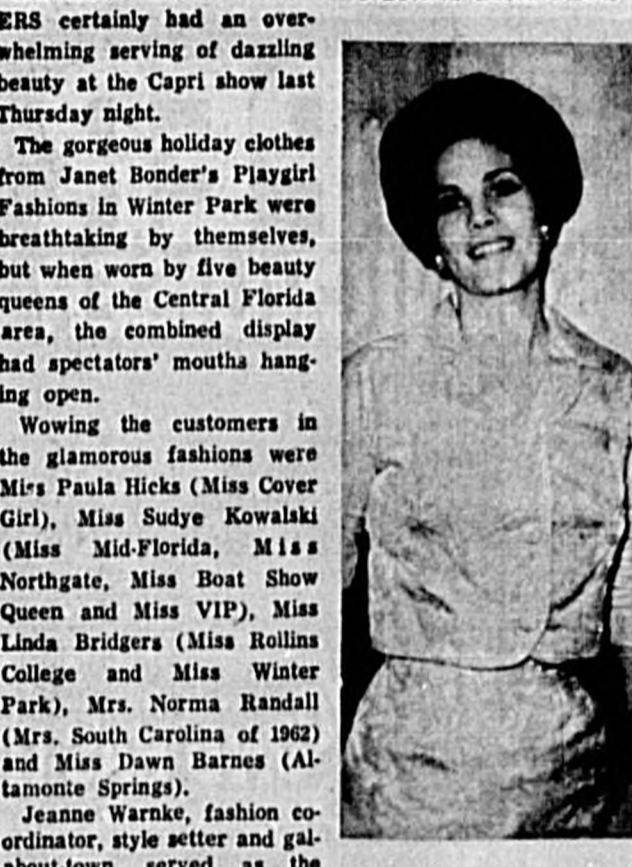

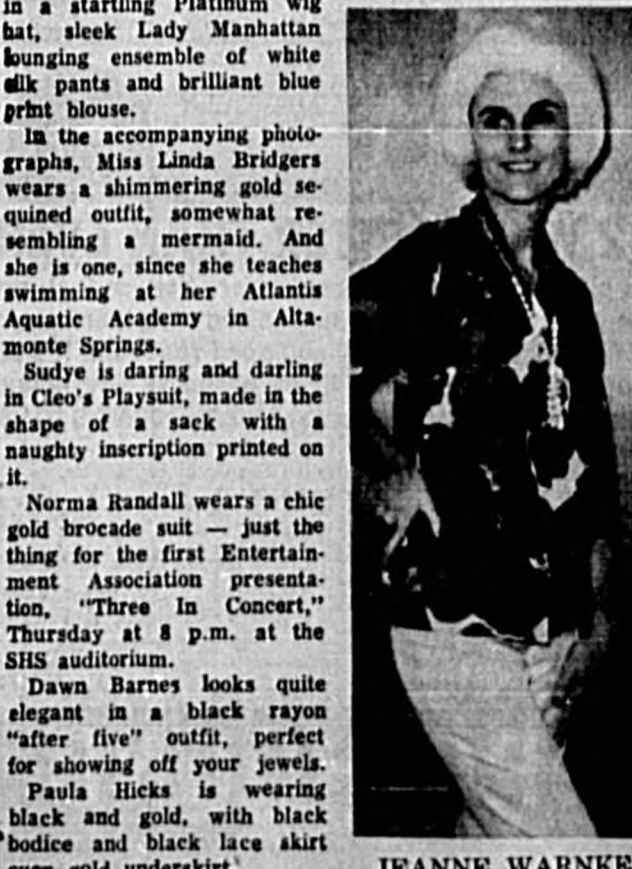

**Business Briefs**

**Ragans Came, Stayed And ... Conquered**

Three years ago Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Ragan decided to come to Florida from Greenville, South Carolina. They were heading to the Gulf Coast.

On their way they stopped at Sanford. They have still not been to the Coast.

The Ragans stayed in Sanford and started in business with the Kwite White Laundry, located at French Ave and 25th Street.

The Kwite White Laundry is the only one in town where customers have almost complete control over the wash. They can run as much water as needed and use as much soap as desired.

The washers are agitator type open washers with a 12 pound capacity. The wash takes ten minutes, after which the clothes are transferred to an extractor-rinse.

While the extractor rotates at a high speed, two streams of fresh water are sprayed on the clothes. The extractor then spin dries the clothes and they are ready for the dryer.

Because there is no waiting for the rinse water to fill and drain, the entire cycle takes about half the time normally used by fully automatic washers.

Before coming to Sanford the Ragans lived in Greenville where Ragan worked selling textile and mill equipment. He has been in the textile business many years since studying textiles at North Carolina State, where he attended college.

EUGENE, Ore.—(NEA) — A 252-pound right tackle with speed and agility is making Oregon halfbacks look mighty good.

Steve Barnett, a six-foot, one-inch senior, is Oregon's nominee, as well as that of a lot of other people, to be All-America. He's been All-Pacific Coast for two years and was chosen on a second All-America in 1961 and honored after every game. Big Steve, ready

and tough and carrying the nickname of Baby Buffalo, plays a lot. He played 399 minutes last year, more than any other Wedfoot.

Barnett is tremendous offensively, where his blocking is superb. That's why Duck backfield men adore him. He helped them gain 309 yards against Texas in the season's opener and 491 yards against Utah.

Various sections of the count-

ry will have a chance to watch hefty Steve as the season progresses. He led the charge against Rice in Houston and will help the Duck assist the Air Force Academy dedicate its new field in Colorado Springs Oct. 20. Then, of course, it'll be Ohio State in Columbus Nov. 17.

Barnett is certain to be one of the professionals top draft choices. During his sophomore

year a scout claimed he could have been playing offensive guard then with the pros. As a physical education major, he looks forward to a pro career before settling down to teaching.

Barnett started this season hard as nails. All summer he worked on the green chain at a sawmill six miles from Eugene. That meant he handled pieces of lumber of all sizes. To keep his legs in

shape, he pumped a bicycle 12 miles daily.

When Barnett charges, with his 252 pounds something's got to give because he hits with exceptional speed for a big guy. Despite his size, he has been clocked 50 yards in complete football gear in 6.1 seconds. He is one of the joys coach Len Casanova has this year. Barnett is among the 23 lettermen, of whom nine are regulars, who make the Ore-


gon footballers so tough this season.

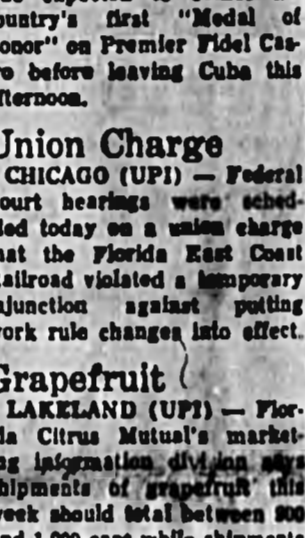

Probe Wreckage From Viet Nam Plane Crash

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI) - American military officials today inspected the burned wreckage of a U. S. Air Force L28 observation plane to determine if it was shot down by Communist Viet Cong guerrillas from the ground.

The pilot of the T28 was thrown clear of the wreckage and rushed to a hospital. Military officials said they thought it "probable" that the L28 was shot down but final determination would have to await a more thorough investigation.

American military officials denied reports that this was the first instance of Americans flying solo combat missions. They said U. S. Air Force pilots have been flying such missions for months.
