

At that time the United States informed Cairo of the flights and urged the Egyptians not to consider the reconnaissance missions as provocations. The U.S. message said the Egyptians "understood" the situa-







Shocked Oyster Caper

Oyster lovers can take heart, says the National Marine Fisheries Service of the U.S. Department of Commerce. A major problem of the oysters industry has been solved - how to open the stubborn things.

Most oysters are opened or shucked by hand, a difficult, time-consuming and sometimes dangerous job. Researchers with the fisheries service in Gloucester, Mass., decided to apply scientific know-how to the problem.

They tried vacuums, electric shock, ultrasonic vibrations and chemicals, all without much success. Then they tried microwave energy, which is commonly used in restaurants for heating and cooking certain foods.

They found that by placing oysters in a microwave oven and exposing them to just the right amount of energy - but not enough to cook them - the oysters stopped clamming up. Taste experts couldn't tell the microwave-opened oysters from normally shucked raw oysters.

The oven works on other hard-to-open shellfish, such as ocean quahogs, hard clams, sea mussels, surf clams and bay scallops.

The result, when ovens are installed in processing plants, will be a savings of about onethird on labor costs, increased production, lowaccident rates and a product free from shell fragments.

Area's lop

Sanford property owners are paying the highest tax millage in Central Florida and perhaps the highest within the state, according to a break-down of tax information.

Sanford Tax

The average Sanfordite, adding his 19.30 mills assessed by Seminole County to the 16 mills assessed by the city, is paying 35.30 mills, the highest millage listed in the eightcounty central state area.

New Smyrna Beach is second highest in the area with a 15.3 city millage but Volusia County is assessing lower than Seminole by a mill to place the total millage paid by property owners of the beach city at 33.635 mills. These figures include all debt service millages, district fire, mosquito and hospital

millage. An Orlando home owner is assessed 10 mills, which included with the 20.391 county millage, amounts to a 30.391 total assessment.

No Millage

Two Seminole County cities enjoy no millage assessments while two other cities are assessed among the lowest in the eightcounty area that includes Orange, Brevard, Lake, Marion, Osceola, Poik, Seminole and Volusia.

These are Casselberry and North Orlando with no city assessments and Altamonte Springs and Lorgwood with five and 3.97 mills, respectively.

Other than New Smyrna Beach, other city assessments in Volusia County include Daytona Beach, 13.90; DeLand, 12, and Ormond Beach with 7.43 mills.

Property owners in Ocala are assessed but six mills to include with the Marion County assessment of 16.93 mills for a total of 22.93.

Osceola Lowest

Figures disclose that Osceola County prop erty owners are assessed less than any of the other seven countles with 11.79 mills. This means that a Kissimmee property

owner is assessed a total 19.79 mills, when his city assessment of 8.50 mills is included along with his county millage.

Brevard County is nearest Seminole with 19.9% county assessed mills but cities like Cocoa, Cocoa Beach, Melbourne and Titusville assess far less than Sanford, with the first three limit at 10 and Titusville even less at 8.7 mills.
