Beaton and his brother Cipriano and a friend, Felipe Martinez Norma, were escorted by army trucks from the Santiago naval district to an army firing range in suburban San Juan. They were shot at 8:15 a. m.

Thurmond Wins

COLUMBIA, S. C. (UPI)—J. Strom Thurmond, R., holding, Bible-reading war hero who holds the Senate filibuster record, Tuesday won an overwhelming victory for Democratic nomination to a new U. S. Senate term. Thurmond, sometimes called a maverick by old-line Democrats, bucked the state Democratic organization six years ago to win Senate election on an unprecedented write-in campaign. He beat the party nominee to replace the late Sen. Burnet R. Maybank.

Navy Doctors Work To Save Diver's Life

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Navy doctors kept an around-the-clock vigil beside a huge grey steel decompression tank today fighting to save the life of a partly paralyzed amateur skin diver stricken with the bends. The victim, Lloyd E. Goines, 28, an Okmulgee, Okla., police sergeant, lies inside a barrel-shaped chamber, beneath a white sheet amid the harsh glare of lights.

Citrus Packers Face Illegal Payment Charges

A Sanford and Oviedo fruit packing firm were two of seventeen citrus packers that were given 30 days today in which to answer a charge of making illegal brokerage payments to favored customers according to United Press International. The Federal Trade Commission complaint said the 17 sell their citrus both directly and through brokers who are paid a set rate in most cases of 10 cents per one and three-fifths bushel box. But the FTC said each packer sells in substantial volume to some brokers and direct buyers and pays additional allowances or discounts instead of the brokerage fee on many of such sales. Packers named in the complaint are: Keen Fruit Corp., Frostwell Groveland Fruit Co. Inc., Groveland; Battaglia Fruit Co. Inc., Winter Garden; Zellwood Fruit Distributors Inc., Zellwood; John A. Taylor Co., Largo; Sorrells Packing Co. Inc., Arcadia; Knowles and Co., Leesburg; Lakeland Highlands Cooperative Assn., Highland City; Lake Wales Citrus Growers Assn., Inc., Lake Wales; Peace River Packing Co., Fort Meade; Lakeland Packing Co. Inc., Lakeland; Marion County Citrus Co., Weirsdale; Nelson & Co. Inc., Oviedo; Patrick Fruit Corp., Sanford; Holly Hill Fruit Producers, Inc., Davenport; O. D. Huff Jr. Groves, Inc., McIntosh; and Apopka Fruit Co., Apopka.

Nuclear Sub Rocked By Fire

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (UPI)—The nuclear submarine Sargo was rocked by fire and explosion late Tuesday, but the Navy averted possible disaster by opening a hatch to the burning room and partially submerging the vessel. The fire started in the after compartment, the area was flooded by submerging the stern of the submarine at an angle of about 30 degrees. The Navy said two men were unaccounted for, but emphasized that they might not have been aboard the Sargo when the fire occurred. It also said the vessel's atomic reactors were sealed off and there was "absolutely no danger of an explosion from the reactor compartment." The fire started at a leaking high pressure line in the after torpedo room, as the submarine was taking on oxygen at a pier at 12:25 a. m. Witnesses said flames shot 25 feet into the air, and six minutes later the Sargo was jolted by a large explosion. Fire boats and trucks were rushed to the scene, while two non-atomic subs and a submarine tender were moved to other docks for safety. After fire control units had battled the blaze for nearly 45 minutes without success, ships officers decided to take the Sargo a short distance from the dock and submerge her.

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One Missileman Killed, 9 Hurt In Cape Mishap

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — For 10 years missilemen have launched giant rockets into the skies here with spectacular safety, but Tuesday five flares no bigger than firecrackers ruined the record.

One man was killed and nine were injured when a "flare package" blew up for unexplained reasons in the hull of a 98-foot Titan intercontinental missile they were preparing for an early scheduled launching.

Although the huge missile, which is scheduled for major space assignments, was not damaged, it is expected the launching will be delayed while reasons for the trouble are sought and corrected.

Joseph G. Sibole, 24, of Cocoa Beach, who was killed in the accident, and his companions were among a team on a platform that surrounded the great Titan getting its pre-flight checkover.

The injuries were mainly confined to severe burns. There was also one serious hand injury. Four of the injured were hospitalized.

A spokesman for the Martin Company which makes the Titan said a so-called "squid" power package already had been installed in the missile and technicians were at other jobs on the space craft when the five flares suddenly exploded.

The solid fuel flares—only 1.5 inches long—are fired during the Titan's flight as part of its tracking system. Ground cameras that take pictures with the speed of a bullet photograph the bursting flares. The image, showing up as a streak against the sky, is a valuable directional aid to the scientists keeping track of the missile.

The flares are located in a small compartment between tanks high up in the Titan, protected by doors that are flung open by a small explosive charge at the right moment in flight.

The hull doors had not been installed when the accident happened.

