TRADE EXTENSION COMMITTEE EXPECTS BIG CROWD HERE FROM ADJOINING COUNTIES

The Trade Extension committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce has about completed all arrangements which will make Thursday, September 29th a Gala Day in every sense of the word.

The thousands of visitors expected in Sanford that day will be more thoroughly entertained than a small boy at a three ring circus. The program as arranged by the committee is as follows:

10 a. m. a parade, which will consist of the Sanford Band, Sanford's own Company D, the tournament riders, and automobiles with the business men and any others who desire to participate in this parade.

The parade will be led by Sheriff Hand, who has officiated many times in the role of Marshall. Those participating in the parade will assemble at Central Park and Oak streets, and the route will be down Oak to First, from First to Magnolia, out Magnolia to Seventh, West on Seventh to Park, down Park to Court House.

The address of welcome will be given by Capt. Geo. A. DeCottes, and will be followed by an exhibition drill by Company D. This drill should prove interesting to those who have never seen the operation of a machine gun, and in the use of which Company D has become especially proficient.

Following the drill the barbecue will be held, and the balance of the afternoon will be devoted to tournament and races. Arrangements have also been made to have the band give a concert during the afternoon. The barbecue will be held on the lake front and the races will be run on the same place as they were on last Armistice day.

The evening entertainment will be a large street dance starting at eight o'clock and lasting until such time as those participating call it a day.

The Rod & Gun Club have also advised that they will hold a shoot in the afternoon, at which time prizes will be offered for high scores.

The arrangements provide a good time for everybody. Everything is free and all the committee expects from those who are present is to enjoy themselves to their fullest extent and capacity.

The merchants of Sanford are also requested by the committee to decorate their stores for this occasion.

Last, but not least, is the minstrel to be given by "Co. D" and the American Legion in the Princess Theatre at 8 p. m.

Victim of Jealousy Cannot Recover—Miss Hanan Sinking

Motive Behind Shooting Remains Obscure Today

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Mildred Hanan, who was shot yesterday by her former chum, Mrs. Grace Lawes, was reported sinking rapidly today. Peritonitis is said to have set in as the result of one of the three wounds received, as she was leaving the apartment of a friend in Brooklyn with John Borland. The motive back of the shooting remained somewhat obscure. Theory of jealousy on account of Borland's attentions to Miss Hanan, advanced by the police, repudiated by Borland, Miss Hanan and Mrs. Lawes' sister, Mrs. M. E. Dittmar, in San Francisco. They expressed belief that she was temporarily deranged by drugs and liquor.

ALL CROPS NEED RAIN, SAYS BUREAU

HARVESTING PROGRESSES AND CORN YIELD SHOWS FAVORABLE.

(By The Associated Press) GAINESVILLE, Sept. 24.—Harvesting is progressing rapidly but all of the crops need rain says a review of the Florida crop conditions for the week ending today, by the Federal Bureau of Crop Estimates here. The corn yield is showing up favorable. Cotton picking is well advanced. Dry weather is hurting the late sweet potatoes. Citrus fruit is ripening rapidly but rain is badly needed.

Transplanting of truck is well advanced in South Florida in spite of the dry weather. The supply of farm labor exceeds the demand in many parts of the state.

DOUBLE HANGING AT CRESTVIEW OF TWO MURDERERS

TWIN GALLOWES CLAIM PUTNAM PONSELL AND JAKE MARTIN

CESTVIEW, Sept. 24.—A double execution took place here yesterday when Putnam Ponsell and Jake Martin paid the death penalty for the murder of John Tuggle on July 4 near this place. The trap was sprung at 12:10 p. m., and the men were pronounced dead in eighteen minutes.

A crowd estimated at 1,000 persons had gathered to witness the hanging, which was a public one.

Both Ponsell and Martin again admitted their guilt just before the execution.

A collection was taken up in the crowd for the benefit of the wife and two children of Ponsell and the wife and one child of Martin, who are destitute and more than a thousand dollars was contributed.

Martin went to his death calmly singing a hymn. Ponsell collapsed and had to be administered. Shortly before their death the men received a letter from the mother of the slain man, saying she had forgiven them for the murder of her son.

Mrs. Martin, wife of Jake Martin, Thursday sought clemency for her husband before the pardon board, not with the belief that she would be successful, she said, but in order that the now baby daughters would understand it all in after years.

The throng witnessing the execution yesterday came from the surrounding countryside. As early as Thursday automobile parties had been pouring into town.

Tuggle was murdered after he had taken the men in his automobile, and in order that he might be robbed of a trivial sum.

(By The Associated Press) JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 24.—Colonel Frank Pope, senior, one of the most noted criminal lawyers of the Southeast, and father of John Pope, local attorney, on trial for murder, died today in Port Orange at the age of 71. Col. Pope was in feeble health and because of this he had not participated in the defense of his son, but his second son, Frank Pope, Jr., is assisting in the defense of his brother. Upon announcement of the death of Colonel Pope Judge Gibbs ordered a recess until Monday morning. Tentative jury had been completed but state was challenging panel when recess was taken. Colonel Pope had never been told of his son's predicament.

But Make Some Reservations to the Treaty of Versailles

BORAH IS BORE

LEADER OF IRRECONCILABLES STANDS OUT AGAINST THE RECOMMENDATIONS

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—President Harding, in a letter to Senator Lodge, read in the senate today when consideration of the treaties with Germany, Australia, and Hungary begun said pacts would put aside last remnant of war relationship and bring complete return to peace.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Treaties of peace negotiated by the administration with Germany, Austria and Hungary were approved yesterday by the senate foreign relations committee, but with two reservations.

