

France Builds Luxury Liner For Sea Flights

Flying Boat To Carry 40 With Cocktail Bar, Stools And All

France is building a flying luxury liner for trans-Atlantic operations which promises to rival in accommodations the most modern long-distance planes of other nations.

The Societe Nationale de Construction Aeronautique de Sud-Est is the company charged with construction of the flying yacht, which will be approximately 120 feet long and will have accommodations for forty passengers.

The craft's total of 9,000 horse power will be supplied by six engines of 1,500-horsepower each placed in line along the leading edge of the wing.

Two floors, joined by a staircase, will be situated in the flying boat's hull. Forward in the top deck will be the control room, with stations for the pilot, navigator and radio operator.

Rome Is Requested To Explain Bitter Attack By Fascists

FDR Denies As Deliberate Lie Statement That America's Frontiers Are In France

Socialists Seek Aid For Loyalists

Party Urges France To Rush Supplies To Government Forces

The United States embassy in Rome today asked the Italian government for an explanation of the bitter Fascist press attacks on President Roosevelt. The request was almost simultaneous with the President's denunciation as a "deliberate lie" the report that he had said either that America's frontiers were in France or were on the Rhine.

There had been the announcement for the editorial game of the Fascist press. Before the news of the President's denial reached Europe, Virginia Guynn, Fascist's chief newspaper spokeswoman, accused that "Roosevelt wants to push his offensive into the heart of Europe up to Rhine and Alps. It is natural that the defense to counter-balance it be extended up to the Rio Grande as well as to the line of the Panama Canal."

French Socialists began a new drive today to win aid from the United States government.

533 Residents In Seminole Apply For Old Age Aid

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 2.—During the 15-month period from July 1, 1937, when the State Welfare Board was born, to Dec. 31, 1938, the end of the first calendar year, 533 residents of Seminole County applied for Old Age Assistance. It was announced here today from state headquarters of the board. On Jan. 1, 1935, there were 158 applications pending.

The statistics show that during the first fiscal year, ending June 30, 1936, 458 applications were received, this number being supplemented by an additional 81 applications the succeeding six months.

In the Twelfth welfare district 4,296 applications were received during the 18-month, with 451 applications pending as of Jan. 1, 1935.

A December, 1934, two head of \$1,100, with \$100 applications pending is an indication of the potential case load.

Former U.S. Engineer Says Ditch Would Up State Expenses

The cross state canal, if constructed as proposed, would entail millions of dollars of additional expense for the State of Florida, according to Col. William J. Wilcox, retired U. S. Army engineer, who in a letter to The Herald today said that the right-of-way, alone would cost over three and a half million dollars.

Col. Wilcox, writing from Winter Park, was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for his work as a member of the military railroad commission in England and France during the war and also as a deputy director general of transportation for the American Expeditionary Force.

An organizer of considerable renown before the war, Col. Wilcox was chief construction engineer of the Chicago Union Terminal and the Grand Central Station in New York City. He was also chairman of the advisory board of construction engineers for the tunnel under the Detroit River and for the vehicular tunnel under the North River, in New York.
