### Federal judge says prayer's OK

JACKSONVILLE — A federal judge has ruled that graduating high school seniors in Jacksonville will be allowed to give a message, including a prayer, at commencement ceremonies.

U.S. District Judge Terrell Hodges ruled Friday against three students and a parent who had attempted to stop student-led messages in graduation ceremonies starting this week.

They contended a school memo allowing the messages was an attempt to circumvent a U.S. Supreme Court ruling prohibiting prayer at graduation.

"Is the purpose of the policy to invite and perpetuate religious prayer?" Hodges asked. "Or is it essentially a neutral policy ... which delegates to the senior class ... the right to make a two-minute speech?"

He said he could not resolve that issue during the hearing. "I am not ... sufficiently persuaded," to stop the school system from allowing the student messages, the judge said.

### DOE finds no mob connection

TAMPA — State Education Commissioner Betty Castor has decided to take no action against a high school principal who allegedly had ties to a reputed mobster.

Castor found no probable cause to suspend or revoke the teaching credential of King High School Principal Frank Scaglione, she told him in a letter Thursday.

Scaglione's attorney, Robert Polli, said his client was pleased but not surprised by Castor's decision.

She initiated the investigation seven months ago when Scaglione's name surfaced in connection with a reputed Mafia extortionist targeted by a task force investigating Key Bank of Florida.

Scaglione, 60, testified before a grand jury in 1988 in the federal extortion case against James William Donofrio but was never charged. Federal court documents described Scaglione as a front man who delivered cash from extortion victims to Donofrio in the early 1980s when he was principal at Tampa Catholic High School.

### Insurance companies want exemptions

TALLAHASSEE — Sixteen insurance companies are seeking a state exemption to cut customers during a moratorium on homeowners coverage cancellations, claiming another hurricane will put them under.

Insurers were banned May 19 from canceling any policies based on hurricane risk for 90 days unless the potential loss from another storm would make them insolvent.

Prudential Property and Casualty, the state's fourth-largest insurer, is the biggest company to make the claim, and five exemptions already have been granted to small insurers.

Among the others hoping to quickly trim policyholders is Foremost, a major mobile home insurer in Florida, and Independent Fire of Jacksonville, which has announced plans to pull out of the state market.

The others are: Tri-State, State Capital, Highlands, Highlands Underwriters, Unisun, Merrimack Mutual Fire, Cambridge Mutual Fire, Bay State, Atlantic Mutual, Centennial, Home Indemnity, the U.S. branch of Generali, and Bankers and Shippers.

### Would-be kidnapper still at large

HUDSON — Investigators in Pasco County received more than 100 tips, but had no success finding the man who reportedly attempted to abduct a 10-year-old girl.

Because the girl described someone driving a blue pickup truck, Saturday's case bears similarities to the Feb. 19 abduction and slaying of 12-year-old Jennifer Odom in rural St. Joseph.

Using the description of the truck in Saturday's case, sheriff's office spokesman Jon Powers said, investigators might be able to identify some suspects. But they haven't had much luck so far.

The girl told deputies she was riding her bicycle along a state road about 9:45 a.m. While on her way home after buying a newspaper, a light blue pickup stopped beside her, and a white male tried to force her into his vehicle.

She screamed and fought the man, who apparently gave up and fled, Powers said.

In the Odom case, pupils told investigators they saw a blue pickup edging toward her after she got off her school bus. Odom was never seen again, and a special task force has focused on that truck in its search for her killer.

### Drive thru drug sales stopped

BRADENTON — Some customers at a fast-food restaurant were getting more than roast beef sandwiches and French fries through the drive-through window, police said.

Police said the Arby's assistant manager was selling rock cocaine through the drive-through window and inside the restaurant.

William C. Redden, 22, of Bradenton, was arrested early Thursday following an investigation into drug sales at the restaurant.

# Florida tourism to woo more blacks to visit the state

ORLANDO — Only 6 percent of the 40 million people who came to Florida last year were black, but tourism officials in Orlando and Tallahassee are starting to try to change that.

Six percent is too low, particularly since Orlando is one of the world-leading destinations, said Barry Kenney, director of the Division of Tourism in Tallahassee.

"I think there is a perception that Florida is still part of the deep South," he said.