One reservation, similar to a Lodge reservation to the treaty of Versailles, would require an act of congress prior to representation of or participation in any foreign agencies or commissions by an American representative whose nomination would have to be confirmed by the senate. The other is designed to protect the property rights of American citizens as well as of the American government in the three former enemy countries.

Adoption of the two reservations brought from the white house the statement that while President Harding had not seen their next he favored the principles involved and no objection would be raised by the administration to ratification with the proposed reservations attached.

Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, a leader of the "irreconcilables" in the treaty of Versailles ratification fight, alone of the foreign relations committee, stood out against the recommendation that the three treaties be ratified with the proposed reservations. Democratic committee members joined with the other Republicans in ordering the pacts reported favorably to the senate where they were presented late yesterday by Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, Republican leader and committee chairman.

The treaties, Senator Lodge announced, are to be called before the senate today when he plans to make a preferential motion for their discussion ahead of all other business. It is proposed, however, to give right of way next week to the tax bill and to have night sessions beginning probably next Tuesday, in an effort to hasten ratification.

Committee discussion of the treaties yesterday developed that the administration plans to begin withdrawal of American troops from Germany immediately after ratification.

SENATE FOREIGN RELATIONS COMMITTEE ORDERS REPORT ON PEACE TREATY TODAY

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Favorable report on peace treaties between the United States, Germany, Austria and Hungary were ordered today by the senate foreign relations committee.

BOOK OF SERMONS IN BURGLAR'S OUTFIT.

MIAMI, Sept. 23.—The police always regard the contents of a burglar's kit as interesting but the discovery of a book of sermons in one held here is said to have shattered all local records for oddities. A burglar sentenced here recently by Judge Norfleet to spend the next six years in the state prison, left a small handbag of tools and other articles which upon examination was found to include a time worn volume of sermons on the "Temptation of Christ," published nearly 350 years ago. The book bore the imprint of a publisher in London, England, and was published in 1685.

FINED FOR CUSSING HIS CAR.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 23.—Although the arresting officer agreed with a local negro, that a man was justified in "cussing" his automobile when the motor failed to run, Municipal Judge Spear did not take the same position when the motorist appeared before him Thursday and the negro was fined \$10 and costs for using profane language.

The negro recently purchased at fourth hand an automobile of small size and had it overhauled. The motor balked one day this week and after vain attempts to make it spin, he stood to one side and, according to the policeman, employed almost every word known to the profane vocabulary in an attempt to express his opinion of the machine. The officer arrested the negro, ordered him into the machine and told him to drive to the police station. The car stopped five times on the trip of a few blocks to police headquarters and it was during the journey that the officer agreed with the prisoner that he had a right to express his thoughts in strong language.

FLAG APPEARED UPSIDE DOWN.

Altamonte Springs, One of the Beauty Spots of Seminole's Wonderland

STATE CAPITOL WILL BE MOVED.

No idea, plan or reform, no matter how sound in principle, feasible in execution or just to all, touching the general public interest is ever received with unanimous consent.

The first suggestion made that in the natural course of shifting populations convenience, economy and common sense demanded the removal of the seat of state government from Tallahassee to a point nearer the center of the state's population, as well as more nearly equidistant to the various county seats, met with a storm of opposition.

The demand will come from about two-thirds of the population of Florida if the sentiment in the peninsula area of the state is unanimous.

The Times-Union prints some interesting data taken from an old "Cowperthwait, Desilver and Butler" geography of Florida, published in 1855.

Seven counties west of the Suwanee river held 49,240 of the total state population, considerably more than half the entire number of people in Florida at that date.

The five southern Florida counties of Dade, Hillsborough, Orange, St. Lucie and Monroe, had a combined population of 5,520.

Briefly stated, this means that while the seven northern counties were increasing less than 42 per cent in seventy years, the five southern counties grew in population more than 34 times their 1850 total, or over 3,400 per cent!

Looking at it from another angle, these five southern counties have more population now by 11,309 than the seven northern counties, and have more population by 90,808 than the entire state had in 1850.

Florida Dairy Association Adopts Resolutions Eliminating Cattle Tick

Would Have Special Session of Legislature to Remedy Harm

MIAMI, Sept. 24.—After seeing the dairy industry development in Dade county, which has been freed of cattle fever ticks and where the cattle are kept within fenced pastures, the members of the Florida Dairy Association unanimously adopted the resolutions in favor of eliminating free range and requested Governor Cary A. Hardee to call a special session of the legislature to remedy the havoc wrought by the last legislature in an mutilating the live stock sanitary law and limiting the appropriation for the work, that it is not possible to even get pure bred tick-free cattle out of the state from quarantined counties, for exhibition at fairs. Other resolutions adopted endorsed the activities of the Florida Development Board in working for adequate laws for eradication of the cattle fever ticks, elimination of free range, fire control and reforestation, and conservation of game and fish; recommended that all dairymen purchase their milk bottles from manufacturers in Tampa or Jacksonville as soon as the plants are in operation; and authorized the president to appoint a committee of three to encourage community advertising of milk as a food. The Association elected the following members as delegates to the National Dairy Show, to be held in Minneapolis next month; President Bernard Thyson, Jacksonville; Vice-President August E. Van Espoel, Tampa; Miss May Morse, Tallahassee, and W. E. Dyrenforth, Jacksonville.