Some 400 million gallons of marine fuel will be used this year by vacationers and boat owners.

Eichmann Case Heading Toward Security Council

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The collapse of diplomatic talks with Israel will prompt Argentina to take the Adolf Eichmann case before the United Nations Security Council today, informed sources said.

Argentinians demanded that Eichmann, who was taken from his territory to face a mass murder trial in Israel, be returned. Israel insisted he would be tried in an Israeli court.

Latin American sources denied reports that Uruguayan Ambassador Enrique Rodriguez Fabregat was pressing efforts to mediate the Argentine-Israeli dispute. Mrs. Meir and Amadeo met at Fabregat's New York home Tuesday.

Argentina's deadline for Israel to return Eichmann voluntarily expires today.

The deadline was set in a note to Israel June 8 demanding the return and punishment of those who captured him.

The sources said Argentina would make the same demands to the Security Council, and in addition would request an apology from Israel.

Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion already has apologized in a personal note to President Arturo Frondizi and has asked for understanding for Israel's feelings on the matter.

Eichmann, who headed Hitler's "Jewish Resettlement Bureau" during the Nazi era, is charged with responsibility for the exter-

mination of the six million Jews killed by the Nazi regime.

More people are in hospitals for mental illness than for polio, cancer, heart disease, tuberculosis and all other diseases combined, according to the National Association of Mental Health.

Six members of the Anchorage Mountain Rescue Council reached the wreckage of a Pacific Northern Airlines Constellation Tuesday night and reported all 14 persons aboard were dead.

The climbers were flown to a spot on the mountain 80 miles due east of here. They hiked a short distance to the crash scene and found the wreckage had cascaded down the craggy slopes from the point of impact about the 9,000 foot level. No attempt was made to bring out the bodies.

While in Rollins he received one of the Algernon Sydney Sullivan awards in his junior year. In his senior year, he was a member of the Chapel Choir and was a Chapel Reader. He had a part in the play "Guys and Dolls."

Kipp was born in Sanford and attended Southside Elementary School. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Priest, live at 2399 Sanford Ave. They attended the Rollins graduation and following, Robert was honored with a luncheon at the Imperial House.