Even if treated well, some black visitors feel more comfortable when they visit areas where there are other black tourists.

"When you go somewhere and you don't see many blacks, you think maybe there is prejudice," said Bobbie Brown, who was visiting Orlando recently from Plano, Texas.

Although moving slowly, Orlando officials are beginning to do more to attract black tourists, including a new emphasis by Walt Disney World on what it calls "special markets." The company is the only major theme park in Florida to

advertise regularly in black media.

The state is launching its second advertising campaign to woo black visitors. It will not be spending much money, perhaps only \$100,000, about 2 percent of its annual \$5 million-plus budget this year.

The campaign is still in development and will be unveiled in July.

Some black visitors point to the dearth of black executives in Orlando's tourism industry and question whether the city deserves their patronage.

Of the 380 hotels in the Orlando metro area, only three have black general managers and no more than 150 blacks work in upper-level management, supervisory or sales jobs.

Windell Daniels, chief executive of the United National Masons, picked the Marriott Orlando World Center to play host to the 300 Masons later this month.

Daniels remembers when his fraternal group held its conventions in no-frills hotels, where they were lured with nothing

more than a color TV and a swimming pool.

No one courted them with special meals or rates; they took what they were given, dingy rooms and all.

"We were very limited," Daniels said. "But it's not like that anymore."

Several hotels hustled to play host to the Masons, who will be in town later this month. The Marriott Orlando World Center, which promised good food and competitive rates, won.

But Daniels said he chose the Marriott, in part, because the hotel sales manager is a black woman.

"We are looking not just for the front desk to be African-Americans and not just the bellman to be African-American but for the management or the sales person handling the transaction to be," Daniels said.

Bob Countryman, a member of the National Organization of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers, wants to hold the group's 1994 meeting in Orlando — but only if he finds a hotel with an acceptable level of black

employment.

"We've turned down hotel before that didn't have blacks in management positions," Countryman said.

But that's not the only issue for Orlando. How much black culture can the city provide?

Zora Neale Hurston's hometown of Eatonville attracts black visitors. Some Orlando boosters recently announced plans to create an "African Quarter" for tourism. And there is also a local public-relations consultant who takes visitors on bus tours of black sites in Orlando.

Yet these efforts are small and under-promoted. Cities like Atlanta, New Orleans and Washington are cities with rich black histories with many black-owned restaurants, art galleries and clothing stores.

"If I can go somewhere where I can see black businesses, I'd rather do that," said Ralph Williams, an Indianapolis salesman who recently vacationed in New Orleans. "I've been to Orlando and I didn't care for it that much."

# Stormwater fee approved

## Ordinance accepted on first reading and public hearing

LAKE MARY — The city's Stormwater Utility Fee Ordinance was approved Thursday night on its first reading and public hearing. The matter had been defeated twice during past years.

The ordinance would charge \$3 per residential unit per month, based on an average EDU (Equivalent Drainage Unit). The money would consist of a base fee of \$1.45 plus \$1.55 per EDU.

Commercial buildings would not be charged the base fee, but be assessed based on the number of EDU's, determined by the physical size of the building and amount of paved area on the property.

As an example, Ron Ferland, of Dyer, Riddle, Mills and Precourt, who created the study, estimated a building the size of the Channel-35 studio in Lake Mary, would contain 26 EDU's.

"This would be one of the major improvements in Lake Mary to affect the largest number of people," said Mayor

Lowrey Rockett. "The biggest problems are drainage and stormwater, and in order to solve them, we must generate revenue."

Finance Director Randy Knight had projected that the ordinance could generate approximately \$232,000 per year for the city.

The mayor commended the city staff for preparing the ordinance and all of its sections for commission approval. "I realize we can't raise enough money to solve drainage problems in just one or two years," Rockett observed, "but we have got to start somewhere and I am one hundred percent in favor of this."

"One thing I want to be sure of," said Commissioner Gary Brender, "is if we charge people, we want to be certain that we can show them the results of what they are paying for."

"Everyone should realize," Rockett said, "that drainage problems are more than just a mud hole in someone's yard. Proper drainage speaks of the quality of life in our city. A good drainage program is a major benefit to the total community."

