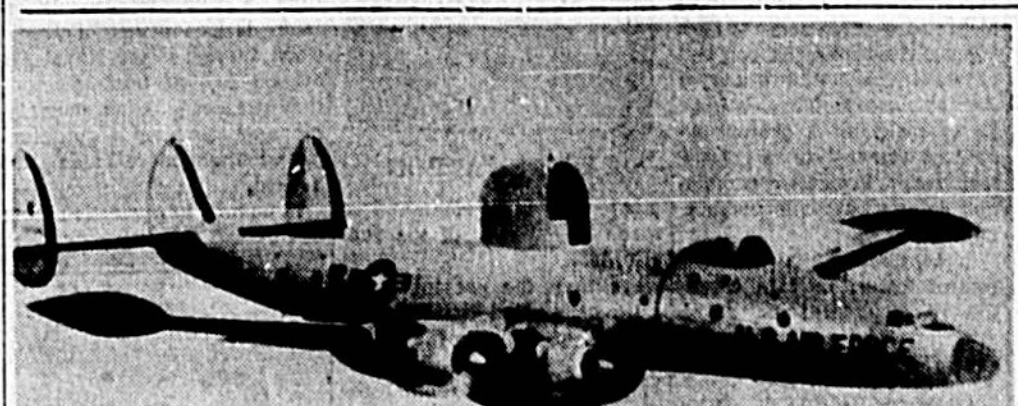

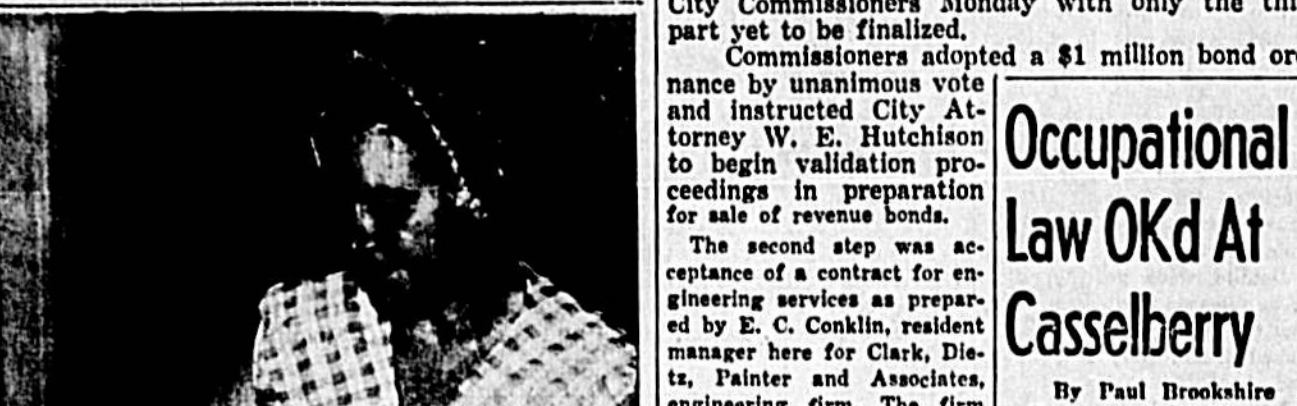

# Home Fires Study Set At N. Orlando

The latest and most serious of a series of utility room fires in North Orlando occurred Saturday when a blaze damaged the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Higginbotham, of 11 North Edgemoor Avenue.

Damage was estimated at approximately 80 per cent when fire destroyed the front portion of the home, and utility and storage rooms.

The fire was detected by Higginbotham's 16-year-old mother, here from Georgia for the wedding of her grand-daughter, Betty, later this month. She was sleeping near the source of the fire.

Also sleeping in the house at the time were the Higginbothams and their children, Terry, 11, and Betty, 10.

The North Orlando Volunteer Fire Department was assisted by the Caseyberry and Longwood fire departments in fighting the blaze.

Still recovering from the shock of having half of her home destroyed with household possessions and irreplaceable treasures scattered around the world during her husband's years in the Air Force, Mrs. Higginbotham said she has the highest praise for the fire fighters as well as friends and neighbors.

Many came out in the early morning hours to lend assistance, working until after sunrise to help remove the debris and other articles.