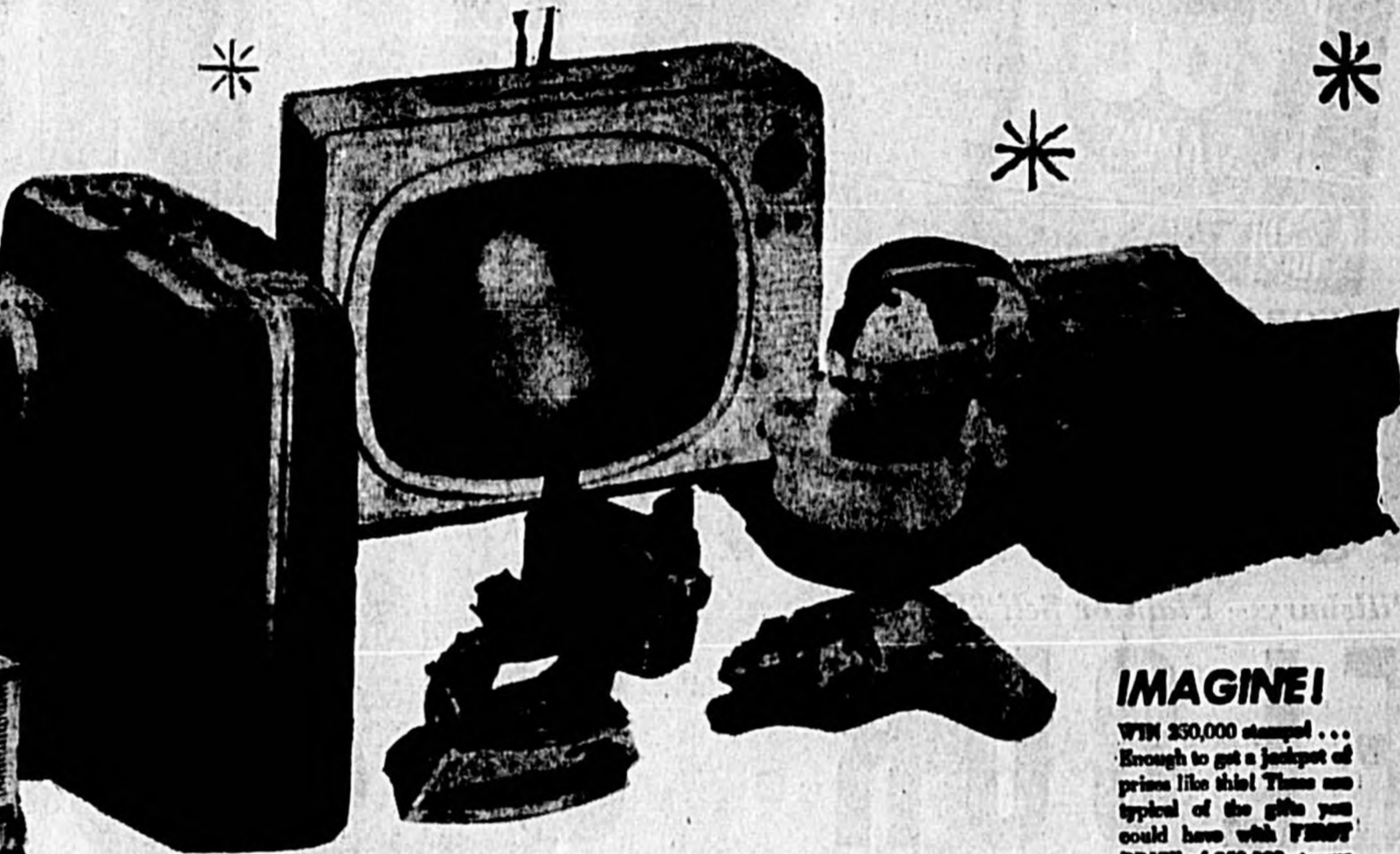

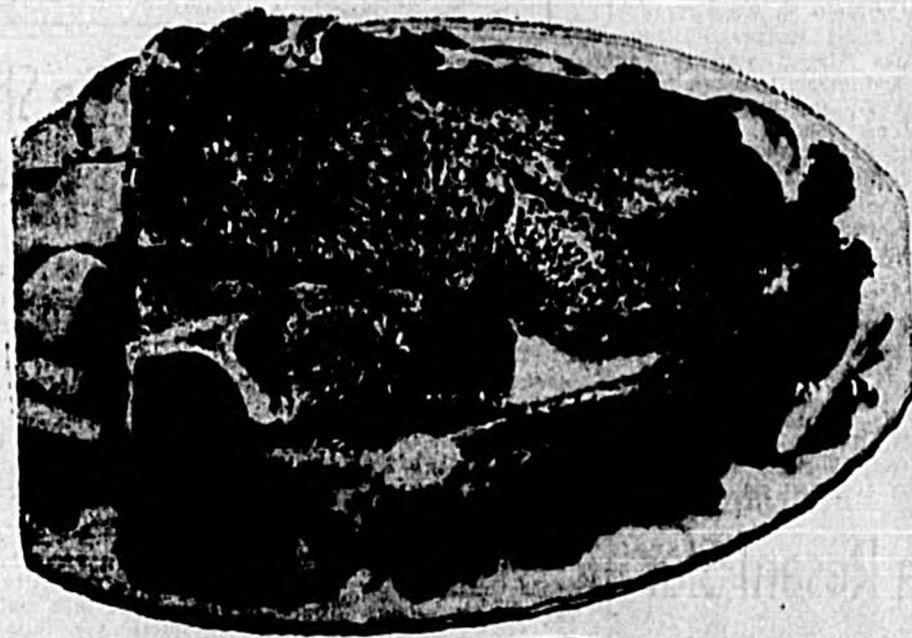

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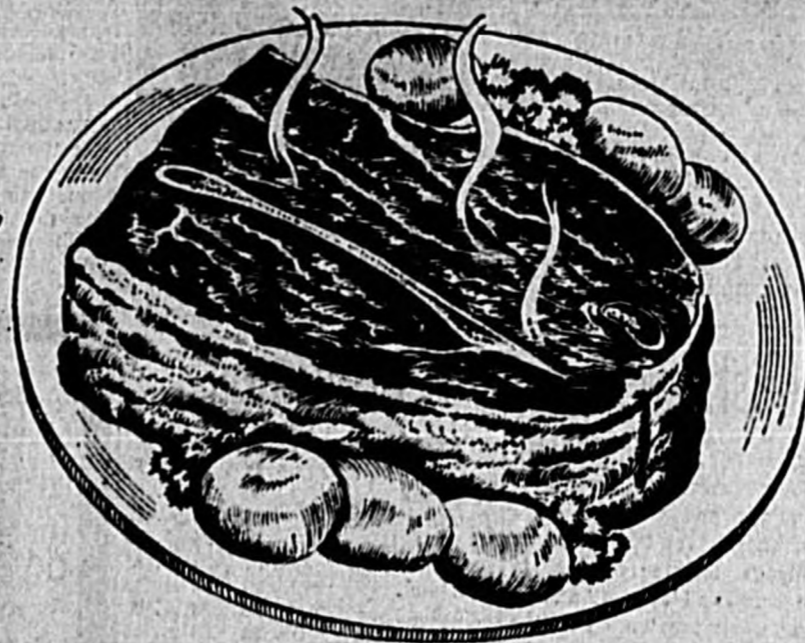

Spy Plane Incident Closes 19th Century Diplomacy

WASHINGTON—Bits and pieces of the U-2 diplomacy keep turning up. They can be put together somewhat in this form:

There is some mutual benefit to the United States and Russia alike. Both the State Department and the Kremlin evidently felt from 30 speeches made in four months by Khrushchev and from pin-point statements made by De Gaulle and other Western spokesmen, that the summit meeting was likely to fall in any event.