During public comments, Sheila Sawyer said, "It's good to see the commission address this problem as something that affects the entire community. I believe this is a good example of concerned government."

Resident James Thompson asked if the city would put drainage down on unpaved streets without paving, then have to reinstall drainage whenever the street is paved.

Mayor Rockett responded, "The city may have to consider paving in addition to drainage, but if we do that, we would look into combining the cost through the use of other funds." He stressed, "This Stormwater Utility Fee is strictly for drainage and stormwater control, the work involved in getting it installed and maintained, and nothing more."

The matter passed on a unanimous vote of the commission. It is expected to be brought up for second reading, public hearing and final adoption at the next meeting of the City Commission, scheduled for June 17.

# 2 whites face trial in black torching

TAMPA — With no hard evidence, inconsistent witnesses and the plea-bargained testimony of a teen-aged defendant who has told different stories, prosecutors are ready to try two white laborers in the New Year's Day burning of a black tourist.

"We're confident the system will work," said newly elected State Attorney Harry Lee Coe, a longtime judge who will make the high-profile case the first he will prosecute in 22 years.

Jury selection was set to begin Monday for Mark Kohut, 26, and Charles Rourke, 33, charged in the attempted murder, kidnapping and robbery of Christopher Wilson of New York City.

Police say Wilson was abducted at gunpoint from a suburban shopping plaza and forced to drive to a remote field, where he was taunted with racial slurs, doused with gasoline and set afire. The 32-year-old brokerage clerk from Brooklyn was left with burns over nearly 40 percent of his body.

Arrests came six days later, after then-17-year-old Jeffery Pellett started talking — first to his mother, then to police — and implicated two of his fellow labor pool buddies.

But as the weeks wore on, problems surfaced for the prosecution.

Wilson initially failed to pick anyone from photographic lineups. In the ensuing months, he identified only Kohut as his memory became clearer.

FBI laboratory tests on hairs, fingerprints and fibers failed to link any of the three to the crime, and similarly there was no link found through handwrit-

ing analysis of a note left at the scene that read "One less nigger more to go."

Then there was Pellett, a shaggy-haired teen who has rock groups, a girl's name and an obscenely tattooed on his arms. His repeated confessions and recantations resulted in varying versions of what he saw and who did the burning.

The latest account came to light late last month when he struck a deal with prosecutors still anxious to bolster their case.

Pellett, now 18, describes the attack beginning as a robbery and ending in hate. The teen said he followed behind in a Chevy Blazer as Kohut and Rourke forced their victim to drive to a dusty field called Fort Lonesome.

"He saw the whole thing," according to an investigative report on the statement. "He saw Kohut give Rourke the jug of gas and witnessed Rourke dousing Wilson with the gasoline. He saw Wilson on fire."

They left Wilson in the field to burn, and as they drove away "all three of them yelled racial remarks like 'Die, nigger, die,'" the report said.

In exchange for his testimony, Pellett is to plead guilty to a state accessory charge requiring him

to spend no more than 2 1/2 months behind bars. He also pleaded guilty to a federal charge of aiding a carjacking and was expected to get much less than the 25-year maximum sentence.

Defense attorneys paint Pellett's testimony as worthless. "That's going to be tough for any jury to live with and rely upon," said Public Defender Julianne Holt, Kohut's attorney. "Pellett has not been candid with anyone — he's changed his story too often."

Added Rourke's attorney Kay McQueen: "The state has a huge credibility problem."

Even prosecution co-counsel Len Register acknowledged Pellett's cross-examination "will be nothing short of blistering because he made those inconsistent statements."

Defense attorneys say they have witnesses who can place Kohut and Rourke at their Lakeland trailer park home at the time of the burning.

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# Presbyterians consider new study on sexuality

ORLANDO — After years of divisive debate, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is considering launching a three-year study on homosexuality.

The Committee on Human Sexuality of the 205th General Assembly voted 32-3 Sunday to recommend a churchwide study in response to more than 30 requests from regional church bodies that want the church to either strengthen or relax its ban on homosexual clergy.

Under the proposal, the ban on openly gay clergy would stand, but homosexual Presbyterians who have not made their sexuality public would be allowed to participate in the study without retribution.

Gay activists decried the call for further study as a delay tactic.

