Tammany's O'Brien Is Selected As Candidate To Complete Un- expired Office Term

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Oct. 7.—(A.P.)—Surrogate John P. O'Brien last night was nominated for mayor of New York by the Democratic city convention after it had heard a dramatic message from James J. Walker, abashed on ocean liner in mid-Atlantic, removing his name from consideration.

Walker wired congratulations today to John P. O'Brien, Democratic nominee for New York mayor. Perfect nomination, very happy command me, he said.

"I regret that my name be withheld from the nomination. Walker's nomination and the decision to elect him is my willingness to pay the price of the party and the good of the city."

The remainder of the night was spent in the city hall, where the Democratic party held its annual meeting. Franklin D. Roosevelt was quickly opposed by the city's executive committee, now the Democratic presidential candidate.

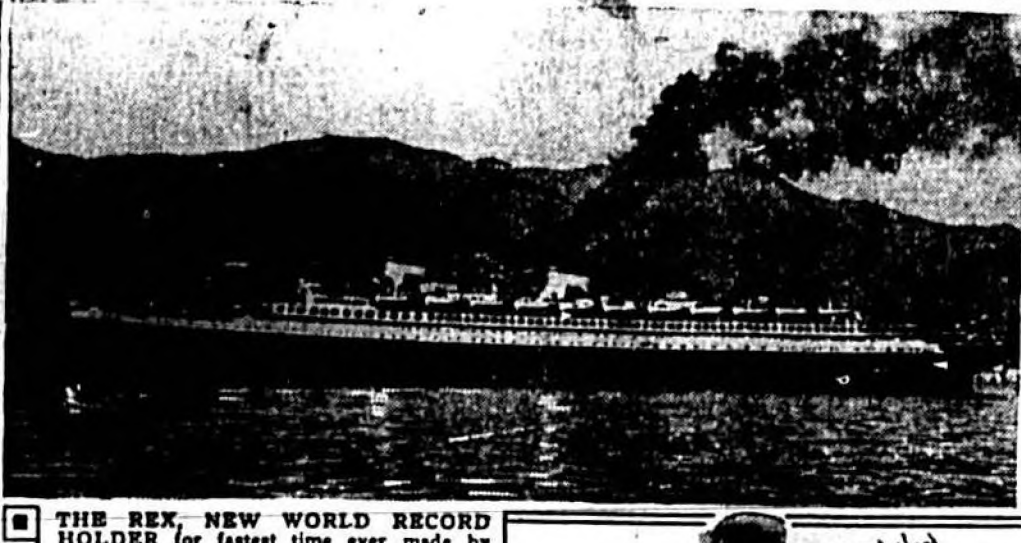

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Oct. 7.—(A.P.)—Surrogate John P. O'Brien last night was nominated for mayor of New York by the Democratic city convention after it had held a dramatic message from James J. Walker, aboard an ocean liner in mid-Atlantic removing his name from consideration.

Walker wired congratulations today to John P. O'Brien, Democratic nominee for New York mayor. "Perfect nomination, very happy Command me," he said.

"I regret that my name is withheld from the convention," Walker's telegram said, and the decision is based on my willingness to put the interests of the party above my personal desires.

The renomination of Walker, who resigned in the middle of his first term, was a surprise. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who is expected to be the Democratic presidential candidate, had been named by the convention.

"I know the people of my native city," Walker said in a message to the convention, "and I have done my best to serve them. I do not intend to run for a second term, but I am glad to see the party's success in electing a new mayor."

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The Digest Poll

Increasing his lead from approximately two thousand to over twenty-five thousand since the last report, Franklin Roosevelt occupies a commanding position in the Literary Digest straw poll. Carrying fourteen out of the twenty states thus far tabulated, he has fully demonstrated the sentiment prevailing throughout the country at the present time in favor of a change.

With nearly eight hundred thousand votes counted, the third report in the Digest poll gives Roosevelt 404,992 and Hoover 328,845. Of those voting for Roosevelt, 153,736 voted the Republican ticket in 1928. Of those voting for Hoover, 20,251 voted the Democratic ticket in 1928. Of further interest in these figures is the fact of all those voting for both candidates, 104,745 did not vote at all in the last presidential election.

A Few Silver Linings

That not all reports of returning prosperity are based on political propaganda is evidenced by a summary recently prepared by Collier's Weekly pointing specifically to a number of items which very definitely are decorated with a gleam of hope. The following items are not opinions of overly optimistic economists, business leaders, or industrial experts, but are simple statements of facts upon which anyone is entitled to base his own opinion.

HE NEEDS NO HELP

It comes as no surprise to Miami that a Literary Digest poll about the city, showing 1,370 voters for Franklin D. Roosevelt for president as compared to 1,000 for Herbert Hoover, is being reported in the Miami Herald.

CHAPIN SEES END OF DOWN TREND IN U. S. INDUSTRY

Report Shows Prices On Commodities As Improving Slowly

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Secretary Chapin said Wednesday that on the basis of commerce department figures showing gains of some industries, it appeared the downward trend had been halted.

The secretary said commodity prices had improved, particularly in the farm and food products lines, and that he found indica-

tions of strength or moderate improvement in several others.

He said the gain in business from August to September was probably 3 to 4 percent greater than the normal seasonal expectation.

The secretary observed that the advances had been confined largely to the consumer goods industries such as textiles, leather and food processing but that the heavy industries still displayed a tendency to lag. He said the construction situation was encouraging and holding up in better volume than in the two previous years.

Production, distribution and sales of goods were in greater volume in September than in August with electric power production up 2 percent, steel mill activity about one-sixth, and cotton cloth production about a

third. Chapin added, however, that automobile production had shown a decline but petroleum production had advanced 3 percent and the lumber output 9 percent.

The secretary, while citing the gains, urged that every effort be made to consolidate the increases and offset seasonal declines to be expected.

"We now are approaching the most critical phase of the present move," he said. "The impetus derived from seasonal influences will be largely spent during the current month. It is important, therefore, that everyone make steady efforts to consolidate our gains so as to offset the adverse seasonal tendencies usually operating toward the end of the year and thus maintain the improved trend."