Neither side was willing to give. The West was not going to leave Britain, as Khrushchev demanded. Khrushchev was not going to accept on-the-ground inspection, as the West demanded, in any disarmament package.

Had the leaders reached the summit and come to a dramatic failure on one of these substantial subjects, there might have been greater cause to fear a war. But when the U-2 incident supplanted a quarrel over a side-issue (not that we planned it that way) the substantive problems between East and West were not affected.

With better sets of nerves the American allies could have benefited from the U-2 episode. Heavy thinkers in the State Department, but not wholly irrationally, relate the spy plane theory to the philosophy of Woodrow Wilson. Both the U-2 and Wilson were forces in the direction of open societies. The U-2, after four years of successful aerial reconnaissance, showed that secrecy as a national policy is obsolete, if not outmoded, while Wilson tried to show that diplomacy must take the form of "open covenants openly arrived at."

True, the U-2 and Wilson were ultimate failures, but the attempts they made had great historical significance. Even after the loss of one plane, there was no technical or psychological reason to cancel all future U-2 spy flights. Indeed, it was urged that a necessity existed for the USA to go right ahead with the flights and to highjack Russia into the Eisenhower policy of open skies.

But the weak knees of the allies gave way. The Russian threats to "bury" the West now, instead of later, scared our friends and forced us to end that "phase" of the larger struggle to pierce and demolish the Iron Curtain.

The U-2 incident signals an end to 19th Century diplomacy. In the

days of John Hay and even John Quincy Adams, such an episode would have caused, at the very least, a breaking of diplomatic relations. The State Department cannot see any "advantage" in cutting off communications with Russia. The policy will be to continue to negotiate on summit subjects at other places than the summit. There is a feeling that De Gaulle will turn out to be the honest broker who bargains for the Western position with Russia.

Unless we elect a peace-at-any-price president in November, the Western lines should hold as long as France has her strong man in the breach. But it will take a very forceful American president to restore the USA to full command of the Free World coalition. Khrushchev's vilification of Mr. Eisenhower is not so much a new line as an old line. In his book "Diplomat," which was published over a year ago, the author Thayer gives the historical background of what he calls the Russian "diplomacy of vituperation."

On page 56 the author quotes a five-paragraph Russian diplomatic note to the Turkish Sultan in the 18th Century. Harper Brothers, not a prudish house, prints the letter with nine dashes to indicate gutter language which then passed for international exchange. Mr. Thayer finds that modern Western diplomacy, with its polite and often "honest" approach, comes down from the polished, soft-sell methods of Cardinal Richelieu. But Soviet diplomacy is the result, he says, of an entirely different evolution. It still has Byzantine overtones. In a paragraph which tells us what we're up against, Thayer writes:

"When the emperors in Constantinople sent Cyril and Methodius to teach the Slavs Christianity and their scholars to teach them how to read and write, their architects to teach them how to build onion-steeped churches, they also sent along their diplomats who, intentionally or not, taught them deception, chicanery, and treachery."

WORRY CLINIC by Dr. G. W. Crane

CASE E-487: Sam T., aged 19, has been guilty of numerous instances of petty thievery.

"Dr. Crane, the police have finally arrested Sam," his mother tearfully informed me. "He took some athletic supplies from a sporting goods store."

"But Sam isn't really a bad boy at heart. I have tried to tell him that stealing is wrong, but he is impulsive and when he wants things, he just takes them without thinking."

"What makes a grown young man do such things?"

"Too many parents let their youngsters take toys from neighboring children or from their brothers and sisters, but fail to emphasize property rights."

So the guilty children ultimately develop a habit of taking what they want, without thought of consequences.

When they steal within the home, doing mamma or papa always forgives them. So when they grow old enough to leave the

home, they may then continue their thievery.

But the rest of society will not overlook such evidence of juvenile delinquency; hence, a policeman soon enters the picture.

The best place to teach a child honesty is thus in his own home and before he even enters kindergarten.

Tell a child that dogs and cats don't know right from wrong. A fence doesn't indicate property rights to such animals. Thus, a dog will jump the barrier and tear up the neighbor's garden.

So, too, a human toddler may walk into the neighbor's yard and pick her choice flowers.

Unless he is quickly taught differently, he may thus form the habit of taking other people's property.

Ultimately, he may walk into a bank with a loaded gun and try to take the money from the cashier.

There is a straight road from the high chair to the electric chair.

You parents who think your youngster is too cute to be punished for his petty thievery at the age of four or five, or who can't bear to see his big tears when you reprimand him, may live to see his tears behind a barred window of a prison cell.