"We feel we are being sold down the drain again," said the Rev. Howard Warren of Presbyterian Act Up.

The committee was scheduled to report Monday afternoon to the full General Assembly, the church's policy-making body.

The 1991 General Assembly affirmed past church statements declaring homosexuality "is not God's wish for humanity."

The Rev. David Lee Dobler, the General Assembly's newly elected moderator, has appealed for a stand that emphasizes compassion toward homosexuals but continues to ban openly gay people from the clergy.

"I believe that the middle will hold on this," Dobler told the committee Sunday. "There are voices on the edges that our lord and we need to hear, but we don't have to be driven by them."

Sunday morning, Presbyterians for Lesbian and Gay Concerns held a spirited worship service featuring noisemakers and calls for continued activism.

Lisa Largea of San Francisco told the gathering it was not enough for the church to welcome homosexuals when it refuses to ordain them.

"As a church, we cling to the false hope that we can offer love without justice," she said.

Afterward, the Rev. Jane Spahr said the church should lift its prohibition on openly gay clergy before engaging in further study.


"Let's study together, but let's rescind this rule that keeps us divided," she said.

Spahr's appointment as minister to a congregation in Rochester, N.Y., was revoked last year by the church's highest court.

Others have called for the church to strengthen its stand opposing the ordination of homosexuals.

"For 205 years, the Presbyterian Church has maintained a clear biblical witness," said Tom Edwards, one of the authors of the Princeton Declaration, which states the Bible is unambiguous in its condemnation of homosexuality.

"If we set this aside, the Presbyterian Church will... say the authority of Scripture is secondary. The world will decide and tell us what is right. And that's a very scary thing," Edwards said.

such as food stamps, may request child support services also. The outreach program is designed to help children who are sometimes living in poverty, in part, because deadbeat dads are not paying the support ordered by the court.

Although the amount of delinquent child support payments are kept for the individual cases, Wright said statistics showing the total overall amount due are not kept.

Wright said the clerk's office writes a notice of delinquency on the case when the payment is not received. A certified letter is sent to the last known address. The individual must contact the court and if they do not, a judgment may be entered against him.

"We can't go out and locate the missing parent," she said. The information is turned over to the court. Sometimes, the person cannot be located. In some cases, men who remarry list all his assets in his new wife's name so they cannot be attached to pay the judgment.

The worst case of delinquent child support Wright has encountered was for \$67,000. She was going through some computer files and ran across the case.

"It probably was a very old case," she said, "and I don't remember how many children it involved."

Wright added that the father may have disappeared and that is why no one tried to collect the money owed.

Last week, Health and Human Services Secretary Donna E. Schalala announced a plan in

President Clinton's welfare reform package to track deadbeat parents who cross state lines and avoid paying support.

Now, one-third or more of all child support cases cross state lines and billions of dollars in child support payments are never collected. According to the government, \$16.3 billion in child support was owed in 1989 and \$11.2 billion was collected.

Schalala said the Internal Revenue Service may be called in to help get child support from parents who refuse to pay.

The Association for Children for Enforcement of Support, Inc. (ACES) is a support group working on the problem of collecting delinquent child support.

Longwood resident Debbie Brooks, who was successful in collecting \$54,000 in back child support from her ex-husband who moved out-of-state, is still active in ACES.

"Non-payment of child support is the only socially accepted form of child abuse and neglect in this country. There are a slew of federal and state enforcement laws, yet over 10 million kids in

the U.S. suffer from inadequate food, housing and medical care because absent parents refuse to meet the legal, moral and economic obligations of child support," she said. "ACES helps custodial parents emerge from welfare dependency to self-sufficiency."

ACES has a June 17 meeting scheduled at the Casselberry branch of the Seminole County Library on Oxford Avenue at 7 p.m.

# Case of mystery illness cracked

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Fear slowly gave way to relief and hope in Navajo country as doctors became more confident of having cracked the mystery of an illness that has killed 11 people.

But Tribal President Peterson Zah said Sunday that people won't be completely satisfied until doctors are certain of their diagnosis.

Officials said weekend test results showed they were right on track in their theory linking the disease to a virus found in rodent droppings.

The illness begins with a vaguely flu-like fever, aches and congestion. Death can come as quickly as a day. Most victims have been young, healthy Navajos in New Mexico and Arizona.