"Some of them," Mrs. Higginbotham said, "continued to rescue our belongings, when they were personally endangered by smoke and fire. I can't thank everyone enough."

The wedding and reception were to have been held in the home in late July and some of the invitations and gifts were ruined.

Although the exact cause of the fire has not been determined, it started in the area of the hot water heater in the utility room, as was the case in many other fires in the community. The door to the utility room had been left open overnight so that a small boat painter earlier in the day could dry.

On discussing the number of utility room fires in the area and their increasing severity, Mayor David Tilson said that he is going to contact the insurance companies investigating the various fires to learn if they can come up with a cause and solution.

In the meantime, he suggested that residents of the community clean out over-crowded storage areas, especially attics, to help prevent any further disasters in the area.

# Right-To-Work Battle At End

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The congressional battle over President Johnson's proposal to eliminate "right to work" laws in 19 states is heading for a showdown in the House with both sides predicting victory by an eyelash.

Intensive lobbying and letter-writing campaigns are being waged by the AFL-CIO, principal supporter of the measure, and the National Right-To-Work Committee, spearhead of the opposition.

Speakers for both groups say they do not expect dramatic developments before House debate begins on July 26.

The President, who has given only subdued backing to his request for repeal of Section 14-B of the 1947 Taft-Hartley Act, is not considered likely by either side to play a major public role during the debate. His bill would nullify state laws banning the so-called "union shop."

A government official who is playing a leading role in the fight, said he was confident of an administration victory.

# Photography Is Expensive

**PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)**—Based on the price of payloads, the 17 close-up pictures of Mars that scientist sent Mariner 4 to set cost about \$6 million each.

# Mariner-4 Ready For Mars Tonight

**PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)**—America's Mariner-4 space camera, acting on orders from Earth, pinned its eye on Mars today and began the final, furious dash to snap the first pictures of the mysterious red planet.

Working on instructions from Pasadena's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, the tracking station at Goldstone, Calif., sent Mariner 4 the first of the 17 close-up pictures of Mars at 6:52 p.m. EDT.

The first picture is available to the world Friday, according to JPL.

Each picture will take eight hours and 35 minutes in transmission.

The photographic information is transmitted in digital formones and series—and then is placed in a computer which "unscrambles" it.

Because of weight limitations, only a small radio transmitter of 10-watt power was put on board the 570-pound spacecraft.

The instructions must be sent back literally bit by bit. Six bits of information must be received before either a picture or a zero is compiled. This makes one dot on a line of 200 dots.

One picture is composed of 40,000 dots, thus accounting for the long transmission time.

Another factor in the time element is the great distance to be covered—134 million miles. The radio signal travels at the speed of light—186,000 miles a second—but it takes 12 minutes to reach Earth.

The pictures may provide new information on the Martian terrain features about two miles long about which scientists had only photographs of the mission is considered a scientific success.

# U. S. Combat Force Will Hunt Guerrillas

**SAIGON (UPI)**—A task force of 2,576 U. S. Army combat infantrymen headed by Gen. William W. Westmoreland today searched out and destroyed Viet Cong guerrillas operating near the Bien Hoa airbase only 16 miles north of Saigon.

The infantrymen of the Army's big Red One Division bring to 71,000 the number of American armed forces in South Viet Nam. They will join an advance unit as the 100,000 Army infantrymen committed to combat in the war.

# Red China 'Pressuring' Moscow

**LONDON (UPI)**—Communist China's anxiety to get the United States out of Viet Nam is being matched increasingly by Peking's determination to remove the last remnants of Soviet influence from South-east Asia.

China's anti-American designs in Asia have been discernible for some time, but lately its propaganda machine has been geared to an all-out effort to undermine Moscow's prestige in Asia.

Russia is now being accused of secretly passing to the United States detailed lists of its arms supplies to Communist North Viet Nam, and of helping the North Vietnamese.

The latest indications from Peking point to Red China's firm determination to eradicate Russian influence from South East Asia and, more immediately, to prevent the Soviets from establishing themselves in Viet Nam as either a political or military factor.

China's propaganda machine has been geared to an all-out effort to undermine Moscow's prestige in Asia.

Russia is now being accused of secretly passing to the United States detailed lists of its arms supplies to Communist North Viet Nam, and of helping the North Vietnamese.