Tactful words are good, but a hairbrush or hickory switch is often more influential in instilling a youngster from the dangerous highway that leads straight from the high chair to the electric chair.

In dealing with adolescents who still take other people's property, it is wise to point out the insidious nature of their behavior.

For young people intensely dislike being linked with babyhood. They wish to be adults.

Show them, therefore, that babies have no sense of property rights and that toddlers take whatever they can lay their hands on.

This reaction is typical of infancy. But a child of grammar or high school age is emotionally retarded if he continues to steal.

His playmates then will think of him as a baby, not as a "big shot" or mature adult. They'll say he should still be wearing diapers.

This approach is usually more successful than to fall back on religious flims and the Ten Commandments. For young people can't bear to be "soked down" as children.

Indeed, they often steal in order to win the acclaim of their mates, and to get money for buying friendships through ice cream sodas or movie tickets, sporting goods, etc.

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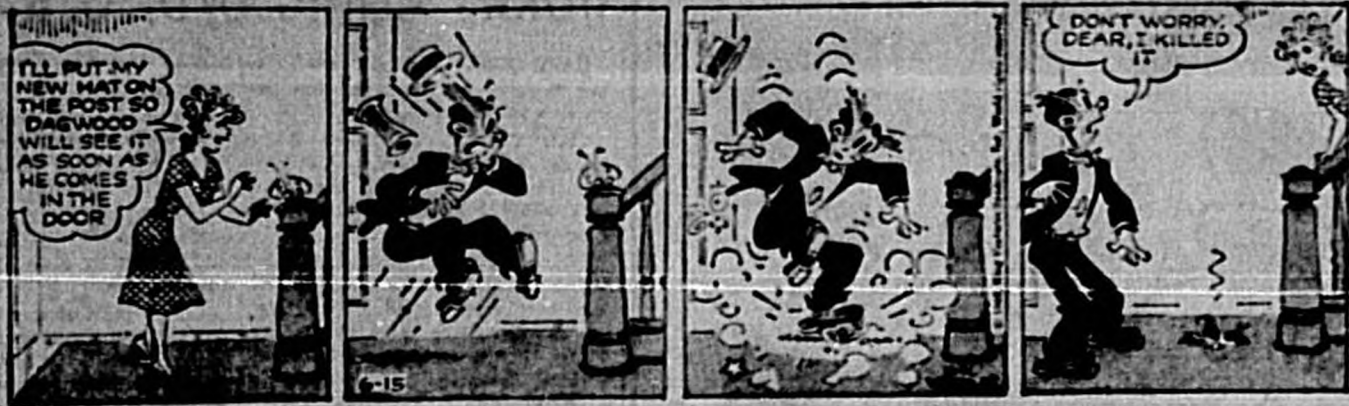

Three Seminole County Boys At 4-H Short Course

Three boys from Seminole County will participate in the 41st Annual Boys' 4-H Club Short Course at the University of Florida this week.

Cecil A. Tucker II, county agricultural agent, said the Seminole County delegation includes Jerry Arndt, Ovidio; Owen Cammack, Geneva and John Jakubcin, Slavia.

The delegation will be accompanied by Ernest C. Lundberg, Seminole County assistant agricultural agent.

About 400 boys from throughout the state are registered for the annual event, according to W. W. Brown, state boys' 4-H Club agent. Brown said delegates to the Short Course will enjoy a week of in-

struction, entertainment, recreation and contests.

Classes in agriculture will be conducted each morning by Extension Service specialists. First year boys will receive instruction in two different subjects each day, while senior boys will choose one of eight courses.

Daily assemblies will be devoted to talks by leaders in agriculture and education, including President J. Wayne Reitz of the University of Florida.

Part of each day will be set aside for swimming and other recreational activities. Competitive events including football, softball, and volleyball will be under the direction of Ray Graves, university athletic director and head football coach.

Short Course contests will include the state dairy judging runoff, tractor operator competition, public speaking and lamp making. In addition to these contests, competitive examinations will be held for several available scholarships.

not knowing they are pronouncing it the wrong way because that is the way everybody is pronouncing it with one lone except, they will assume that the person pronouncing it the right way does not know better.

Or, even if they suspect that he is pronouncing it the right way, they will charge him with putting on airs. The right way will seem to them silly and affected. It will strike them as being un-American. If he pronounces the foreign language the right way they will feel no confidence in him. They will scorn what he has to say. Certainly they will not give him any office involving trust.

Under these circumstances the person who pronounces the foreign language the right way will hesitate to do so. He would prefer to be popular and to enjoy the confidence of his fellows. So he will listen carefully and do his best to pronounce the words as they do even though he knows they are wrong.

Only a person with rare courage will be so bold as to say to those present: "I have spent years of labor and devoted large sums of money to learning the language. Therefore whatever you may think of me I am going to pronounce it the right way."