Zah said many Navajos are still frightened by the slightest symptoms of a cold, particularly because many live far from hospitals.

"There is a lot of fear in people, perhaps more the idea of (being) fearful of the unknown," he said.

Two representatives of the National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said they were encouraged that test re-

sults showed antibody reactions to the virus, called Hantavirus, in three patients.

"We have what we believe is good presumptive evidence," said Joseph McDade of the Atlanta-based CDC, credited with discovering the cause of deadly Legionnaires disease in 1976.

Bob Howard of the CDC said the three antibody test results had been otherwise normal. McDade and Howard said they didn't know whether the three antibody-linked cases involved victims living or dead.

Howard said about 10 cases of the illness are being studied, but only the three results were released. He said two autopsies have failed to show antibody

reactions, but that this was not unexpected because autopsies often don't show levels high enough to be detectable.

The virus, carried in airborne particles of rodent waste, is common in Asia and has occurred more rarely and less severely in Europe. But it had not previously been associated with the severe respiratory distress suffered by U.S. victims.

When the virus caused death elsewhere, it was usually because of kidney failure. None of the U.S. victims developed kidney problems.

No new cases of the illness were reported over the weekend. Of 18 confirmed cases, seven in New Mexico and four in Arizona have been fatal.

This year more students are enrolled in higher-level math classes like algebra, dropping the enrollment in basic classes by 60,000, he estimated.

In reading comprehension, 58 percent of the Seminole County students did as well as 50 percent of the national group, an increase of a single percentage point over last year.

At Lake Mary High School, the

percentage was 62; at Seminole High, it was 41 and at Lyman it was 54 percent.

Statewide, 44 percent of the Florida students did as well as the average student in the national group.

"We've seen some gain in Seminole County," Winger said. "And any gain is good."

Items, Jackman said, the district should have provided.

While only 31 percent of the district's 2,000 union members returned the surveys, Jackman said she believes the ones that were returned present a clear message.

"Seminole County teachers are spending too much of their own money for items that should be supplied by the district and the students' parents," she said. Jackman has called for teachers to stop "subsidizing" the education of the students.

"If we continue to spend our hard earned dollars for items the district should provide, the parents will never believe there is a money problem in education and the district will just continue to pass over certain items that teachers seem only too happy to supply," Jackman said.

She said she believed the students would continue to receive a strong education in Seminole County even if the teachers were to stop buying the "extras" for their classrooms.

"Absolutely, the the students would still learn," she said. According to Jackman, elementary school teachers reported that they spent an average of \$224 per school year to supplement their classroom supplies.

# Spaniard puts end to reign of Courier

PARIS — It was a curious French Open, dominated by its champions from last year, even though one was missing and the other was dejected.

No amount of heroics in the women's field could erase the fact that Monica Seles was not here to pursue a fourth straight title. Steffi Graf was subdued after winning so convincingly aware that her victory was a foregone conclusion.

Among the men, a steady stream of upsets and five set thrillers provided only temporary distraction from the central question: could anyone stop Jim Courier from winning his third title in a row?

Only on Sunday, evening after a bruising four-hour, five-set final did Spaniard Sergi Bruguera answer that question with an unexpected "Yes."

The 17th seeded Spaniard played probably the greatest tennis of his life, ending Courier's 20-match French Open winning streak with a 6-4, 2-6, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 victory.

"I was in heaven for a moment," Bruguera said. "I reached my dream from since I was 5 years old. It was the best feeling I have had."

Courier, a former resident of Sanford, had not dropped a set to Bruguera in four previous matches, but he refused to second-guess himself about his chances in the battle of baselines.

"I hit the shots at the times that I thought were correct," Courier said. "But some, and I missed some. He played better than I at the big points."

Bruguera beat top-ranked Pete Sampras, as well as second-ranked Courier, en route to his first Grand Slam title, leaving unresolved the debate over which of the two Americans is the best.

Sampras had hoped to do

Ah, but what memories.


You, collectively, the graduating class of 1993, will be remembered, for what you did, how you did it, what you attempted, and who you were.

Every time they made you repeat a drill time after time after time to the point of distraction, they were teaching you a lesson.

When they told you to hold your tongue after a win or hold your head

up after a loss, they were teaching you a lesson.

