Airport welcoming more overseas flight

SANFORD - It hardly seems like it, but Am-port Orlando, at the Orlando-Sanford Airport, is almost on the verge of observing its first anni-versary. The progress at the international facility meanwhile, continues to move ahead.

Brendan Carmody, president and CEO of Central Florida Terminals, Inc. told the Sanford Herald that by this summer, his company expects a 50 percent increase in flights, and 40 percent more passengers from the United

Kingdom. "We refer to it as the United Kingdom rather than Great Britain." he said. "because the kingdom covers much more territory. We also have flights coming in here from Belfast in Northern Ireland."


He added that he expects to lure in new flights soon from Canada and Brazil.

Neither Sheafer nor Dillard could be reached for comment this morning.





Board approves two charter schools

SANFORD - The Seminole County school board approved the first charter schools in the county on Tuesday. One of the schools is designed to help those

students who are at risk of dropping out of school and the other is to cater to the needs of youngsters with learning disabilities.

The plans call for the schools to open in August

at the start of the academic year. By a unanimous vote, the school board ap-proved the charter school applications of both the

Summit school and the Rays of Hope school.

The former is designed to help 150 learning disabled students while the latter has plans to provide an alternative for students who are not doing well in the traditional classroom and are at

risk of dropping out. According to the applications. Rays of Hope officials plan to work with district officials, starting immediately, on finding the students who can best be served by their school. Potential students will be contacted by the achool about attending the classes there.

Tentative plans call for the school to be located in an empty shopping center at Airport Boulevard

and 25th Street in Sanford.

Summit is not yet sure where they will be located, officials told the school board, but they located, officials told the school board, but they are talking to district officials about a possible site in a portion of the old Teague Middle School in Altamonte Springs which was abandoned in favor of a new facility built last year. On Tuesday, the school board tentatively decided to tear down Teague's main building, but made no decision on the music and art building that the Turnett school music and art building

The value of wetlands filtering system in Lake Griffin cleanup

Bill Graf is a spokesman for the St. Johns River Water Management District.

Borrowing an idea from the cleanup of Lake Apopka, acientists have created a marsh filtering system on Lake Orifin that will soon treat the entire volume of the lake in less than a year.

Since the downing of this decade, acientists of the St. Johns River Water Management District have understood the value of using wetlands to filter lake water. At Lake Apopha the restored wetland filters out the nutrient pollution that plagues the lake. Marsh plants remove 90 percent of the actiments in the lake water as it flows through the marsh. Water clarity is improved fourfold by this flow-way system.

To restore the Ocklewsha Chain of Lakes and the Ocklawaha River, as well as Lake Apopka, District scientists are looking beyond just fixing the problems at Lake Apopka. In the past six to eight years, the District pursued the purchase of muck farms throughout the basin that were polluting the lakes and river. That effort led to the purchase and restoration of the Emeraida Marsh. With the marsh in public ownership, it did not take long to begin planning to use the marsh as a natural filter. Today, the marsh offers Lake Griffin about 1,700 acres of potential treatment area, nearly five times the size of the demonstration project at Lake Apopka.


Encouraged by initial water quality tests, work started last May to add additional horsepower and pumping capacity to the Lake Orifin for-way. Four discharge pipes soon will be pumping more than 90,000 gallons of Lake Orifin water per minute-more than 200 cubic feet per second -- through the marsh and over a lever into Haines Creek. More than just horsepower, the pumps were strategically placed to encourage sheet flow over most of the marsh.

We're in the process of fine-tuning the flowway to get an much water treatment from the marsh as possible," said John Richmond, the project engineer.

Richmond explained that the discharge pipes moving water from the flow-way into Haines Creek are located off the main channel to provide safety to bosters on the creek with improved fishing opportunities conveniently located.

Tish love these flows, and we're pretty surthese discharge spots will become favorite fishing holes. Bo we wanted to get the pipes away from the main traffic along the creak so fisherman don't block the channel," Richmond said.

Like Lake Apopha's flow-way, the Emeralda Marsh has been muck farms for decades before coming into public ownership in recent years. For decades pipes carried 20 to 25 tons of phosphorus and 100 tons of nitrogen pollution from the farms into Haines Creek each year. At many of the same sites along the creek beginning this summer, 75-and 100-horsepower electric pumps will discharge treated Lake Griffin water.



Unlike the shallow, vegetated Apoplia marsh. the Griffin flow-way is a deep-water marsh. At Apopka, the plants help filter the water. In the deeper portions of the Griffin flow-way. explains Environmental Specialist Walt Godwin, particles suspended in Lake Griffin water fail toe bottom when they reach the marsh and will gradually build up the marsh sotia. The flow-way, despite its name, is devoid of currents or flows strong enough to keep the particles suspended in the water.

Test results indicate that the Griffin Flowway is only months away from beginning to reduce phosphorus levels in Lake Griffin. Because the marsh flow-way is constructed on former muck farms, the marah is still releasing slightly more phosphorus than it is capturing. though release of phosphorus is below some expectations and far below the levels formerly pumped off by the muck farms. Both the St. Johns River Water Management District and the state Department of Environmental Protection are watching water quality figures closely.

Nevertheless, the flow-way is already treating Lake Griffin water. Water quality tests begun in November of 1995 show the flow-way has already removed more than 15 tons of nitrogen and more than 350 tons of suspended solids.

"The test data are encouraging. Already we can say that this 'low-way is performing beyond our initial expectations for nitrogen removal." Godwin said. "More than a kidney for Lake Griffin, the flow-way is restoring about 2,000 acres of fish and wildlife habital. On Lake Griffin, the people who flah, boat and play, I believe, will notice the water gradually becoming clearer and attractive to a whole variety of water-based recreation."



Drug therapy: Has it gone too far?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 88-year-old unt is a resident in a mersing bene.

She has been given Hytrin. Xanaz. Saled, Danyvel, and crythromytin. What are these drogs used for? I believe that due is cross-medicated as that she will "get along" with the mersing house shall. Her drog bills are

DEAR READER: I agree that your sent is over-medicated, over though I an not familiar with her or her med-ical problems.

Hytrin is a medication used for treating hyperiension. If your sunt has high blood pressure, this pre-scription is appropriate. Zoioù and Desyrel are anti-depres-sants. One or the other might be suit-able for your sunt, but both together are probably unnecessary.

Xanax is used to treat anxiety. In my opinion, it is unnecessary in the presence of anti-depressant therapy.

Erythromycin is an antibiotic. It is customarily administered for short periods to cure infections. I do not know why your aunt's doctor has pre-scribed it for chronic use.

I am very active in two nursing

I am very active in two nursing homes in my community, and I am con-stantly astonished at my colleagues' widely varying prescription practices. All are capable dectors, I want you to understand, however, some practition-ers prescribe 10, 12, even 15 medica-tions to elderly residents. Not only is this dangerous thow can anyone esti-mate the enormous potential for unde-sirable drug interactions?), but it is redundant and wasteful.

My personal style may be unique. I have adopted a minimalist approach: only those drugs that are absolutely necessary for my elderly patients' health and comfort.

For example, in your aunt's case, I'd make the following recommendetions.

Stop the Xanax. Your sunt's anxi-ety might be better treated with regu-lar involvement in social programs, accupational therapy and other activi-ties. Prognent visits by the nursing home chaptain might help her.