A complete five day a week program of pre-teen activities will be conducted in the mornings from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. at each playground except Seminole High School and the Civic Center.

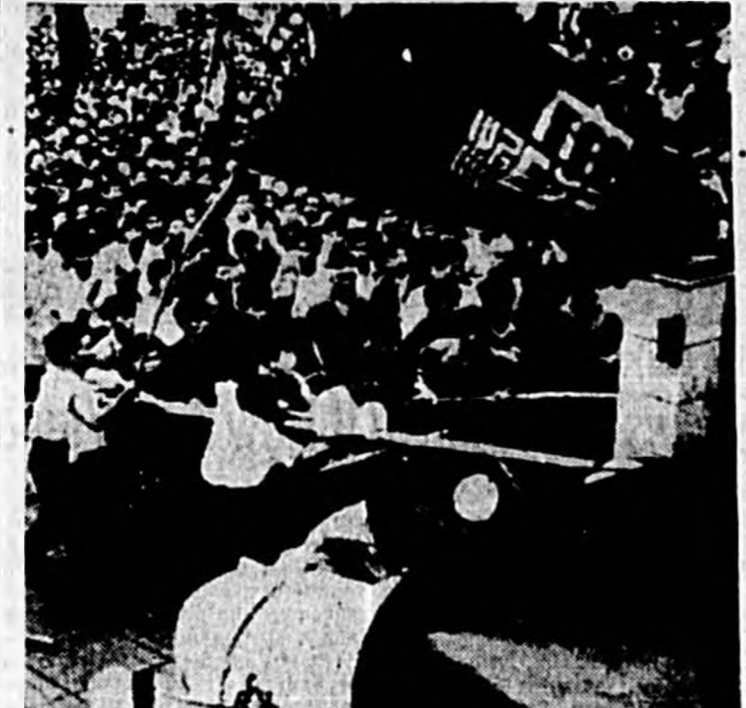
New playground areas this year include the Lake Mary School and Sunland Estates.

One Killed As Storms Hit Plains States

At least one person was killed and several injured Wednesday night when thunderstorms, hail and 80-mile-an-hour winds battered the plains states.

A brief but furious 30-minute storm made a shambles of Hastings, Neb. Mild panic broke out as residents piled into cars and tried to leave the storm-lashed city.

Hastings Airport Manager Bill Latta measured the wind at more than 80-miles-an-hour just before the storm struck. He said the wind could easily have reached more than 90 after he took refuge in a storm cellar.

Latta said the storm, which dumped 1.66 inches of rain on the town in 15 minutes, wrecked five planes. Four railroad cars and three mobile homes were blown over. Luckily, no one was in the cars.

A migrant Mexican farm worker, Cecilio Ruiz Santiesteban, 36, was killed when a grain bin overturned and crushed him near Funk, Neb. Hail and wind gusts of 71 miles hit Omaha.

Kennecott, Iowa, reported 3.50 inches of rain in 1 1/2 hours. Wind gusts hit 55 miles in Des Moines and 48 at St. Joseph, Mo.

A severe windstorm swept through an area around Jackson, Mich., damaging 20 buildings. There were no reported injuries.

2 Die In Brevard Plane Crash

TITUSVILLE (UPI) — John Walter Null, a Tampa golf professional and golf course designer, was killed Wednesday in the crash of a single-engine plane which also took the life of Dwight Alfred Norman, a professional pilot of St. Petersburg.

An official at the Tampa Golf and Country Club, where Null had been professional since 1937, said Null had flown here to close a deal on construction of a golf course.

The official said Null was also interested in buying the plane, an old Navy F-4 warplane, and had presumably taken Norman along to check it out. The plane was registered to Houston Sinclair Jr. of St. Petersburg. It crashed three miles southwest of here just off State Road 405.

Anyone See Abby? Lake Monroe Boy Wins FFA Contest

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Navy hurricane hunter planes resumed their search for "Abby" today, hoping they won't find her.

Abby is the name announced by the Weather Bureau for the first hurricane of 1960. The hurricane season officially opened Wednesday and will continue through Nov. 15.

Last year's first tropical storm, Arlene, showed up on May 29, more than two weeks early. But the Weather Bureau reports there is so far no sign of any birth of Abby.

The Navy Super-Constellations, specially equipped with radar for the search, are an integral part of Florida's hurricane warning system. There are six of them based here and in Puerto Rico.

Ike's Tokyo Visit Out

TOKYO (UPI) — Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's pro-Western government bowed to Communist-led violence today and cancelled President Eisenhower's trip to Japan because it could not guarantee his safety.

The President accepted the decision with regret in Manila, where he wound up a three-day visit to the Philippines and sailed for Formosa on the next leg of his Far East journey.

In Seoul, the South Korean government announced that the date of Eisenhower's visit there has been advanced from June 22 to

June 19 in view of the Japanese cancellation. The 18-Sunday-isle date Eisenhower was to have arrived in Tokyo.