Discipline, team work, and second effort have become overworked to the point of being clichés ("There's no I in team" or "The person who will beat you tomorrow is practicing today," for example), but there's a valid reason for that: these are the values that participation in athletics teaches.

I know it sounds corny, but that's what it's about.

Success — continued success, not just the occasional win — is the product of hard work. Certainly, talent is a part of the equation, but not as much as some might think. The real talent is applying yourself to get the most out of your physical ability.

Discipline, team work, and second effort — they make sense in the realm of sports but really don't start taking on meaning in a real-world sense until you leave the safety nets. Extra credit, make-up tests, and the like built into high school educa-

tion.

And while this column appears on the sports page, these intangibles are not limited to athletics; every extracurricular activity demands discipline, team work, and second effort in some fashion.

Forget the intangible lessons learned while participating in those activities at your own peril. You may laugh now or consider this just more rantings of an antiquated mind but you consider 32, antiquated, but I firmly believe this.

Think of the good times, and remember the hard work that it took to get you there. Think of the tough times and the extra effort it took to get through them. Think of the losses and how you pulled together with your teammates to come back the next time.

Discipline, team work, and extra effort — they'll mean more to you than all the trophies, ribbons, medals, and varsity letters.

Use them well.  
And Godspeed.



# Hodgkin's disease is often curable

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've recently been diagnosed with Hodgkin's disease. If the lymph nodes in my armpits are swollen, would it help if they were surgically removed?

DEAR READER: Hodgkin's disease is a type of lymphoma, cancer affecting the lymph glands.

The disorder usually begins with swollen lymph nodes, commonly in the neck and upper body, that may be associated with fever, night sweats, weight loss and malaise. As the disease progresses, anemia, jaundice, swelling of the ankles, and difficulty breathing appear.

Hodgkin's disease is diagnosed by lymph-node biopsy, which shows a typical cancerous pattern. Once the diagnosis is established, the disease must be staged; that is, its extent must be verified because the type of treatment depends on the location of involved glands -- and whether other organs, such as liver and bone, are also affected.

This is accomplished by X-ray tests and surgical exploration.

Stage I is disease in a specific, localized area, such as the neck. Stage II reflects involvement of "skip" areas either above or below the diaphragm.

Stage III indicates tumor on both sides of the diaphragm, including the spleen.

Stage IV is extensive involvement outside the lymph system.

In the past few years, treatment for Hodgkin's disease has been remarkably improved. The affliction is now curable in most cases. Patients with Stage I and II disease are treated with radiation therapy; those with Stage III and IV disease must undergo extensive irradiation, with or without combination chemotherapy (anti-cancer drugs).

I cannot tell from your question what the stage of your disease is; it could be Stage II or, if lymph glands in your pelvis



cancer. However, some tumors appear to be caused by viruses. Therefore, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Viruses and Cancer."

## WIN AT BRIDGE

**By Phillip Alder**

It was suggested on Saturday Night Live that because of the dissolution of the Soviet Union, Yakov Smirnoff is out of work. But back in 1994 he summed up life in Russia like this: "In the United States you have freedom of speech. You can go up to Ronald Reagan and say, 'I don't like Ronald Reagan.' In the Soviet Union you have the same thing. You can go up to Chernenko and say, 'I don't like Ronald Reagan.'"

Today's deal was defended brilliantly by a top Russian player, Tim Zlotov.

In the original auction, South opened one club, the Moscow Standard System opening bid to show — as if you didn't already know — a balanced 12-15 points or an unbalanced 17-plus. In my version, North's sequence, a forcing one-no-trump response

followed by a jump to three spades, shows about 11 points and three trumps. I feel that South was optimistic to use Blackwood.

Declarer won the heart lead with dummy's ace and played a spade to his king. He continued with three rounds of clubs, ruffing the last in the dummy and bringing down the queen. He played a second trump and claimed the slam a few moments later.

At least, that is the likely scenario. However, under the second top club, Zlotov dropped the queen. Now South thought he would be overruffed if he ruffed the club three in the dummy. Instead, South played a diamond to dummy's queen and led a trump. Zlotov went in with the ace and returned his last trump. With the diamonds not breaking, declarer had to finish one down.
