Housing Complex For Elderly

Bram Towers Funding OK'd

A 14-story high-rise apartment building to be located in downtown Sanford has been funded for construction to be started within the next 90 days.

This was disclosed today by John Krider, board chairman of Bram Towers, and Rev. Loren D. Spicer, president of the elderly housing complex, named in honor of Bishop

Martin J. Bram, of the South Florida Episcopal Diocese.

In a prepared statement delivered to news media by Krider, it was disclosed that the feasibility study for the \$2.6 million project had been received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Occupancy for qualified elderly in one of the 160 apartment units is expected to occur during the early part of 1972, according to

the information contained in the news release.

Krider said the apartments is expected to range from \$75 to \$100 monthly with all utilities furnished to persons on a first come-first serve basis.

Additional equipment to be included in the complex will consist of refrigerators, stoves, kitchen exhaust fans, carpets and air-conditioning.

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School Girl, 13, Is Raped

Sheriff's deputies today are probing the reported rape of a 13-year-old student of Sanford Middle School Monday afternoon.

County Det. L. J. Kris and Tony Calogianis are investigating a report involving the girl, which was relayed to county authorities by Sanford police after it was determined the 13-year-old student of Sanford Middle School Monday afternoon.

According to Sanford Det. William Lykens, the girl telephoned her mother after a man followed her as she walked home from school.

The girl asked the mother to meet her on 10th Street but, when the woman arrived, her daughter was nowhere to be seen. According to reports of bystanders, the girl was pulled along by a heavy-set man who looked to be 20 years of age.

Lykens records indicated the woman's daughter had been missing an hour before she finally arrived home and told her mother she had been sexually abused. A doctor's examination determined that the girl had been sexually abused.

Lykens confirmed that the girl had identified the man who is reported to have molested her but, according to county authorities, the mother has not yet taken out a warrant.

Casselberry Is Looking To Future In New Laws

CASSELBERRY — Casselberry is moving day by day toward becoming a truly modern city, if the agenda of a public hearing held last night is any indication of things to come. The hearing was held to give citizens a chance to speak out on proposed ordinance changes which have been drawn up by the council.

A big step ecology-wise will be taken if the addition to the sanitation ordinance is adopted. This particular addition is concerned with the filtration of surface water in shopping center parking lots, and requires that this water be filtered through a rock purification system before it enters the city outfall waters.

This will curb to some extent the contamination of city water and sub-surface water by grease, oil, and other impure materials. The council also instructed Mayor Curtis Blow to look into the feasibility of the application of this legislation

to subdivision drainage systems.

The city is growing larger, and several things within the city are growing larger—or will be if several changes in the Zoning Ordinance are duly adopted. Several new changes were presented at last night's hearing. The council has suggested an amendment to the ordinance concerning the elimination of side setback requirements in C-1 commercial districts. The present requirement is that buildings be set back 7 1/2 feet from side lot lines.

This amendment, if adopted, will eliminate this setback, allowing the first occupant of a parcel of land to build up to his property line. The occupant adjacent to him, however, would be required to allow 48 inches between his building and the first for fire protection purposes.

Killed In Building A School

A Sanford resident, who died of a heart attack while preaching to a group of people in a building under construction, was buried Tuesday in La Victoire, a village 100 miles into the interior of Haiti.

Pastor Edward Blaine Schoolcraft, 77, of Riverview Avenue, Sanford, died Nov. 24 from a skull fracture and chest injuries three hours after he fell from a scaffold while finishing a school building.

The natives worked through-out the night to build his casket and carefully dug his grave between two trees outside his mission home. Thousands of the people who returned the love he had given them came through the night and the next day to pay their respects, bringing wreaths of native flowers, some having walked five hours.

A native pastor preached the funeral message and gave the eulogy.

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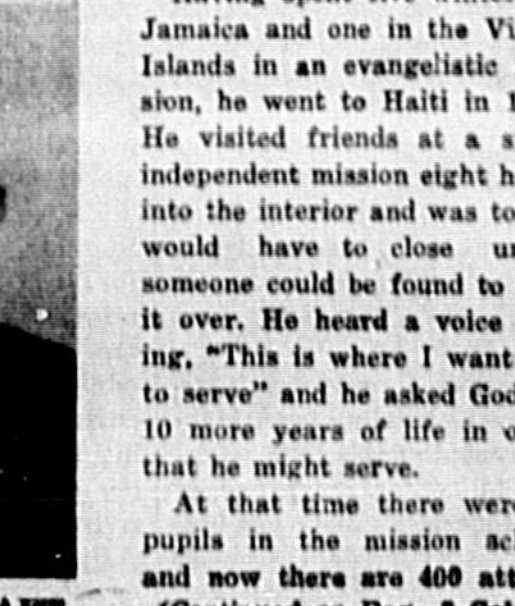
Sanford Missionary Served Haiti

He visited friends at a small independent mission eight hours into the interior and was told it would have to close unless someone could be found to take it over. He heard a voice saying, "This is where I want you to serve" and he asked God for 10 more years of life in order that he might serve.