Kishi announced his decision personally following an emergency meeting of his Cabinet, while an estimated 25,000 left-wingers milled outside and screamed for his resignation.

The cancellation was hailed as a great victory by international communists. Kishi's political opposition, and by leftist student and union groups here which had staged a month of violent demonstrations against the visit.

Europe viewed the decision as a major setback for the West in Asia and a propaganda victory for the Kremlin.

Japanese newspapers expressed shock, shame and regret over the move, although most conceded it could not have been avoided.

There was almost universal distrust in Japan at the violence which culminated early this morning when leftist mobs stormed the Parliament area and battled police furiously.

Kishi was crushed. It probably meant his ultimate resignation. Eisenhower, receiving word of the postponement, requested in Manila, was deeply disappointed.

The grim-faced Kishi announced the news to reporters himself at his official residence. He blamed the necessity for the decision on a Communist-inspired effort to destroy democracy in Japan. He made it clear he was acting because he feared for Eisenhower's safety.

The announcement set off a tremendous cheer and wild rejoicing in a throng of 25,000 student and union demonstrators who had been milling outside Kishi's windows screaming for his resignation.

"We've won, we've won," they cried hysterically. They did snake dances, hugged each other and jumped about joyously for hours afterward. Only moments before they had been threatening a new riot.

Kishi said he himself would not resign until the U.S.-Japan treaty is ratified. It is due for ratification Sunday.

Kishi's brother, Finance Minister Eisaku Sato, said the postponement means Eisenhower probably would not come to Japan before his term is up in January.

"The desire of the majority today must be denied in order to avoid any unfortunate incident on the president," Kishi said.

Outside his residence 25,000 leftist demonstrators cheered wildly and claimed a victory for their cause.

"If democracy is to bow to minority violence, it is a grave matter," the prime minister said. "The task remaining now is to strengthen security."

"It is unbearably regretful that the president's visit must now be postponed."

Machinists Strike At Cape Settled

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — Union machinists ended a 10-day strike today against Convair Astronautics and returned to work on America's priority missile program, including the intercontinental Atlas.

The Cape Canaveral local of the International Association of Machinists voted about

J. Dan Wright, Jr. of Sanford, prominent 44-year-old citrus grower and businessman, was elected 17th chairman of the Florida Citrus Commission at the State agency's annual organizational meeting in Lakeland Wednesday.

Wright succeeds J. R. (Nip) Graves of Vero Beach who stepped down after serving two years as Commission head. All 12 members of the Commission are appointed by the Governor and serve without pay.

"This is one of the greatest honors of my life," Wright said after taking over the Chairman's gavel today. "I will do everything in my power to handle this high position with decorum and honor while seeing that all segments of the industry receive fair and courteous treatment."

The youthful Commission chairman is a native of Nashville, Tenn., and moved with his family to Jacksonville when he was nine years of age. He attended Jacksonville schools and the University of Florida Law School.

Wright was first appointed to the commission in 1933 by Governor LeRoy Collins to finish out the unexpired term of another commissioner. He was reappointed as commissioner at large by Collins in 1937 and again in 1950. In 1958 he was named chairman of that important Committee and re-elected again in 1959. In 1958 he also served as a member of the Container and Concentrate Committees, while in 1959 he was a member of the Administrative, Fresh Fruit and Processing Committees.

Special Board Meet May Be Held

The City Commission may meet in special session Monday to study five engineering proposals requested by City Mr. W. E. Knowles to solve the city's water supply problem.

Knowles said today that he informed the engineering firms to turn in their proposals Friday.

The city manager added that if the proposals come in on time, he would call a special board meeting to discuss them.

City Commissioners met informally with engineers during the past two weeks and explained to the firms what they wanted. The study would include a review of the present supply and storage system in comparison with the present city needs.

Knowles had been authorized by the board last month to contact engineers after he told commissioners that the natural growth of the city is straining the capacity of its water system.

Governor Raps Remodeling Job

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. LeRoy Collins said today he wants no part of any Capitol remodeling job that calls for the rental of a private building across the street with a connecting bridge to provide larger quarters for the House of Representatives.

The proposal for the remodeling job, which will cost between \$300,000 and \$500,000, came from the House caucus which met at Pensacola recently.

Speaker-designate William C. Cline of Ocala got Cabinet approval a week ago for an advance of the necessary money so the job can be completed in time for the April 1961 session.

The approval was obtained while Collins was out of the state, although he had asked that it be held up for his return.

However, the Cabinet on a 11-7 agreed to advance money for general remodeling of House quarters and did not obligate itself to any specific part of the job.

The governor said his talks with Cabinet officials indicate that some of them feel free to turn down any specific part of the project.

Collins said he is opposed to the leasing by the state of a private building and remodeling of it at state expense. If the House insists on renting the private building and fixing it up, he said, he will insist that it take full responsibility for the arrangement and that the Cabinet have no part in it.

House Group OK's Compromise Wage Hike Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Labor Committee approved a compromise bill today to boost the \$1-an-hour federal minimum wage gradually to \$1.25 and bring 3,900,000 more workers under the wage-hour law.

The bill would give pay raises to an estimated 3,300,000 workers. It was approved by a 18 to 9 vote, generally following party lines. One Democrat, Rep. Phil M. Landrum (Ga.) and eight Republicans opposed it.

The measure is a compromise between a broader Democratic-sponsored bill and the administration's proposal to raise the wage floor to only \$1.10 or \$1.15 and extend coverage to about three million workers.

Construction Gains

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Road Chairman William Killian reported today more than \$11 million dollars worth of road and bridge projects were under way in Florida last month. Killian said he was the greatest amount of construction work during a single month in the history of the Road Department.

National Pilots Threaten Strike

Another strike warning added today to the woes of the airline industry already beset by wildcat strikes and four other threatened walkouts.

The Air Line Pilots Assn. ALPA said 300 National Airlines pilots voted to strike unless National gave them satisfactory wages and working conditions. No strike date was set.

Eastern Airlines spokesmen said only "five or six per cent" of its nationwide flights were in the air. The others were grounded by the refusal of 80 pilots to accept federal inspectors in the third pilot's seat. The Eastern wildcat strike defied a federal court injunction.

ALPA pilots stuck to their promise to strike Northwest Airlines at a minute before midnight Friday and refused to comment on a national mediation board offer of mediation.

Pilots of Trans-World, American and Pan-American Airlines honored injunction against a planned boycott of jets carrying Federal Aeronautics Agency FFA inspectors in the third pilot seat.

Unpopular Teacher

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. (UPI) — Miss Emeline Stearns, a veteran of 10 years teaching, was without a job today because she assigned her students too much homework. Miss Stearns said she was notified Wednesday that the Fredericksburg School Board has upheld its earlier decision not to renew her contract.

Senate Action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate was expected to complete action today on a bill canceling the written non-Communist loyalty oath for students seeking federal college aid, but there was no assurance the House would follow suit. By a voice vote Wednesday night, the Senate approved eliminating the written affidavit requirement of the National Defense Education Act.

Feeling Better

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Navy hospital spokesman said today with a case of bends himself today after staying more than 30 hours in a decompression chamber to help an Oklahoma skin diver who was fighting off paralysis from the ailment. The skin diver, Floyd S. Goines, 35, of Newburg, Okla., walked from the decompression tank early today smiling and in "excellent condition."

Liability Hikes In State Asked

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Insurance rating agencies today asked the state insurance department for increases in liability premiums but filed for decreases in physical damage coverage.

The proposed rates were taken under advisement.

Physical damage rates, which include comprehensive, fire, theft, and the like, have gone down consistently in past years but liability rates have gone up.

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Israel Seeks Backing On Case

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI) — Israeli diplomats today sought world support for Israel's stand on the Adolf Eichmann case but hoped the issue could be settled out of the United Nations.

The U. N. Security Council meets next Wednesday to take up an Argentine complaint that Israel violated Argentine sovereignty when it seized the former Nazi colonel in Buenos Aires last month and brought him to Israel to face trial.

British Walkers Nearing Record

LEBANON, N. J. (UPI) — Two British paratroopers set out from this Hunterdon County community today on the last stretch of their cross-country hike.

Sgt. Mervyn Evans, 35, and Sgt. Patrick Maloney, 34, plan to walk across New Jersey and arrive in New York, 24 miles away, by Friday afternoon. They will be permitted to cross the Hudson River through the Lincoln Tunnel.

Krider Answers Alignment Protest

County Commission Chairman John Krider Wednesday wrote a letter to Altamonte Springs Mayor Wilbur Hawkins answering a protest on the board's decision to go along with the State Road Department on the Maitland Ave. alignment.

Hawkins sent a telegram to the Commission Tuesday saying that the town council was protesting the alignment.

Hawkins stated that the commission did not consult with the Altamonte Council on the alignment.

In his letter to Hawkins, Krider said, "two years ago the entire program was approved and preliminary surveys were made by the SRD on Maitland Ave. to determine the most feasible alignment taking into consideration the cost of the right-of-way and engineering problems. After all details were studied, the present alignment was recommended for this project. The recommendation by the SRD was accepted by the commission."

"Recently, after several complaints from property owners of the west side of the project, the commission requested the SRD to state out an alignment taking

equally from the east and west sides. After completion of the survey, the board made an extensive on-the-scene investigation and it found that six homes were affected on the west side under the present alignment. However, taking equally from both sides, 20 additional homes would be affected," Krider said.

"The change of alignment would increase the cost of right-of-way tremendously," Krider continued.

"However," Krider added, "if the Altamonte Council would be willing to pay the additional cost we would be glad to consider the change."
